Paris, Aug. 6. — The Allied troops are maintaining their positions on the North Bank of the Vesle river, despite the efforts the Germans to reject them, the French war office announced to-

The French again advanced north of Montdidier, and are occupying the west bank of the Avre river on a three mile front.

With French, Aug. 6 .- With the Germans resisting fiercely along the Vesles river, the French artillery on the South bank of the river laid down a terrific fire on the table land. The artillery did effective work between the Vesles and Aisne rivers.

The French are shelling the crossings on the Aisne river, and pushing the Germans back to the north. Enemy artillery hold allies back from general advance on the Aisne, but the French are not suffering severe damage from bringing up of heavy artillery to as, on this 5th day of August, destroy the German machine gun nests before advancing further.

## GERMAN RECORDS FOUND AT AUSTIN

Austin, Tex, Aug. 5 .- Although government officials decline to admit the fact, it has been ascertained that during the last month all records of the German-American Alliance of Texas, stored in this city, have been seized and are now in possession of federal

These records were stored in Austin for safe keeping, but their whereabouts were quickly ascertained and reported to government representatives at San Antonio. They were supposed to contain the plans and plot of a city to be known as "New Berlin" and destined, some day, to become the capital of "the province of Texas.'

Whether or not this plot was found, the physical evidences ofthe plan are said to exist. In Burnet County, in a pleasant valley, stakes and stones mark the streets and sites for public buildings, and the principal thoroughfare in the visionary future metropolis is known as Unter den Linden.'
