> Paris, Aug. 14 -An artillery battle is raging along a thirty mile front between the Avre and Oise river, the French war office announces. The German raids along the Vesle river have been repulsed and the allies advanced at several points. French made successful raids in the Champaign

> London, Aug. 14 Gen. Haig announces increased activity in Flanders with slight advancement of the British lines at two points in the center of the salient . Artillery also continues in Picardy,

With the French, Aug 14-After being temporairly held up for one day on the Somme, the allies have again launched forward with heavy artillerying and the first stroke proved successful. To the south the French made satisfactory gains, capturing prisoners.

SEED LOANS TO BE MADE TO FARMERS

President Wilson has placed at he disposal of the Treasury and Agricultural Department \$5,000,-000 to enable them to furnish aid to wheat growers in certain sect ions of the West who have lost two successive crops by winter killing and drouth. The Federal land banks will act as financial agents of the government to make and collect the loans.

This fund is not intended to be lent to farmers who have banking collateral; the action of the War Finance Corporation in urging the banks to finance such farmers and its promise to support them in such financing, it is believed, will amply provide for them.

Loans from this fund will be made to individuals who have not banking collateral, and only where it is necessary to enable a farmer to continue to grow food products. The money will be advanced upon the crop of wheat or substitute grain planted on the land, and no loan will be in excess




