Good Ground Cover Is Seen As Best Way In Land Conservation

Good ground cover, such as dead litter and growing vegetation, continues to be the most effective conservation practice for control of wind and water erosion, according to E. E. McAlister of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Service. He stated

that conservation farmers on deep coarse textured "peanut" sands realize that a complete vegetative program is their only means of controlling erosion from wind and water.

A good vegetative program on deep sands includes a combination of winter cover crops, crop residue utilization, and strip cropping on land planted to peanuts, McAlister reported. Winter cover crops of small grain and small grain with vetch seeded last fall have given excellent protection against high winds this spring, as well as conserving maximum rainfall, it was pointed out. Many of these cover crops will be harvested for grain and on others, particularly on peanut land, the residue will be managed for continued soil protection and improvement.

McAlister pointed out that residue management on cropland is the plowing operation on grain stubble, stalks, and other crop aftermath so that they are only partially covered or left lying on the surface of the soil. He cited benefits from this practice as including reduction of erosion by controlling raindrop splash, reduction of evaporation, reduction of runoff, increased water holding capacity of the soil, as well as greatly lessening wind erosion. The soil conservation official stated that farm equipment most commonly used for crop residue management includes sweep type tillage plows, chisel plows, tandem discs and stalk cutters, and one-way plows operated shallow and at slow speed to not bury residue.

Strip cropping has become a common conservation practice with most peanut farmers, according to McAlister. Strip cropping used in conjunction with peanuts provides a barrier against wind erosion. Strips fit well into a system of crop rotation alternating from year to year, he also reported, by providing organic material which helps hold water, plant food, and air.

Crops used for strips should be adapted to soil conditions and fertilized the same as clean-tilled crops, it was pointed out by McAlister. Best results are obtained when strips are planted on the contour or across the prevailing winds, and not less than four rows of grain sorghum or two rows of sudan alternated with not more than eight rows of peanuts.

Supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District have urged farmers to give maximum protection to their land throughout the year with three practices — winter cover crops, crop residue utilization, and strip cropping on peanut land. "Conservation pays dividends in dollars and cents."

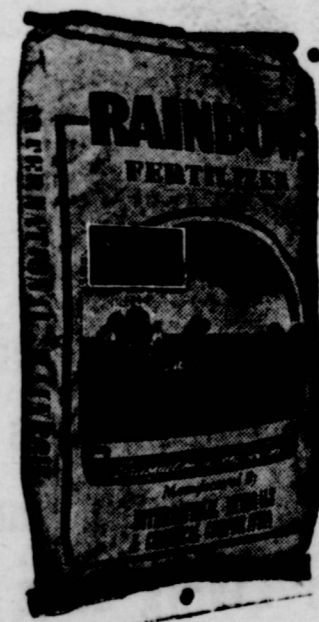
