Huns are Beating a Hasty Retreat

SAID AMERICAN BOYS OUGHT TO DIE

Frank Glass, a prominent and well to do farmer of German descent of the Rowena country, was placed in jail at Ballinger late Wednesday afternoon on disloyalty charges. He was arrested by Ranger Flynt at the home of Glass and brought to Ballinger, where he was held over night. Thursday morning he was carried before the local council of defense, and later carried to San Angelo where he will be arraigned before federal authorities.

It is alleged that Glass became very angry when he was approached by a prominent citizen and solicited to buy a Liberty Bond. The records show that Glass had not purchased any Liberty Bonds, and the records also show that he is among that class of men who are able to buy bonds, and a member of the local committee was sent to see him and solicit his support in the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign.

Judge A. K. Doss called on Mr. Glass, and it was while judge Doss was reminding the man of the sacrifice our boys are paying for the protection of America lives and American property and American freedom, that remarks are alleged to have been made that caused the man's arrest.

When told that American boys were dying in France, and that money was just as essential to win the war as soldiers, it is alleged that Glass said, "They ought to die, they had no business going over there, they can't whip Germany and they should quit and come home." It is also alleged that he said, "They are a bunch of crooks," referring to President Wilson and his administration of

affairs.

In reporting the alleged case of disloyalty, those who heard Glass, stated that he was very vociferous in his remarks, and showed that his feelings towards the American government were not in keeping with the spirit of the times.

Glass has one son in France, the young man having been drafted through the local board several months ago. It is reported that Glass said that he may be dead as he had not heard from him in a long time.

LONDON, OCT. 17.—BRITISH NAVAL FORCES HAVE OCCUPIED OSTEND, IT WAS OFFICIALLY ANNOUNCED THIS AFTERNOON

AVIATORS REPORTED OSTEND ENTIRELY CLEAR OF THE ENEMY THIS MORNING.

VICE ADMIRAL JEYES, COMMANDER OF THE BRITISH CHANNEL FLEET, LANDED AT THE FORMER GERMAN SUBMARINE BASE AT TWELVE-FIFTY-FIVE THIS AFTERNOON AND THE BRITISH NAVY IS IN COMPLETE CONTROL OF THE IMPORTANT NAVAL BASE.

Amsterdam, Oct. 17.—Official dispatches received here from Berlin today deny the abdication of the kaiser or the surrender of Germany.

London, Oct. 17.—While unconfirmed rumors of Germany's surrender continue to be circulated here, the British press Bureau, announces that the reports are circulated on unfounded facts. Nothing official has been received here indicating what Germany's reply will be to President Wilson's last note.

CAPTAIN BAUGH GETS TRANSFER

Judge A. K. Doss received notice Thursday morning that Captain J. H. Baugh, better known in Ballinger as Judge Baugh, had been transferred to Camp Sevier, Greenville, N. C.

The notice came in the form of a message advises Judge Doss that a telegram sent to Capt. Baugh by Judge Doss had not been delivered giving as a reason the removal of Capt. Baugh from Camp Travis to Camp Sevier.

It was announced some time ago that Lieut. Baugh had been promoted to Captain Baugh, and that he had been promoted from assistant judge advocate to judge advocate, but the Ballinger attorney failed to notify friends that he had been transferred.

Camp Sevier is a training camp for overseas duty, and if movement of troops keeps up it means that Capt. Baugh is on his way to France or some other foreign field.

Paris, Oct. 17.—A complete break through the German lines has been effected by the allies on the German second defense line in Belgium, according to battle front dispatches. Dense masses cavalry are pouring through the breach, and the allies have advanced nine miles on Belgium territory, throwing the enemy back with great destruction to its army organization.

London, Oct. 17.—The British began a new attack on a ten mile front between Leateau and Bohain early this morning, Gen. Haig, reported, and satisfactory progress is being made as this report is cabled. The Germans are withdrawing at practically all points where the allies are active, counter attacks growing weaker and stubborn resistance of few days ago is breaking.

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Hint that German Submarine War Fare to Be Renewed

Amsterdam, Oct. 16.—There are good reasons to believe that the German submarine warfare will reach its climax during the winter, says the Rheinisch West Phalian Gazette. It will produce an economic crisis not anticipated in entente countries.

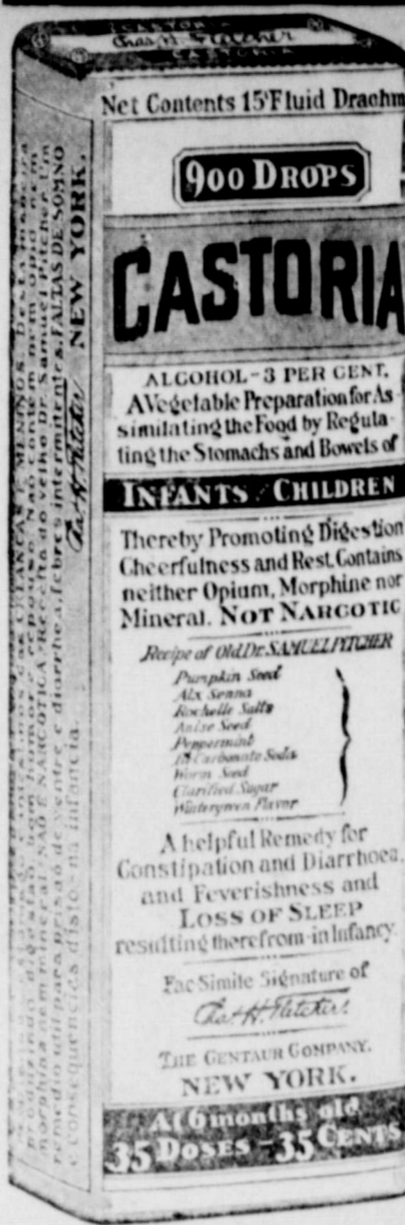

Miss Hattie Laxson is in receipt of a letter from her brother, S. V. who has been in the navy for nearly two years. Miss Hattie is in Waco, but her father forwarded the letter to her after giving The Ledger the privilege of publishing it. Following is the letter:

My Dear Sister:
Will try to drop you a few lines to let you know that I am back in New York. We arrived last Wednesday. It sure does feel good to be back in the States, but we won't stay here long. We will be gone next week.

Well Sis, I dropped you some postcards from Brunona, Ireland, and some from Dublin about a month ago. I guess we beat them to New York. I would have given you my address, but we didn't know just where we would be.

Ireland is some cold place, we were wearing our heavy clothes over there and when we got back in New York we just melted, had to change. I am stopped up with cold, out side of that I can't kick.

We were in a storm for eleven days and nights. Couldn't sleep or cook. We put this ship in commission five months ago, and we have been out at sea about four months and two weeks. So you see we haven't much time to have for recreation. I have not been ashore for four months, now think I will go ashore tomorrow it is Sunday. Every body is worn out from so long a trip.

Well sis, I haven't told you what I am on it is America's fastest destroyer. We can make fifty miles per hour, that is some speed in the water, and we have sunk and captured 3 submarines. We had some of the Germans aboard our ship for 12 days and they sure are a hard bunch of customer to put up with. You have to beat them with a club to do anything with them. We carried them to the prison camp at Boston, Mass. Sure was glad to get rid of them.

Well sis I don't know when I will be home, but from the looks of things this war is about over. So will expect to get a furlough next summer. Well we are about to go to work Will close for this time.

There is a move on foot in Congress to perpetuate indefinitely the day light saving bill, and if the bill is amended, as is now pending before congress, it will keep the clocks ticking on the present time and there will be no turning back of the clocks one hour on Oct. 28, as is now provided by the original bill.

Chamber of Commerce, and commercial organizations all over the country are flooding congress with telegrams urging that the law be not changed and that the nation return to the old time on Oct. 28th.

Under new time the sun now rises at 7:45. If we allow the time continued as it is now the sun will rise on December 21st, at 8:45, and bed time will be about twelve o'clock at night.

The object of the daylight saving bill was to save fuel and it worked well in the summer when the days are long, and nights short but to perpetuate the law will cause a great waste of fuel, as people will be forced to burn lights longer in the morning and longer at night, to say nothing of the inconvenience it will cause. We can't understand why congress should even consider amending the law.

SLOW PROGRESS IN OIL DEVELOPMENT

Salt water continues to flow from the Rowena well at a depth of about 1300 feet. Operations have been at a standstill for several days waiting the arrival of casing with which to ease the salt water off and permit further drilling.

County Judge Parish, president of the company, reported that they had received some casing and other would arrive soon, and work would immediately be resumed.

This company experienced difficulty in getting casing. The company purchased casing from a dry hole owner in the Santa Anna field, making the deal over the phone. Nothing was said about

the casing being in a well and it later developed that the owner of the big pipe had to pull it from a well, and in the pulling he had bad luck and lost part of it.

Russell Well Going Deeper

Drilling was resumed at the Russell well at four o'clock Thursday morning to permit the winding of new line, both drill and sand line. 3500 feet of each is being placed, and drilling will be resumed as soon as this is done.

The well is still in the wild cat class, and nothing new has developed since last week, when it was reported that the well was producing eighteen or twenty barrels of oil per day.

The gas pressure in this well is still strong, and at a depth of 2435 feet no accurate estimate has been placed on the production, while a considerable quantity of oil comes from the well daily.

The drill will continue to a depth 3500 unless a good well is brought in before that depth is reached.

Drilling continues in the Schultz well, with an increase in gas and oil.

Speculation is on the lull pending the outcome of the wells now being drilled. There is talk and more talk of other drilling contracts, and there will be other drilling in this county, regardless of the outcome of the present tests.

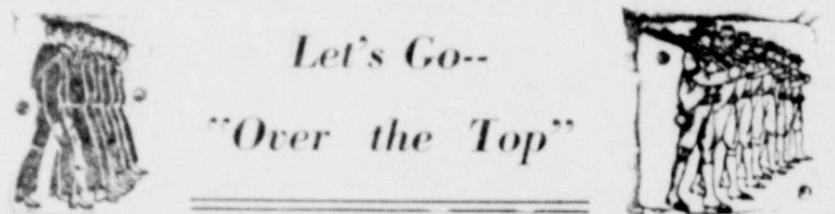
MANY "FLU" VICTIMS HEHE
