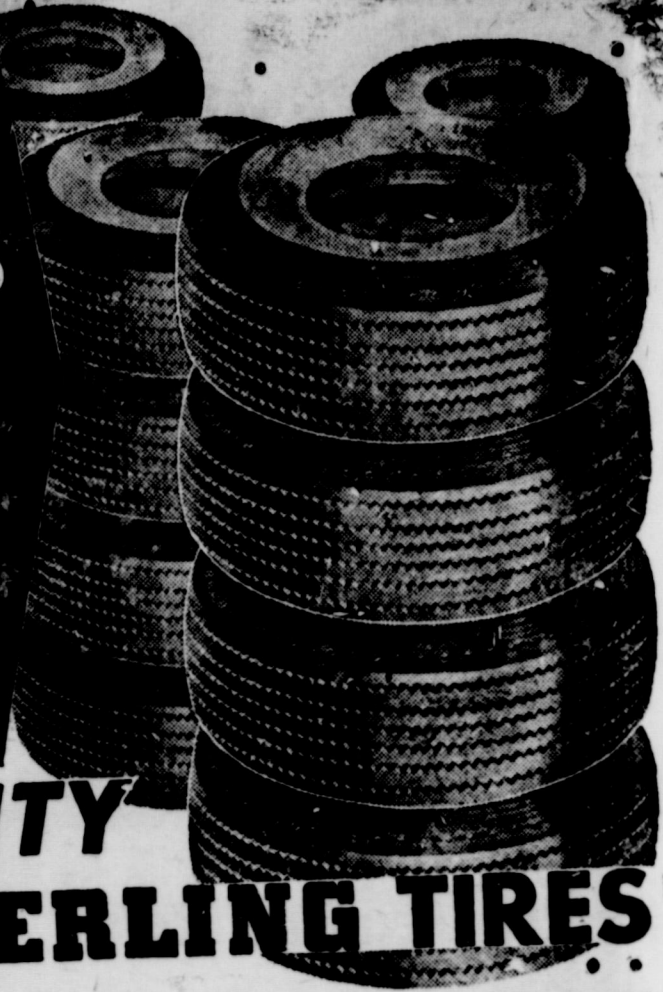

Junior College Is Registering Students For Summer Courses

Pre-registration for the summer semester at Cisco Junior College is now in progress, it was reported Friday by Dean-Registrar E. W. Mince. Official registration will be June 3 with classes to begin on June 4.

Tentative schedule for the summer classes was announced as follows:

7:00 to 8:15 a. m. — English 113, Government 213.

8:25 — 9:40 a. m. — English 213 History 213.

9:50 to 11:05 a. m. — Trigonometry or algebra, typing.

Mr. Mince stated that other classes will be taught if ten persons register for the course. Night courses will also be offered

if the demand justifies.

The first summer session will end on July 12, with registration for the second session on July 15. Classes in the second session will begin on July 16 and end August 23. Tuition for the summer is eight dollars per semester hour (\$24 for each course), Mr. Mince stated.

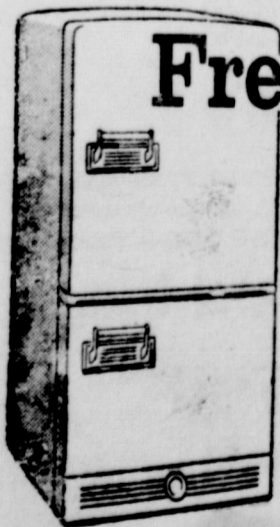
