### MORE GAS IN

At a depth of 2595 feet the gas supply in the Russell well was increased at least a half million feet, according to reliable reports brought from the well Wednesday. The new gas was struck late Tuesday evening.

This well looks better to the drillers as drilling progresses The gas supply now is sufficient to furnish fuel for drilling purposes and then some. Arrangements have been perfected for burning the excess gas and a flame twenty-five feet long illuminates the country by night as well as burning throughout the day.

. The oil from the well is carried into a storage tank by the gas pressure when the drill is pulled from the well. Those who visited the well Wednesday and saw the big gas flame says it is worth the trip to the well to see this.

W. M. Smith, local express agen underwent a serious operation at nesday morning. He is reported to be in a serious condition, and it will be several days before the result of the operation can be determined.
