Irrigation Tailwater Loss Reported By Residents

"Though small in number, they sure draw attention to themselves and cause the telephones to ring at the Water District's Lubbock office. We are speaking of irrigators who allow irrigation water to escape from their farms when they begin watering," says spokesman for the HPUWCD#1. Callers to the District office relate the details of losses of irrigation water from producers' farms, referred to as irrigation tailwater, and demand that it be stopped.

The large number of telephone calls received by the District come from a cross-section of the residents of the area. The variety of callers, whether they be bankers, lawyers, businessmen, homemakers, elected officials, neighbors, bus drivers, or mail carriers all are of the opinion that the underground water in this area is a very valuable asset which should not be wasted. Everyone seems to be aware that the ground-water reserves of the area are being depleted and that this depletion is affecting the entire population of the area. The callers often point out that the majority of the irrigators are doing a good job and do not waste water. They express

little understanding or sympathy for those who habitually waste water. Investigation of tailwater complaints is the responsibility of the Water District's staff. Upon receipt of a complaint, the staff proceeds to document the waste of water through photographs and written memorandums detailing the waste. Follow-up investigations are made to determine if the tailwater waste is a habitual occurrence. The landowner and operator are then contacted and advised that the waste of water is a violation of the law and must be stopped. If no action is taken and the waste continues, the Water District may seek an injunction in the District Courts.

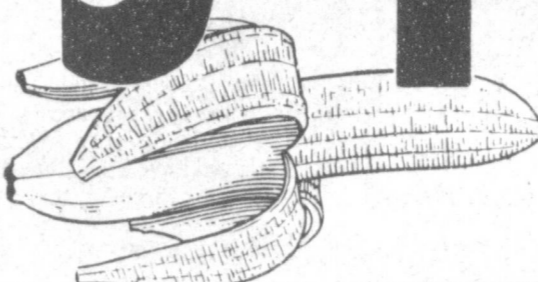

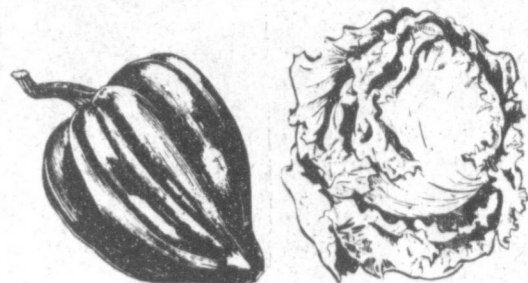

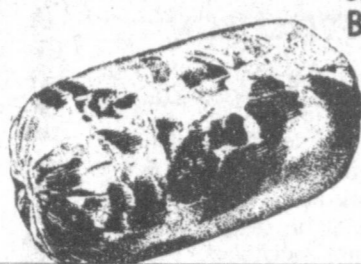

Memorial services for Dr. Dudley Lancaster, 73, of Weslaco were held Wednesday, April 4 at John Knox Village Chapel in Weslaco. Lancaster died Monday in Weslaco. Dr. Lancaster was born August 13, 1910, in Plains, N.M. and moved to Clovis, N.M. in 1920, with his parents and graduated in 1931, from New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell. He began his medical training at Texas Tech in Lubbock and graduated from Baylor School of Medicine in Dallas. He practiced medicine in Muleshoe, Portales, N.M., and Clovis, N.M. He served as public health officer in Raton from 1947, until 1950.

In 1952, Dr. Lancaster moved to San Benito where he specialized in Anesthesiology until his retirement in 1979. He was a member of San Benito Masonic Lodge number 65 and the First Presbyterian Church of Weslaco.

against landowners and operators who were habitual violators. Receipt of an injunction transfers responsibility for fines or punishment for tailwater waste to the District Court. Any further waste is considered an act of "contempt of court." "Contempt of court" citations for tailwater waste carry a maximum fine of \$500 for each occurrence and a maximum sentence of six months in the county jail. The court might also choose to direct the sheriff to padlock the well(s) to prevent any further waste of

water if the violators persist in violating the court order.

In addition to the injunctions received through the courts, tailwater waste violators should be aware that there are damages for which they could be held liable. If the tailwater waste occurs on a public road or roadway and an accident were to occur as a result or partially as a result of the loss of water, the producer of the water could be held liable. Additionally, should damages occur to another landowner's property as a result of the tailwater losses, the producer of the water could be held liable for property damages as well as loss of crops.

Some methods being used to control tailwater runoff are: 1) the use of borders to hold the water on the land; 2) the use of a tailwater return pit and tailwater return system to capture and reuse the water; 3) the installation and use of sprinkler systems; and 4) a new method of furrow irrigation using a surge time control valve.

According to state law (Chapter 52, Vernon's Annotated Civic Statutes) and Rule 1 (5) of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, irrigation tailwater waste is described as "Witfully causing, suffering, or permitting underground water produced for irrigation or agricultural purposes to escape into any river, creek, or other natural watercourse, de-

pression, or lake, reservoir, drain, or into any sewer, street, highway, road, road ditch, or upon the land of any other person than the owner of such well or upon public land."

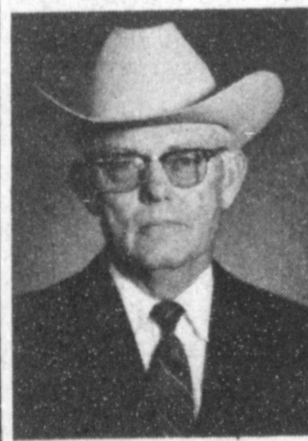
