



would sweeten the government's crop support programs and head off a potentially serious wheat surplus prior to Election Day. Late last Monday, the

Senate passed a bill that would pay wheat growers to idle part of their land this year and next and provide payments in 1985 for corn, rice and cotton farmers, if surpluses of those crops grow

This compromise package was endorsed by the Reagan Administration and will go to the full House and Senate for ratification, hopefully as early as the first part of the week of April 9.

Under the measure proposed, wheat farmers would be paid to idle 10 percent of their cropland this year and next if they agree not to plant crops on a total of 30 percent of their normal wheat acreage. Wheat-state senators had to agree to a two year reduction in the target price support level for wheat to win that provision.

For corn, cotton and rice, farmers will take a freeze on the target prices at 1984 levels in return for a similar paid land-idling program, if surpluses of those crops exceed specified trigger levels.

Investigation of tailwater complaints is the responsibility of the Water District's staff. Upon receipt of a complaint, the staff proceeds to document the waste of water through photographs and written memorandums detailing the waste. Follow-up investigations are made to determine if the tailwater waste is a habitual occurrence. The landowner and operator are then contacted and advised that the waste of water is a violation of the law and must be stopped. If no action is taken and the waste continues, the Water District may seek an injunction in the District Courts. The Water District has in the past received injunctions





Former Area **Doctor Dies**

At Weslaco

Memorial services for Dr. Dudley Lancaster, 73, of Weslaco were held Wednesday, April 4 at John Knox Village Chapel in Weslaco. Lancaster died Monday in Weslaco. Dr. Lancaster was born August 13, 1910, in Plains, N.M. and moved to Clovis, N.M. in 1920, with his parents and graduated in 1931, from New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell. The court might also choose to direct the sheriff to padlock the well(s) to prevent any further waste of

tions received through the courts, tailwater waste violators should be aware that there are damages for which they could be held liable. If the tailwater waste occurs on a public road or roadway and an accident were to occur as a result or partially as a result of the loss of water, the producer of the water could be held liable. Additionally, should damages occur to another landowner's property as a result or partially as a result of the tailwater losses, the produc-

er of the water could be held liable for property damages as well as loss of crops.

Some methods being used to control tailwater runoff are: 1) the use of borders to hold the water on the land; 2) the use of a tailwater return pit and tailwater return system to capture and reuse the water; 3) the installation and use of sprinkler systems; and 4) a new method of furrow irrigation using a surge time control valve.
