TO GRANT WOMEN MORE PRIVILEGES

Austin, Jan. 29.—In all probability women will be granted the right to serve on educational boards and boards of directors of educational and eleemosynary institutions before the present session of the Texas legislature adjourns. Provision for the appointment of women as members of such boards was made in a bill introduced in the House today by Representative Johnson of Travis county. It is expected that the bill will pass.

BROWNWOOD MAN OUT FOR SENATE

Thos. Leach, member of the Brownwood bar, announces that he has decided to make the race for state senator to succeed Scott Woodward of Stephenville, present representative of the 26th district in the Senate, who has announced his intention to resign at once.

Mr. Woodward was elected two years ago, and is a hold over this year. Since his entrance into the Senate he has been fortunate in oil investments and peanut raising and his announcement reason for retirement from the Senate is that his private business affairs require his attention. Mr. Woodward has been in bad standing with the majority of his constituents since the memorial vote against the impeachment of Ferguson, he being one of the faithful four who consistently voted against every charge filed against the Bell county politician.

Mr. Leach has lived in Brownwood for a long time, and is widely known throughout this senatorial district. For many years he was district court stenographer, and later was admitted to the bar and has been practicing law since that time. He is a prohibitionist and is closely in touch with the sentiment of the people of the district, which he desires to represent in the Senate.

DEEP TEST SHOW DOWN IN BROWN

The end of this week is to witness a show-down on Brown county's deep oil development, in the opinion of many observers. At any rate, the Byrd's store structure is going to have to prove itself and will be given only a few days in which to do so. The Bailey test, which has been hanging fire for more than thirty days with a showing of oil and gas, may not be drilled for several more days, but the Sinclair test, two miles northeast of the Bailey, is hammering away in the lime and will be in the so-called Bailey sand with something happens to delay drill in the next five or six days unless there will be no delay of it can be avoided, according to the Sinclair people.

The lime was found in the Sinclair well, at 130 feet deeper than in the Bailey, showing the dip of the structure towards the northeast as outlined by the geological surveys of that territory. Otherwise the logs of the two wells are said to be similar, and it is predicted that the Sinclair will pick up the Bailey sand at about 2520 feet the Bailey having reached it at approximately 2440 feet.—Brownwood Bulletin.

FAMOUS DUKE OIL WELLS WEAKENING

Fort Worth, Jan. 29.—Officials of the Texas Penn Company today announced that the flow of the original Duke well in Comanche county is weakening, but that it will be cleaned out and sunk deeper.

The Knowles well is still flowing about 4700 barrels. The Magnolia's Duke No. 1 is also weakening. It has a terrific gas pressure, but it is producing only about 400 barrels of oil. It first was reported as an eight to ten thousand barrel gusher.

It is understood both the Duke wells will be drilled deeper.

London, Jan. 29.—A general strike is spreading in Great Britain and Ireland. Nearly one-quarter million workmen have quit work, and many lines of industry are crippled, and there is a general tie up threatened.

Spill writes that he is now stationed in Manderscheid, Germany. He says they are in the most interesting places in Germany, and the prettiest county they have seen.

The moving around indicates that the Americans are soon to find themselves at an embarkation station and then it will be over the deep blue sea for them, and great will be the arrival in Ballinger during early spring.

LABOR EXAMINER COMING HERE

Farm Agent Eaton received notice Wednesday asking him to get the different government organizations together for a meeting here Saturday afternoon. The notice stated that an examiner for the United States Labor Service Bureau would be here to meet with the people in the interest of the labor question.

The hour and place for the meeting has not been announced, but all those interested should be here Saturday afternoon. Either Mr. Eaton or Paul Trumier can give you further information later in the week.

The labor question has been easily handled in this country up to the present, but the government is paving the way for what seems to be coming when demobilization is well under way, and when the time comes for bringing the idle men and the work for him to do together.

PECAN TREES ARE DONATED TO PARK

M. C. Falls, landscape gardner for the county, reports that several have donated pecan trees for the park, and that he hopes to have the order ready to be placed for the trees at an early date. There is room for many more trees, and the earlier they are put out the better results will follow in growing them. Every vacant space suitable for a tree should be filled at once.

B. F. Brown, of the Crews country, was transacting business in Ballinger Tuesday and renewed with the Banner Ledger for the ensuing year. He was hauling out supplies for his community and reports the roads awful muddy and hard to get over in his section. He reports the wheat and oats in his section doing splendid the freeze let up and the fine rains came.

Washington, Jan. 29.—A resolution directing the department of agriculture to inform the senate whether there are large surplus of supplies of foodstuff in warehouses, and where such supplies are stored, is to be introduced by Senator Kenyon, of Iowa.

Senator Kenyon announced that he will ask for this information to get facts, as the senate wants to know where the surplus of foodstuffs are, by whom held, and for what purpose they are being held, and ascertain if holding is in an effort to uphold high prices.

PAY OIL IN RUSSELL WELL

That the Russell well will prove a paying proposition at a depth of 2300 feet, where oil was first found, is the opinion of those who are familiar with the log of the well.

"If the well was close to the railroad," said a prominent oil man, "it would be worth much money to the owners." The question of transportation makes the well knock the profits out of the oil this well will produce at the shallow depth. Hauling oil by motor truck for a distance of sixteen miles will not prove profitable.

Many wells would be drilled along the railroad if they produced as much oil as the Russell well will turn out at a depth of 2300 feet. The oil flow, it will be remembered, was eased off, and the drillers went after deeper oil and a heavier flow, all of which they have so far failed to find.

Oil experts are of the opinion that the drill has passed the oil strata, and that when real gushers are brought in they will be found at a depth of much less than 3500 feet. The Russell well will probably be shot at the 2300 mark and tried out for all it is worth, if oil is not found before drilling is suspended.

AMERICAN CRIMES SERIOUS IN FRANCE

Paris, Jan. 27.—Thirty-four murders, 220 day and night assaults and nearly 500 serious fights due to American soldiers, occurred in the department of the Seine during December, says the Matin today, discussing the reorganization of the American police in Paris. With the new organization effected, police operations have been resulting in the arrest of many American deserters.

The American police in Paris has been previously chiefly all recruited among American officers and soldiers who had been wounded. Their main duty was to give information to American soldiers and to regulate trifling offenses. They were not planned to deal with serious crimes, adds the newspaper, which cites the December statistics as proving the inefficiency of such policing.

STEEL GANG GOES TO SOUTH TEXAS

John Tabor, foreman of the Santa Fe steel gang, left for South Texas Tuesday afternoon, with thirty Mexicans and their families, numbering in all about seventy five people. The crew is being transferred to Caldwell, where the Santa Fe has some track work under way.

For more than a year Tabor has been working a crew of men on the Santa Fe between Coleman and San Angelo, replacing steel rails, taking up the fifty two and sixty pound rails and laying eighty five pound rails. The work was completed this week with the exception of a mile of tract east and three miles of tract west of Ballinger. A shortage of steel made it necessary that the work be suspended here for the time.

SECRET TREATIES ARE SERIOUS TRAP

Washington, Jan. 29.—The most formidable barrier athwart the road to a lasting and democratic peace is the little known series of secret treaties formulated by the Allies during the war, before America's intervention.

Up to this writing the American press has practically ignored the diplomatic "booby-trap" designed to annihilate any genuinely liberal plans based upon altruistic ideas of present day aversion to any nation acquiring territory by conquest.

Not only must these treaties, which are in unalterable conflict with the "fourteen points," be abrogated before democratic ideas prevail at Versailles, but what is more important and what is not at all understood, they must be abrogated by the people of the nations represented at the peace conference. Allied statesmen of Europe are powerless to revoke the barrier, even if they now desire to do so. Their hands are tied by the secret treaties themselves. The treaties over the signatures of some of the very statesmen now acting at the peace congress, stipulated that no action by the peace congress shall abrogate the provisions of the documents themselves.

Only pressure of public opinion in a majority of the Allied democracies can force the issue. In this fact is thought to lie the real reason for the bold attempt of Jan. 15 to throttle public opinion before it could form, by conning an news and discussion of the peace negotiations to a colorless, non-committal daily communique.

If the terms of these secret treaties are carried out by the Allied governments (and representatives of Great Britain, France and Italy have already declared their intention of doing so) permanent peace becomes exceedingly improbable, and the conference at Versailles will merely set the stage for other conflicts, more terrible than the one recently ended.

For more than a year the liberal press of Europe has been thundering against the secret treaties. Far seeing Europeans statesmen have repeatedly demanded official repudiation of the secret treaties as a condition precedent to the Allied peace conference. The secret treaties have been the storm center of hundred of secret conferences in parliamentary circles and behind closed portals of embassies and foreign offices. The secret treaties are the keystone of that discredited grasping diplomacy for which President Wilson desires to substitute an international spirit of fair dealing.

Since Wilson arrived in Europe there has been growing evidence that between him and some of the spokesmen of the Allies certain seeming irreconcilable difference have arisen. These will probably not vanish until the public here knows the truth and acts. The reason for these differences does not lie in the opinion of Premier Lloyd George, Premier Cleamen-

of Premier Orlando, whatever their opinion may happen to be. None of these men is at liberty to fashion a really democratic peace, for they are bound by a set of agreements from which they dare not depart. These agreements, some in the form of secret treaties duly signed and sealed, and other mere "gentlemen's agreements" between the various governments, dominate the situation. While they exist the European representatives at Versailles are not free agents. They are mere attorneys, pledged to negotiate for their clients' cut and dried schedules of annexations and trade redistributions which have nothing to do with democracy.

If the secret treaties stand the war, from America's standpoint, will have been fought in vain and yet, with the various European governments committed, their agents at Versailles can only be free to act if the people of the Allied countries make such a demand for the renunciation of these reactionary agreements that the Entente governments will unanimously agree to drop them overboard.

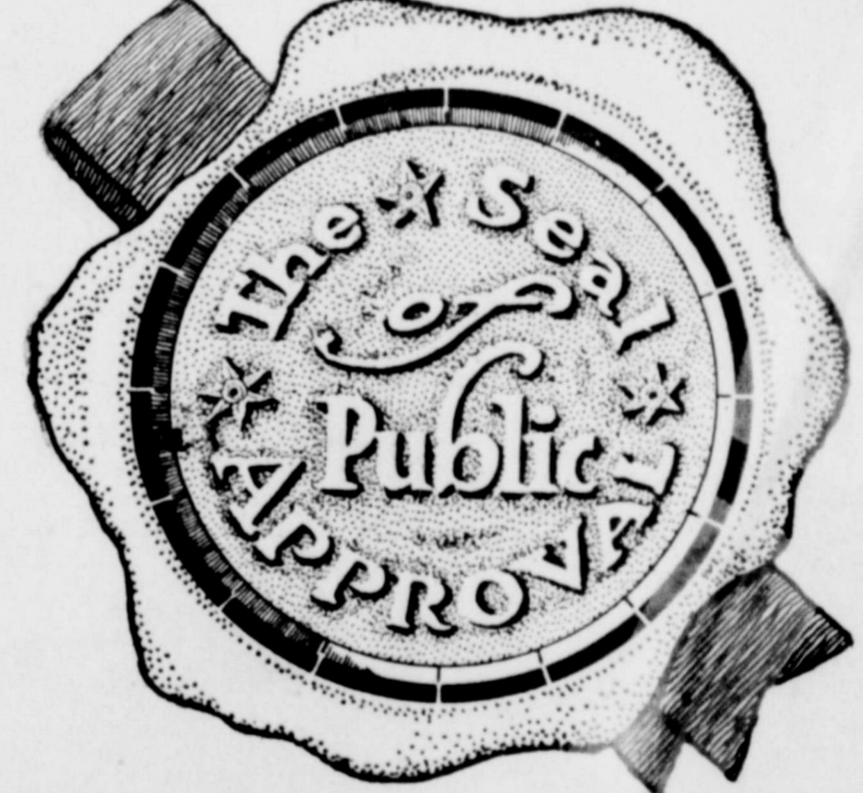
