## HEARING ON RANGER CHARGES

Austin, Jan. 31.—Representative Canales filed five specific charges against certain State Rangers today. The charges range from assault to alleged second degree murder. Hearings are underway before the committee investigating this afternoon, and examination of witnesses is progressing without delay. A delegation from the Rio Grande valley are here to defend the rangers.

Austin, Jan. 30.—Speaker of the house, R. E. Thomason, states this morning that Representative J. T. Canales has appealed to him for protection from rangers. Representative Canales made charges against rangers while he was advocating a bill in the house of the Texas legislature to regulate and re-organize them that has brought on a legislative investigation of the state ranger force. Rep. Canales said on the floor of the house that rangers had threatened to kill him and at one time he referred to rangers seated in the galleries at the nearest point to his seat. The speaker said today that Rep. Canales sent word by his wife yesterday at noon that he was afraid to come to the capital on account of threatening attitude of rangers. The speaker sent a committee to escort Rep. Canales to the capital and left his stand to warn the rangers that he would tolerate no intimidation of members of the house by rangers. Rangers deny that they have attempted to interfere with Rep. Canales and one ranger states that he has told friends of Canales that if the adjutant general will permit, he will act as a body guard for the representative.

## PLANS FOR LOCAL HIGHWAY APPROVED

R. P. Kirk returned home Friday at noon from Austin, where he went to confer with the State Highway Commission. Mr. Kirk stated that he spent two days with the highway commission, and succeeded in getting the plans for the highway from Ballinger to Rowena approved.

The plans for this road have been held up for some time, and caused a delay in getting the work under way. Mr. Kirk says that the contract will be let as soon as bids can be advertised for, and he hopes to have the work going at an early date.

This strip of road is about eight miles long, and will be constructed out of the bond issue money, and aid received from the state and federal government. The remainder of the bond issue money will be used on other roads and in augmenting amounts to be received from the state and federal government from time to time, or as fast as the highway commission can approve the applications and make the appropriations.

Every effort will be made to have good roads leading into Ballinger in time to haul the bumper crop over this fall.

## NEW OIL GAME NETS NICE WAD

Dallas, Jan. 21.—J. D. Burns, a cattle man of Portales, N. M., reported to the police today that he had been robbed of \$6,000, bound hand and foot and thrown from an automobile on a lonely country road by two men who posed as oil salesmen and who were taking him to Waco to inspect an oil proposition there. Burns said the men had been introduced to him as oil men, that they had interested him in the Waco proposition and that he had drawn the money to invest with them. They were driving from here to Waco when the men held a revolver at his head and robbed him. They then deserted him at the roadside where he was picked up sometime later by a passing motorist.

## American Diplomacy Wins Third Round in Peace Bureau

Paris, Jan. 31.—American diplomacy won the third straight victory over the reactionary opposition in the peace conference today, when agreement was reached that German colonies disposed of does not apply to any European territory.

The official announcement of the settlement of the colonial question means that the conference has accepted President Wilson's program for placing all disputed areas under the control of the League of Nations, with the nations directly affected as trustees.

The next great issue to be settled is self determination. This developed in the conference and preliminary steps are expected to be taken when the peace bureau resumes deliberations this afternoon.

Paris, Jan. 30.—The supreme council it is officially announced today reached satisfactory provisional arrangements dealing with the German colonies and the oc-

cupied territories of Turkey in Asia. The council decided that the military representatives of the allied powers at Versailles should meet and report on the most equitable distribution of the burden of supplying military forces for the purpose of maintaining order in Turkey, pending action by the conference regarding the government of Turkish territory.

Paris, Jan. 30.—The British and French governments have accepted in principle President Wilson's plan concerning mandatories from the League of Nations for the administration of captured territory it was stated by Capt. Andre Tardieu of the French peace conference delegation today. The acceptance however is subject to learning under what conditions the plan will be carried out. Captain Tardieu made the announcement during his conference with the correspondents at the foreign office.

## HOW HUN SPIES WERE RECRUITED

London, Jan. 17. (By Mail)—How German militarism developed a huge spy system to spy on its own soldiery is told here by the British admiralty.

According to the admiralty's information all letters from home to the German private or noncommissioned officers were subject to a close censorship by battalion officers.

It sometimes happened that a father, mother or sister would very openly express its dislike of the German government.

An officer would immediately call the soldier receiving such letters before him and give him the alternative of becoming a spy or having his family court-martialed.

Knowing what that meant the soldier invariably agreed to be a spy to save his family.

## ALL WOUNDED YANKS OUT OF ENGLAND

London, Jan. 13.—(By Mail)—American wounded have been so rapidly evacuating hospitals in England that today there are but three hospitals in operation. They are operated by the American Red Cross. These three hospitals which ordinarily hold several thousand have but 1,000 wounded American men in them. Two are at Liverpool and one at Southampton.

Altogether the American army and Red Cross operated fifteen hospitals in Great Britain. Twelve of these have been closed. Practically all of the wounded have been sent home. More than 5,000 were taken home during the first two weeks of December.

It is expected that practically all wounded Americans will have been removed to the United States by February.

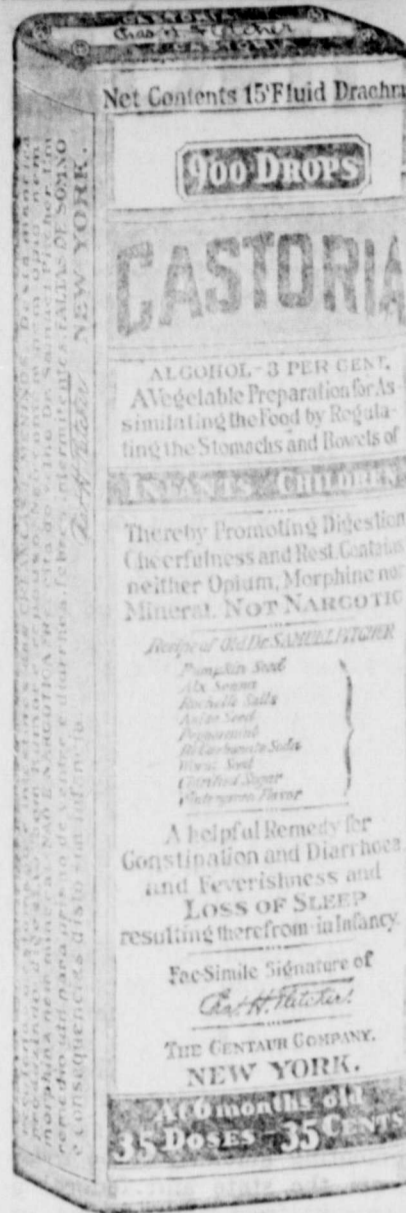

## New Telephone Toll Rates

—Effective at 12:31 a. m. January 21, 1919, a standardized schedule of telephone toll rates becomes effective throughout the country, as announced December 13, 1918, by the Postmaster General.

—The new rates are figured on "airline" mileage—the shortest distance between the two points, and all rates are standardized on this basis. The new plan comprises:

1. A basic, or "Station to Station" rate, which is the cheapest form of the service, and applies to calls merely for some particular telephone at the distant point.
2. A "Person to Person" rate, which is a call for some particular person at a distant point. This service, requiring a greater amount of operative work, and additional use of the line, is approximately 25 per cent higher than the cheaper form of the service, the "Station to Station" rate.
3. Reduced Night Rates—Calls on the "Station to Station" basis take a much lowered rate at night, as follows:
  - From 8:30 p. m. to midnight—approximately one-half the day rate.
  - From midnight to 4:30 a. m.—approximately one-fourth the day rate.
4. On "Person to Person" calls a "Report Charge" is made under certain circumstances. Special rates also apply to "Appointment" calls and "Messenger" calls.

—Complete information on the subject will be willingly furnished any patron on request. Rates to any particular point will be quoted, on request, by toll operators, as usual.
