COMANCHE MAN IN THE RACE FOR SENATE

S. C. Finley, of Comanche, phoned The Ledger Thursday morning that he had decided to enter the race for State Senator, to succeed Scott Woodward, resigned. The election is to be held on Feb. 20th. week from today.

Mr. Finley was in Ballinger last week, and stated that he would make the race if Wallace Hawkins, of this county did not run. After learning that Mr. Hawkins was too young to qualify for the office, he yielded to the petition of his friends at Comanche, Dublin and Stephenville, and his name will be on the ticket.

Mr. Finley is perhaps better known over the district than any other man in the race. He has lived for many years at Comanche serving that county as county superintendent, and during the war has been county food administrator. He is in the best stage of his life to give the people good service as a public servant, is ambitious and has the best interest of the people of this section of the State at heart. He is as solid as an American fort on all questions pertaining to the normal and progressive development of the state.

In addition to giving his own service and serving as county food administrator, a service which carried with it no pay and was a service of sacrifice, Mr. Finley has two boys in the army and four brothers also in the army. He recently purchased the Comanche Vanguard, a newspaper published at that place and immediately changed the name of the paper to The Wilsonian, which speaks for his democracy.

The people can not go wrong by electing S. C. Finley to represent them in the State senate. All questions effecting West Texas will be in safe hands.

HOMESTEAD AMENDMENT SUBMITTED

Austin, Feb. 13.—The senate this morning finally passed the joint resolution calling for the granting of state credit to homesteaders.

The House passed the bill a few days ago.

The resolution provides for the submitting to the voters an amendment to the homestead law, which if adopted will give the homestead owners the right to mortgage their homes to secure money from the federal land bank with which to make improvements, or buy homes.

People who were out on the road Wednesday night suffered experiences they will never forget, and reports reaching Ballinger Thursday told of several instances where people had to abandon their cars and seek shelter along the road or make their way on foot.

At least four autos become stranded on the Ballinger-Rowena road during the early part of the night and the occupants of the cars suffered severe experiences and hardships.

Mrs. W. A. Schuhmann and Miss Dahlgreen, of Rowena, came to Ballinger early in the day before the dust storm came up. They spent the day with Mrs. Schuhmann's parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Voelkel, and started home late in the afternoon. Their car went to the bad after they had traveled four or five miles, and they remained in the car until Dr. W. B. Halley, who was enroute to Miles came along and picked them up.

About one mile from Rowena Dr. Halley's car refused to travel further against the wind and dust storm, and he walked in to Rowena and sent another car back after the ladies.

The royal family is reported to have attempted to escape to Jassy, but the revolting workmen prevented it. The revolution is said to be spreading throughout the country.

A party of bankers from Coleman were enroute to San Angelo to attend the district bankers meet. They stuck in the dust storm in South Ballinger, and footed it back to Ballinger where they spent the night.

Parties arriving here from San Angelo early during the night, experienced no trouble traveling with the wind, but reported that at least a dozen cars were dead and been abandoned along the road between San Angelo and Ballinger.

Old timers say that the dust storm Wednesday and Wednesday night was the worst on record. They claim that the high wind blew longer and the dust was thicker.

The Ledger does not agree with the old timers who make such claim. The duration of the storm was perhaps all that the old timers claim for it, but the gale blowing for about eighteen hours, but more real estate changed hands in this country in much less time.

However, it was extreme weather following other extremes for the present winter and while no serious damage resulted, reports of minor damages are coming in from the rural districts of the country and the town suffered considerable.

In town window lights were blown out, sheds unroofed homes filled with dirt, and housekeepers stricken with nervous disgust. Reports from the rural districts say that the grain crops have suffered a severe set back and sheds and out houses blown down.

These boys were in France when the armistice was signed, and were lining up to go against the Huns. Their friends are glad to know that they answered the call of their country, made the rounds and returned home safely. Clay Rayburn, of the Norton country, also returned home Thursday. Out of about twenty Runnels county boys who left Ballinger for the training camp in California, last spring, these four were together from the time they left until they returned. They got within forty miles of the front, but did not get to the real scene of fighting. They did not get to visit Paris or the scenes of war ruin, and came home somewhat disappointed. The returning soldiers say the French people were good to them, but say they would live in that country under no consideration, and are glad to get back. "The Frenchman are about three or four hundred years behind us," said one of the boys, "and are too slow for the Americans."
