Pres. Wilson Reads the World Constitution

COUNTY SELLS WINTERS ROAD BONDS

\$25,000 worth of road bonds recently voted by the people of the Winters road precinct, were sold under contract by the commissioners court this week to Thos. C. Hall, of Temple. Mr. Hall was here Monday and Tuesday, and bid against other bond buyers for the purchase of the bonds. The contract for the sale of the bonds is up and will be closed as soon as the necessary red tape is reeled off.

These bonds were issued by the Winters people for the purpose of building a strip of the Tex-O-Kan Highway from the Taylor county line to Winters, and later the road will be extended from Winters to the north line of the Ballinger precinct, connecting up with the road to be built through this precinct.

The state highway commission has appropriated state and federal aid to help in building the road, and Commissioner Meadows has his plans well under way.

APPROVES REPORT; NAMES DEPOSITORY

The commissioners court accepted an offer of 6.20 per cent interest for the county funds from the First National Bank this week and the First National Bank becomes county depository.

For the past two or three years the F. & M. Bank has been county depository, the court each year advertising for bids. This bank paid four per cent for the money last year and bid four and a half this year, against the bid of 6.20 by the First National Bank. Only the two bids were submitted. The First National was awarded the funds on a basis of daily balance and monthly settlement at the rate of 6.20 per cent interest.

The court checked the quarterly report of Tax Collector Chastain and approved same, receipting him for tax collections up to date.

DROUTH MONEY ALL LOANED OUT

County Judge Parish, chairman of the local drouth relief committee reports that the committee has no more money. All the money appropriated to this county has been placed in the hands of those who needed it and met the requirements.

The money used for this purpose in Runnels county amounted to more than \$3,000 and was loaned to individuals in small amounts without interest and without security. Those who have been helped by the small loans are expected to refund the money, and it is supposed to be used in creating a permanent relief fund. Some of the money loaned has been repaid and loaned again.

The drouth relief fund is a fund held in trust by the governor and

his successors in office, and will be available for relief purposes when the occasion demands. It will perhaps be available for flood sufferers in some other part of the state, as time rolls by.

DISTRICT BANKERS TO MEET HERE IN 1920

Chas. S. Miller and Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Chastain returned from San Angelo Thursday afternoon, where they attended the District Bankers convention. They report a very successful meeting with a good attendance of bankers present, including about fifty or sixty bankers from the East, St. Louis, Chicago and New York.

C. S. Miller, of Ballinger was elected chairman of the District and Ballinger was selected as the place of holding the 1920 convention. Mr. Miller extended the bankers an invitation to come to Ballinger next year, and the vote for Ballinger was unanimous.

The convention met in this city two or three years ago, that meeting being declared one of the most successful ever held in this district. With the local bankers co-operating with the district committees the 1920 meeting will no doubt be equally as interesting and more successful.

HERR BEER BARTENDER SERVES CHOC TO YANKS

With the American Army of Occupation, Andernach, Germany, Feb. 14.—How a German cafe proprietor was forced to abandon the sale of beer to the fraus and herrs of the village, so that he could serve hot chocolate to the American soldiers as they marched by on their way into Germany, is one of the stories of the advance of the Thirty-Second Division.

It happened at Andernach, C. P. Kelpman, a Y. M. C. A. secretary attached to the Division, could find no convenient place in the village from which to serve hot chocolate to the men as they tramped by, worn out from their long march. Then he came upon a cafe admirably situated by the roadside. But the Herr Bartender and proprietor at first refused to exchange the joys of drawing deep foamed beer for the milder thrill of pouring hot chocolate for the men in khaki.

"Nein, nein, he remonstrated, disdainfully. 'It is beer I serve, Hensze chocolate—that is a drink for old women!'"

"I guess you didn't get mee" the Y. M. C. A. man told him. "The American soldiers want hot chocolate, and the American soldiers have got to have what they want."

Herr Bartender said no more. Silently he poured the chocolate made by the Y. M. C. A. man and with resignation he accepted the small fee that he was permitted to charge. But there was a melancholy and meditative look in his eyes. It seemed to occur to him for the first time when a man could be torn from beer pouring thus, it must be that Germany had been beaten in the war.

DROUTH RELIEF BILL PASSED

In a telegram to County Judge Parish Thursday, Representative Stephens wired that the drouth relief bill had passed, thus giving the commissioners courts in the drouth stricken counties authority to appropriate funds with which to buy seed for farmers who were not able to finance the planting of their crop.

The bill provides that the commissioners court can extend aid to farmers in the form of loans for planting seed purchases only, the money to be paid out of the sale of the crop.

With the price of seed so high, and practically every farmer in about one hundred counties having to buy, this bill will be of great benefit to many of them. As the bill has passed it will probably become a law and put in operation at an early date, as planting time is here.

Paris, Feb 14.—The first world constitution was made public here this afternoon when President Wilson read the draft of the constitution as made for the league of nations organization before a general session of the peace congress.

While not containing provisions for any sort of an international police force, the constitution includes the most stringent measures designed to prevent wars in the future.

The constitution provides that in case any nation makes war without first submitting the questions at issue to a board of arbitration to be composed of the various nations, there are the following possible courses open to the league of nations for handling the hostile nations:

First. Severance of diplomatic relations between the powers making up the league of nations and the recalcitrant power.

Second. Economic blockade against the nation refusing arbitration.

Third. Recommendation by the executive council of the league of nations for the use of force in dealing with the recalcitrant powers. Use of force, however, will leave to each power the freedom of action under its constitution to make the necessary declaration of war.

This draft has been practically agreed upon and will be adopted before President Wilson sails for America, the American president having been successful in working out its every detail and perfecting the plan for the league of nations to insure permanent peace.

The plan for International police force, or general staff, urged by the French and put to a vote yesterday afternoon, after a stirring speech by Senator Bourgers, was overwhelmingly defeated. The French and the Czecho-Slovaks were the only representative in the council voting in favor of the police force.

VICE TO FORT WORTH**

Effective Sunday, Ballinger will be allotted sleeper space in the Pullman operating between San Angelo and Houston. Since discontinuing the Fort Worth sleeper, passengers for the north could not get sleeper accommodations until they arrived at Brownwood and changed to the Frisco, and often they found the space all sold. Under the new arrangements certain sections will be allotted to Ballinger, through Pullman tickets sold from this place to Fort Worth but passengers will have to transfer from the Houston Sleeper on the Santa Fe to the Fort Worth sleeper on the Frisco at Brownwood. That will be some improvement over the present service, but will be far from satisfactory.

**E. L. RECTOR'S PLATFORM
Candidate for State Senator**

At the solicitation of my San Saba friends I have been induced to announce myself as a candidate for the office of State senator for this district, to fill the unexpired term of Senator W. Scott Woodward, rendered vacant by his resignation. In making this announcement I am flattering myself with the hopes that if elected I may contribute something to the great industrial and economic development in Texas, that we are all now looking forward to with such sanguine expectations. The sanguinary political controversies that have for years monopolized and distracted the legislature of our state, and kept the development and conservation of her industrial and economic resources in the back ground, have subsided, and the political atmosphere is clearer and healthier for the storms that have wrecked it. Something of the world peace seems reflected in our political sky. Our problems now are material and economic. We stand at the close of a world war, that has not only imposed an enormous financial burden upon our shoulders and ruined our material wealth and resources, but it has taken its toll from the ranks of our best and noblest manhood. In addition to all this, west and northwest Texas for the last several years has passed through the most extended and destructive drouths ev-

er known in her history. We of West Texas are facing one of the greatest economic crises in our history, our once luxuriant pastures are barren and desolated, our vast herds of cattle have perished and dwindled to almost nothing, our fertile farms have yielded almost nothing for two or three years. I believe the people desire to bury the tomahawk, and to join hands in rebuilding our waste places and in reclaiming our parched deserts. If you elect me to represent you, I shall devote my humble ability to fostering this spirit and to carrying out this purpose. Whilst our undeveloped resources in soil and mineral and rock are almost boundless, it will require all the patience and energy and judgement we can command, to develop them and make their wealth available. Our constructive legislation in recent years has much to commend it, and while there have been many mistakes and frequent failures, on the whole there has been decided progress.

**Rural Schools and Farm Extension
Work**

In building up and enlarging our public school facilities, especially in the rural districts, and in making attendance compulsory, and in furnishing free tuition, and even proposing to furnish school books free, we are very slowly raising the standard of education among the masses, and thereby checking the spread of anarchy and bolshevism.

In approving what we have done I am willing to admit that we should do much more. We are only at the beginning of this great work. We will never attain to our boasted democratic freedom, until the masses are freed from the fetters of ignorance and illiteracy. Other commendable laws have been passed. The Agricultural and Mechanical College embracing in its board of Directors the secretary of agriculture, is designed especially as a great educational center for the extension and development of agricultural knowledge and skill throughout the agricultural districts of the state, the scope and extent of its instructions and usefulness is being constantly and efficiently broadened and made more thorough and comprehensive. It is the duty of your representative to encourage and foster a work of such great practical importance and benefit, and to study how to eliminate any errors and defects in its operation, and to make it if possible still more efficient.

Good Roads and Irrigation

There are some enterprises in the development of which the legislature does not seem to have been so successful. One of these is the Highway Commission. Now there is no more important or useful enterprise in the state than the building of good roads. Without going into the plans and purpose of the commission we find that only a small fraction of the money raised goes into the construction of good roads. Now to the uninitiated it would seem that of all enterprises the building of good roads would require the least preliminary outlay in preparation for work. We find a similar appar-

ent failure in irrigation development. About six years ago the legislature organized a board of water engineers and passed a very voluminous and complicated irrigation law, in which they attempted to lay down a very complicated system of irrigation, the main object of which seemed to be regulate and police the distribution of water, which no provision was made to assist or enable the land owners to store or conserve the water. As a member of the water board said to me: "they put the cart before the horse." But I am not proposing to discuss the irrigation law or the good roads law. I am simply pointing to results. The law has been in operation for 6 years, and during that time West Texas has suffered more from the drouth than ever before in its history. The irrigation law has done practically nothing to relieve the situation. I want to say here that I have no fault to find with the Water Board. I believe them to be very worthy and capable men. They are laboring very hard and conscientiously to carry out the impossible provisions of the law.

I am not writing to discourage legislation on good roads, or irrigation. There are no more important subjects for legislation than these. They need to be made practical and efficient. There is nothing gained by throwing away money even in a good cause. The West Texas chamber of commerce recently organized composing all the counties in this district, with large ranch men and capitalists behind them, are working to get a bill passed at this term of the legislature securing the storage of water for irrigation in West Texas. The bill is in the hands of Judge Tillotson of Austin County who is in the house. My purpose would be if elected to cooperate with them and give my best efforts to securing an efficient and practical law that would inaugurate a system of storage reservoirs that would successfully irrigate our Western Valley. I have no room to discuss details or plans, my purpose would be to get the cooperation and assistance of the attorney general, and of expert engineers in Colorado and elsewhere, and to try to fan the interest that is awaking in the west. We have been asleep long enough.

**Opposed to Land Grabbing
Schemes**

The two great latent resources of our district are irrigation and oil. And if elected it would be one of my principle objects to foster and develop these resources. That is a bill in the legislature now which I have not read but which I understand proposes to cut out the excess of acres in all located surveys and turn it back to the state. If that is the purpose of the law it is very doubtful whether it is constitutional. If it were it would be utterly inequitable to take the land from the present owners, who are in most cases innocent purchasers, having paid full value for the excess lands. They should at least have the preference of purchasing the land from the state. It would be hardship enough to have to pay for the land twice; such an unjust and iniquitous statute would meet with my uncom-

BRITAIN IS PLANING WAR BRIDES SCHOOL

London, Jan. 31. (By Mail)—Schools for war brides and soldiers' fiancées are being planned by the demobilization department. Domestic science, food chemistry, marketing, and care of children will be taught.

The government will pay all expenses of the pupil.

The schools will be open only to wives of soldiers and women engaged to marry soldiers. More than 400,000 young women are eligible, it is estimated.

Department officials explain the schools are expected to pay for themselves as social experiments by training women to be helpful wives. The schools are needed it is believed, because thousands of young girls left their homes to work in munition factories at a time when they ordinarily would have begun to learn household duties.

Of 1,500,000 women who entered industry during the war, thousands now are jobless through the closing of munition factories. Hundreds are unable to find other employment because peace industries have not yet got into full swing. The schools are expected to give occupation to hundreds of women who otherwise would have nothing to do.

The wives' and fiancées' school will be established in scores of cities which because munition centers during the war.

A worm resembling in every respect the pink boll, was found in the first handful of cotton seed taken from the first sack opened out of a shipment of one thousand

Demonstrator Eaton compared the worm with one sent him from the A. & M. college, and the only difference between the two was one was smaller than the other. Form, Color, etc., of the two worms were identical.

The worm is on the way to College Station, and the wormologist will examine it and wire Mr. Eaton immediately. If the little pest proves to be a pink boll worm the shipment of seed will be condemned and shipped back to where they came from.

The seed did not come from an infested district. Or at least the district where the seed were shipped from has never been declared to be infested. The seed will be traced back if the worm proves to be the pink boll worm.
