# 1984's Final Half Brought Rain; Wrecks

(Editor's note: The final 6-months of 1984 was a continuation of the problems that plagued farmers, but in reverse. Where the first six months were marked by drought, the final six months brought wet, soggy fields that prevented farmers from conducting farming operations. Also, both joys and tragedies continued.)

## JULY

Bob Haralson, administrator for West Plains Medical Center, announced that Carver Light, an EMT and LPN from Portales had been named as director of the local ambulance service. Deanna Rasco, EMT, was employed as a fulltime driver for the ambulance.

Sudan was packed with visitors and hometown folks for the annual all day celebration there. A total of 287 pioneers and 427 guests registered at the Sudan Hotel. Hundreds enjoyed the outdoor concerts and activities all through the day.

John David Agee was critically injured in a two vehicle accident in northeast Muleshoe. He was transferred to Lubbock for treatment of multiple injuries.

Sudan firemen and local Sudan residents waged a 'war of words' with Sudan city officials in an effort to obtain a new fire truck for that city. In about 10 days from a community meeting, officials approved the purchase of the new fire truck.

Financially troubled West Plains Medical Center officials decided to end the acceptance of Medicaid patients at the Muleshoe Nursing Home. This left 23 patients scheduled to be transferred to area nursing homes.

Louis Reeder, president of Wes-Tex Feed Yards, Inc. announced the purchase of King Feedlot and Bailey County Feeders, along with proposed plans for expansion of both facilities.

Ron Montgomery, manager of the SPS office at Sudan, was named new manager of the Southwestern Public Service office in Muleshoe. He replaced former manager Dave Cavitt, who moved to Guymon, Okla.

West Plains Medical Center board members explained reasoning for terminating Medicaid patients at the Muleshoe Nursing Home. Continued federal requirements, and less federal money received were cited as the reasons for making the change.

Mitzi Dutton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Dutton was chosen as the Earth Rodeo Queen to kick off their annual three day rodeo.

John Teters of Hereford announced renovation of the former Corral Restaurant in Muleshoe, and said it will be a K-Bob's Steak House, with breakfast scheduled to be served. He anticipated a mid-September opening of the new restaurant.

Construction was continuing on the Heritage House Inn, a new motel being built just to the west of the roadside park at the new city limits of Muleshoe.

A local man was charged with 'Cruelty to Animals' after Humane Society personnel from Lubbock, along with a Bailey County deputy sheriff found a dead mare and colt at a location north of Muleshoe on Highway 214. The Humane Society took 29 horses into protective society and obtained the services of a veterinarian to care for them.

## AUGUST

Lawrence Smith, 69, of Maple, was killed in a late afternoon, one vehicle rollover about one half mile south of Maple in far southwest Bailey County.

Bailey County had some crop damage in widespread 2,4-D spray damage recorded in Parmer and Deaf Smith Counties, who had extremely heavy damage to crops from the wayward spray.

City Patrolman Eugene Porras was injured, as well as the female driver of a second vehicle involved in an accident with a city patrol car. Porras was responding to an emergency call at the time of the accident.

Trucks, cars, pickups and all vehicles found east Highway 84 'too much to handle' in wet weather as a rash of accidents started with rainfall in the area.

More than eight inches of rain effectively broke the drought that had devastated farming operations in a widespread area. The moisture fell within a one week period and left fields, crops and roads under water.

Bailey County Judge Gordon H. Green approved moving the Cruelty to Animals case against L.F. Bruns to Canyon after determining he could not get a fair trial in Bailey County due to widespread publicity over the case.

Although wet weather and soggy dirt roads hampered attendance, good crowds were on hand for the annual Mule Day's Festival benefit for Girlstown, U.S.A.

A Tulia native, Deana Finck, was named County Extension Agent, Home Economics for Bailey County to replace Linda Mullin, who moved to El Paso to go into private business.

L.F. Bruns was found guilty after a jury deliberated for 40 minutes in Canyon in a Cruelty to Animals case, that was moved to Randall County from Bailey County. Fifteen witnesses took the stand to testify in the all day trial conducted by County Attorney Linda Elder and heard by Bailey County Judge Gordon H. Green.

Eighteen rail cars loaded with coal headed for the Southwestern Public Service Company Tolk Plant, derailed approximately five miles east of Muleshoe. The derailment tore up several sections of track.

The Anchor Brothers Gospel Music Group was nominated for state honors in several categories with the winners scheduled to be announced during the Southern Gospel Music Association state convention in Lubbock. They received nominations for 'Group of the Year,' 'Vocalist of the Year,' 'Youth of the Year' and 'Instrumentalist of the Year.' The nominations put the group in the top five groups in the state of Texas with the nominations.

Very few people showed up to hear proposals for an all-weather track to be constructed around the football field. The meeting was headed up by Dr. Jack McCarty, with a permanent committee to be named at a later date.

## SEPTEMBER

Muleshoe City Police Officer Tom Watson was named to the Legion of Honor in the American Police Hall of Fame in Miami, Fla. Officer Watson was chosen for his activities "Above and beyond the call of duty."

David Garcia, a native of Hobbs, N.M., was named manager of the local C.R. Anthony Co. to replace former manager Steve Thrasher, who transferred to El Paso.

More than \$2,000 was donated by local residents during the annual Jerry Lewis telethon for Musclar Dystrophy. This amount broke all previous records for contributions to the fund in Muleshoe.

James T. Lee and his family moved to Muleshoe where he had been named manager of the Bailey County Farm Bureau.

Record numbers of people had entries in the annual Bailey County Fair held at the Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum. New events were added to the fair this year and proved to be popular with all visitors to the fair.

Portales Rams' dropped Muleshoe 20-7 for the season opener in football. Greg McCarty and Hector Flores both received severe knee injuries in the opening football game for 1984.

Most of the EMTs who operated the ambulances for West Plains Medical Center resigned during a controversy over insurance, personnel and equipment for the ambulances. Todd Ellis, EMT, agreed to take ambulance calls in the interim while additional personnel were secured.

A late rally by the Morton Indians pushed them past the Muleshoe Mules by a score of 22-16.

Continuing controversy over the local ambulance service turned up information that the ambulances were operating without state certification as the ambulances did not have a state-mandated piece of equipment.

Muleshoe Lions Club President Les Irvin presented a check of more than \$5,000 to the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation to help move the old Santa Fe Depot and set it up adjacent to the Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum.

In a Homecoming thriller, the Muleshoe Mules downed the Frenship Tigers with a score of 14-7. Shelley McMeans was named Homecoming Queen and special awards were given to Claude Wilemon, for being the only player to ever play varsity football for seven years and to Jim Cox and Roland Matthesen, members of the 1921 football team, the first of record in Muleshoe.

Both the Heritage House Inn and K-Bob's Steak House held formal opening ceremonies, complete with ribbon cuttings.

Carrots West, located northeast of Muleshoe, was in full swing, processing the fall harvest of carrots in the area.

## OCTOBER

Fall rains were continuing to play 'havoc' with harvesting operations. Late rain was considered beneficial for winter wheat and pastureland, but was effectively keeping farmers out of their fields.

A Lazbuddie teacher, Janet Elliott, was credited with saving the life of a kindergarten student by applying the Heimlich Maneuver to dislodge a piece of candy stuck in the student's throat.

Lyndon Huckaby was installed as president of the Kiwanis Club in ceremonies conducted at K-Bob's Steak House. James Roy Jones was named the 1984 'Outstanding Kiwanian.'

Roby Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Wilson, was apparently killed instantly in an accident near Canyon. Muleshoe resident, Tommy Lynn Sexton, 20, was critically injured in the wreck. Three members of a Tulia family were also injured.

Harold King, 76, prominent local businessman, died at West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe following a lengthy illness.

By mid-October, rainfall for the year stood at 15.51 inches, with most of the moisture being recorded since mid-June.

Tracy Tunnell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Tunnell, and Jodie Wheeler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wheeler, were named Gold Star winners during the annual 4-H awards banquet in Muleshoe.

Republican Phil Gramm brought his candidacy for U.S. Senator to Muleshoe. A large number of persons met with the candidate when he flew into Muleshoe on a campaign swing through the South Plains.

Cloudy, damp, cool weather has lingered in the area, and the National Weather Service has promised more of the same through the weekend.

Low hanging clouds were expected to continue to cover the South Plains, leaving light and spotted moisture.

A 20 percent chance for showers and some thunderstorms stayed in the forecast for Saturday and Sunday, with some clearing expected for Sunday.

NWS officials said a weak cold front extended from Eastern New Mexico through the Trans-Pecos region of Texas late Wednesday. As abundant tropical moisture flowed upslope it created fog, drizzle and light rain was continuing to hang around the area.

The rains prompted a flash flood warning for portions of New Mexico, including the central and eastern sections of the state. Flooding had been reported earlier on Wednesday and Thursday in western areas of the state of New Mexico.

The warm moist air flow over the state is expected to continue

through today as an upper level disturbance over Southern Arizona moves slowly to the east this weekend.

At this time, the cotton harvest for Bailey County is not expected to be completed until late February or early March.



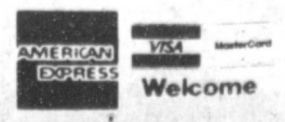

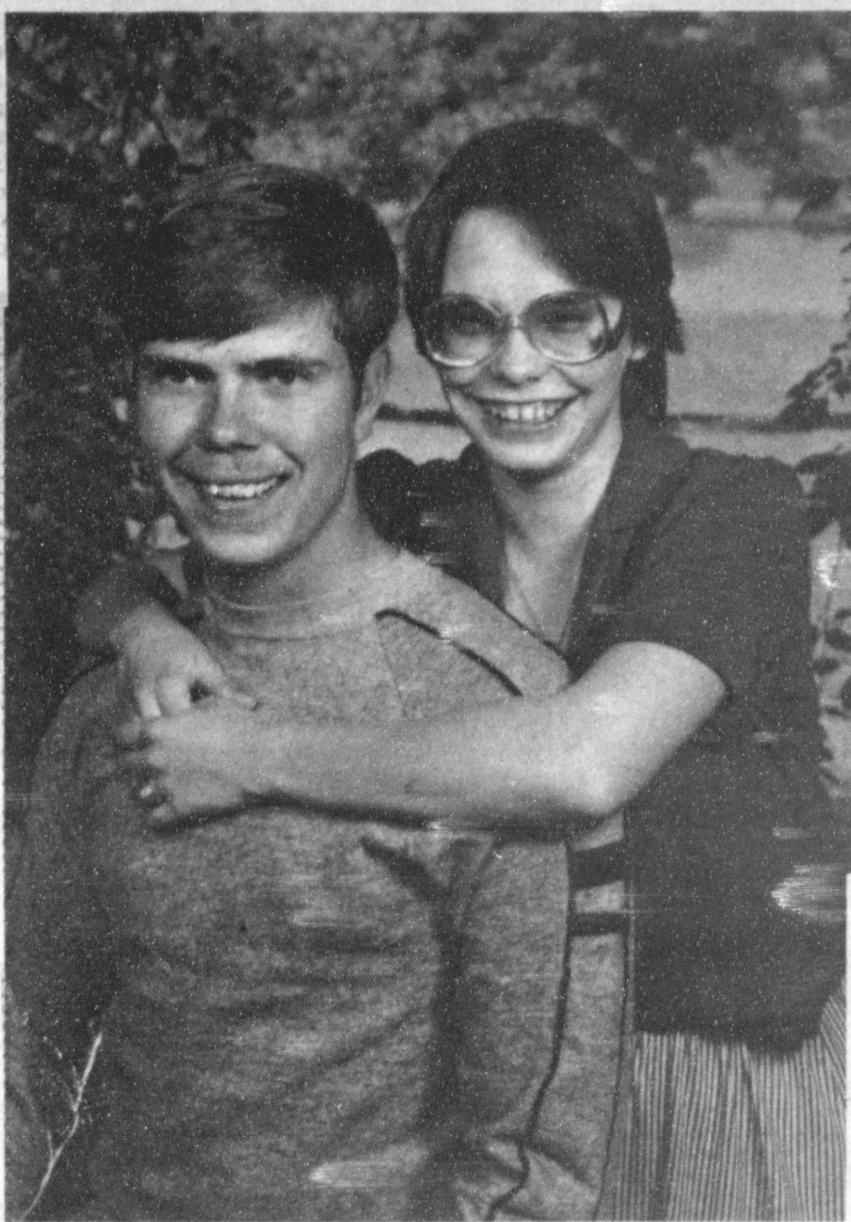

## Thawing Frozen Pipes

If this winter is anything like last winter, some Texans will find themselves confronted with frozen plumbing.

Even in a normal moderate Texas winter, it's possible to have pipes freeze because of a sudden drop in temperature, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Peggy Owens.

Pipes are most likely to freeze if homeowners turn the heat off while they go away on vacation, she warns. Whenever the house will not be lived in for a period of time, set the thermostat at 55 degrees Fahrenheit to protect the plumbing, advises the specialist.

"Should the pipes freeze, there are two important rules for thawing them in a way that won't do more damage in the process," Owen says.

First, always open faucets connected to the pipe being thawed. When faucets are left closed during the thawing process, she says, the pipe may burst if steam develops in the blocked pipe.

Second, don't use open-flame heat sources to thaw pipes, she cautions. The pipes could be damaged and dry or flammable materials near the pipe may ignite.

The safest and most effective way to thaw pipes is to use electric heating tape, says Owens.

Simply wrap the tape around the pipe at the points most likely to be frozen, and plug it into an appropriate outlet to start the thawing process.

According to Owens, one advantage of electric heating tape is that it can be left in places on pipes likely to freeze frequently during the cold season and plugged in when needed. Consumers should check to make sure the heating tape bears an Underwriters Laboratories (UL) label.

Other means of thawing pipes include the following:

Hair dryers or other hot air gun-type heaters--Use the high heat settings and direct the hot air along the frozen pipe. Clear cobwebs and flammable material from the area to be heated.

Vacuum cleaners --Connect the vacuum cleaner hose to the discharge outlet of the machine and blow air from the vacuum cleaner and the room onto the pipe. This is good if the room is warm and the pipes are in cupboards, closets or under floors and in walls where air can be easily blown.

Small fans --If the room is above 40 degrees Fahrenheit, direct the fan onto the area

where the pipe is frozen. This works well if the pipes are in cupboards or closets.

Hot water and rags --Wrap

the pipe with rags and pour hot water on the rags. Continue pouring hot water until the pipe thaws. This technique is not suitable where water will damage walls, floors or other areas.

"Homeowners can save themselves the trouble of having to thaw pipes if they'll simply wrap any exposed pipes or encase them in insulated tubing before the worst of the winter cold is here," Owen notes.

### Taking Medications Safely

Elderly people who take many medications may be tempted to crush or mix pills so they will be easier to swallow.

But not all medications can be safely treated this way, cautions gerontologist Dr. Judith Warren.

Some tablets are coated to conceal the unpleasant taste of the medication, prevent irritation of the mouth and esophagus, or to delay release of the drug, says Warren, a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program.

Crushing a coated tablet immediately releases the drug and may cause a bitter taste in the mouth, stomach irritation

and nausea. This may cause some elderly to avoid taking the medicine as prescribed, Warren notes.

Drug overdose can also result since some preparations are designed with multiple coatings or beads that permit gradual release and slow absorption of the drug, cautions the specialist.

When time-release capsules are crushed or mixed with a liquid, a greater than normal amount of the drug is released and the symptoms of overdose or intense side-effects can occur, she adds.

Some elderly may prefer to mix their medication with milk or fruit juice, but this is not always safe either, says Warren. These liquids can alter the solubility and absorption of some drugs. Fruit juices can also inhibit drug action, she explains.

Since crushing or dissolving any medication can alter its effects, elderly patients or those who care for them should ask the pharmacist, doctor or nurse whether an alteration will be safe or not, Warren suggests.

Other questions to ask include: Can this drug be taken with fluid? If so, how much? With what food or fluid can this drug be safely mixed?

Taking precautions when crushing or dissolving medication can insure that medicines actually have a chance to do their job, Warren notes.

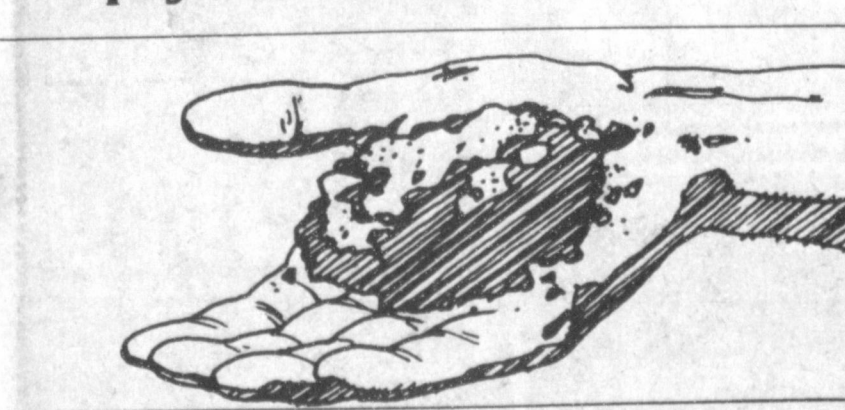

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### Imitation Cheese Nutrition

It may look and even taste like cheese, but these days, only the label will tell you what you're eating.

Under Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations, a dairy product which does not meet the relevant standard of identity must be called "imitation," says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Mary K. Sweeten.

But if the product substitutes for an resembles another food is not "nutritionally inferior" it does not have to be called imitation, she adds.

Some cheeses are labeled as imitation simply because of a change in ingredients from real cheese. For example, some grated Italian style cheeses which contain added whey fall into this category.

Another class of "imitation" cheese is the non-dairy product, made from vegetable oils, sugars, a protein source such as sodium caseinate and other ingredients.

Some of these products, like

imitation cream cheese, are not nutritionally equivalent to the products they imitate, says Sweeten. They must be labeled imitation, may be marked "non-dairy product," and may bear a nutrition label.

An "imitation label also appears on a popular and economical category of substitute cheese which have been fortified to contain the same amounts of protein and the 19 other ingredients for which U.S. Recommended Daily Allowances have been established, says the nutritionist.

The nutrition labels on these products indicate that they are equal to or better than natural cheese in providing protein, vitamin A, riboflavin and calcium. These products may be equivalent in fat content to natural cheese.

For consumers, the labels on packages of imitation cheese can be confusing, Sweeten maintains. The FDA requires full ingredient listing but nutrition labeling is not normally required.

Shoppers may have even more difficulty identifying imitation cheese in processed foods, she says, since the processor does not always have to state on the label that imitation cheese is being used.

For example, if a pizza is called "cheese" pizza and the processor uses imitation cheese,

the word imitation must be stated on the label. When a pizza is called "mushroom pizza," the means mushrooms are the primary topping ingredient and any cheese used is secondary, so the imitation label does not have to appear.

When the cheese is genuine,

the word cheese will appear in the ingredient listing, Sweeten says. But the only way a consumer can identify imitation cheese in many processed foods is to look for sodium caseinate and vegetable oil, its two primary ingredients, on the ingredients listing.

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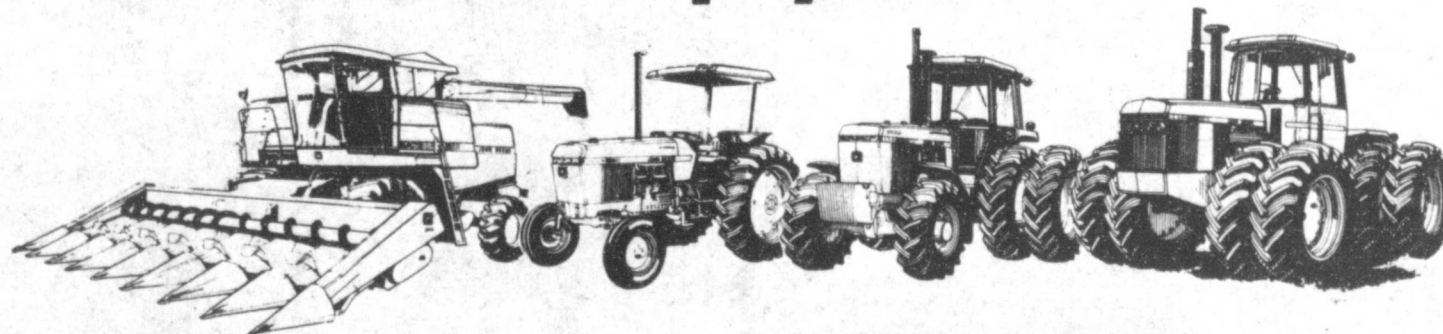

Mark Moton put on a one man show with 246 yards in the Mules 28-13 victory over the Dimmitt Bobcats. Dale Demel of Bula produced the first bale of cotton ginned in Bailey County for 1984. It was ginned at Claunch Gin in Bula. In a slow, cold rainstorm, the Tulia Hornets stung the Muleshoe Mules, 21-7.

### NOVEMBER

Don Richards and Kent Hance were honored by local friends at a reception held at the Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum. Kristen Chitwood was determined to be the top winner in the "Why We Should Vote" essay contest for local students. She is a fourth grader and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Chitwood. Elvira Faulkner was apparently killed instantly in a noon hour, intersection crash about eight miles west of Muleshoe. The crash occurred at the intersection of two county dirt roads. After being moved to Ector County, a judge there dismissed the trial of L.F. Bruns civil case on Cruelty to Animals on a technicality. The case was immediately refiled in Bailey County by County Attorney Linda Elder. She also asked for, and received, custody of the surviving horses in the case. Bailey County voters opted for President Reagan-George Bush; Don Richards and R.L. Scott in the general election. District wide, Republican Larry Combest won the election. Serious country road accidents continued to plague the area, with Ricky Vaughn becoming the latest seriously injured individual from an intersection crash. Joel Shumake, 26, who was a new resident of Muleshoe, was killed in a one vehicle rollover near Lariat. Barbara (Mrs. Bob) Finney, an educator with 16 years experience, was named principal of Dillman Elementary. Milton Oyler, who served as principal of the school for 28 years, had announced his retirement at the end of the current school year. Twelve persons were injured, and five of the injured transferred to Lubbock hospitals, following a late evening head on crash of two cars about five miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 70. Mr. and Mrs. Ed W. Johnson were killed on Wednesday evening before Thanksgiving when their car veered out of control on a city street, slamming into the corner of a brick house.

### DECEMBER

Members of the Muleshoe Fire Department, Bailey County EMT Association and police conducted a fire and evacuation drill. A successful Arts and Crafts Bazaar was conducted at the Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum, with more entries that drew large crowds. Beautiful weather also attracted a large crowd for the annual Christmas Parade. West Plains Medical Center Board vice president Bob Finney, announced West Plains Medical Center was negotiating with management corporations to lease the hospital facility. Declining patient population, and continuing financial problems were prompting the proposed lease, said Finney. Freezing rain, and the first snow of the season created driving problems in the area. The Muleshoe eighth grade basketball players won their own tournament and widened their season record to 6-0. Records fell in Muleshoe in a successful blood drive conducted

by the United Blood Services of Lubbock. A total of 214 persons donated blood, the second largest blood drive ever conducted in this area in a one day drive. Sgt. Wayne Holmes of the Muleshoe Police Department, in conjunction with the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, conducted shoplifting seminars for local businesses. Members of the SCAC from Muleshoe High School presented a check in the amount of \$850 to the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation for the Santa Fe Railway Depot fund. Muleshoe was darkened for up to six hours after a truck slammed into a power pole during an ice storm, blocking the highway in the 600 block of West American Blvd. and plunging the city into darkness. Slick roads and highways caused a rash of accidents, most of them being one vehicle turnovers from vehicles losing control on the icy roads. As the year ended, continuing rain kept the cotton harvest stopped. It was estimated that as much as 50 percent of the cotton was still on the stalk in the field, and harvest was predicted to go into late February or March.

Up to 15 semester hours of credit toward the master's degree may be obtained through the program in Muleshoe. Wayland will accept up to 12 hours of transfer work from an accredited institution, and the

remaining hours in the graduate program may be obtained at the WBU main campus in Plainview.

Tuition for the program is \$85 per semester hour, and a special payment plan is available to those committed to the M. Ed. program. Loans are also available through Wayland's Office of Financial Aids, and in nearly all cases, tuition, books, and travel are tax deductible.


