AGUILAR SAYS THE JUAREZ AFFAIR IS VIOLATION OF THE RIGHTS OF MEXICO

Washington, June 17.—Gen. Candido Aguilar, President Carranza's confidential ambassador to the United States, issued to the press today a formal statement declaring that "the government and people of Mexico consider as a violation of Mexican sovereignty, the crossing of United States soldiers into Mexican territory," and expressed the hope "that the situation created by the latest occurrences in Juarez will be satisfactorily adjusted between the two countries."

A copy of General Aguilar's statement was sent to the state department, but officials there said they did not regard it in the nature of a formal protest and that no reply would be made. They added no other communication had been received from the Mexican government regarding the crossing of American forces into the confidential ambassador to the fired into El Paso.

It was understood that Mexican representatives at Washington, appeared to be satisfied with explanation given by the state department and it was assumed Gen. Aguilar sent his statement to the state department merely to keep the record straight.

In this connection it was learned authoritatively today that President Carranza never had assented to the agreement proposing that where bandits committed depredations in either country the armed forces of that country could follow a "hot trail" across the international line.

Juarez, June 17.—Villa is now at Bosque Bonito, opposite Fort Hancock, Texas, according to an announcement here today by Gen. Francisco Gonzales, commander of the federal garrison here.

German Cabinet Inclined to Not Sign; Will Accept Fate

BUYS ANGELO OIL DRILLING OUTFIT

D. G. Lacy, contractor for Russell Oil Well No. 3, left from this point for Ranger Wednesday afternoon. He had been here and at San Angelo several days looking after plans for drilling Russell No. 3.

Before leaving here Mr. Lacy announced that he had closed a deal for the Oscar Cain drilling outfit, buying the complete outfit, including the casing, and all tools and rigging necessary in drilling an oil well. The outfit is being loaded and will be shipped to Ballinger at once and placed on the ground for the new well.

Mr. Lacy will spend a few days in Ranger where he has oil interest and will return here next week to make the location for his well, and be ready to build the derrick and place the machinery as soon as it arrives.

It will be recalled by the readers of this paper that the Cain well was recently abandoned at a depth of 4200 feet after a big flow of salt water was brought in. The rig used in drilling the Cain well is made up of standard machinery throughout, as evidenced by the fact that a hole 4200 feet deep was put down successfully.

Mr. Lacy was successful in buying this outfit, as it is close at hand and he will save on freight, and will be able to get the machinery here quick and begin operations much quicker than if he had to go to the market and buy equipment and ship it a greater distance.

"I am going to make a record breaker out of this well," said Mr. Lacy, "and will do everything I can to help develop this field in the quickest possible time. I know there is oil in the vicinity where we are drilling and I think we have a good chance to strike it as any driller in the field."

Mr. Lacy is optimistic over the outlook for a good find. He recently acquired leases on 2000 acres of the Russell land and it is upon this 2000 acres that he will sink his well. The well will be some where in the neighborhood of Russell No. 1 and a miles or two nearer Ballinger.

NEW RULE FOR SHIPPING MELONS

The Regional Director of Railroads has issued an order that unless melons are protected by the application to the stem end of a paste recommended by F. C. Meiss of the United States Agricultural Department they cannot be shipped without prepayment of freight.

Several concerns throughout the country are advertising this paste for sale, but it will, no doubt, be cheaper for the growers and give local druggists the business, if the formula is given, which is as follows:

Bluestone (Copper Sulphate) 4 ounces, Rye flour 4 1/2 ounces, Pistachio green coloring one-half fluid ounce, powdered alum, 3 ounces, distilled water, 3 pints. This amount of material will make about one quart of paste, a sufficient amount to treat one carload of watermelons.

To prepare paste: use copper or enamel ware vessels. (1) Dissolve 4 ounces bluestone in 2 pints boiling water. (2) Dissolve 3 ounces powdered alum in 1 pint water and then add 4 1/2 ounces rye flour and mix to form a smooth paste. (3) When the bluestone is thoroughly dissolved, pour the solution in the paste, stirring the mixture thoroughly. Bring this mixture to a boiling point and cook for about five minutes. (When the paste is made in larger quantities, it may be necessary to change this time for cooking). After the paste is allowed to cool it may then be strained through cheese cloth, after which the coloring matter should be added. (4) The paste should be stored in airtight containers. Glass jars or tin cans lined with paraffine may be used for this purpose. Uncoated metal containers must not be used.

NO SENSATION IN OIL FIELD

Developments in the oil field are lagging just a little at this time. At least nothing sensational comes in as the drills in the several wells under progress peg away making holes deeper.

The time for spudding in other wells is rapidly expiring, and within the next 30 days several new wells must be under drilling or bonds and cash deposits will be forfeited.

One good feature of the report going out from this county is that there is not a dry hole in the county. The Russell well is the only well any ways near complete and it is producing oil. That well is being rigged up for receiving its output, and it is believed that the well will be worked and oil stored, while the Russell Nos. 2 and 3 are going down.

The oil industry will take on new life when the Mustang, Los Arroyo and other wells under contract are spudded in and the drill begin to make their way to where the oil is.

Lease holders are hanging on to their holdings, and the prices being asked are almost out of the wild-cat class, and this makes dull trading in the lease line. Wild cat stock companies seem to have overdone the thing in other fields, and stock sales now are not so brisk as was the case a few months ago. The dividend checks are not coming in as fast as stock salesmen and their customers believe would be the case, and the dissatisfied stock holders do not encourage stock buying.

Washington, June 18.—The Mexican government will not protest to the United States regarding the action of American troops in crossing the border at Juarez and driving back the rebels, it was officially announced today. The state department received official notice that Mexico regards the matter as a "closed incident."

In a message to the War department, Gen. Cabell, in command of the Southern Division, said that the American casualties number two civilians and two soldiers killed and eight soldiers severely wounded and four civilians slightly wounded, as a result of the battle with the Villistas near Juarez.

UNCLE SAM TOOK CARE OF HIM

Washington, June 18.—Just by way of illustrating what the Federal Board for Vocational Education is doing for our wounded boys, take this case which is one of thousands who are being helped to overcome their handicaps.

Away back early in the war one of the boys got a frightful wound in the leg and was carried to the hospital half crazed with the pain. After the other effects had passed he was told that his right leg had been taken off just five inches below the hip. "Were they to let his mother know, or his father?" He shook his head. You see he didn't happen to have any father or mother. In fact, it developed that there wasn't a single soul that that boy knew who would be interested to make life worth while for him, after he got back to his town with a wooden leg and a shattered future.

There were lots of applications too. He had been so anxious to get an education that he had borrowed the money to go through high school, because he had hopes of entering the banking business later on. With no right leg and no money, it looked for a while as though there wasn't any heart either to go on and fight it out. But it was there, and the only thing needed to discover it was the exercise of a little intuition on the part of a Special Agent of the Federal Board for Vocational Education. These Special Agents are endowed with a kind of super sense. They know when a man has some possibility hidden away that even he himself doesn't know about. The possibility they found here was a good enough bet to stake a pretty fair sum of money on, and that is what the Board did.

He was sent after his discharge to a commercial school, and completed a course in commercial subjects. And then the possibility didn't seem to be at an end, for he was found to have made such good progress that he was given a collegiate course in banking and economics so that his field of activity could be considerably wider.

Sometimes, he says, he stops and thinks of the first day when he wished so hard for somebody to care, and then of today when he is doing the one thing that he has always wanted to do, and hardly dared to hope for. This is just one out of the thousands of cases in file with the Federal Board.

200,000 POUNDS ANGELO WOOL SOLD

The sale of 200,000 pounds of long wool by the Wool Growers' Central Storage Company of San Angelo was reported Tuesday by President Robert Massie. No prices were given.

J. H. Cauthen of Lampasas bought the twelve months clip for Crimins & Pierce of Boston, and seven cars were being loaded Tuesday for movement over the Santa Fe to Galveston, where the wool will be placed on board a Mallory boat for shipment to Boston.

The sale is the first announced in San Angelo since the Wool Growers' late in May disposed of 175,000 pounds of long and short wool. At that time, C. D. Stokes of Lampasas purchased 115,000 pounds of the long fleece from the Wool Growers for Winslow & Company of Boston, and H. M. Cummins bought 60,000 pounds of short wool for Adams & Leland, also of Boston. The prices paid at that time were said to be good, forty-seven cents being paid for the short fleece and fifty-four cents for the longer fleece.

Mr. Massie stated Tuesday that the prices received for the 200,000 pounds of long wool sold to Crimins & Pierce had been satisfactory, and it is presumed that they were as high as those that prevailed less than a month ago.

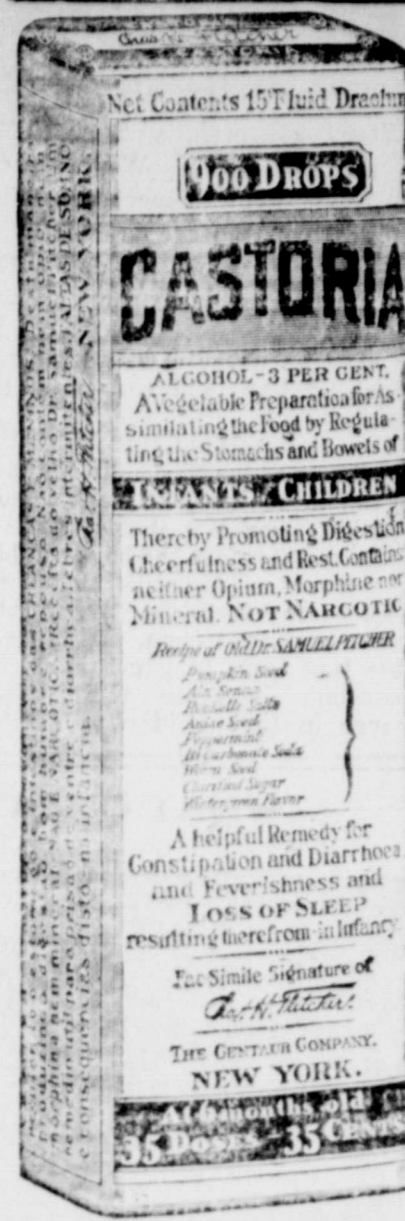

Seventy secretaries are serving the towns and outposts along the Mexican border, this phase of Y. M. C. A. activity having been materially enlarged since the armistice.

Y. M. C. A. ENLARGES WORK IN RUSSIA

Doubles Personnel in Non-Bolshevik Sections—Large Sums Being Expended.

An urgent cable has been sent from Vladivostok to the Y. M. C. A. national war work council headquarters in New York requesting that 200,000 feet of up-to-date English comedies and dramas and an enormous repertoire of Russian titled films be rushed to that part in addition to 725 reels of committee on public information educational films.

In response to appeals made by the Omsk government and other allied authorities, the Y. M. C. A. has doubled its personnel in non-bolshevik Russia, and has enlarged the scope of its work proportionately.

The national war work council is now expending \$150,000 a month for Y. M. C. A. work among allied and American troops in Siberia, and an additional \$50,000 a month among the troops in northern Russia.

WHAT ONE CLASS IS DOING



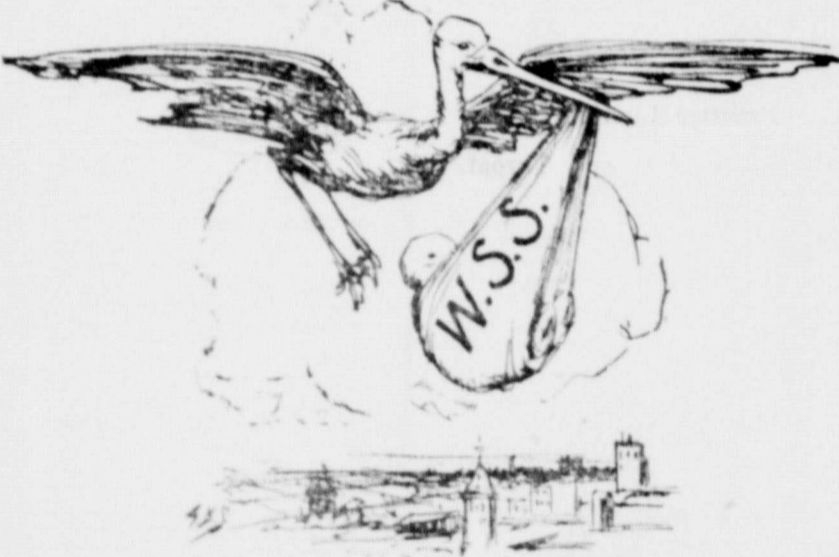

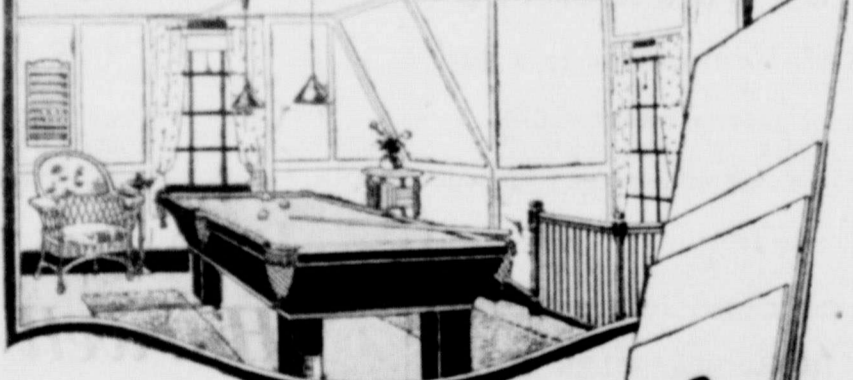
