## Interned German Fleet Destroyed By Own Crew; Ships Sink With Hun Flags Hoisted

London, June 21.—"Certain of the interned German ships at Scapa Flow, Scotland have been sunk by their German crew." the British admiralty announces officially this afternoon.

News dispatches received here state that practically the entire German fleet was sunk, the ships going down with the German flags flying. The fleet was interned at Scapa Flow following its surrender under the terms of the armistice.

### 36TH BOYS WILL ARRIVE TOMORROW

Telegrams from Ballinger boys in the 36th Division came Friday night bringing the good news that they would arrive home Sunday at noon. At least the message stated they would be discharged today and leave Camp Bowie tonight, and they should arrive here at noon Sunday if they make connection.

Mrs. Ben Smith received a message from her son George, and she left for Brownwood Saturday afternoon, where she will spend the night with friends and meet her son en route home. Mrs. T. J. Starkey also received a message from Levy, saying he would be at home Sunday.

These boys are in 144th Infantry, and this company was made up at San Angelo and spent several weeks there before being transferred to Camp Bowie. The entire San Angelo company is due to pass through Ballinger Sunday and San Angelo is arranging to give them a great welcome.

It seems as though it was yesterday when a special train carrying the company passed through Ballinger, and made a short stop here for the Ballinger folks to say good bye. Yet, sufficient time has elapsed for the brave boys from this section of the state to train, equip and defeat the worst enemy the world has ever known. There will be great rejoicing when the company arrives, but not without sorrow, as some of those who were on that special train are now sleeping in France under mounds made by the hands of heroes.

### Majority German Assembly Will Vote To Sign Treaty

#### PRESIDENT EBERT MAKES LAST STAND

Paris, June 21.—Advices received by the United States peace delegates at twelve o'clock today state that president Ebert of the German government had asked Herman Bauer to form a new cabinet. It was further stated that 275 of the 491 members of the National Assembly, had expressed their intention of voting for the acceptance of the peace treaty.

Paris, June 20.—The latest reports received over the military wire from Weimar indicate that at 9 o'clock this evening (Friday) Germany is still in the throes of a reconstitution of the administration in an endeavor to get a government that is capable of signing the peace treaty.

Paris, June 20.—An unconfirmed report here from the army intelligence bureau at Coblenz says Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador to the United States, has been named as foreign affairs and that he will come to Versailles to sign the peace treaty.

Berlin, June 20.—It was stated on good authority today that President Ebert had decided to stand or fall with Chancellor Scheidemann because he felt that he must resign rather than sign peace treaty.

London, June 20.—The signing of the peace treaty by Germany an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen quoting advices from Weimar, says is as certain as if the signing nature had already been put on the document.

#### NO COMMUNICATION TO MEXICAN REBELS

El Paso, June 20.—"I decline to have any communication whatsoever with you or your principal" Brigadier General James B. Erwin replied today to a communication received from General Felipe Angeles, commanding revolutionary forces in Mexico, regarding the reason American troops crossed the border last Sunday night.

A courier from General Angeles camp near Samalyuca, thirty miles south of the border today, delivered the communication to General Erwin. It was signed by General Angeles and bore the seal of Villa's revolutionary government.

The reply was transmitted to General Angeles by the same courier, who left immediately for the revolutionary headquarters.

### U. S. CALLS IN TREASURY NOTES

The Secretary of the Treasury has just issued the following statement: All United States treasury certificates of indebtedness of series VG dated February twenty seventh, Nineteen nineteen and maturing July nine nineteen are hereby called for redemption on July first nineteen nineteen at par and accrued interest pursuant to provisions for such redemption contained in the certificate of July nineteen nineteen on all certificates of said series will cease to secure holders of certificate of said series shall never the less have the privilege of exchanging such certificates on or before July first nineteen nineteen at par with and adjustment of accrued interest to treasury certificates of indebtedness of series T—four dated June third nineteen nineteen maturing September fifteen nineteen nineteen.

### "DEAD" SOLDIER RETURNS HOME

Henry Vorbeck arrived home Saturday at noon from France. Henry was a member of the company organized at San Angelo, and saw service in the 36th Division. He was reported dead by the war risk insurance department and his father received notice to qualify for recovering the insurance which the young man took out when he entered the army. While the war risk department was trying to convince Mr. Vorbeck that Henry was dead Mr. Vorbeck was receiving letters regularly from his son, the letters being dated several weeks after the date on which it was reported the young man had been killed. Mr. Vorbeck finally convinced the department that it was not his son whose father should claim the insurance, and the matter after so long a time was straightened out and it is presumed that the insurance payments are now going to the right father of some son by the same name who did give his life for the cause. Henry is very much alive and has the scalp of some hung to his credit.

Harvey Pearce was another one of the boys who came home Saturday. He was in the 90th Division and his mother had not heard from him in several months, and was very uneasy about her son when he delighted her by returning home.

Luther Watson, also a member of the 36th Division, returned home Saturday, having made the rounds and did active fighting in France.

L. B. Wardlaw, better known as Jack Wardlaw, came in Saturday from Dallas. He is in the navy and has been waiting at Dallas for his discharge. While waiting there he was married to Miss Leska Hinds, a Ballinger girl who was visiting in Dallas. He left his bride in Dallas to complete her visit, and he came home to join a family reunion at the Wardlaw home. Nert Wardlaw will arrive tomorrow, receiving his discharge from the 36th Division today.

### R.R. COMMISSION GOVERNS OIL FIELD

The railroad commission of Texas has issued a list of regulations governing oil field operations. The rules cover all phases of oil field development, including the prevention of waste, plugging of dry holes, shooting wells, etc. In view of the fact that there is much development in this country, we reproduce the rules for the benefit of all who are interested in the oil development.

Rule 9. Plugging dry and abandoned wells. (a) must be plugged under supervision of conservation agent—All abandoned or dry well shall immediately be plugged under the supervision of an oil and gas conservation agent of the railroad commission of Texas.

(b) Manner of plugging—All dry or abandoned wells must be plugged by confining all oil, gas or water, in the strata in which the occur, by the use of mud laden fluid, cement and plugs may be used. These wells must first be thoroughly cleaned out to the bottom of the hole and before the casing is removed from the hole the hole must be filled from the bottom to the top with mud laden fluid of maximum density and which shall weigh at least twenty five per cent more than an equal volume of water; unless the commission directs that some other method shall be used.

(c) Notice of intention to plug Before plugging dry and abandoned wells, notice shall be given to the railroad commission of Texas or its conservation agent in the field and to all available adjoining lease and property owners, and representatives of such lease and property owners may in addition to the oil and gas conservation agent of the commission, be present to witness the plugging of these wells if they so desire, but plugging shall not be delayed because of failure or inability to deliver notices to adjoining lease and property owners.

Rule 10—Log and plugging record to be filed with commission—The owner or operator shall, upon the completion of any well, file with the commission of Texas a complete record of log of the same duly signed and sworn to

**FROM FLANDERS TO BROADWAY**

**New York Hut Opens for Doughboys As They Disembark at Gotham Longing for Home and Mother**

New York City is gravely congested with soldiers and sailors, and the problem of how to provide them with sleeping accommodations has not been answered at all satisfactorily. Hotels and lodging-houses of all kinds are crowded to their capacity, and in many instances the lodging and boarding-houses are arranging sleeping accommodations on the floor. Even with this additional arrangement it is not possible to house all the soldiers and sailors that are making New York City their center. The Salvation Army Memorial Hotel on the Bowery is overcrowded continually. The recently opened hotel on East Forty-first Street on a recent night turned away 600 applicants after the rooms were filled, and every available space on the floor was occupied. Within a very short time the annex to Forty-first Street, a big residence on West Seventy-fifth Street, will be opened to accommodate several hundred soldiers and sailors. In the near future a much larger building than any we have in the heart of the Great White Way district, and which has already been secured, will be open to accommodate from 800 to 1,000 men. Other propositions are being considered, and our friends may be assured that the same care that the Salvation Army exercises for the welfare of the boys in France will not be discontinued in their home country.

**NEW HOSTEL JUST OPENED AT EL PASO**

The Salvation Army now provides 10,981 beds in its hostels which are established in various parts of the United States. These beds are occupied by workmen, by soldiers, sailors and marines at a very nominal cost. In cases where the men are without funds, they are supplied with beds free until positions can be found for them.

In El Paso recently a hotel was opened solely for the use of soldiers, sailors and marines and those who have received their honorable discharge from the service. At the dedication of the hostel a talk was made by Lieut. Harry Welsch Jr., who had just returned from eighteen months' service in France.

Lieut. Welsch told of the wonderful work done by the Salvation Army overseas and the esteem with which the workers in France are held by the men in the army. He said: "In the celebration of the opening of the hotel of the Salvation Army, it gives me pleasure to express the appreciation of the soldiers and marines of the American 2d division overseas. Their principle was always to bring the greatest relief when most needed. This principle was brought home to me in the observation of a Salvation Army hut located about 39 kilometers back of the front line. The lassies in that hut had a record of making 350 pies and a proportionate amount of coffee in one day and, later, of supplying 15,000 cups of coffee to men who arrive unexpectedly on their way to the front.

**SALVATION ARMY AT HOME EVERYWHERE**

(Editorial in Pittsburgh, Pa., Post)  
As for the Salvation Army itself, who can describe it? One moment it is thought of as a modern wonder, the next it is realized that it is founded on principles as old as the human heart, and that its strength lies in its humble practicing of the rules given nearly 2,000 years ago by the Founder of Christianity. In one view we may think of it as about the most public institution there is, with its daily appearance in the streets, and in the next it is remembered that its chief recommendation is that it goes into the darkest and lowliest haunts to rescue outcasts. It is at home everywhere there is need for its services; as no sorrow is beneath its notice, neither is it awed by calamity; it took its place to perform a great work in the world war as quietly as if it were going to the relief of a single case at home. What a lesson it teaches of the power of unselfish labor and of the wisdom that is found in humble activities!

**Blind Chinese Recruit's Gifts.**  
One of the Salvation Army recruits at Tung Chow, China, is a blind man who earns eight coppers (less than five cents) a day by going into town to make purchases for the prisoners in the jail, according to a letter received recently from a Salvationist in China. This old man lives chiefly on maize bread, yet he contrives to give seven coppers a week to the Army and has donated fifty coppers towards the purchase of a China drum.



**R. R. COMMISSION GOVERNS OIL FIELDS**

(Continued from First Page.)

upon blanks to be furnished by the commission upon application; and upon plugging any well for any cause whatsoever, a complete record of the plugging thereof shall be made out and duly verified on blanks to be furnished by the commission.

d) Shooting to be under supervision of conservation agent—All shooting of wells shall be under the supervision of an oil and gas conservation agent of the railroad commission of Texas.

(e) Notice of intention to shoot must be given the railroad commission of Texas at least five days prior to shooting.

Rule 34. All owners or operators of oil or gas wells in this State shall keep books showing the amount of oil and gas produced and disposed of, with the price for which the same was sold, together with the receipts from the sale or transfer or leases or other property, and the disbursements made in connection with or for the benefit of such business, which books shall be kept open for the inspection of the railroad commission or any accredited representative thereof, and of any stock holder or share holder in said business.

Rule 35. All contractors and drillers carrying on business or doing work in the oil or gas fields of the State, as well as leaseholders, land owners and operators generally, shall take notice of and are hereby directed to observe and apply the foregoing rules and regulations and all contractors, drillers, land owners and oil operators will be held responsible for infractions of said rules and regulations.

Rule 36. All conservation agents,

appointed by the railroad commission of Texas shall cooperate with and invite the cooperation of the oil and gas inspectors of the United States Bureau of Mines of the Department of the Interior.

Rule 37. All conservation agents appointed by the railroad commission of Texas shall be governed by and are charged with the enforcement of the law and these rules and regulations.

This order shall take effect June 18th, 1919.

**TAX LIST READY FOR PUBLICATION**

Tax Collector Chastain stated Saturday morning that he had the delinquent tax roll ready for the printers.

"I will comply with the law and have the roll ready for publication early next week," said Mr. Chastain, "and will be glad if all those who can pay their delinquent taxes do so before their property is advertised."

The law provides that the commissioners court have the delinquent tax list published by a certain time following the time taxes are due, and after the list has been published the county attorney files suit to recover the taxes.

If property owners do not pay the taxes, the state is given a judgment in court for taxes, and cost and the property is again advertised and sold for taxes.

A tax debt is one the property is good for, if it is worth it, and the longer the taxes go delinquent the greater the cost. Penalties, court cost, printers fees, etc., is added.

The 1918 delinquent list will be published early in July, and you will have to hurry if you save the additional cost.
