Germans Sign Up--Allies Notified

Paris, June 23.—It was officially announced here this afternoon that Germany had notified the Allies that she will sign the peace treaty. The official statement said that President von Haniel had been instructed by the German National Assembly to sign the treaty immediately.

Weimer, June 22.—The National Assembly Sunday by a vote of 237 to 138 voted to sign the peace terms presented by the Allies.

Following the vote to sign the treaty, the Assembly took a vote of confidence in the Cabinet, which resulted as follows: For 236, against 89, blank 68.

CARRINGER TO MAKE HOME HERE

Mr. Beck returned to Brownwood at that time and accepted employment in the freight office at that place. The change just made comes as a promotion to both of the gentlemen.

President Dallas News Died Today

Dallas, June 23.—C. M. Lombardi died in California today, where he went for the benefit of his health.

Mr. Lombardi was president of A. H. Belo & Co., publishers of The Dallas and Galveston News and The Dallas Evening Journal.

MAKING PLANS FOR SOLDIERS REUNION

We are in receipt of an invitation from the Post Commander, the Mayor and the President of the Chamber of Commerce of San Saba, inviting us to attend the first annual district meeting of the American Legion to be held at San Saba on July 3, 4 and 5.

Judging from press reports and reports coming to the soldiers of the district, San Saba is planning to entertain on a big scale. The officers of the American Legion of the 17th District are Lieut. S. P. Boon, of Brady, Commander; Lieut. Roy Nicholson, of Ballinger, Vice Commander; and W. A. Smith, of San Saba, secretary and treasurer. Mr. Nicholson stated Monday morning that the invitations sent out included all ex-soldiers, sailors and marines of the world war, and their relatives, and any friend who wanted to attend would receive a hearty welcome.

The joint executive committee, created by the directors of the San Saba County Fair Association and the Chamber of Commerce to take charge of the reception, care and entertainment of the large number of soldier boy delegates to the convention is well up with its work. The program for the three days has just been completed and every moment that the boys are not engaged in business sessions will be filled with some form of entertainment for them—parades, speaking, basket and barbecue dinners, races, ball games, band concerts and dances. A welcome to the soldiers ball is planned for the evening of the 3rd, a big free barbecue for the Fourth, the heaves for which have already been freely contributed by the ranchmen of the county, and a street dance will be held the same evening.

W. A. Bridwell, who has been confined to his bed with a carbuncle for three weeks, is recovering and was able to be up a little Sunday. He has had a serious seige of it, and his friends will be glad to note that he is improving.

Austin, June 23.—The 36th Texas Legislature convened at ten o'clock this morning in the second called session. As soon as the law makers organized for work a resolution to ratify the federal suffrage amendment was introduced in the House, the resolution carrying the signatures of eighty-one members of the House which is sufficient number to put the bill through the house. The resolution was also introduced in the senate but only contained the names of thirteen members, which is a few short of the required number to pass the bill. The bill will be called for vote and in all probability the amendment will be adopted.

BOARD ELECTS BOOK CUSTODIAN

At a meeting of the school board last Saturday afternoon, Mrs. W. A. Bridwell was elected custodian of school books for the local school. This is in compliance with the law governing the free book program. Mrs. Bridwell will have charge of the distribution of the books, and be responsible for them. It will add considerable work to her duties, and the law provides that she shall receive five percent of the cost of the books, which will be about \$150 for the term.

There are several vacancies in the faculty yet, and these will be filled at a meeting of the board to be held at an early date. The board has quite a number of applications to choose from in filling the vacancies.

As soon as a synopsis of the law governing the use of free school books can be prepared The Ledger will carry it for the benefit of the patrons of the school. Books will be issued to the children free, but certain requirements must be complied with, or the parents will be responsible for the books. Children will be required to buy covers for the books, and uniform covers will be adopted.

Germans Destroying Their War Ships For Past Time

Paris, June 23.—Reports received here today say that all of the German war ships at Kiel which had not been surrendered to the Allies, were destroyed by their crews this morning. The ships were sent to the bottom with the German flag flying, according to the report received here.

BOYS FROM 35TH ARRIVING DAILY

Several hundred people were at the passenger station Sunday at noon and waited patiently for the delayed train which was reported would bring several of the Ballinger boys home from France. Only two Ballinger boys arrived, George Smith and Levy Starkey. These were given a hearty welcome home, their many friends greeting them as they landed here.

Monday Newt Wardlaw came in from Camp Bowie, where he was discharged Sunday. These boys come from the 36th Division and there are several Runnels County boys yet to come from that division. Much has been said about the work done by the 36th Division, and the Ballinger boys faced the bullets and did their part toward stamping out humism. George Smith wears a scar above his right eye as a mark of honor which he can not discard when he exchange his uniform for civilian clothes, and all the boys have honor marks stamped upon their very countenance.

The Ledger is anxious to see all plans hurriedly perfected and a date set for the great home coming celebration which Ballinger and Runnels county has promised to stage in honor of our heroes.

Minnesota Storm Kills 75; Millions Lost In Property

St. Paul, Minn., June 23.—Minnesota state officials, who are investigating the extent of the storm damage to Fergus Falls, telegraphed to St. Paul this afternoon that the total death list reached seventy-five and that many more were injured. The property damage runs in to the millions of dollars.

The storm swept over Fergus Falls late yesterday afternoon, and the first report said that 200 people had been killed. The latest report reduced the death list to seventy-five, and more than one hundred homes were demolished. A great Northern passenger train was blown off the track about twenty miles from Fergus Falls and three passengers killed.

GOOD CHANCE TO WIN AT BIG FAIR

The State Fair of Texas, through its Educational Encampment expects to be host to six hundred boys and three hundred and fifty girls of the State of Texas, at its Victory Exposition this fall.

These young folks will be selected from the State, by competition for the best work done in the boy's agricultural clubs, the boys and girls poultry club and the girls canning clubs. The movement is under the direction of the A. & M. College of Texas, co-operating with the United States Department of Agriculture.

"This action on the part of the management of the State Fair of Texas in thus further encouraging the work of our boys and girls, is greatly appreciated," said County Agent D. F. Eaton, in speaking of the subject the other day. "We are planning to take 5 members from Runnels county to Dallas this Fall. The only expense our young folks will have, will be their transportation from Ballinger to Dallas. Any member of the Club in our County who does not know what the requirements for this work are, can learn the details, and also secure my assistance by getting in touch with me."

In view of the splendid results being attained in the work by our young folks, I have no hesitancy in saying I feel confident that the boys and girls of Runnels county have as good, if not a better chance of securing some of these prizes, as have any young folks anywhere in Texas. I hope many will come to me for further information on this subject, and enter their names in the contests so commendably arranged.

Ten thousand dollars, the largest amount ever offered in the Agricultural Department, will be awarded by the Directors of the Victory Fair this Fall. This is in addition to the many special prizes, both for grown-up and for the boys and girls. Of this amount, County Exhibitors and Individual displays will each receive \$5,000.00. The amounts are to cover all kinds of products of the farm, the orchard and the garden.

The Dallas Cotton Exchange offers \$500.00 additional for the best bale of cotton grown in Texas. The Texas Land & Mortgage Company offers \$200.00 for the best County agriculture display, and \$100.00 for the best individual display.

Secretary W. H. Stratton of the State Fair of Texas, has worked out a new system of scoring which places all counties on a neutral basis, and therefore makes the contest keener and more interesting than ever. Why should not Runnels county win in the first prize of \$500.00 in the agricultural department this year? We can do this if the women and girls will

cooperate with our farmers to this end. I will gladly assist those in any community who desire to compete in these contests: If any of the prizes can be brought home to our people here in Runnels county, it will prove a wonderful advertisement for our county, a source of gratification to all of our home folks, and an honor to the winners personally.

Big Plan to Aid Moving of Cotton

Fort Worth, June 23.—Leading bankers from various sections of Texas attended a meeting here Friday when preliminary steps were taken to organize the Texas branch of the International Cotton Exchange Financing Corporation. John T. Scott, president of the First National bank of Houston, was elected to form the permanent branch in the state. Mr. Scott is president of the Texas Bankers' Association.

It was announced that the sum of \$25,000,000 will be raised in the eleventh federal reserve district and that \$7,500,000 will be raised in Texas. Subscriptions will be sought from banks, large corporations, wholesale and retail merchants, and cotton brokers and exporters. Individuals too may subscribe. Mr. Scott was given power to name members of the working committees and fix the date when they will begin active selling campaigns.

Reports from various bankers indicate that Texas has been aroused to the importance of subscribing its quota. J. A. Kemp, of Wichita Falls, presided at the meeting which was attended by W. F. Ramsey, chairman of the federal reserve bank at Dallas, only pledges the member nations to Austin, Houston, Paris, Cameron, Corsicana, Corpus Christi,

HEAVY SHOWERS FALL SUNDAY

The heaviest rain fall for this year came in certain localities Sunday afternoon. In no case did the showers cover much territory, but "regular floods" is the way those who received rain expressed the down pour.

The rain came to the North and South gates of this city and stopped. Shortly afternoon a drenching rain fell in South Ballinger and for several miles to the south. Later in the day a heavy shower flooded the Mud Creek country to the north of Ballinger, coming to within a half mile of the city.

Shocks of grain were washed away in the low places in the Mud Creek neighborhood, and branches were filled to overflowing. The ditch along the road side of the Johnson lane was filled with water from the rain which fell on the hillside further north, while along the road through the Johnson lane no rain fell.

R. L. Booth, of the Mud Creek neighborhood lost a good horse by lightning. He only had one team a mule and a horse.

"Grain is in good shape so far" said W. R. Sumpter who lives on the Hall place north of Ballinger, "but some of my neighbors say that early cuttings of wheat is sprouting." The rains for eight consecutive days and nights, with only a miss here and there for a day or two, has caused much uneasiness on the part of the farmers for fear grain was being damaged, but a general report says that if the rain will let up now the damage will be very light. Threshing will be put under way as soon as the machines can get in the field and the grain is dry enough.

SUSPEND DRILLING IN HIGHTOWER WELL

Parties here from Winters Monday reported that drilling in the Hightower well had been suspended and the well will be shut down for probably thirty days waiting the arrival of new casing.

According to the report received here, after the well had been drilled to a depth of 2000 feet and casing set for most of that depth, it was discovered that defective casing had been used, and it would be necessary to pull the casing and this would take some time.

The log of the well, according to E. A. Shepperd, who was here from Winters Monday, compares favorably with the log of the Russell well. The contract calls for a 3500 foot hole and those interested of the county, as well as the part of the county, as well as the

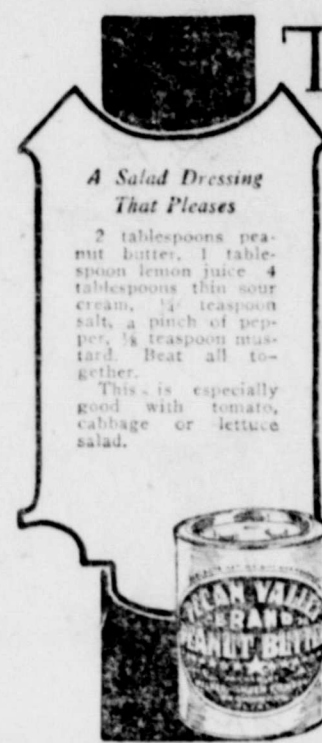

SIXTEEN JOIN BAPTIST CHURCH

Three additions by letter and thirteen additional by Baptism and about twenty-five more manifesting an interest and asking for prayer, was the result of Sunday's services at the Baptist church, where the pastor Dr. Alvin Swindell is preaching a series of sermons.

The meeting has been in progress one week, and despite the fact that the rain hindered the attendance, the meeting has already proven a success, and will continue for the present week.

The other churches of the city called in their services Sunday night and a large crowd filled the auditorium of the Baptist church, where they enjoyed the singing by the large choir and the practical message brought to his hearers by Dr. Swindell.

The auditorium of the church is equipped with electric fans, and notwithstanding that a large crowd was present and the night a still sultry one, the congregation listened in comfort to Dr. Swindell as he appealed to the people to live a "Surpassing life," and live away from the danger line of wrong.

Using a brief text from Matthew "What do ye more than these?" Dr. Swindell emphasized the great fact that God expects more of a Christian than he does of the man of the world. God is not limited in his goodness to Christians and he does not want Christians to be limited to serving him.

Dr. Swindell used practical illustrations throughout his sermon to drive home the truths that there is a great difference between the suppressing life right living and wrong living. He pointed out the wide difference between a life of indifference, an unchristian life and a life of Christian freedom and Christian liberty.

"The non-Christian, the man of the world, is watching the Christian world, and expects the Christian to live a surpassing life," said Dr. Swindell, and then he illustrated the great loss of Christian influence of the man who lived so close to danger line of wrong that the world couldn't distinguish him from the man who made no pretense towards Christianity.

Using an illustration of how an employee advances and grows with the firm for which he is working because he gives more than is exacted of him by his employers, Dr. Swindell emphasized how the Christian grow in influence and usefulness by giving to God more service than just barely enough to get by with and keep in the good graces of the laws of the land and meet the demands of public sentiment.

"There are three kinds of honest," said the preacher, "dishonesty, law honesty and honesty. There are three classes in the religious world, the un-Godly, the class which can't be located because they live so close to the line of wrong, and the class who are Christians indeed and in truth, living the surpassing life."

The preacher emphasized the fact that the man who lives close to the border line of wrong, can never grow in Christian influence. The man who lives only to sustain a reputation of respectability can not grow in church influence.

Dr. Swindell said that he had been told that some of his members had left church a night or two before and attended a dance. He said that such church members never lead a soul to Christ, and that they were living far from the surpassing life, and were living close to the danger line and the world could not distinguish them from the sinful world.

"The church can't depend on you if you are living close to the danger line," said the speaker, "but if you are living the surpassing life, the church can always count on you."

Two services for each day this week, except Saturday, were announced. The morning service is being held in a vacant store building on Eighth street at ten o'clock and each business house has been requested to send a representative to that service. The evening service is held at 8:45.
