Washington, July 29.—President Wilson today presented the Franco-British-American defensive alliance agreement, providing that the United States and England shall come to France's aid in the event of any unprovoked attack upon her by Germany, to the senate, and asked for an immediate ratification.

Half of One Per Cent Unidentified

New York, July 28.—Less than one half of one percent of the American soldiers who died on the battlefields of France were buried unidentified, according to Col. Joseph S. Herron of Cincinnati, commander of the 15,000 troops who interred the fallen Americans and who returned here today. The men under Colonel Herron's command removed the dead from the temporary graves dug for them under fire at night on the field where they fell, and laid them to rest in large concentrated cemeteries.

The largest grave yard is at Romagne, where lie 22,000 Americans who died in the Argonne and Meuse sectors and the next largest is at Thiaucourt where 4,300 soldiers who fought at St. Mihiel and Toul are buried.

"We did our work," said Col. Herron, "in accordance with the expressed wishes of the men of the A. E. F. The remark most frequently heard when the business of getting killed was spoken of was the hope of the fellow talking 'got his' he would be buried with the others of his regiment or division who also fell and close to the battle field or on it."

Says Carranza's Rule is Outlawry

Washington, July 28.—Carranza rule of Mexico is "not a government, but a band of outlaws, both technically and practically" and "today it is utterly impossible, an enemy of its own people first, and America second," William Gates, of Baltimore, an archaeologist, told the house rules committee today, in its hearing on the Gould resolution proposing a congressional inquiry into Mexican affairs.

Although asserting that President Wilson was misled in making his decision to recognize Carranza, believing the Mexican president to be a "people's champion," Gates declared in favor of leaving the solution of the Mexican problem with the president. The president, he said, has been not fully informed of conditions in the southern republic.

Governor Signs Blue Ridge Bill

Austin, July 28.—The act passed by the legislature instructing the prison commission and the governor to take such steps as are necessary to enforce the state's option to buy the Blue Ridge prison farm was signed by the governor today.

Other laws signed by the governor today provide: A board to examine and license land surveyors, regulations to require the correct labeling of seeds offered for sale the establishment of county library by commissioners courts upon majority petitions, the releasing of those who have been in the military service of the United States from tax penalties, regulations requiring those who charge warehouse fees to shelter commodities, amendments to civil laws to statute of limitation apply to minors, insane persons, etc., as it does to all others.

FOUR ARE KILLED IN EXPLOSION

Corpus Christi, July 29.—Four shipyard workers were killed today in Rockport, near here, when a boiler exploded in the shipyard at that place.

Chicago, July 29.—Twenty-two are known to be dead as a result of the race rioting here, beginning at seven thirty yesterday, and continuing throughout this afternoon.

Seven negroes were killed, and more than one hundred and fifty negroes and whites wounded.

The Governor of Illinois is here and is personally attempting to quiet the situation.

Six hundred soldiers have been rushed to the city to assist the police in quelling the riots.

The fighting is generally scattered over the entire city today.

Chicago, July 28.—Seven persons were killed and more than two score wounded, many seriously, in a renewal of race riots in the Chicago "black belt" tonight.

For more than five hours, the five miles area in the south side was a battle ground of scattered fights between whites and blacks and between policemen and negroes, who fired from housetops from dark alleys and from other points of vantage.

The call for troops to quell the outbreaks resulted in four regiments of national guardsmen being mobilized but at a late hour tonight they had not been dispatched to the disturbance district and chief of police Garrity expressed the belief that the worst of the disorder had passed.

Five of the dead are negroes, and two are whites. The wounded in most cases were hurried to hospitals, after which they were removed to homes when their conditions permitted.

There was no concerted battle

by the blacks, the outbreaks dotting a large area.

Washington, July 28.—Two threatening letters, one addressed to the governor of Georgia and the other to the governor of Mississippi, were taken by the police from William Laney, negro alleged slayer of a 17 year old white boy during the riots of last week. The negro denied authorship of the letters and claimed he found them.

The writer of the letters refers to himself as the "S. S. of the United States," taken by the police to mean sharp shooter. The letter to the governor of Georgia reads:

"Dear sir: You are the governor of the state of Georgia, and I want you to consider that the negro was drafted during the world war to fight for this country as well as for the white man, and I want you to understand that this thing of lynching in the state of Georgia must be cut out.

"We went and killed Germans for your rights and we can also kill Americans for our rights, and if I hear any more of lynching in the state of Georgia I will come quickly and the people will weep after I leave, because I sweep from the cradle up. I will remember you this time. Why did you let this man be lynched in May?"

In the letter to the governor of Mississippi the writer repeats the part the negroes played in the war and what they will do for their rights and concludes: "Sir, this thing of lynching negroes in the state of Mississippi must be cut out. I am the negroes S. S."

In the opening of the message to the governor of Georgia the writer wrote:

"From the S. S. of the negro race."

WORK ORGANIZED FOR COMING REVIVAL

Rev. J. B. Curry, Rev. J. H. King, Rev. H. P. Bates, T. S. Lankford, R. A. Williamson, R. W. Bruce, C. R. Stephens, A. W. Sledge, C. P. Shepherd, W. A. Francis, Lemmie Davis, Dr. T. A. Rape, U. E. Hartman, P. McGregor, J. J. Erwin, representing the two local Presbyterian churches and the Methodist church met at the Eighth Street Presbyterian church Monday evening and adopted plans looking to the revival campaign to be launched in this city on the Fourth Sunday in August.

Rev. J. B. Curry called the meeting to order, and was elected as chairman. He briefly stated the object of the meeting, after A. W. Sledge had been elected secretary of the conference.

The first question discussed was the place for holding the revival. The Eighth Street church lot, where the meeting was held last summer, was unanimously selected as the best place, and it was decided that a tabernacle be constructed on this lot.

A building committee composed of T. S. Lankford, Rev. J. B. Curry, P. McGregor and W. A. Francis, was appointed to adopt plans for the tabernacle and to secure material, and the plan calls for the building of the tabernacle by volunteer labor. The question of employing men to do the work was discussed, but due to the demand for labor it was decided best to ask the men of the three churches, and all others who will assist, to meet at the location after business hours and help to construct the tabernacle. This work will be done one week before the revival begins.

R. G. Erwin, A. W. Sledge and Lemmie Davis were appointed to secure seats for the tabernacle, with authority to draft others to assist in providing the seats.

The three pastors, Revs. Curry, Bates and King, were appointed to serve as a music committee in naming two others from each church whose duty it will be to assist the evangelist singer in enlisting the singers of the city and organizing a choir.

It was decided to hold union services each Sunday night through the month of August, and also a union prayer service on Wednesday night, the selection of the place of holding such services was left in the hands of the pastors of the three churches.

Other committees will be named later and further announcements concerning the revival made.

GIGANTIC MOVE ON FOR ROAD BUILDING

Fort Worth July 28.—On the face of partially complete returns Tarrant County voted the necessary two-thirds majority for a bond issue of \$3,450,000 for the improvement of roads in Saturday's election.

With 3,197 votes accounted for, the bonds had a lead of 1,191 votes or 185 votes in excess of two-thirds majority. Only eight voting boxes had been reported when this total was taken. They are small in numerical strength and

if the percentage of voting as cast in other boxes holds good in those the total vote cannot equal the margin now in favor of the issuance of bonds.

Here is what each commissioners precinct will receive in the way of good roads as a result of the voting of the \$2,450,000 good roads bonds Saturday:

- No. 1—73.8 miles of improved roads at a cost of \$558,360.
- No. 2—708 miles of improved roads at a cost of \$1,185,850.
- No. 3—102.2 miles of improved roads at a cost of \$711,736.
- No. 4—90.8 miles of improved roads at a cost of \$724,335.

Because the bonds carried Tarrant County will receive between \$200,000 and \$340,000 State and Federal aid to complete the all-county system of high ways as planned by County and Federal engineers.

Of the \$3,450,000 voted, \$450,000 will be spent for permanent bridges and culverts.

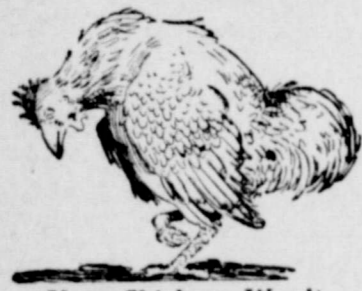

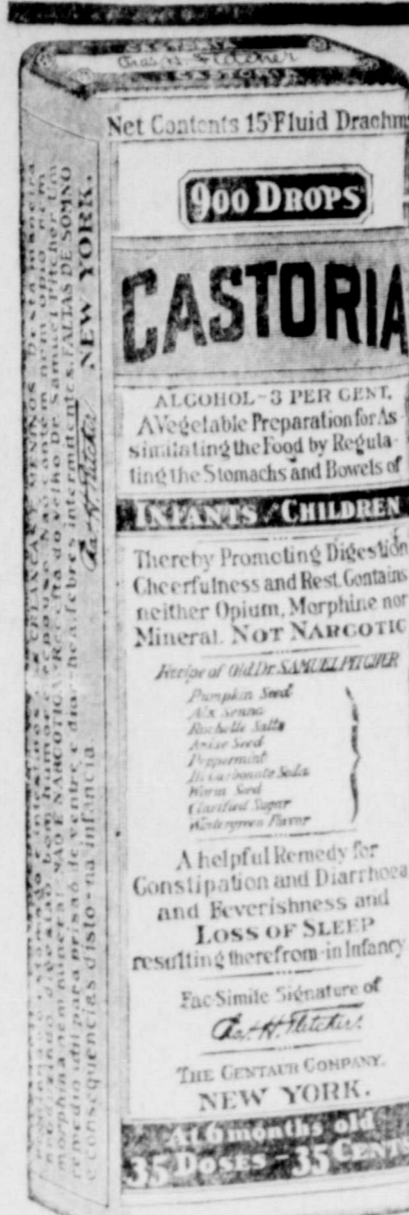

HICO ENGINEER IS ELECTROCUTED

(Hico News.) J. W. Bunn, Chief Engineer for the Central Texas Power and Transmission Company, was accidentally killed at the local plant Wednesday morning about 10 o'clock. Garland Tunnell, who was not far from him when the unnerving tragedy occurred, and other fellow employees rushed to his aid immediately after receiving the terrible shock, but they were unable to save him or to secure medical assistance in time to give him relief. Although, it is possible that the full facts, explaining just what was the cause of the electrocution will never be known, as far as ascertainable, it seems that Mr. Bunn was trying to take up the slack in a belt connected to certain electrical equipment. He had just changed an old one for a new belt and had started the machinery to see whether or not it needed tightening. And in doing this, it is said that he slipped on the greasy floor and his right wrist came in contact with one of the highly charged wires, burning a hole in it and causing him to fall against other parts of machinery. When aid reached him, life was rapidly leaving his strong body and he was unable to speak before dying a few seconds later.

Pat M. Neff is a native Texan, his parents coming to Texas from Virginia in 1852. They settled twenty-five miles from Waco, where his mother, now eighty-nine years of age, still resides. Mr. Neff is an A. B. and A. M. graduate of Baylor University and holds a LL. B. degree from the University of Texas. He taught school several years and has practiced law at Waco for the past twenty years, six years of which time he served McLennan county as prosecuting attorney. He was Speaker of the 28th Texas House of Representatives and has the distinction of being the youngest Speaker who ever presided over that body. He was for some years President of the Conference for Education in Texas, and has been for fifteen years President of the Board of Trustees of Baylor University. During the past year he served as Grand Chancellor of the Knights of Pythias of Texas. Mr. Neff was one of the speakers who accompanied the 4th Liberty Loan train through South and West Texas. He is State Chairman of the League to Enforce Peace, and has lately made a number of speeches throughout the State in behalf of the League of Nations. Mr. Neff married Miss Myrtle Mainer, of Houston county, Texas, and has two children.
