## BILL PROVIDES BIG PROFITEER PENALTY

Washington, Aug 19.-The first tangible result of the Administraton's appeal for legislation to strengthen the hand of the government against the high cost of living came yesterday when the House Committee on Agriculture drafted an amendment to the Food Control Act to earry out suggestions from the Attorney General including a provision making it possible to send food hoarders and profiteers to jail.

The amendment, which extends the scope of the control act to include wearing apparel, food, fertilizer and containers of food and revises the profiteering section, will be submitted to the House today by Representative Haugen, chairman of the committee.

As soon as it is formally referred, Haugen said, the committee will be ready to report it back with a recommendation for its passage. One salient feature of the provision gives the President power to find out what is a reason able, nondiscriminatory and fair or nonwasteful charge, commission, profit or practice.

The penalty provision, which the President said was essential for a successful war against profit eering, makes possible a fine of \$5,000 or imprisonment for not more than two years or both for profiteering, food hoarding and others who violate any provision of the law.





## LABOR UNION SUED \$900,000 DAMAGES

Pittsburgh, Aug. 18 .- A suit sking \$900,000 damages was filed this afternoon by the receivers of the Pittsburgh Railway company against the local division of the Amalgamated association of Electrical Railway employes alleg ing breach of contract by 3,000 striking motormen and conductors who have tied up trolly transportation here since last Thursday midnight, when they rejected the national war labor board's award of a five cent an hour wage increase. The men demanded a 12 cent raise and suspended their strike last May pending the board ecision, which they agreed to abide by. This suit is brought jointly against th eunion its officers and members.


