History Of The 1938 Study Club

When war clouds began to hover club dropped out of TFWC and concentrated on home front. They dedicated their efforts and funds to service men and women, helping in local drives, donated to war chest, to parties for Camp Bowie men, cards and gifts to hospitals for service men, bought bonds, collected waste paper, rags Red Cross clothing, sewed and knitted for Red Cross, contributed to McKinney General Hospital, etc.

The library, which was housed in Hall's Store, must be adding new books. Therefore there had to be library benefits to make money. The first undertaking was to present Bob & Joe Shelton & the Sunshine Boys of Dallas Then a Tom Thumb wedding in which 40 little children participated. Then came Stunt Nights, variety shows, a womanless wedding, and game tournaments.

In time, many things happened to club life. Members had sons and husbands serving on war fronts, a change in population, old members would drop out for various reasons, some taking employment to supplement family income, some moving far away.

Interest in the library as well as other phases of club, began to wane. More and more the responsibilities of the library were left up to Mr. and Mrs. Hall. Finally, for the lack of space to house it and because it ceased to be a profitable project, it was sold to Carbon high school in 1954.

The club's study courses were usually of a miscellaneous nature, consisting of educational programs, Literature, History, Government, The Arts, World Affairs, World Religion, Laws Courts, Bible Nationalities, etc.

Eighteen years brought many changes. A total of 42 women accepted membership in '38 Club. Members came and went until the chain was reduced to a few links. The club did not grow discouraged that so few women were interested in Club. Even God did not depend on the might of the multitudes, but accomplished his greatest achievements upon the fidelity

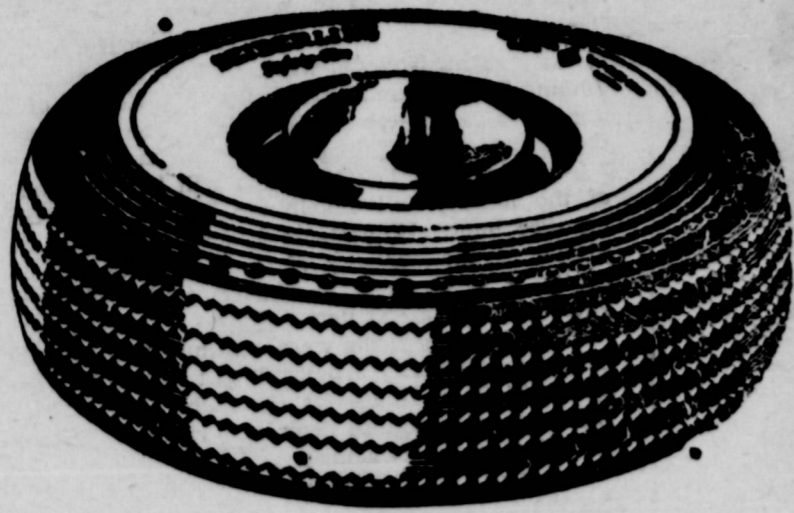

ANNUAL EVENT WILL OPEN XMAS SEASON FOR CISCO ON NOV. 26

Tickets for the annual Cisco Treasure Hunt, which will be held Monday night, Nov. 26, will be distributed at The Press office beginning Tuesday and until 5 p. m. on the day of the hunt, according to an announcement Saturday. The event will formally open the 1956 Christmas Shopping Season in Cisco.

The numbered tickets, which will be free, one to each member of the family, will enable the holders to participate in the big treasure hunt. Hunt items worth hundreds of dollars will be on display in the windows of Cisco business firms. Each item will contain a number and, to win, you will need to find the number of your ticket on a gift item.

Cisco business firms were continuing to join the Treasure Hunt program by offering handsome gift items. The stores are planning on a big Open House for the night of the 26th. Their windows will feature Christmas items and visitors will be invited to inspect their holiday merchandise.

Manager Paul Brashear reported that plans have been complete for the downtown street decorations to be turned on on the 26th. He said the town would be especially attractive for the Treasure Hunt. Everybody's invited to attend and everybody except employees of The Press and their families is eligible to participate.

Date Of Filing SS Claim Vital Factor To Many

"Every self-employed farm operator past the age of 65 should find out from his social security office whether it would be better for him to file his claim now or wait until after January 1, 1957," says R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

In brief, according to Tuley, if the amount of farm income creditable for social security purposes in 1956 is going to be less than was the 1955 amount, filing a claim for benefits now will result in a higher benefit figure than would be true after January 1, 1957, outside of minimum benefit situations where neither year's income is much over \$500.

Such differences could range from 10¢ to several dollars, and comes about because a claim filed in 1956 may have the benefit

computed on the 1955 income plus half of the 1956 income averaged over 18 months. On the other hand, a claim filed in 1957 will take into account the 1955 income and all of the 1956 income averaged over a 24 month period. This latter course would result in a lower average monthly earnings figure when 1956 income is not as large as was the 1955 income. All benefit amounts stem from the insured person's average monthly wages or earnings.

Tuley added that women farm operators should remember that the age figure for them to keep in mind is age 62 rather than age 65.

Since a brief article such as this cannot give all possibilities, he urges readers of this newspaper to get in touch with a representative of his office when he makes his next visit to this part of the sixteen county district serviced by the Abilene office. Glen McNatt of that office will be at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco on Wednesday afternoons, October 31, Nov. 14 and 28.
