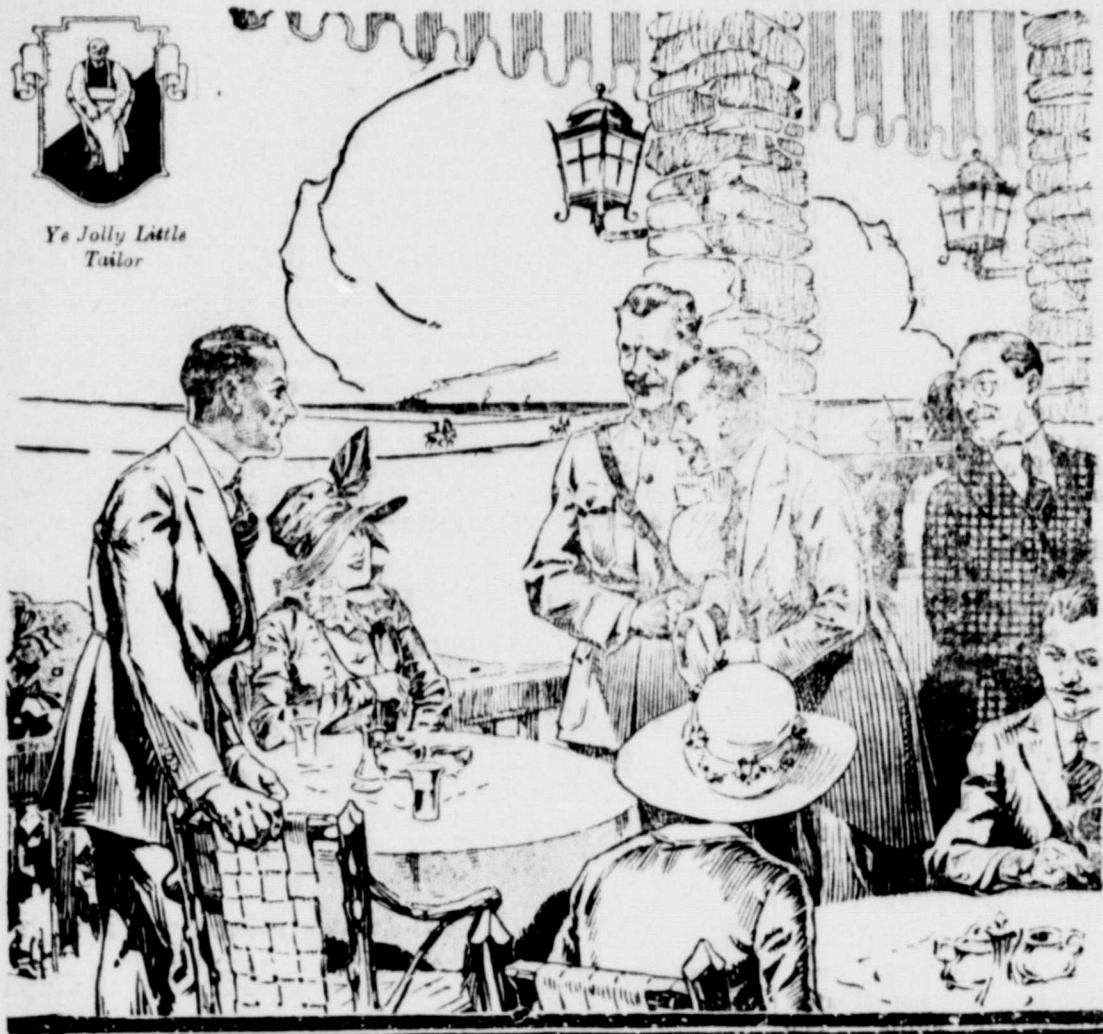

Gary Refuses to Meet Strikers; No New Changes in Situation

OIL MEN BETTING ON BASE BALL

REDLAND FIELD, Cincinnati, Ohio, Oct. 1.—More than thirty thousand howling fans packed the grand stands when the world base ball series between the Cincinnati Reds and the Chicago White Sox opened to two o'clock this afternoon.

The weather is perfect, warm bright sunshine prevailing, and the first game for the world's championship opens under the most favorable conditions.

Sixteen Texas oil men arrived today to witness the game and are offering to bet a half million dollars on even money that the White Sox win the series. Betting is seven to five on the White Sox for the winners of the series.

JIM BAKER MADE MAYOR OF BRADY

Hon. James H. Baker, formerly of this city, has been appointed mayor of the city of San Saba, his present home, by the city commissioners Saturday afternoon, it is learned here today. San Saba had been without a mayor for a week following the resignation of Mayor A. R. Riley, who gave up the office when he moved his residence to the city of Austin.

Mr. Baker has accepted the office and begun his work. It is not his first experience as a mayor, he having served one term as chief executive of Phoenix, Arizona, before locating in San Saba. He is a brother of John T. Baker, of this city.—Brownwood Bulletin.

WILSON IS BETTER AFTER BAD NIGHT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—President Wilson spent a restless night, but continues to improve, Dr. Grayson announced this afternoon.

The president was able to take a short motor ride this afternoon, but remains quite nervous.

3000 REGISTERED AT UNIVERSITY

Austin, Oct. 1.—Registration has had to be extended at the University of Texas on account of the inability of the registration committee to handle the unusually large number of students this year. The numbers registered are shown by those who have paid their fees, and many have not yet been able to get into the auditor's office as a result of the long lines awaiting every step in the process of matriculation. Figures at noon Monday showed that 3,000 have completed registration, with hundreds more standing in the lines at the offices of the registrar, the dean, and the auditor. Classes began Monday morning.

N. PASSUR BUYS 6TH STREET HOME

A deal was closed Wednesday in which Prof. E. L. Hagar sold to N. Passur, a house and lot on Sixth Street for a cash consideration of \$1600. Mr. Passur has been renting and he says his land lords either raised the rent on him or put him out when winter came, and he decided to settle the trouble.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Chairman Gary of the United States Steel Corporation, testifying before the senate labor committee today, flatly refused to the committee's request that he meet representatives of the striking steel workers union to submit differences to an arbitration committee. It was suggested that an arbitration committee be appointed by President Wilson and that the steel corporation leaders and representatives from the steel workers' unions meet. M. Gary refused to meet the steel workers.

WE GAIN AN HOUR ON OCTOBER 26TH

On October 26th we will regain the hour lost last spring when we moved up one hour. This is according to the daylight savings bill which was passed during the war, and which will be forever dead after we get back to the old time of living.

Some of the timekeepers came down town Wednesday morning, Oct. 1st, an hour late, having moved their watches back, and street arguments resulted, the feller with the slow time claiming that he was keeping step with the government's way of reckoning time.

The days are growing shorter, and we will have to get up before breakfast if we get an even start with the business world before we regain the hour lost.

COTTON REPORT IS DUE TOMORROW

On the eve of the government crop report and cotton ginners' report, cotton dropped considerable this week, losing about ten dollars per bale.

The report is due Thursday, and buyers are playing close around the shore, and most of them will go over into Thursday with a clear desk and in position to ride the waves, regardless of which way the market turns.

Notwithstanding that the market showed a decline there was much activity and many bales sold on the local market Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the sales running above 125 bales per day.

The top price Wednesday was 33 cents. Quite a number of farmers are passing up street buyers and storing their cotton in the local yard and warehouse, but a large majority are letting go at the prevailing price.

Seed market holds up good, the gin prices being \$60 and street prices \$63. Most of the farmers are selling at the gin, indicating that they do not care to handle the seed from the gin and get the \$3 per ton better price on the street.

Three days pretty weather and with increased picking crews in the cotton fields, gins are running late and early. On account of being unable to get help some of the gins are working their men overtime, and have not put on day and night crews.

The report due Thursday will no doubt bring a change in the market, but it is strictly a gamble to put your money on either side of the bears or bulls.

Sheep and Goat Raisers will be given a total of \$4,000.00 at the Victory Fair at Dallas in October. There are also numerous special premiums in this department, including those of Swift & Company, who offer \$125.00 to be divided between fine wool breeds and mutton breeds, and allowing \$25.00 for the Grand Champion wether in the Sweepstakes.

For the first time, this year cash premiums are offered by the American Cotswold Registry Association for Leicester, Karakules, and Karalines.

There are still large areas in Texas suitable for sheep raising which these premiums are intended to encourage. When it is realized that the people of the United States consume an average of only six pounds of lamb, and seventy-seven pounds of pork, it will be obvious that a large opportunity exists for raising mutton and lamb, especially if the quality and flavor be improved. This, experts say, can be done by proper care and feeding.

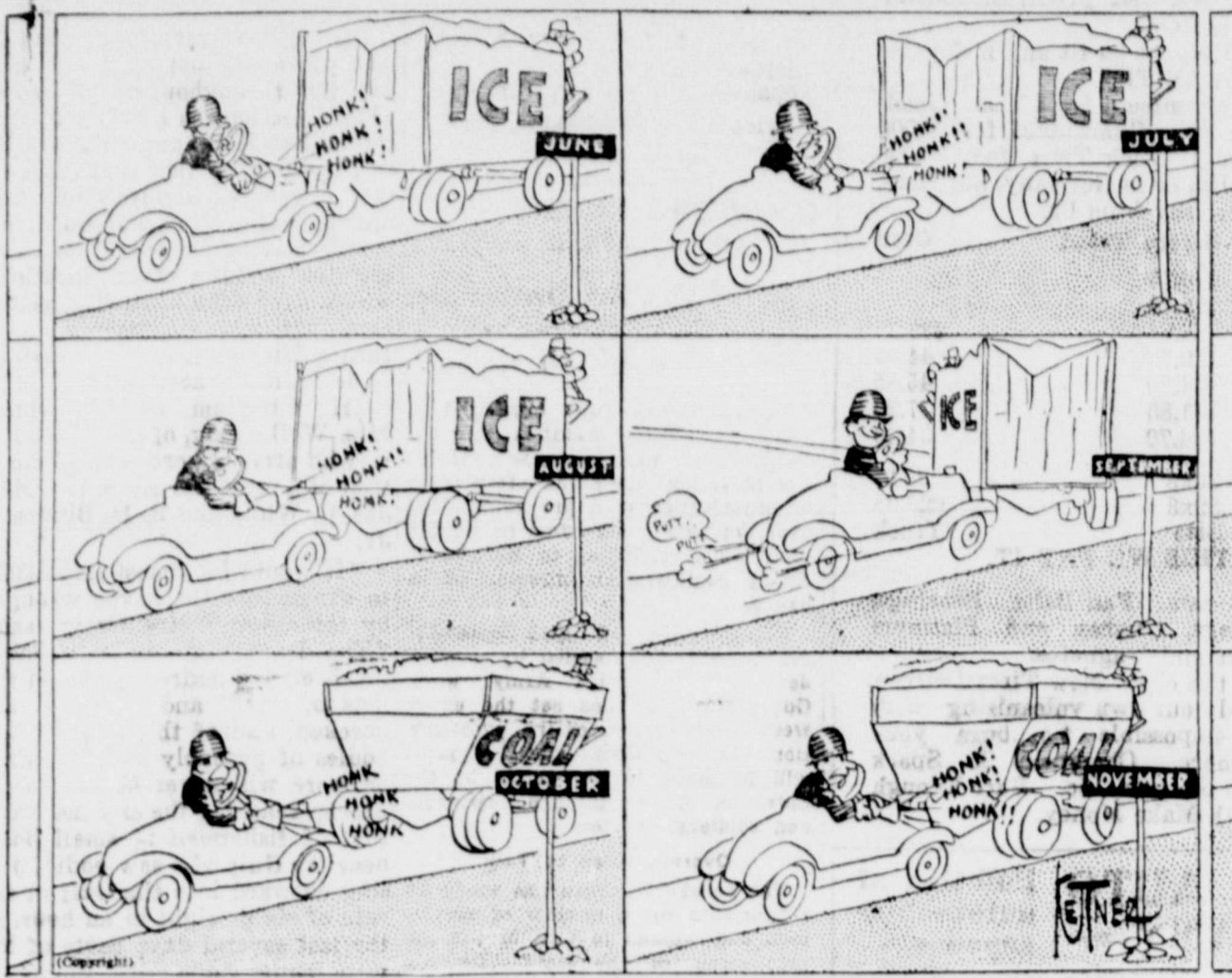

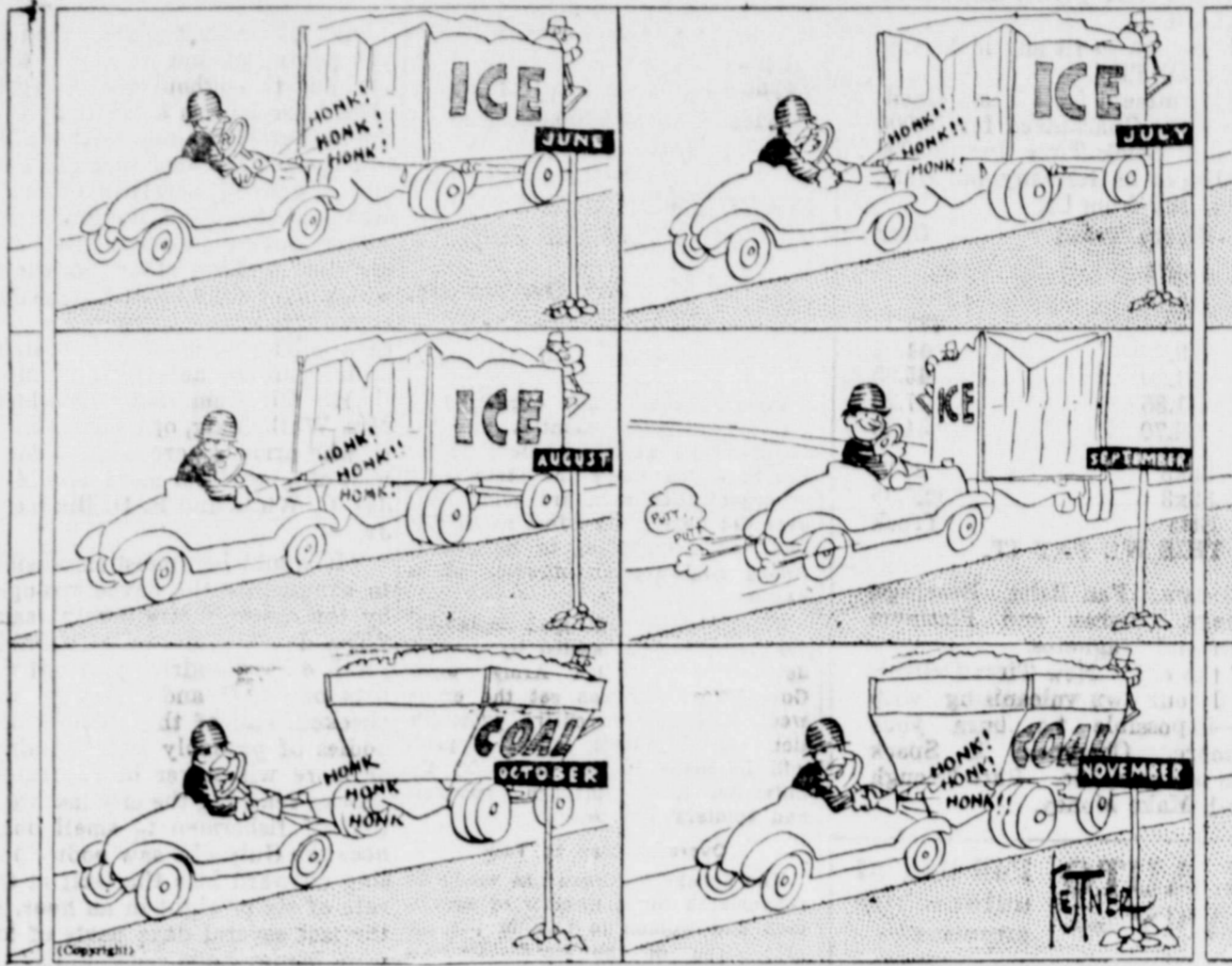

\$700,000 CATTLE DEAL AT HOUSTON

A total of 10,600 steers from the Turnbow ranch on Chocolate Bayou were sold by W. C. Turnbow to Childers & Son, of Temple, and the Blakely-Settegast-Martin cattle company, Saturday afternoon for approximately \$700,000. The steers brought from \$60 to \$80 per head.

The deal constitutes the largest cattle sale in this section in some time. It was consummated in the Houston National Exchange Bank at 1:30 Saturday. The terms of the deal were not announced. The cattle will be delivered within the next 15 days and it is understood to be the intention of the purchasers to ship most of them to West Texas.

Childers & Son took 1500 head, and the remaining 9,100 were sold to the Houston concern.

Mr. Turnbow stated Saturday that he had tried successfully during the past few months the feeding of 500 head of steers on steer fatine—successfully so far as fattening was concerned. He lost, however, on the fall in the market, but believes feeding with prepared foods can, he successfully carried on in this section.

Mr. Turnbow's ranch on Chocolate Bayou in Brazoria County comprises 60,000 acres, where 12,000 head of cattle are pastured.—Houston Chronicle.

Cambridge, Eng., Oct. 1.—Princes Albert and Henry, second and third sons of King George, temporarily laid aside uniforms today, and went into residence here, donning cap and gown as ordinary "freshmen" at Trinity College.

Their fellow undergraduates studiously avoided taking any special notice, although several week-end parties were formed to visit the rival university of Oxford, in order to indulge in a "gloat" of pride at the possession of two royal "freshers."

Oxford had the single over Cambridge a few years ago, when the Prince of Wales was in residence there but Cambridge has the longer list of recent royal undergraduates. King George, himself, did not go to either "varsity," but the late King Edward and his father, the Prince Consort, as well as the late Duke of Clarence, were all Trinity students.

The two princes will follow the customary university course, but Prince Albert will work on special lines, making a particular study of history, economics, civics, and French. He is a captain in the Royal Air Force, and is particularly proud of his pilot's "wings." He has an aeroplane of his own, and will probably spend most of his spare time flying from the neighboring aerodrome.

Prince Henry, a quieter and none too strong youngster, is credited with the determination to excel at athletics, being very keen to get a place on his merits in either the college boat, the cricket eleven or the football team. He performed fairly well at athletics at Eton, and has just passed through the Royal Military Academy, having been given a second-lieutenancy in the King's Royal Rifle Corps.

The brothers will lodge together in characteristic undergrad's "diggings," with one of the royal aides as secretary.

SPEED KINGS WILL BE SEEN AT THE TEXAS COTTON PALACE

Waco.—Several speedway drivers are negotiating with Secretary S. N. Mayfield of the Texas Cotton Palace, Oct. 26 to Nov. 9, regarding purses, and entries are expected shortly. At present Fred Horey, holder of 12 world's records; Sigard Hugdahl, Scandinavian speed star; Bob Cline of Ohio, and Floyd Willard, king of the light car division, are on the books. The field is expected to be the largest and classiest ever started on a half-mile oval in the southwest.

Sig. Hugdahl, the plucky little Scandinavian racer who upset all speed standards in 1918, and who smashed six dirt track records that have stood for years, is one of the entrants in the championship automobile races at the Texas Cotton Palace.

Hugdahl created a sensation during the 1918 campaign by his reckless and daring method of handling a high-powered racing creation. Last winter when Barney Oldfield, announced his retirement from the racing world, he declared that Hugdahl was the greatest race driver of all time, and that he was proud to pass on his honors to Hugdahl.

At present Hugdahl is the holder of six official world's records, including a mile on a half-mile track, which he established last September on the Lincoln, Neb., course. On that treacherous oval Hugdahl negotiated a mile in 1:01.60, and he covered two miles in 2:02.60. The old records for the mile and the two-mile marks were beaten by exactly four and six seconds, which demonstrated that Hugdahl has found a new method of covering space on a dirt track.

In the early race meets throughout the east and the south the little Scandinavian has established a record on practically every track on which he has appeared. He will drive his special 300 horsepower creation in the auto contests at the Texas Cotton Palace and is of the opinion he will hang up marks here that will remain on the official slate for some time.

SPECIAL WAR EXHIBIT IS COTTON PALACE FEATURE AT WACO

Waco.—Here is what the special War Exhibit for the 1919 Texas Cotton Palace exposition will include:

1 tank, 35 tons; 1 artillery tractor, ten tons with one 55 millimeter field gun.

1-75 millimeter field gun with 2 1/2 or 5 ton tractor.

1 Anti-aircraft gun on automobile truck mounted.

1 Artillery repair truck.

This equipment, as from information received from the Cotton Palace, will take four cars to transfer. This equipment will enable visitors to the Cotton Palace to see some of the Mobile field artillery which played such a prominent part in the winning of the war.

One officer and fifteen men will go with the equipment to demonstrate it.

PARIS TO BERLIN JAUNT HAS NOTHING ON TOUR OF WAR RELICS TO WACO

Waco.—It is going to take a longer trip for the United States government war show to get to Waco this year than it did to go from Paris to the Rhine.

The show starts at Washington, D. C., travels to Sedalia, Mo., 1,992 miles; from Sedalia to Des Moines, Iowa, which is a 265 mile jump; from Des Moines travel is taken up to Hutchinson, Kansas, or 443 miles more. From there the war show starts its trip to Dallas, which is 469 miles, and then on to Waco, which is 100 miles more.

This makes a total traveling mileage of 2,369 miles, and by the time it gets back to Washington again it will be over 3000 miles, all of which is some traveling to let the people of Texas view this exhibit at the Texas Cotton Palace and entails an enormous outlay of expense.

LACY WELL SHUT DOWN PENDING SALE; GUARDED

R. P. Kirk received a letter from D. J. Lacy Wednesday afternoon, in which Mr. Lacy stated that he only sold one-half of his acreage on the Russell ranch, the thousand acres sold being the half on which the well is located.

Mr. Lacy acquired a lease on 2,000 acres for drilling, and according to the letter, he retains 1,000 acres.

Reports filed the air here Tuesday afternoon when it was stated that D. J. Lacy had sold the well which he was drilling on the Russell ranch, about fourteen miles east of Ballinger and about two miles from Russell Nos. 1 and 2.

The reports stated when R. P. Kirk, who is in charge of Mr. Lacy's business during his absence, went out and shut down the drilling and brought the drillers in and paid them off and placed R. W. Pilscher on duty to guard the well.

Mr. Kirk was acting upon authority given in a telegram from Mr. Lacy, who is in Oklahoma. Mr. Lacy wired Mr. Kirk that he had

sold out and instructed Mr. Kirk to just as he did.

All kinds of rumors were soon afloat, and it was stated that Mr. Lacy had sold his holdings to the Gulf Production Co., drillers of Russell Nos. 1 and 2, but there is no confirmation for the report. It is not known here who Mr. Lacy sold to, and will not be known until he is heard from further.

It is also being currently reported that the Gulf Production Co. had purchased holdings of others in the eastern part of the county. There is no confirmation of such reports and it is mere speculation on the part of some of the well entiers.

It is a fact that Mr. Lacy has sold out, and this gives ground for considerable speculation, as he was drilling successfully a round 900 feet, and oil had shown up in the well.

The deal does not block development in that part of the county, as Mr. Lacy is under contract with owners of the acreage to drill a 3500 foot hole or find oil before reaching that depth. The contract

will be carried out by Mr. Lacy's successor.
