Runoff Necessary In Only Three Co. Offices

The Eastland county primary election of Saturday, while very close in many instances, was decisive in the final analysis in all except three of the county contests—that of sheriff and the two legislative races.

Omar Burkett and T. M. Collier, 106th legislative district, were only 313 votes apart and must enter the runoff. Burkett led in the voting Saturday.

In the race for federal representative, Eastland and Callahan counties, Pearson and Blackburn will fight it out. Pearson led his opponent by 1,137 votes.

W. W. Eddleman led J. B. Williams in the race for sheriff by only 51 votes, and they too, will again submit their candidacies to the voters on August 24. John Barber trailed Mr. Williams by 13 votes.

Dallas, Texas.—“Good living conditions are sought by all American today” Captain Mundell, U. S. Army Recruiting Officer stated today. “And the regular Army gives you that in good measure during peacetime. With the post-war Army greatly reduced, many of the isolated emergency posts that were hastily built during the war years will be inactivated.

“Many of the post-war Regular Army soldiers will be assigned to one of the big permanent Army posts and will live more comfortably than any other soldier in the world.

“Single men will find well constructed barracks, conveniently located and well heated, well lighted, well ventilated. Married men in the first three non-commissioned grades will find that the Army is making every effort to give them that domestic comfort and security that is to be found in normal life in civilian life. Draft May Hit Army Overseas

Department Is Uneasy About Its Ability to Meet Future Commitments.

WASHINGTON. — Uncertainty over the final fate of selective service is stirring uneasy speculation in the war department over its ability to meet future commitments overseas, says the Associated Press.

Exemptions of teen-agers in the current stop-gap six weeks extension may cost the army more than 100,000 replacements, responsible officials estimate, at a time when release of veterans is proceeding at an undiminished rate.

Congressmen advocating the draft cut have argued that higher army and more intensive recruiting would produce the needed men.

Study the Matter. To guard against the possibility that congress might continue the extension of 18 and 19-year-olds beyond July 1 or wind up the draft altogether, a study already has started to determine whether occupation forces in Germany and Japan can be reduced below levels which Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower has called the minimum for national safety.

The study was described, however, as merely precautionary. Officials predicted that in any trim-down estimates the last to feel the shears will be those of the chief of staff on occupation forces.

Eisenhower has said the job can be done with not more than 335,000 soldiers in Europe and 375,000 in the Pacific.

The war department's concern is to have the troops shifted rather than for the immediate future.

Relief Shipments Will Set Record

Desperate Efforts Are Made To Get Out Wheat.

WASHINGTON. — Sec. of Agriculture Clayton Anderson said recently that the United States will set a world record for food relief shipments.

In a coast-to-coast broadcast, sponsored by the American Dairy association, he said "the next five weeks will witness the greatest single movement of a food commodity in world history."

The nation is engaged, he said, in the final push "toward fulfillment of America's promise to export 40,000,000 bushels of wheat by the end of the current wheat marketing year, June 30."

"We are making a desperate effort to get every last bushel of wheat that we can possibly ship right now in the most critical part of the famine period. As a result of this record movement, hoarders temporarily may not be able to buy all the bread and flour they want in their stores during the next few weeks."

Anderson said two-fifths of the world's total exports of all food grains for the marketing year, 1945-46 will consist of wheat from American farms.

Exports for the 1945-46 crop year will approximate one-third of the nation's wheat crop, he said.

The exports, in addition to causing temporary shortages of bread and flour, now also will result next year in less pork, ham and fewer poultry and eggs because of the feed shortage.

The secretary mentioned the importance of the dairy industry's part in the famine relief program. During the first three months of this year, he said, 300 million pounds of condensed milk and 100 million pounds of powdered milk were sent abroad for relief purposes, mainly for women and children.

Lesson for August 4

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JESUS AND THE SABBATH

LESSON TEXT—Ezekiel 20:8; Mark 1:25-26; Matthew 12:12. MEMORY SELECTION—"This is the day which the Lord hath made: we will rejoice and be glad in it."—Psalm 118:24.

"The Sabbath was made for man," said was ordained of God for the good of the body and soul. It was intended to be a day of glad fellowship with the Lord.

Since the Sabbath—the seventh day—is essentially one of rest and worship, the principles which surrounded it and directed its life may be applied to our day of rest.

I. A Day of Holiness (Exod. 20:8).

God gave his people a day of labor to balance up their days of labor and to bring blessing to their souls. On that day he decreed that they should come apart from their labors, turn from secular interest and turn their hearts and soul to the unseen and the eternal. Man would become so engrossed in the things of this world that he would soon forget, therefore, God commands him to stop and worship. That should be sufficient to cause his people to "remember" the day "to keep it holy."

Notice that the day of rest was to be not only for the family, but also for servants and for visitors. It is a day when the unseemly separates his factory or office on Sunday, and the soldier who violates this commandment. Note also that the man who is to work on the six days. Day of Helpfulness (Mark 3:1-6).

For formalists of Christ's day, the Pharisees, had overlooked the heart of God's law and the holy living which it was intended to produce, and had bound up even the observance of the sabbath (which was intended to be a day of rest and gladness) in such a mass of technical "thou shalt not's" that it was a day of gloom and gloom.

The accusations against the disciples because they had taken and eaten grain was not on the law for the Pharisees, but on the law (Deut. 23:25) guaranteed that right to the one who passed through his neighbor's field. The Pharisees contended, however, that the disciples had worked on the Sabbath in picking and hilling the grain.

God's laws are helpful laws, and it is only when men pervert them, or add to them their own traditions and interpretations, that they become burdensome to anyone who is God-fearing and obedient.

III. A Day of Healing (Matt. 12: 9-13).

Jesus made it clear that healing of the man was more important than the sabbath; in fact, that is the very day for it.

Worship of the man with the withered arm revealed that back of the Pharisees' professed concern for the Sabbath was a real hatred for the work of God. It is no wonder that in that the house of worship on the very Sabbath day, these men, outwardly so religious, were plotting against our Lord.

Jesus cuts across human hypocrisy and hatred to declare that the true keeping of the Sabbath is to do the work of God. No work of necessity (like plucking the grain) or of mercy (like healing the withered arm) is ever out of place on the day of rest against our Lord.

A word of caution is needed, for some have sought to interpret this Scripture as providing biblical ground for doing all sorts of things on their day of rest. That day for man's good, not for his destruction. His greatest good is served by rest, worship, spiritual development, Christian fellowship, and the doing of deeds of necessity and mercy.

The recreation of the Lord's day in our time is a serious matter.

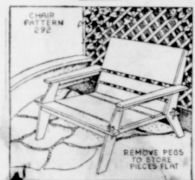

Russians Quit All of Manchuria Except Port Mukden.

MUKDEN, MANCHURIA. — Authoritative semi-official Russian quarters said that Soviet troops have withdrawn from all of Manchuria except Port Arthur.

The withdrawal was completed April 30, the Soviet source said. The port of Dairen has been evacuated, and Red army troops stationed there were transferred to nearby Port Arthur.

Authoritative Chinese Communist sources reported Communist troops moving in behind the Russians, having taken over more than 90 per cent of Manchuria.

Central government sources, confirming the widespread Communist operations, said Chinese Nationalist troops control only a few corridors along railroads branching out from Mukden.

Under the Sino-Soviet treaty, Dairen is a free port and demilitarized. The Communists claim they control the Liaoting peninsula behind Dairen up to Kaiping, 140 miles north of Dairen on the railroad to Mukden.

British Find Neurotics

LONDON. — Soldiers discharged from the British army because of neuroses have become more self-conscious, less sociable and less interested in their jobs than they were before the war, according to a ministry of health report.

A group of 30 demobilized soldiers selected from rural, town and city areas by a ministry psychiatrist, Dr. Eric Gutman, of Mill Hill Emergency hospital, showed great difficulty in readjusting themselves to civilian life.

Uncle Sam's Tars Like Bell Bottoms, Chief Says

WASHINGTON. — Chief Sam's sailors have demonstrated such affection for their bell bottomed trousers and their familiar blues and whites that the navy may reconsider plans to change uniforms.

Vice Adm. L. E. Denfeld, chief of naval personnel, said it would be at least 18 to 24 months before the navy's garb is altered—if at all.

Many enlisted men, he told the appropriations committee, are against the proposed new streamlined uniforms and "most officers and men would like to get back to blues and whites, instead of blues, grays, whites and khakis."

Crown Fruit Salad
1 cup undiluted gelatin
2 cups cold water
1 c. fruit juice
(apple, orange, or grape)
1 cup sugar
1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup raisins
1 cup nuts
1 cup currants

Soak gelatin in cold water. Heat fruit juice or juices to boiling; remove from heat and dissolve gelatin in hot juice. Cool. Add the light cream and mayonnaise and stir until mixture is smooth. Cool until mixture is slightly thickened; then add sliced fruit and halved cherries. Pour into a mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on glass plate or platter. Arrange lettuce leaves around the edge of the salad. Garnish with clusters of grapes, halves of bananas or slices of canned fruit. Serves six. This molded fruit salad is lovely to serve at a buffet supper.

1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg

Soften gelatin in water. Combine milk, 1/2 cup sugar, nutmeg, 1/2 cup egg yolks in top of double boiler; cook over boiling water until thickened, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and add vanilla and softened gelatin; stir until gelatin is dissolved. Chill until starting to become rather firm; beat with rotary beater and fold in egg whites beaten very stiff with the 3 tablespoons sugar. Turn into pie shell and chill until firm. Whip cream with remaining sugar; spread over pie. Sprinkle with grated chocolate.
