### Lewis Crossley To Speak Here Saturday

P. L. "Lewis" Crossley, candidate for re-election to the office of County Judge, will speak in Carbon Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock in the interest of his candidacy. The public is invited and urged to hear him.

## P. L. Crossley Makes Formal Announcement

Following is the formal announcement of P. L. Crossley, who is a candidate for re-election as County Judge:

"Since the beginning of our country and the institution of our democratic form of government, it has been broadly considered that one who has served his constituency faithfully, honestly, and constructively, should at least be entitled to a second term in office. I am proud of the fact, however, that we live in a free America, where anyone who feels so inclined, may run for the office of his choice. It is in the theory, however, that a faithful servant is entitled to at least his second term in office, plus the record of actual achievement and benefits derived and accruing to the people's interest and benefit, that I am asking you for a SECOND term as your County Judge.

"I refer you to my promises two years ago, wherein I said that I would, to the best of my ability, perform the duties of the County Judge's office in as business like and economical manner as was consistent with good business judgment and practices, and I now submit to you that this has been done. By reason of our adherence to this principle and policy, some personalities were injected in to it in the early days of my tenure of office, and at various times during last year, all of which will probably be revealed as the campaign progresses. We have tried to pay the employees of the county all that we felt that we could afford to pay, making such salary adjustments as we thought were necessary and reasonable, and at the same time have consistently refused to grant out of line and ridiculous salary raises, both for the office holders and the employees.

"A close study of the financial picture of the county will reveal that the county is in better condition than it has been in more than 30 years. This is because we have entered into a delinquent tax collecting campaign, that has ensured to the benefit of the entire citizenship, to the end that our tax rate has been very

**THE LAW IN JESUS' DAY**

LESSON TEXT—Deuteronomy 6:4-9; Matt. 23:17-23; Mark. 10:17-22. MEMORY SELECTION—Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I come not to destroy, but to fulfill.—Matthew 5:17.

Jesus Christ is the believer's final authority. He is both our Saviour and our Lord. He is our teacher, our guide, our pattern in all things. It is therefore of the highest importance that we know his attitude toward the Old Testament laws, and that is just what we are to consider in the lessons of the next three months under the general title, "Jesus Interprets Old Testament Laws."

Our introductory lesson tells us of the origin, interpretation and application of the law, then we go in later lessons to consider the Ten Commandments in the light of the teachings of Jesus.

It is appropriate to point out that, far from being outmoded, the Ten Commandments are in fact the basis of all moral law. They need a diligent restudy and re-emphasis in our day of disregard of moral standards.

**I. The Law—Given by God (Deut. 6:4-9).**

Our God is the one true God who is to have the complete and constant devotion of all. The fact that so many men have ignored him explains the awful depth to which the world has fallen.

This one and only true God has given through his servant, Moses, the fundamental moral law for the government of man, and he is to give diligent attention to it at all times.

Religion in the household (v. 7) should include the teaching of the Word, and the easy natural discussion of spiritual things in all the varying circumstances of home life.

The law of God should go with his people into their daily occupations (v. 8), not in any formal or forced way but as the normal expression of their love for him. It should be evident to all who enter the home that the Lord is loved and honored (v. 9).

**II. The Law Fulfilled by Jesus (Matt. 5:17-19).**

The law of God is eternal, never to be abrogated, never set aside. Christ himself, although we might properly say that he was in reality the lawgiver and thus had power and authority over the law, indicated his purpose in coming to be that of giving the law its full meaning, not of destroying it.

One could wish that those who profess to be his servants might have the same measure of regard for God's law. If they did, they obviously would not be so ready to ignore it, so quick to change it or ready to subvert with their Master every "jot and tittle"; that is, even the minutest detail of his Word.

It is a mark of greatness (v. 10) and of pathetic smallness to break his commandments and to teach others to disobey God. Some of the supposed great men of this world are mighty small when they are measured by God's yardstick.

**III. The Law—Applied to Man (Mark 10:17-22).**

The gospel of the grace of God in Christ Jesus takes us a step beyond the law, and it is a great step for here we meet and follow the one who is greater than the law, the giver of eternal life.

Obedience to the commandments brings a man up to the very entrance upon that life; but to enter in he must have more than the "things" of the law; he must have the person who is "the door" to eternal life.

The young man who came to Christ was rich. His mind was obsessed with things. He had made it his business to observe the law, and had done well (v. 20), but his heart was not satisfied. He thought one more "thing" that he could do would accomplish his purpose.

The general attitude of the man was commendable. He sensed his lack of the vital something which would remake his life. He came to the right one—the Lord Jesus—with his question.

His failure to go beyond the things of the law to a faith in Christ, however, showed that he loved his possessions more than he desired to follow the Lord.

**AROUND THE HOUSE**

Small bottles with a combination screw cap and medicine dropper are convenient for storing small amounts of household oil near appliances that require regular oiling.

Patches that press on may be used for mending weak spots in the feet of hose. Mend before the weak spot wears through to make certain patch does not show.

Stocking feet can be made more durable by rubbing candle wax or paraffin on heel and toe.

 materially reduced, and will be still further materially reduced for another year. The tax rate for the immediately surrounding counties run from 48¢ per hundred valuation to 60¢ per hundred, whereas Eastland County's rate has been considerably more than double these rates. At the beginning of my term in office, the tax rate in this county was \$1.16. I am happy to tell you that the 1946-47 rate will not be more than 60¢ per hundred, which said rate will be duly set as is required by law. This savings of 56¢ per hundred or \$5.60 per thousand valuation, should be something that all the people should be proud of. This has been done through a fine spirit of cooperation, without a single contested suit having been filed, and at a time, when, if one can ever start doing something toward paying, it is now. Adjustments have been given, when they were not to be given, and the yardstick of fairness has been applied to everyone alike, notwithstanding the mouth to ear whispering and anonymous letters and postcards that have been sent throughout the county. If anyone desires to know about any particular matter, he need only to county business the best place to learn the facts is from the official handling of the business, by all of the units involved. By reason of the cooperative spirit that has been demonstrated by the people, we are far ahead of even sinking fund requirements and indebtedness, and by the end of this year, will be TWO years ahead of ourselves in the payment of our indebtedness. All indications point to the fact that the tax rate for 1947-48 will be even lower, probably not more than 50¢ per hundred valuation, and if we are permitted to continue this delinquent tax program, there should be no reason for our tax rate being more than 50¢ per hundred at any time in the future, unless additional bonds are voted for some purpose by the people. We must bear in mind, however, that these low rates cannot continue to prevail, if the job is to be abandoned just half completed. It is essential that the program not be abandoned in the middle of the stream in order that fair play to all alike be had and full benefit of the results be gained for the entire citizenship of the county.

The routine legal duties of the County Judge's office, plus duties in connection with the tax program have been quite strenuous and it has been necessary that I devote all of my time to these duties. I expect to see every voter that I possibly can, and expect to acquaint you with every phase of this work, before the campaign ends. In this connection may I state that there has never been a two year period when as much publicity, newspaper and otherwise, has been given to the people, as has been given during the past two years, in an effort to keep you fully informed as to what was going on in your county business.

"Notwithstanding the fact that a good deal of my time will have to be devoted to the duties of the office, I shall make every effort to see each voter personally. However, should I miss some of you, I sincerely trust that every reader will consider this a personal solicitation for his or her support for my SECOND TERM as your County Judge."
