"MASTER MIND" IN BIG ROBBERY RE-ARRESTED

BILLS PENDING TO CUT DOWN STATE PAY ROLL

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—Senator Williams today introduced a resolution in the senate proposing a complete investigation of the penitentiary system.

The resolution was laid on the table subject to call.

Senator Bailey, of Cuero, introduced a bill proposing a merger of the State Pure Food Department and State Health Department, in accordance with the recommendations of Governor Neff, in a message to the legislature.

In a senate concurrent resolution offered by Senator Hertzberg of San Antonio, proposed that in the event that Governor Neff could not attend the inauguration of the Governor of the State of Nuevo Leon, Mexico, on Feb. 5th, that accredited representatives from Texas be sent. The resolution was adopted.

A bill dealing with private banks was introduced in the senate. A graduated system of bonding examination by commissioners and banking was a feature of the bill.

A bill introduced by Representative Veatch, of Johnson county, and Nelson, of Hopkins county, abolishing the marketing and ware house department and placing the work of the department on the department of agriculture was reported favorable today by the House committee. This consolidation was recommended by Governor Neff in his message to the legislature.

ANTI-JAPANESE BILL PROPOSED

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—A bill proposing anti-Japanese legislation in Texas was introduced in the senate today by Senator Dudley, of El Paso. The bill was referred to the committee on State affairs.

The measure as introduced was copied largely from the California alien land law, and was prepared by the American Legion of El Paso.

The bill applies only to aliens ineligible to citizenship in the United States, and is not intended to exclude Mexicans holding and owning property in Texas. Adequate measures for protection of aliens owning property in the State is provided. The attorney general is given authority in the bill to institute suit to recover in behalf of the State, land acquired by aliens eligible to citizenship.

MORE OIL USED IN U.S. THAN '20 PRODUCED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Almost one hundred million barrels more of oil was consumed in the United States during the year 1920 than was produced in the United States, according to a preliminary report made in the annual geological survey which was made public today.

The oil production in the United States for the year 1920 totaled 443,402,000 barrels, while the consumption amounted to 531,186,000 barrels.

Despite the excess consumption the need of the year showed a net increase of petroleum stocks of more than ten million barrels. The total production it is estimated was said in the report, would probably be increased when the amount consumed on leases is known.

After allowances are made in net charges, it made the stock held by producers on leases, as it stands, represents a gain of 17 per cent in production as compared with 1919, 78 per cent in 1913.

Imports petroleum for 1920 amounted to 106,075,000 barrels, which is more than double the imports of 1919 and almost five times greater than the imports of 1913.

Rev. Arthur Holten came in from Thorp Springs, Friday at noon to visit his father, P. P. Holten, who was recently injured by falling from a hay wagon.

DALLAS, Jan. 28.—Silbert Rowan, under federal indictment as the alleged leader of a bold post office robbery, in this city on January 14, was arrested here today as he stepped from an elevator en route to his attorney's office. He was not permitted to see his attorney and was hurried to the federal building, and will be placed in jail until he makes \$25,000 bond.

DALLAS, Jan. 28.—Federal and State authorities instituted a search today for Albert L. Rowan, son of a prominent Dallas business man, who disappeared Tuesday following his indictment by the federal grand jury as the alleged leader of the sensational sub-post office station robbery here on January 14th when three employees of the office were wounded and following which one of the bandits was killed and another injured was trying to make their getaway when the car in which they were fleeing turned over on the Dallas-Fort Worth pike.

Rowan surrendered to the police when the captured bandit implicated him and denied his guilt. He was released on \$15,000 bond, which he readily furnished, following a preliminary hearing. The federal grand jury returned an indictment and Judge Meek increased the bond to \$25,000 and when the officer went to arrest the man again he was missing and his whereabouts are not known.

Rowan's attorneys stated yesterday that their client would return during the day to make bail, but he had not appeared at the federal building at a late hour today and a search was immediately instituted for him.

Judge Meek has set the trial of Rowan, Ben Luna and W. S. Scrivner, charged in connection with the robbery, for next Monday. Luna is at liberty on \$10,000 bond while Scrivner is in jail. County Attorney Hughes said that murder charges would be filed against the six men as the result of the death of G. W. Street, postal clerk, who died as the result of gun shot wounds received when the bandits robbed the post office.

MAN CONFESSES THEFT OF FUNDS

MARION Ohio, Jan. 28.—Treasurer Harry Forry, of Marion county, who reported Wednesday that he had been robbed of \$14,000 by two bandits, who knocked him unconscious in his office at the court house was placed under arrest today.

According to the police Forry made a confession after being put through a close investigation and admitted that he was not robbed, but stole the money himself.

Not satisfied with the story told by Forry when he rushed to police headquarters to report the robbery, the police became suspicious yesterday and today obtained a written confession from the man.

Forry was arrested almost immediately after the arrival of a new baby at his home. He is the father of three children and is 35 years old. Friends believe that debts created during the political campaign in which he was re-elected worried and weakened Forry and caused him to commit the theft. He is being held without bail.

Farm Agent Eaton returned Friday at noon from Dallas, where he and Feb McWilliams attended the State meeting of the National Farm Bureau. A branch of the bureau will be organized in this county at an early date.

RURAL TEACHERS HERE TOMORROW

Eighty-five rural school teachers will meet in the court house at Ballinger at ten o'clock tomorrow morning for a day's institute work. The teachers will be in session until four o'clock.

The meeting here is to complete the year's institute work which fell short one day at San Angelo. The teachers adjourned at San Angelo a day ahead of time in order to get home before Christmas, by previous arrangements are to meet here for one day.

In addition to making up the

lost institute time at tomorrow's session the teachers of this county are coming together to consider other matters of vital importance to the rural schools of this county.

County Supt. Bugg was busy arranging for the coming of his big bunch of fine teachers, and it will be a busy day for him. Every rural teacher in the county is due to be here tomorrow.

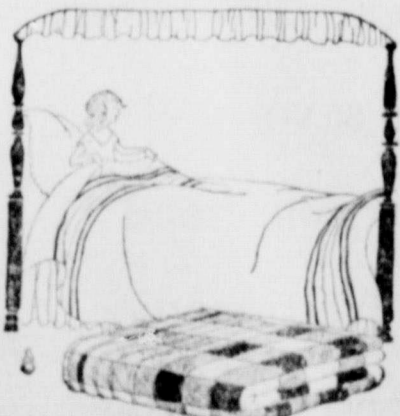

DANISH ARTIST COMING MONDAY

In speaking of Skovgaard, the Danish artist, who will appear at the Carnegie Library Monday night, under the auspices of the Civic League. The Waco News Tribune says:

To a well filled house, proving a flatteringly appreciative and delighted audience, Axel Skovgaard the Danish artist, played last night at Carroll chapel in a program bringing into play his wonderful power of interpretation and his skillful and complete mastery of that most difficult as well as most pleasing of all musical instrument, the violin.

Presented by Professor Severin Frank of the department of music at Baylor, it was expected that the musician would be a star of the first magnitude by all those who know Mr. Frank's high standard and the personal interest he takes in bringing an artist to Waco. Mr. Frank's choice was justified last night by the breathless attention with which the audience heard the violinist, the thunderous applause that greeted him at the close of each number and repeated calls for his re-appearance.

Mr. Skovgaard was assisted by his wife, Madame Alice McClung Skovgaard, who accompanied him with that perfect rapport necessary to harmony, observing all the delicate nuances which make for complete unity between violin and accompanist.

Further addition to the program was found in the songs of Miss Pearle Weatherber, a singer of charming personality, possessed of a beautiful voice.

The program opened with Sjogren's Sonata in E minor, a brilliant performance by the Skovgaard, that caught the fancy of the audience in the beginning, sustaining throughout a repertoire that featured the violinist in delicate rhapsodie, quaint folk song, Indian dance and negro spiritual with equal facility.

Mr. Skovgaard's violin caught the spirit of the negro melody perfectly and swayed his audience with the power of the master artist when applied through the simplest medium.

The fantastic Lepo-Lele, Armenian folk dance, the Indian Snake dance, and the delicate "singing" of bold English melodies were achieved with equal artistry, the magic of a "wizard of the bow." Madame Skovgaard's piano solos were equally the work of skilled performers.

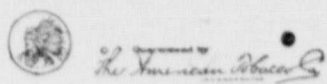

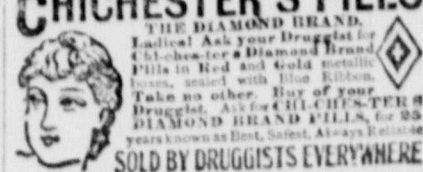

FANS FIND FUNDS FOR BASE BALL

ANOTHER DELAY IN HORNSBY CASE

Information from Belton today is to the effect that District Judge Blair of Bell county intimates that it may be impossible for the court to reach the case of the State vs. George Hornsby, alias Scott, during the present term. There are four murder cases on the docket for each of which a special venire has been summoned. One of these murder cases is now on trial and may consume all of this week and part of next. In event the case is continued, however, it would probably come up in March as a term of court is held in Bell county during that month, there being four terms of district court in Bell county each year instead of two, in Brown county.

The prosecution has employed the firm of Hair & Woodward of Temple, and Martin White also of Temple, to assist the State's attorney, Louis Jones.

Judge Blair has not as yet appointed an attorney to defend Hornsby, but will probably do so within the next day or so, and it is quite probable that some of the attorneys for Hornsby at Brownwood may attend the trial at Belton.—Brownwood Bulletin.

MONEY ALLOTTED FOR IRRIGATION

EL PASO, Jan. 28.—Nearly \$2,000,000 has been allotted to the Rio Grande irrigation project by the reclamation service to complete the irrigation and drainage work on the system which irrigates 200,000 acres of land in the Rio Grande valley in New Mexico and Texas. When this additional sum is expended, it will make \$12,000,000 which has been spent on the project since 1906, when work was begun on the Elephant Butte dam in New Mexico.

The irrigation system, however, has turned hundreds of acres of desert land into acreage that will produce cotton, corn, alfalfa, truck garden crops, peaches, pears, grapes, and melons in abundance.

BALLINGER CAR KILLS BOY ON BRADY STREET

S. V. Brandon, for many years a citizen of the Crews country, and who for several months had been living in Ballinger, had the misfortune to kill an eight year old boy at Brady last Saturday while en route to the Rio Grande Valley where he went to make his home. Mr. Brandon owned the Lawrence Harris place North of the compass, and had just rented the place to N. K. Freeman, and left in his car for his new home in South Texas Friday. The Brady Standard gives the following account of the tragedy, which shows that Mr. Brandon was not to blame for the accident.

One of Brady's most distressing accidents occurred about 5:00 o'clock Saturday evening at the corner of the Brady National Bank, when an 8-year old lad, Lewis Montgomery, was crushed to death beneath the wheels of an automobile driven by S. V. Brandon, late of Ballinger. The accident occurred in plain view of a large crowd of Saturday afternoon sleepers, who stood aglance at the accident they were powerless to prevent. When those closest at hand rushed to the scene and tenderly picked up the limp form, the boy was still alive, but it was seen that the angel of death lurked not far distant. Dr. B. L. Craddock, who was one of the first to reach the boy, picked the boy up and carried him to the walk, and Dr. J. B. Granville, who was close at hand, rushed him to the sanitarium. An X-ray was taken of his injuries, and showed a fractured skull. Although the lad rallied, he never regained consciousness, and the slender thread that bound him to this life was snapped in twain by the death angel Sunday morning, shortly after 5:00 o'clock.

While there was a large crowd in the immediate vicinity, few appeared to have witnessed the accident entirely, and reports consequently vary. The account most credited is that the little fellow, who would have been only 8 years old in March, was crossing the street along with other passersby, and just as the car reached the crossing he suddenly stepped back just in front of the car. Mr. Brandon, himself was driving, and his view to the left was partially obstructed by a side curtain. However, Mrs. Brandon, who also occupied the front seat of the car, saw the lad's danger and screamed just before the car struck the body. Her scream attracted the attention of bystanders, but by

that time the car had already passed over.

All are agreed that the car was running at a very moderate speed and this further evidenced by the fact that the heavy automobile, a Willys-Knight, was brought to a standstill within a car's length.

The lad came to town Saturday afternoon in company of a 17-year old relative, and while the latter was shopping, strayed away from her care. Supposing that he had gone on home, the young lady returned home without him. For this reason, coupled with the fact that the family had only recently moved to town, it was an hour or more after the accident before the identity of the lad was learned.

Mr. Brandon, who drove the fatal car, with his wife and son and daughter, were enroute from Ballinger, where they had resided for a number of years, and where they are well-known, to Waleseo, a new town on the coast, where they expect to make their future home. The family was obliged to wait over in Brady a day for repairs to their Willys-Knight, and the car had been out of the shop less than a quarter of an hour. Mr. Brandon having driven to the hotel for his family to continue his journey. Mrs. Brandon was all but prostrated by the terrible accident, and was under a physician's care Saturday night. The family continued on their way Sunday morning. Mr. Brandon being anxious to get his wife away from the scene of the tragedy that had so seriously affected her. While no blame attaches him in the matter, yet he was very much affected by the accident, and asked that everything possible be done for the unfor-

tunate victim and that the bill for all expenses incurred be forwarded to him.
