NEFF WANTS SUSPENDED SENTENCE LAW REPEAL

AUSTIN, Feb. 1.—In a special message to the legislature today, Governor Neff recommended an outright repeal of the entire suspended sentence law. The governor said that the law was a convenient vehicle by which many criminals were escaping just punishment, and he referred to the law as "the incubator of professional criminals."

AUSTIN, Feb. 1.—Governor Neff today sent the appointment of Judge F. L. Hawkins, of Waxahachie, as judge of court criminal appeals to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Judge W. L. Davidson, to the senate for confirmation. The governor also appointed Joseph W. Myers, of Fort Worth, as labor commissioner and assigned R. H. Hamilton, of Port Lavaca, assistant attorney general, to the court of criminal appeals. The senate will meet in executive session Thursday to consider these appointments.

AUSTIN, Feb. 1.—The senate committee on civil juris prudence will consider the bill of Senator Witt, proposing the creating of a court of industrial relations next Thursday in an open hearing.

The House bill by Representative Hall, increasing the pay of sheriff's and allowing an increase in fees of from forty to fifty percent, will be considered Monday by the state affairs committee at an open hearing.

The concurrent resolution of Senator Hertzberg, granting the request of the Daughters of the Republic to hang a portrait of Mrs. Clara Driscoll Sevier in the Senate Chamber, was adopted.

ASKS WILSON TO CALL A SESSION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The request of President-elect Harding that President Wilson call a special meeting of the new senate on March 4th was conveyed to the executive at the White House today by Senator Underwood, of Alabama. The democratic leader, Senator Underwood, said that he conveyed the message at the request of Senator Lodge, of Mass., republican leader. Mr. Underwood saw Secretary Taft today who said that he laid the request before Mr. Wilson.

BIG CUT IN THE DEFICIENCY BILL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—A reduction of department estimates of more than one-half was made by the house appropriations committee which is framing the first big deficiency bill this year. The measure as reported today in the House carries \$203,293,497, as compared with an estimate of \$478,726,786.

DOPE AGAINST 'MASTER MIND'

DALLAS, Feb. 1.—Testimony in the trial of W. S. Scrivner, charged with the Jackson Street post office robbery here on January 14th, was given in graphic detail by the defendant today, who implicated Albert Rowan throughout as one of the principals in laying the plan for robbing the office. The testimony shows that Rowan was the "master mind" in planning the robbery and in the division of the loot.

BUSINESS LEAGUE HAS MUCH TO DO

L. M. Hewitt of Navasota addressed the Directors of the Business League last night on the possibilities of irrigation in this section, stating that it was his belief that an area including the cities of Ballinger, San Angelo, Winters, Paint Rock, Miles, Rowena, Bronte, and all of the smaller towns within that radius could eventually be included in a Water Improved district whose taxable values would exceed \$25,000,000, and which would allow for the emponing of water on both the Colorado and the Concho for city water supplies as well as for irrigation.

Secretary Williams stated that an interesting contour map of the project had been prepared and was on exhibit in the offices of the League. The general public was invited to inspect the map in order that they might be better able to visualize the possibilities of the project.

It was decided to hold a general membership meeting Thursday night at which time all those who are interested in the Carnegie Library, the Cemetery Association or the Business League are urged to be present. The banquet feature will be dispensed with as a measure of economy.

Mr. E. D. Walker and Judge J. W. Powell were added to the committee on the West Texas A. & M. College contest, which committee will prepare the brief to be used in arguing Ballinger's claim to the school.

The committee on advertising and insignia for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention at Ranger reported that a special edition of the League's house organ would be issued for distribution at Ranger, and that distinguished insignia had been decided upon.

A letter from Congressman Tom Blanton was read in which he stated that he was working with the proper officials in Washington to get night mail clerks installed on the Santa Fe.

It was the opinion of the Board that Sweetwater should be supported by this city as the meeting place for the next West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention in 1922.

Good Program for Public Affairs Meeting Thursday

An after meeting of retail merchants will be held to discuss the newly organized Retail Merchants Association, and elect officers and directors.

The trip to Ranger to attend the Third Annual Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be discussed, and an effort made to secure an adequate representation for the purpose of distributing the advertising matter being prepared by committees from the Business League.

Much business of importance is to be transacted, and every citizen of this city who is interested in the prosperity and progress of its affairs is expected to be present.

ICE CO. DIRECTORS VS. INTERSTATERS

Representatives of the Interstate Electric Corporation are here to negotiate with the Citizens' Ice Company and the City Commission with a view of selling their holdings here to the ice company and the city.

On account of the absence of the members of the city commission the light plant proposition will not be considered further at this time, and it is not probable a deal for the ice plant will go through.

At four o'clock Tuesday afternoon the directors and representatives of the New York company were in conference, the directors being called together to entertain a proposition from the foreign concern concerning the ice plant.

It was announced before the meeting that the Citizens Ice Company would buy an ice plant Wednesday. If no terms for the purchase of the present plant can be agreed upon, the directors will place an order for the new plant.

Mayor Guin, in discussing the light plant proposition, stated that he was of the opinion that it would be hard to perfect a purchase of the light plant, due to the fact that the physical values of the present company would have to be figured on a low basis, as the equipment was old and badly worn out. However, if the company has a proposition to offer, the city will hear it, and then proceed to install a new plant, if terms for buying the old one can not be agreed upon.

The city has cash assets to the amount of \$75,000 which it can draw upon, if necessary to install a new plant, while it is not expected that a new plant will cost more than \$60,000.

WOOL GROWERS AUTHORIZE SALE

The members of the Runnels County Wool Growers Association have authorized the sale of 200,000 pounds of wool which they have in storage at Boston. This action was taken at a meeting of the wool growers in Ballinger last Friday.

The wool growers of this county consigned their holdings to commission men in Boston last summer, where the wool could be handled to a better advantage and sold to a better advantage when the owners of the wool decided to sell.

The market is yet far from satisfactory, the price to be received ranging from 22 to 30 cents, according to grade, but with another clip about to be made, and with foreign wool pouring into the United States by the millions of pounds, the sheep men of this county seem to be doing the wise thing in taking what is in sight and getting out with as little loss as possible.

GERMANY DECLARES CAN'T PAY WAR DEBT

TARIFF BILL IS LIKE WOOD SHIP

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The Fordney emergency tariff bill which is awaiting the action of the senate, begun resembling a wooden ship adrift a barnacle sea. Encumbrances are being added daily by opponents' friends. The opponents began today to see visions of the bill sinking beneath the waves from the weight imposed.

Proposing to place an import duty on sunflower seed and nails were made in amendments appearing today. As it left the House the bill provides for duties on a score of products. Now the senate clerks are unable to estimate the number of commodities subject to additional tariff levies should all the amendments be adopted.

NEW YORK SUGAR DROPS TO 7.50

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Fine granulated sugar is quoted today at seven and one-quarter cents per pound by several large local refiners. The price decreases one-fourth cent per pound in the latest quotations and brings sugar down to the lowest point in more than two years.

Be Wise and Advertise—

PARIS, Feb. 1.—The fact that the German delegation to the Brussels conference of financial and economic experts are remaining in Paris for consultations, is taken in political circles here to mean that Germany is willing to accept the decision of the allies in regard to preparations as a basis of discussion, notwithstanding the comment in Berlin indicating the disposition of the part of Germany to reject the plan.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—It will be impossible for Germany to pay the amount fixed as reparation debt by the allies, according to John Keynes, the principal representative of the British treasury, at the Versailles peace conference. Keynes argues that Germany must have a total export trade of seven hundred million pounds in order to have a surplus of exports amounting to two hundred million pounds.

Immediately following the announcement of the amount of the reparation debt agreed upon by the allied council last week, the German papers, in commenting on the amount of the debt, stated that it would be impossible for Germany to pay it.

BERLIN, Feb. 1.—Germany regards the reparation terms which were received yesterday in a note from the allies as impossible and fanatical. The general opinion is that the German government can not and will not agree to the terms as fixed by the allies.

In referring to the note from the allies giving the terms agreed upon, the leaders in the Reichstag used the term "madness." Foreign Minister Simons declared that to undertake to put into execution the terms of the settlement would produce a state of chaos, not only in Germany, but throughout Central Europe, and would lead to bankruptcy in Germany and also among part of Germany's war creditors, among whom is France.

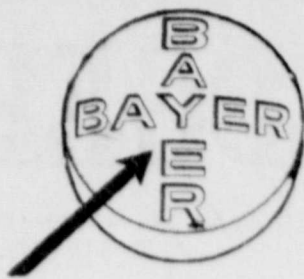

sought to show that popular sentiment was in favor of the retention of the agent in order to get the court to reconsider its action.

But the commissioners stood pat on their contention that the majority of the farmers were opposed to the plan. Straw votes were taken by those friendly to the agent's work in several communities, the results of which were in their favor. Various farmers made statements about the benefit they had received personally through the agent. There was a general discussion of the merits of the work and pretty nearly everybody in the county became better acquainted with the county agent and his work.

Those sponsoring the move to retain the agent asked the court to call an election to determine the sentiment of the farmers in the county and offered to pay all the expenses incident to the referendum, but the court ruled that it was illegal and refused to take action.

The farmers finally decided to dig up the \$1,000 and let the agent continue his work. A limited number of farmers will pay for the service direct instead of all paying indirectly through taxes. The A. & M. extension service made an agreement with these farmers to continue their support, which is the big end of it.

It is significant that the work was considered of sufficient importance by the farmers that they would go to their pockets for the funds to continue it. Evidently these farmers believe that the agent is accomplishing something worth while in Runnels county and backed by the confidence and cooperation of these he will be enabled to do more perhaps.

But although a few of the farmers underwriting the expenses, Mr. Eaton, the agent, will make no discrimination in assisting all

the farmers in the county who call upon him or who are willing to fall in line with any of the programs which he may institute.

As we see it the action of these farmers is a definite and unmistakable endorsement of the county agent's work in that county. It is a hopeful sign when the farmers enter so enthusiastically into a proposition for helping themselves.—Temple Telegram.

Fifty-seven women qualified for voting in the city elections by paying their 1920 poll tax, according to City Tax Collector Lusk.

This number represents practically the increase in city polls over the previous year. Even 400 polls were issued in the city, while a little more than 350 were issued one year ago. Nearly one hundred polls were issued Monday—the last day, showing that many people delay as long as possible.

The total number of polls paid in this county will not be known until Collector Brown works up several hundred orders which he has on file. Receipts are being issued today on orders which came in at the last hour and which accumulated faster than the collector could issue the receipts. As soon as the work is completed the total number of county polls will be announced.

The tax collector remained on the job until midnight Monday and as usual there were several eleventh hour callers.

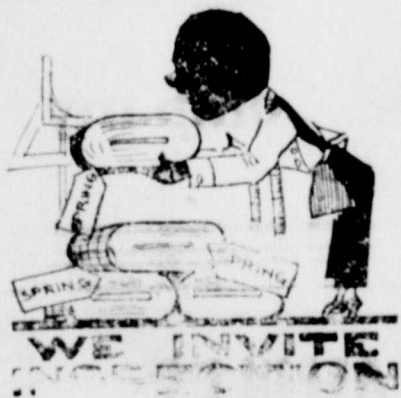
**SESSION MEETING

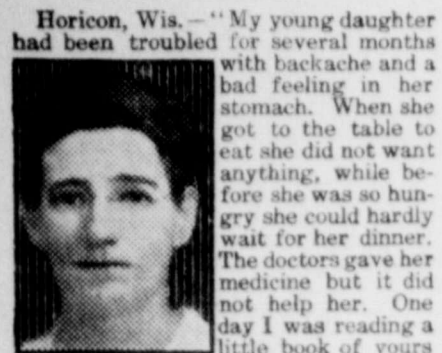

GALVESTON NOT HIT BY CRIME WAVE

GALVESTON, Feb. 1.—The geography of Galveston has prevented the spread of the crime wave to this city, according to W. J. Sedwick, chief of Police.

A two mile long causeway connects this island with the Texas mainland and it is through this "bottle neck" that miscreants of all kinds have to pass in order to escape, Chief Sedwick pointed out. As a result of this handicap to the "profession" according to the chief, bandits, robbers and yeggmen are careful to give this community a wide berth.

Only one automobile "stayed stolen" in the year just ended, according to records of the police. Cars whose owners placed valuations upon them approximately \$45,000 were taken in the twelve months just ended, but with the aid of the "bottle neck" all but one, valued at \$500, were recovered. In 1919 only one car was stolen here.

Automobile owners of the island have been thoroughly informed as to the advantage of their "geography," according to Chief Sedwick. All that the police department and sheriff's office asked was that owners notify them promptly of missing cars. The officer who is stationed day and night upon the approach of the causeway is notified and the thief is apprehended as he attempts to get to the mainland and safety.
