## GRAND JURY TO PROBE BOXING

DALLAS, Feb. 10.—The grand jury will investigate the boxing bout which was held last night at the Dallas amateur athletic club, it was announced at the court house this morning. The authorities claim that the boxing was conducted in such a way as to violate the law.

### TEXAS NEWS BRIEFS

Roy Burrow, age seventeen, was accidentally killed at Stamford Thursday afternoon when a shot gun he was holding slipped from his hands and struck the steps on which he was sitting.

Harry Carter, given twenty years at Abilene for the killing of R. Clint Chambers, an Abilene attorney, has been granted a new hearing. Carter claimed that Chambers had meddled in his family affairs. The case will be tried at Anson on a change of venue.

## LAW NO BAR TO MANY CRIMINALS

CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—That a large majority of the crimes committed in Chicago is committed by professional criminals is shown in a statement made by detectives here. Chief of Detectives Hughes stated today that seven out of every ten crimes of violence in Chicago were committed out on bond in cases which they already stood charged with crime.

## 1 DEAD; STEAMER BADLY DAMAGED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10.—The steamship Bessie Dollar, located 790 miles from Cape Flattery, Washington, is badly damaged, the bridge of the vessel being gone, a steward killed, and the captain injured, according to radio messages received here this afternoon. Two steamers are standing by ready to render aid.

## NO VERDICT IN TWYMAN CASE

GATESVILLE, Tex., Feb. 10.—The jury in the Twyman case continued its deliberations today. Up to a late hour there was no indication that a verdict would be returned.

The case went to the jury about five-thirty yesterday afternoon. Twyman is on trial for the death of Dell Thames, a fifteen year old inmate of the juvenile school here where Twyman was military commandant, it being alleged in the indictment that the boy's death resulted from whipping and choking administered by Twyman.

## YOUNG MAN IS ARRAIGNED FOR TRIAL

Aubrey Hickson was arraigned for trial in county court Friday on a charge of theft, having been indicted by the grand jury. The young man was charged with stealing an overcoat from the automobile of another man at a dance in Rowena on the night of December 26th. He was found wearing an overcoat in Winters two weeks later which the owner of the lost coat claimed as his property. Young Hickson's defense was that he purchased the coat from a stranger. After hearing the evidence Judge Trimmer fixed the punishment at one day in jail and ten dollars fine and costs.

## EXPLORER'S BODY TO BE RETURNED

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Feb. 10.—The body of Sir Ernest Shackleton, the famous British explorer and naturalist, will be returned next month for burial on Island South Georgia, near where he died last month, it was announced today.

## BOND SWINDLER UNDER ARREST

TOPEKA, Kans., Feb. 10.—A man who gave his name as Underwood, and who is being held here for California authorities, answers the description of Edward F. Sands, formerly butler for William Desmond Taylor, moving picture director, for whose death Sands is being accused and for whom a nation wide search is being made, according to the sheriff's department.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 10.—W. T. Maddox is the name of the owner of the apartment house here in which Walter S. Underwood, under arrest at Topeka, Kansas, lived for six months or more. Underwood is wanted here on a complaint charging the misappropriation of funds of a bonding company, the police department told newspaper reporters today.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Urging the women to neglect their homes, husbands and children, if necessary, Miss Mary Garrett Hay, called on the members of the League of Women Voters to devote all their energies to the campaign being waged to get fifty thousand new members by the 25th of February.

## HIDALGO LEADS HIGHWAY WORK

AUSTIN, Feb. 10.—The first county in Texas to be completely crossed by a concrete highway is Hidalgo. Bonds for building a concrete highway across the county in both directions were brought here for approval today.

### SMALL BLAZE

The volunteer fire department answered a call shortly after three o'clock Friday, at the home of Mrs. Gressett on Sealy Avenue. A small blaze was discovered in the roof near a stove pipe. Besides tearing a few shingles from the roof no damage was done.

## NO CHECK TAX FOR BONUS BILL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Reaching final agreement on the soldier bonus tax program, the House ways and means subcommittee decided today against the tax on bank checks as a means of raising funds to pay the bonus. The program was not announced but it was stated authoritatively that with the exception of the tax on bank checks the plan of raising the money was substantially the same as that announced yesterday evening.

## STATE RESTS IN OUSTER SUIT

ARDMORE, Okla., Feb. 10.—The state expects to rest its case in the ouster proceedings against Buck Garrett, suspended sheriff of Carter county, this afternoon, Russell Brown, special state's attorney, said today.

No far sixty-two witnesses have been used and this is the fourth day of the trial. J. B. Champion, defense attorney, said the defense would call about forty witnesses, and that Garrett would testify in his own behalf.

## 21 INDICTMENTS IN COLEMAN COUNTY

The grand jury returned 21 indictments in Coleman county, completing its work this week. Twelve of the bills were for felony charges.

Up to Wednesday four sentences had been passed on the convicted by Judge Woodward and four convicted prisoners were carried to the penitentiary Wednesday.

J. M. Elkins, charged with killing his nephew, Norman Weaver, last month, was tried, but up to a late hour yesterday the jury had not returned a verdict, being out since Wednesday. Elkins plead self defense. He shot his nephew in the court house, where they were discussing property rights, Weaver being in possession of the farm of Elkins' father and was alleged to have refused to move off when requested to do so. There were no eye witnesses to the shooting. Weaver was not armed.

## SKUNK HIDES LEGAL TENDER IN KIMBLE

The financial depression does not bother the people of Kimble county, who have made legal tender of possum and skunk hides, just like our forefathers used bear skins and furs in the olden days.

These facts were brought out in an advertisement appearing in the Junction Eagle in which a play was announced for the James River school and the payment of admission placed at so many hides.

The scale of admission was as follows:

General admission, one possum hide. One fox hide admits two. One skunk hide admits three. One coon hide admits five. Candidates, one skunk hide each. Children under 7, old maids and widows, free. The ad winds up with "Catch your possum and be there."—Brady Sentinel.

## EASTERN MONEY FOR TEX. PRISON

AUSTIN, Feb. 10.—Members of the Texas Prison Commission are conferring today with Gov. Neff concerning financing of the prison system. It is understood that an Eastern house has offered to advance from five hundred thousand to seven hundred thousand dollars, and the offer to loan that amount of money to the system is being discussed.

## BRITISH REFUSE POSTPONEMENT GENOA MEETING

LONDON, Feb. 10.—Great Britain will not agree to a postponement of the Genoa economic conference unless a request for the postponement emanates from Rome, it was authoritatively announced here today. It is understood that the French ambassador was so informed yesterday by Lord Curzon, foreign secretary, during the discussion of the French memorandum urging that the conference be postponed.

## IRISH STRIKERS SEIZE RAILROADS

CORK, Feb. 10.—Dissatisfied with the terms of settlement of the Irish railway strike group of workmen marched into Cork station today and seized the station with all trains in the sheds. No opposition was offered and the strikers took possession without damage to property or person.

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The announcement was made in the House of Commons today that Premier Lloyd George had notified Michael Collins, head of the Irish provisional government, that kidnapping of Ulster citizens shows the necessity for the presence of British troops.

## HARDING GOES TO THE SENATE WITH TREATY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—President Harding is expected to present in person today to the Senate the treaties adopted by the recent arms conference. The Senate will take up ratification of the treaties immediately.

Sumner, on the Pecos river in ico, where an army of ps were stationed to

keep on the reservation about 17,000 Navajo Indians who, at that time, were peaceful because they were not allowed to even go out on a hunt for fear they would go on the "war path."

"We hit the old "Chisholm Trail," (sometimes called the Goodnight Trail), a cow trail across the plains made by John Chisholm long before our narra- tive begins, and moved West- ward along this trail, passing old Ft. Chadbourne and crossing the Colorado river a few miles to the Southwest of this place. Thence across the country to the North Concho river; thence up the Concho to its very source. Thence due West across the "Staked Plains" to Horse Head Crossing on the Pecos River, then up the Pecos to the end of our journey.

"We encountered no Indians on our outward journey—deliv- ered the cattle to the govern- ment at Ft. Sumner. On the re- turn trip nothing transpired worthy of mention until we reached the falls on the Pecos. Just East of the falls, on a small

elevation, about 400 yards from the falls, we found a pole about 5 or 6 feet long stuck in the earth, and standing straight up, with a man's head on the top of it!

"The man had been scalped and his head cut off and was on top of this pole! We did not find the body of the man but learned afterwards that his name was Williamson—that his small party had been completely wiped out of existence by a murderous band of hostile Indians. This was in December, 1867, and the weather was rather chilly, but we pushed our way homeward. We finally reached the head of the Concho and to our dismay we saw just to the North of us a band of Indians, about 30 in number, who made a direct charge at us.

"By way of explanation I wish to say that nearly every one of our party, except one man who was driving our loose horses, was in the ox wagon at that time. Before we had time to even find our guns among the bed clothes the Indians were upon us and our only chance of escape was to "take to the brush" and leave everything behind—even our horses.

"I think this band of Indians was Kiowas—these Indians were not quite so bad as the Comanches—however we retreated in haste and hid as best we could and watched them. They paid no attention to us after they captured everything we had, and drove our horses and ox wagon off in a North direction. There were, about 240 miles from the ranch and to travel afoot was extremely dangerous, but we pushed for home on foot.

"There was plenty of game for food but it was cold and we had no bedding. Finally after many hardships we landed at Sam Gholson's hut on the Colorado, near old Ft. Chadbourne, but there was no one to say, "welcome boys, come in," so we kicked down the rickety door, took out some bread stuff and marched on some 85 miles more to our ranch. As well as I remember this is a list of our party: John Hittson, "boss," Chester Wentworth, Frank McLaura, James Hart, John Hart, the writer of this article, and a negro by the name of Andy, and Newt Kirksey.

"John Hart is still living at Baird, Callahan county, Texas, or was a few years ago; Jess Hittson now lives at Hardwick, Texas, some distance Northeast of

El Paso. The writer lives in Dal- las, Texas.

"If the reader cares to know how we again got possession of the ox wagons I will explain it in my next article."

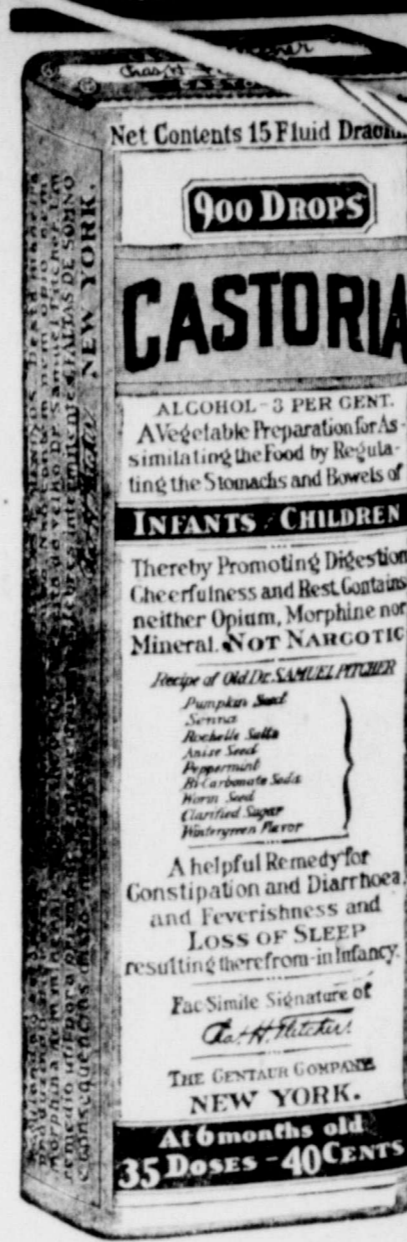

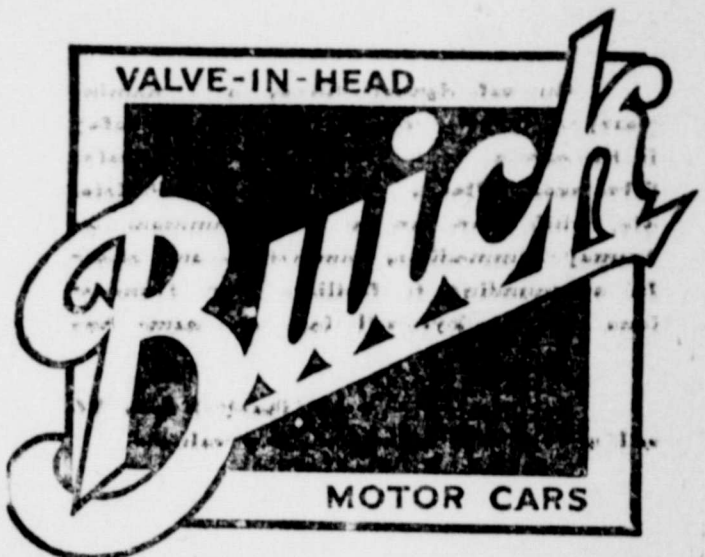

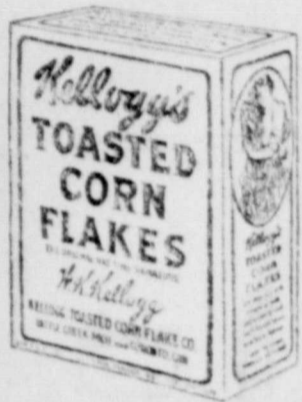
