WORK BEGINS ON BASE BALL PARK

The material is on the ground and work is underway on the construction of a baseball park on Eighth Street South of the A. & S. track, and on the ground where many battle royals for horse-hide honors have been waged heretofore.

In the palmy days of baseball when Ballinger maintained a professional team, with Dupree, Gaskill, Robinson and other celebrities on the pay-roll, full parks greeted the players on this site, and the fans are looking forward to a return of the days.

The erection of the park is being financed by private capital, arrangements with the local team having been made to use the park, and the builders to receive a per cent of the gate receipts to take care of the cost of building the park.

In addition to the grand stand, arrangements will be made for a space for parking cars in the park, and parties can drive in and occupy their cars while witnessing the game. Work on the park will be speeded up and early games announced. To get the ball started rolling good first games will probably be played between local teams, the married and singles.

LITTLE PROGRESS IN HAMON TRIAL

ARDMORE, Okla., March 11.—Little progress was made in the trial of Clara Smith Hamon today. The plans for the jury to inspect the suite of rooms at the hotel which were occupied by Jake Hamon and Clara Hamon, were abandoned on account of heavy rains. The downpour of rain failed to lessen the attendance at the trial and the court room was crowded several minutes before court convened.

ARDMORE, Okla., March 11. Five hours and fifty minutes actual court time in examination of forty-nine veniremen were sufficient to obtain a jury for the trial of Clara Smith Hamon, charged with the murder of Jake L. Hamon, reputed millionaire oil and railroad man, Republican national committeeman of Oklahoma and uncle of the defendant's former husband.

Clara Hamon, neatly attired in a blue tailored suit, interestedly watched the selection of the twelve men who will determine whether she fired the shot which resulted in the death of Mr. Hamon. From time to time she took a small note book from her skirt pocket and made notations in it.

She held numerous whispered conferences with her attorneys as the veniremen were examined, and was turned half around in her chair talking over her shoulder when Mrs. Jake L. Hamon, widow of the man Clara is charged with killing, entered the court room with her father, 19 year old son, Jake L. Jr., and 14 year old daughter, Olive Belle. Mrs. Jake Hamon had taken a seat directly opposite Clara Hamon at the same table when the younger woman turned about toward the jury box and saw her. Clara Hamon's face did not betray any recognition nor show surprise and at no time during the two hours Mrs. Jake L. Hamon was in the court room, did their glances meet.

In a final statement before the trial Mrs. Hamon said she regretted she had not taken action years ago while Clara Smith Hamon was still Clara Smith, to end her association with Hamon.

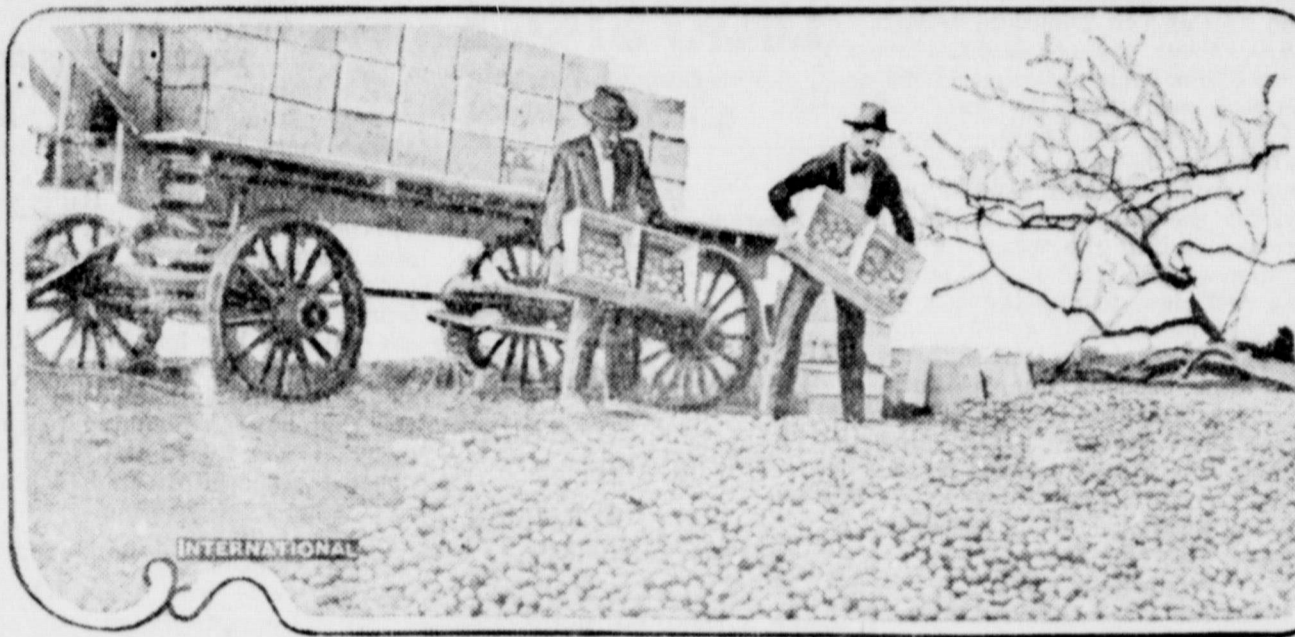
In a statement made in the presence of her father, her 19 year old son, Jake Jr., Fred Ellis former law partner of her husband, and Mrs. Katherine S. Reid, Ardmore newspaper woman, Mrs. Hamon said she had debated with herself many times whether to throw acid in Clara Smith's face to disfigure her so she would not be beautiful and attract Hamon's attention. With tears in her eyes, Mrs. Hamon said she never could bring herself to that point.

LATEST REPORT FROM THE RHINE

FRENCH MILITARY HEAD-QUARTERS, Mayence, Germany, March 11.—Major General Henry T. Allen, commander of the American forces of occupation, will follow the same policy of collecting customs on the Rhine as in handling other problems of occupation, making the decisions of the Rhineland commission his orders to the army, according to information received here from Coblenz today. The information received here said that General Allen was waiting notification of the commission.

ALLIED MILITARY HEAD-QUARTERS, Neuss, Germany, March 11.—General Gaucher, commander of the French troops engaged in the occupation of the new tariff zone along the Rhine river in Germany, yesterday placed wreaths on the graves of the French and German soldiers who died in the war of 1870, and also on those who died in the World War and were buried in the military cemetery near here.

NEW OIL COMPANY WILL MAKE TEST IN RUSSELL FIELD IN JULY

Interest in the development of the oil industry of this county will be greatly revived by the announcement that another well will be put down a short distance from the producing well on the Russell ranch, fifteen miles Southeast of Ballinger.

A charter has just been granted authorizing the Russell Production Company to do business in this state. This is a home company, organized in Ballinger, with H. Giesecke, R. R. Russell, E. A. Giesecke, W. C. McCarver, and R. A. Nicholson, composing the board of directors, and the company is capitalized for \$50,000, with assets of a proven value of \$91,900.

This company is built on the foundation of the Gulf Production Company, drillers of Russell No. 1, and on their holdings which became the property of H. Giesecke when the Gulf Production Co. decided to quit wild catting in this county and devote all their time to taking care of their leases in the proven fields, moving their drills from the local field.

Mr. Giesecke purchased outright from the Gulf Production Co. a perpetual mineral right on about 7,000 acres of land upon which the Russell producing well is located, and received in the deal two standard derricks, a large quantity of pipe and casing, and other equipment and property valued at considerable money.

"Tentative" Agreement to Wed Broken; Widow Files Complaint Against Bachelor

On Wednesday of this week Sheriff Flynt was called to the Wingate community to make an arrest for some trouble growing out of a transacting wherein a breach of marriage contract was involved.

Mr. Flynt arrested, brought to town one Jim Wilson, placed him in jail and immediately a complaint was filed by County Attorney C. P. Shepherd, charging the defendant with the offense of "threatening to take the life of, kill, and inflicting great bodily injury on the person of Mrs. Anthey Fuller."

It appears that Mr. Wilson arrived in Rannels county some time in October A. D., 1920, that he was a bachelor of some 23 summers, and that he was employed by the said Mrs. Anthey Fuller, a widow with some five children, residing in the Wingate country. Mr. Wilson worked on the farm of and for Mrs. Fuller up to the time he was arrested and brought to Ballinger and charged with the offense above named.

It further appears that the acquaintance between Mr. Wilson and Mrs. Fuller ripened into friendship, and friendship ripened into love, resulting in an agreement to marry, or a "tentative" agreement, as declared by Mrs. Fuller.

At first it was agreed that this marriage should occur in August, 1921, but later it was fixed to occur March 10th, 1921, and some two weeks prior thereto a marriage license was obtained by Wilson; but for certain reasons there arose some breach in their relations and this breach resulted in a repudiation of the proposed marriage on the part of Mrs. Fuller, and it is alleged that trouble ensued as a result of this repudiation of the proposed wedding agreement.

As stated above, Mrs. Fuller is a widow about 40 years old, residing on a farm near Wingate with her five children. Mr. Wilson was a former resident of Robertson county, so it is alleged, having come out to Rannels county to seek employment as a farm hand and having found same at the home of Mrs. Fuller.

At last report Mr. Wilson had not made bond. The offense with which he is charged is a misdemeanor, carrying a maximum penalty of fine of two thousand dollars and one year in jail, and a minimum punishment of \$100 with no jail sentence. The case is set for the May term of county court.

The new company has made a contract to supply gas for the Prairie Oil & Gas Co. in drilling on the Miller ranch seven miles from Russell No. 1. Russell No. 1 is now producing gas in a much larger quantity than when it was first capped. The Prairie Company will pipe this gas to its field and use it for fuel in carrying on development. Five trucks loaded with material for the Prairie Co. left Ranger Friday morning coming to the Miller ranch to prepare to spud in new wells.

The Russell Production Company will sell \$24,000 worth of treasury stock for development purposes, but the proposed well will be drilled regardless of the sale of any stock, according to announcement of the officers of the company.

With the casing and large quantities of other material on hand, it will not require a great amount of cash to put down a well to the 2290 foot depth where oil was found in Russell No. 1, and it is the purpose of the new company to drill to this depth.

Many oil men believe that the present well on the Russell holdings was never given a fair chance to show its production on account of the continued drilling and lowering of casing when the oil was first struck. The drillers were working with a view of getting big oil at greater depth, and passed up the first showing with little notice, and after drilling to a depth of 3500 feet the well was plugged at the first showing and has since been flowing oil and emitting gas.

REVOLTERS ASKS CITY SURRENDER

LONDON, March 11.—The revolutionary authorities in charge at the fortress of Kronstadt sent an ultimatum to the soviet government at Petrograd today, demanding the surrender of that city before March 25th. If the city is not surrendered by the above date there will be a general bombardment, according to stipulations in the ultimatum as given in dispatches to the London Times.

RAILROAD WAGE CUT GIVEN OUT

NEW YORK, March 11.—A general move on the part of the railroads of the United States for a cut in the war wage scales which has long been forecasted by officials, appeared to be in full swing today.

Officials of various lines of railroads today are arranging conferences with employes in an effort to reach agreements on plans for putting into effect the reductions. It has been announced that the cut will effect only unskilled and semi-unskilled labor. Men who are actually engaged in the operation of trains and telegraphers and station agents are not included in the new wage scale.

CHICAGO, March 11.—The Chicago & Alton railroad will take steps soon to reduce the pay of their employes. W. G. Bied, president, announced today.

"The reduction will be made to cause ultimate reduction in freight and passenger rates, which are now more than the public can bear," Mr. Bied said.

CHICAGO, March 11.—The Chicago & Great Western railroad today announced that it would propose a twenty per cent reduction in wages and salaries of everyone employed on that road from president down to section hands. This is the first Western road to announce the proposed wage reduction.

MAKE COMPLAINT FREIGHT RATES

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Nine newspapers filed complaints today with the Interstate Commerce Commission, alleging that unreasonable freight rates were being charged by railroads on news print paper. The papers filing the complaints are: The Eagle, Enid, Oklahoma; Herald, Denison, Texas; Record-News, Wichita Falls, Texas; El Paso Journal, Kansas City, Mo.; News-Miami, Oklahoma.

MERGER OF THREE ROADS IS SAID CONTEMPLATED

LOS ANGELES, Calif., March 11.—A merger of the Southern Pacific, the Rock Island, and the El Paso & Southwestern is being considered, it was officially announced here today.

IMPORTANT BILLS ARE BEFORE NEFF

AUSTIN, March 11.—A conference was had today in the Senate on House amendments to the Dudley anti-alien land ownership bill. The measure goes to the governor for his approval. As finally enacted the bill does not disturb Japanese who are now owning land in Texas, but applies to future purchasers.

AUSTIN, March 11.—The Senate concurred in the House amendments to the Bledsoe joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution providing that only citizens of the United States be allowed to vote in general elections of Texas. The measure goes to the governor for his signature.

The House worked leisurely today after the terrific pace yesterday. All Senate bills have been disposed of for engrossment. The day will be devoted to finally passing them.

ELECTION ORDER

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Ballinger deems it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purpose herein after mentioned; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BALLINGER, Texas, that an election be held in said city on the 12th day of April, 1921, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

Proposition No. 1:
Shall the City Commission of the City of Ballinger be authorized to issue bonds of said city in the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) payable \$1,000 three years from their date and \$1,000.00 each year thereafter until all of said bonds are paid, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of improving and extending the water works system of said city, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it accrues, and to pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911, and House Bill No. 42 passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislature at its regular session, and the constitution and laws of Texas.

Proposition No. 2:
Shall the City Commission of the City of Ballinger be authorized to issue bonds of said city in the sum of Sixty-five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000.00) payable \$5,000.00 five years from their date, and \$3,000.00 each year thereafter until all of said bonds are paid, bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purpose of construction an electric light plant in and for said city, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it accrues and to pay the principal thereof as the same becomes due, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911, and House Bill No. 42 passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislature at its regular session, and the constitution and laws of Texas.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Ballinger, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election:
J. F. Lusk, Presiding Judge;
N. J. Wardlaw, Judge;
Edwin Day, Judge;
H. C. Gardner, Clerk;
W. C. McCarver, Clerk.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911, and House Bill No. 42 passed by the Thirty-seventh Legislature at its regular session, and the constitution and laws of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue bonds as set out in Proposition No. 1 shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATER WORKS BONDS"

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:
"Against the issuance of water works bonds."

All voters who favor the issuance of bonds as set out in Proposition No. 2 shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ELECTRIC LIGHT BONDS"

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:
"Against the issuance of electric light bonds."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor of the City of Ballinger, and attested by the City Secretary of said city, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

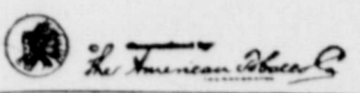
The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted up at three public places in said city, one of which shall be at the place designated for holding said election, at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation which has been continuously and regularly published for a period of one year, in said city of Ballinger, once each week for four weeks prior to the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

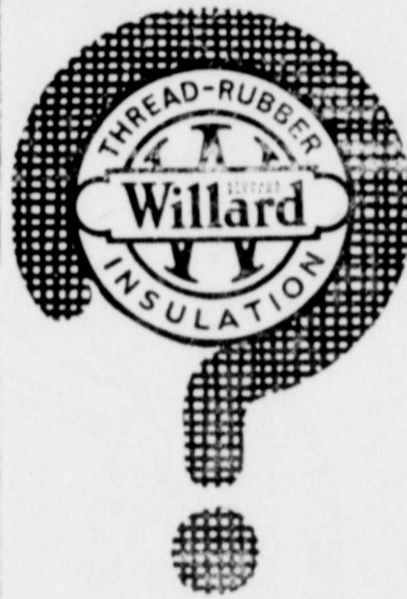

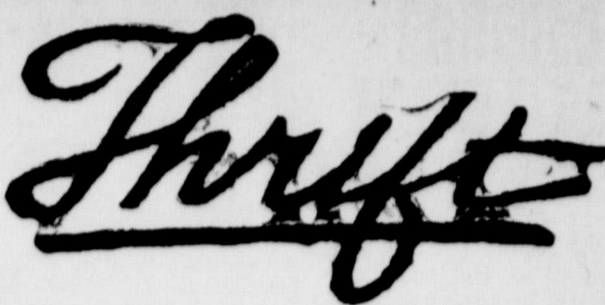
