Will a City Light Plant Save Citizens of Ballinger Money?

Terrell, Texas, 3-17-21.
"Mr. C. S. Guin, Mayor,
"Ballinger, Texas.

"My dear Sir:
"In reply to yours of 15th inst., beg to advise that the city has an electric plant and it is on a paying basis, altho our rates are cheaper than our competitor, Texas Power & Light Co.

"Our power rate is 6 cents per kilowatt for power, exclusive. For commercial and resident current, our charges are as follows:
First 10 KW. . . 12c per KW.
Second 10 KW. . . 7c per KW.
Third 10 KW. . . 6c per KW.
and 2c per KW. for all above 30 KW.

"Where the city installs a meter we collect 25c per month as rental.

"We much prefer the customer owning the meter.

"Our first bond issue was in 1908 for \$15,000.00, and in 1909 and 1910 we had issues of \$10,000.00 and \$8,000.00 respectively.

"However this amount was not spent exclusively for the

electric system as we also operate the water works in connection.

"We do not solicit big business for our plant will not take care of it.

"Just to give you an idea as to whether the people are satisfied with our current, beg to advise that we have four customers to one of the Texas P. & L. Co., and could have more if we were in a position to take care of it.

"Judging from what I have read in the papers, you are having the same trouble that we had before establishing a municipal plant. That is, high rates and indifferent service.

"I trust that you will be successful with your bond issue, for it is about the only way to get relief from big corporations.

"If I can give you any further data that will be of use to you, kindly advise.

KILLS GIRL AND ENDS OWN LIFE

WAXAHACHIE, Tex., March 19.—A. G. Harvey, a drug clerk, last night shot and probably fatally wounded Miss Kathleen Connally, member of a prominent and well-to-do family of this city and then killed himself with the same revolver.

No cause has been assigned for the tragedy, but officers said that it was known that Harvey had been suffering temporary mental trouble.

Harvey is survived by a widow and one child.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Secretary Denby will leave Washington tonight for Guantanamo, Cuba, Haiti and San Domingo.

The water trip will be made on a destroyer on which the secretary and party and naval and marine officers will embark at Key West.

Secretary Denby will first witness maneuvers and target practice by the Atlantic fleet in Guantanamo Bay, and will inspect pacification forces at Haiti, San Domingo. The party will return to Washington on April 5th.

HORNSBY CASE GOES TO JURY

BELTON, March 19.—Argument in the George Hornsby trial will close about four o'clock this afternoon. Practically one entire day was consumed in arguing the case. The charge was given yesterday afternoon about four o'clock, and argument began immediately. It is expected that an early verdict will be returned, and friends of the murdered man are predicting the death penalty while many expect a life sentence for the accused.

The defense rested after introducing the testimony of the defendant in the Hornsby trial Thursday afternoon, and the state offered two or three witnesses in rebuttal and the judge's charge was delivered to the jury late Thursday afternoon and the attorneys began their argument.

Hornsby was on the witness stand about one hour and a half. He made a good witness for himself, and stoutly denied his guilt and denied having anything to do with the murder of J. N. Weatherby.

Hornsby admitted that he was in Brownwood prior to the burning of the Scott house and prior to the murder of Weatherby, and admitted that he left Brownwood with Myrtle Scott on Thursday before the murder on

BELFAST, Ireland, March 19.—A great ambush attack by Irish republicans near Kinsdale, Cork county, today, in which six Crown soldiers were killed and five wounded, was reported here this afternoon. The Crown soldiers returned the fire on the ambushers and the attackers suffered many casualties, and the battle is still in progress. Excitement of the populace prevails throughout the district as a result of the attack on the Crown forces.

MAY ADD NEW STAR TO FLAG

SPOKANE, Wash., March 19.—Northern Idaho residents are fostering a move for the formation of a new state to be known as Lincoln, and which would comprise ten counties from Northern Idaho, part of Western Montana, Eastern Washington, with Spokane as the capital.

A fund is being raised to carry on the new state propaganda, leaders of the movement here today announced. The campaign is to be started within a few weeks and is to be carried on for two years. The Idaho legislature recently passed a favorable bill to form a new state with Spokane as the capital.

LOWER TAX FOR ARGENTINE WHEAT

BUENOS AIRES, March 19.—Wheat exported from Argentina this year will not be subjected to an additional export tax, President Yrigoyen declared today.

An agreement has been reached between local exporters and the government to fix weekly minimum prices. The uncertainty regarding the levy of additional taxes such as was suddenly imposed last year is said to have been the cause of the recent weakness of the wheat market here. The president's announcement will stabilize the market, and removes fear of bad trading in grain.

RAILROAD LABOR SCRAP CONTINUES

CHICAGO, March 19.—Charging that the Pennsylvania and New York Central railroad systems dominate the policies of other roads in opposition to the national agreement with labor unions today, Frank Walsh again appeared before the Railway Labor Board, representing railroad labor unions.

Walsh drew a statement from Dewitt Cuyler, chairman of the Association of Railroad Executives that "the national board's adjustment meant national agreements." Walsh then called attention to copies of the association's correspondence, showing that the association's labor committee twice adopted reports favoring the national adjustment of the board.

CHICAGO, March 19.—Frank Walsh, attorney for the railroad unions, today began a second day cross questioning the railroad officials who were summoned before the Railway Labor Board hearing application for reduction of wages of unskilled laborers. Walsh charges that the railroads knowing that the railway board had no power to enforce its decrees, were trying to smash the brotherhoods and unions through public opinion, and are attempting to influence the public through false, paid publicity.

Despite the objections of Judge Barton, chairman of the board, Walsh renewed reading publicity matter and propounding questions to Cuyler concerning it.

BALLOON RACE TO START ON MAY 21

NEW YORK, March 19.—The Aero Club of America, announced today that it had awarded the 1921 National Balloon Race to Birmingham, Alabama and the start of the race will be made on May 21st. The trophies will be announced later. The officials of the club stated that the foremost balloonists of the United States had signified their intentions of competing for prizes in the race. From the winners a team will be selected to go to Belgium to compete for the Gordon Bennett international balloon cup.

WILL A CITY LIGHT PLANT PAY?

Under the heading "Will a City Light Plant Pay?" The Ledger is publishing a series of letters from cities which own their light and power plants.

The letter appearing today throws some light on the light question and should prove of particular interest to the property owners and light consumers of Ballinger.

The letter comes from Terrell, where one of the strongest electric corporations in the Southwest occupies the field in competition to the municipally owned plant.

The light consumer and property owner, who will have a say in whether Ballinger shall install and own her own light plant should also be interested in the rates for current as outlined in the Terrell letter as compared with local rates.

Very little is being said about the coming bond issue election, but there is very little to be said. The people are familiar with conditions which are responsible for the move to build a municipal plant, and we believe there are very few voters who are not sufficiently enlightened to cast an intelligent vote, voting for his or her own best interests and for the best interest of Ballinger.

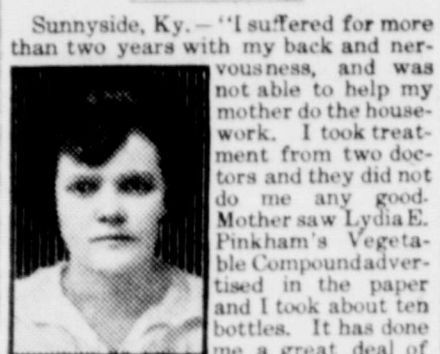
ARKANSAS STRIKE TIES UP RAILROAD

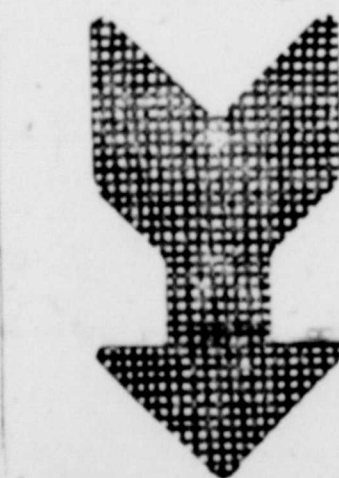

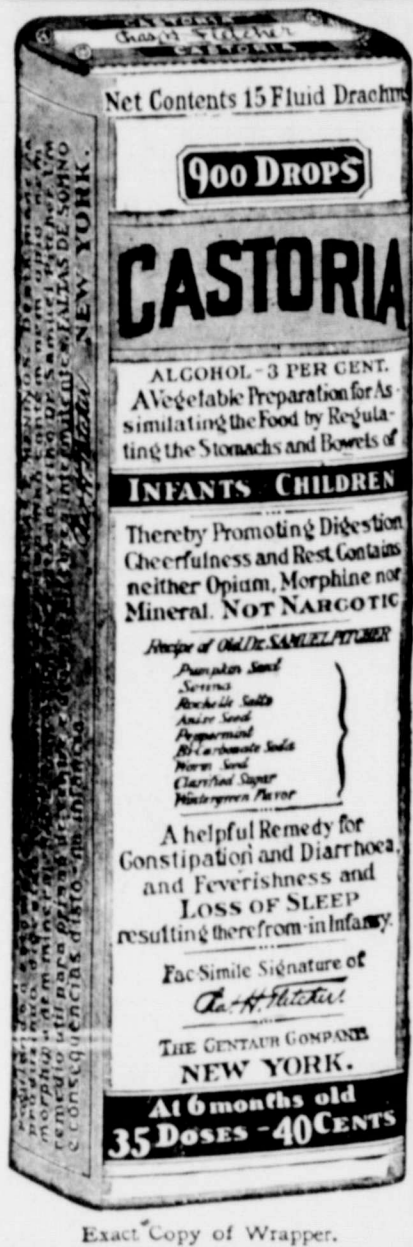

**RAIN GENERAL;
HEAVY PLACES**

About one-half an inch of rain fell at Ballinger Friday night. The down town gauge showed only .35, while the government gauge at the home of E. M. Eubanks in the Northern part of the city showed .65.

The rain was heavy in places. Wingate reports two inches and Winters one inch, with an inch at Crews, inch and quarter at Maverick, inch at Miles.

The rain fell gently and while not particularly needed, will prove a big boost to grain crops and early planting.
