EAGLES PRACTICE ON BEAR CATS

The Abilene Eagles found good material in the Ballinger Bear Cats for testing their metal and getting in trim for the opening of the West Texas League race. The Eagles, a hefty bunch of ball players, and clever young men, arrived here Friday noon and the game staged for their practice in Nicholusk Park was called promptly at four o'clock.

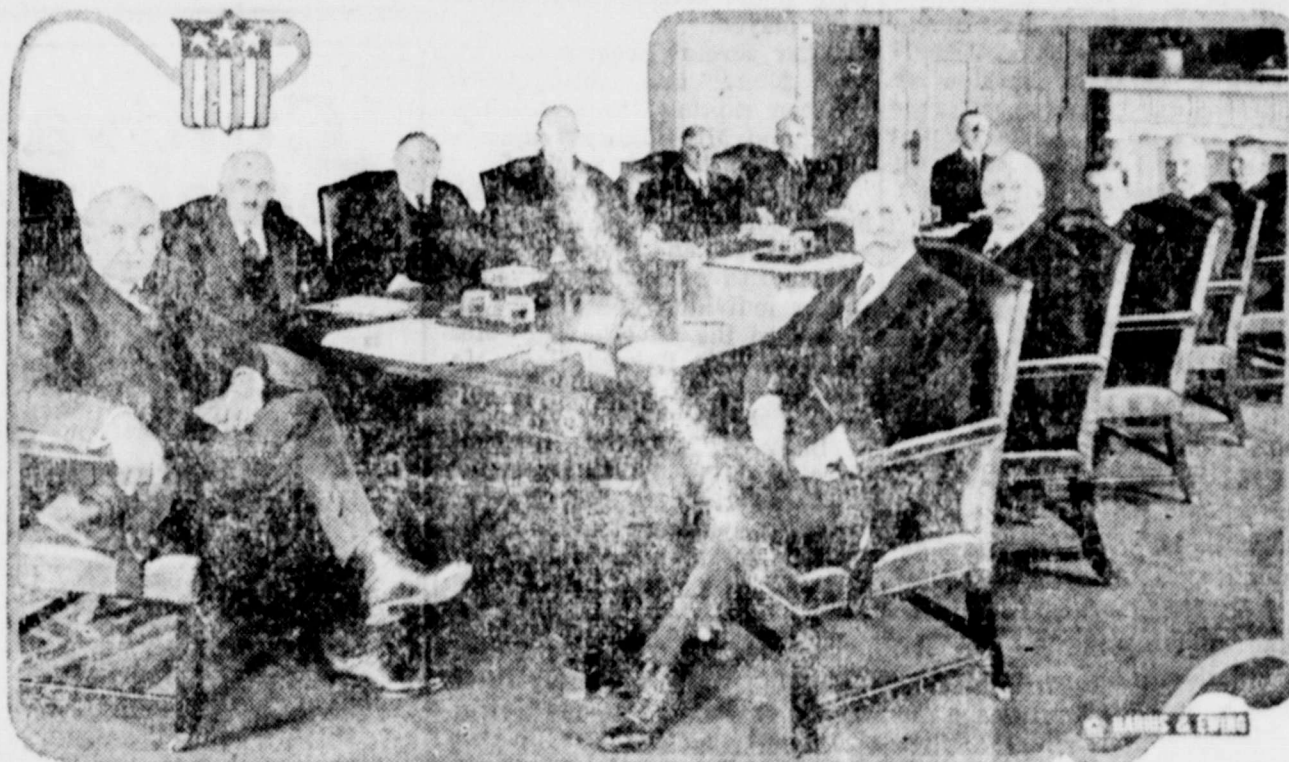
The Eagles are heavy hitters, and landed on Tineup, an Oklahoma pitcher, who is here for a tryout with the Bear Cats, for eight hits in the first six innings, claiming six runs up to this stage of the game.

Meyers went in the box for the locals in the seventh. He walked two men, was touched for two hits and the Eagles ran their score up an additional three, while Seogins tossed the apple for the locals in the eighth and ninth, and nobody scored, the Eagles quitting with nine runs to their credit. The locals fell for several expensive errors.

Hollis for the Eagles pitched hard ball and cut down nine Bear Cats and allowed only three hits. He was given good support and the locals could not make it around the lot as rapid as their opponents. Miller, for the locals, passed over the plate in the fourth and ninth innings, and that was the sum total of the tally sheet at the close of the game. Two to nine, however, was not bad, and the visitors admitted that it was healthy practice for them.

The Eagles were given the first chance at base running. Hendrix was first up and got a walk. Milam passed out at first with a pick up by Seogins. Hendrix advanced to second. Bechtol flied to left field. Kizziar

Hollis out on fielder's choice, Fain going to third and Lewis to second. Hendrix flied to left field.

The Bear Cats broke the goose egg in the fourth when Miller made first on Fain's error. Seogins received a bruise and walked to first, advancing Miller to second. Wooden peeled the mill for a two bag pace, pushing Miller around to home plate. McGregor stopped at first by pitcher passing ball to first. Lase, Stewart made sacrifice. McCreary flied to center, and Seogins was nabbed on third.

Milam knocked to second and nabbed on first. Bechtol came with a third base hit. Kizziar was treated like Milam going out at first by throw from second. Bechtol scoring. Ethridge got on first by error at second. Kemper made first on error, advancing Ethridge around the lot to 3rd, while Kemper steals second. Fain failed to reach first.

In the local's half of the fifth Tineup fanned, Penn goes out at first by short. Roach out at first by second.

INDIANS FILE CLAIM TO 14,000,000 ACRES LAND

WASHINGTON, April 9.—A claim to 14,000,000 acres of land in Texas and Oklahoma, including the cities of Tulsa, Oklahoma City, and practically the entire Burkburnett oil field, was filed in the Supreme Court here today in behalf of the Cherokee Indian nation. The claim is supported by a government patent issued by President Van Buren and certified as authentic by the Department of Interior.

The claim is in the form of a petition to intervene in the Red River oil land case, an original suit between Texas and Oklahoma involving the jurisdiction of valuable fields along the common boundary.

John M. Taylor, grand nephew of General Zachary Taylor, attorney for the Cherokee nation, filed the motion. Taylor said that the patent was discovered accidentally among papers of a deceased chief of the tribe of Cherokee Indians.

The Eagles went out in one-two three order in the ninth. Ethridge put out on a little knock to second who passed the ball to first. Kemper fanned. Fain went out at first on ball driven to third and served back to first.

The Bear Cats doubled their score in the ninth frame, when Miller got a walk. Seogins slammed out a good one and Miller scored. Wooden reached first on fielder's choice, Seogins going out at second. McGregor let the pitcher have a small bunt and went out at first. Wooden attempted to steal second and was nabbed.

The fans were out in large numbers, and the treasurer of the local club was very well satisfied with the receipts. The Eagles were to remain in the city for another practice with the locals Saturday afternoon.

The Bear Cats go to San Angelo Monday and the Brones are due here Tuesday. This will end the Spring contest with league players and the locals will begin to take on amateur teams.

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OKLAHOMA CITY, April 9.—Attorney General Freezing today expressed a doubt that the Cherokee Indian nation can lay claim to 14,000,000 acres of land as indicated in a petition filed in the United States Supreme Court today. Mr. Freezing says that the Cherokee nation now has no official or legal status as a nation. He said, however, that it might be possible for individual descendants of members of the Cherokee tribe, or nation, to support the petition.

MEETING CALLED TO AID HOOVER

DALLAS, April 9.—James Z. George, chairman of the State Chamber of Commerce division of the National Association of Commercial Secretaries, announced today that a meeting of all the state chambers of commerce would be held at Atlantic City, N. J., on April 26th to plan for a campaign of co-operation with Secretary of Commerce Hoover and the Chamber of Commerce of the United States in an effort to bring the economic and industrial conditions back to normal. Mr. Hoover will be present at the meeting, and plans for preventing strikes, and reviving closer relationship between labor and capital will be worked out.

BALLOON FOUND; MEN MISSING

PANAMA, April 9.—The naval balloon which had been missing with five men aboard since it left the Pensacola, Florida, naval air station on March 22nd, was picked up in the gulf late Friday by a fishing boat and brought here today. No trace of the crew of five men has been found. One of the members of the crew was a Houston, Texas, man.

RATIFICATION HELD LEGAL

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 9.—The Tennessee Supreme Court today sustained the legality of the process by which Governor Roberts certified to the United States State Department ratification of the woman suffrage amendment as adopted by the state legislature. The court affirmed the action of Chief Justice Lansden in issuing writs under which the governor acted.

Opponents of woman suffrage filed suit contesting the legality of the passage of woman suffrage in Tennessee, and it will be recalled that many of the members of the Tennessee legislature left the state in an effort to break a quorum when the question was before the house.

LONDON, April 9.—The recruiting of volunteer workers and "safety units," energetically begun by the government today is progressing rapidly, and other plans are being perfected to meet the threat of widespread industrial tie-ups next Tuesday. The strike will involve directly approximately two million workers.

Meanwhile, however, reports from various parts of England, Scotland, and Wales, indicate that the triple alliance executive board may have more to do than the mere issuance of a strike decree in order to bring about a general strike and cessation of work by railway men, transport workers and coal miners.

Word comes from Glasgow, Liverpool, Cardiff, Edinburgh and other important centers that the rank and file of the union men are challenging the right of the railway men's executive body to call a strike without permitting the men to ballot on it. Some local bodies are also opposed to the triple alliance strike.

KANSAS CITY MAN NEW SHRINER HEAD

DALLAS, April 9.—Frank H. Crowell, Ararat Temple, Kansas City, was elected president of the Shrine Directors Association of North America, here today, and Kansas City was chosen as the next place of holding the convention.

WAR RISK INSURANCE DIRECTOR RE-APPOINTED

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Secretary Mellon today announced the re-appointment of Colonel R. G. Cholmeley Jones as director of the War Risk Insurance Bureau.

ROWAN TRIAL AT ABILENE, MAY 2.

ABILENE, Tex., April 9.—District Attorney Cunningham indicated today that the trial of Albert Rowan, charged in connection with the death of a Dallas postal clerk at the Jackson street sub-station robbery, and which is scheduled here on a change of venue, will be taken up during the third week of court, which begins on April 18. This will place the trial about May 2nd.

JUDGE M. C. SMITH DIES FRIDAY EVE.

Judge M. C. Smith is dead. This announcement flashed over the city late Friday afternoon brought sorrow to all who knew the pioneer attorney. Death came suddenly about five-thirty Friday afternoon, following almost a week of illness from heart trouble.

Judge Smith was stricken with what proved to be heart trouble while getting out of his car at the First Presbyterian Church last Sunday morning. He decided not to remain for services, and returned home. He apparently recovered from the first attack, and while not feeling as well as usual, he was able to be down town Monday. His condition became more serious Tuesday, and his daughter, Mrs. F. H. Turberville, and son, Clarence, were called home.

This death removes from this life one of West Texas' most prominent and pioneer lawyers. Judge Smith came to Ballinger thirty-three years ago. He practiced law at Brownwood prior to moving to Ballinger, and was among the first citizens to settle here and help to develop Runtels county and build Ballinger. He was active and well preserved physically for a man of his age. He was born near Marlin, Texas, in 1847, and was seventy-four years, one month and one day old at the time of his death, and was active in the practice of law up to a few days before he died.

Judge Smith had a large clientele and for many years had enjoyed a most lucrative practice of his profession. He was active in the last term of district court here, having been engaged in the trial of an important case which consumed several days of the court's time just a week before he became ill.

Judge Smith was actively engaged in the Civil War. His boyhood days were spent in slavery times, and when the call came for young men to fight for the rights of the Southern people, he found a service to perform, and his experiences during the war, which he often related to his friends, were interesting.

As an attorney Judge Smith had the confidence of clients whom he had represented for more than a quarter of a century. And as a citizen he did his part towards his town and country. Liberal often beyond what could be expected of him, and always aggressive in standing out for what he conceived to be right in matters moral and political. He supported every worthy cause both with his time, influence and means.

The pioneer attorney was a member of the First Presbyterian church, and had been for many years. He was regular in attending the services of his church, and was almost ready to occupy his accustomed pew on the last Sunday he remained in this world when he was stricken ill and forced to return home.

No man was ever better to his family than Judge Smith. He was devoted to his children, and was ambitious in seeing his only son complete his education and qualify for filling a place of usefulness in this world. The good wife and mother, and the three children, Mrs. F. H. Turberville, of Gainesville, Miss Maryatte, and Clarence, were all present when the death angel visited their home and removed from this world their husband and father.

According to arrangements announced Saturday morning, following the death Friday afternoon, the funeral will be held from the residence 116 Sixth St., Sunday afternoon at two-thirty o'clock. In the absence of the Presbyterian pastor, Dr. Alvin Swindell, pastor of the First Baptist church, and a good friend of deceased and his family, will conduct the funeral services. Interment will be made in Evergreen Cemetery.

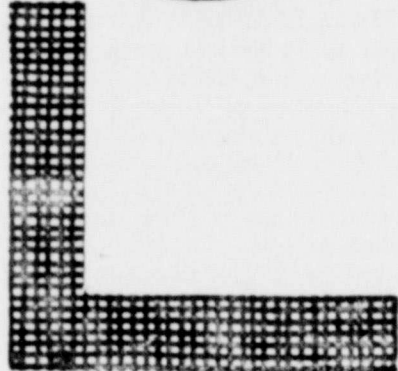
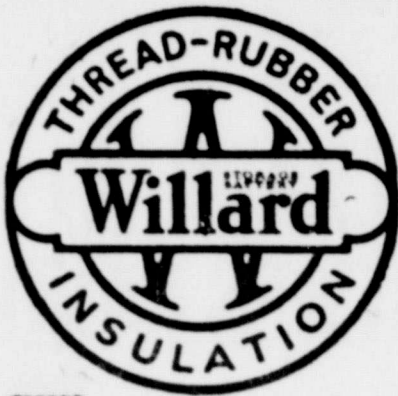

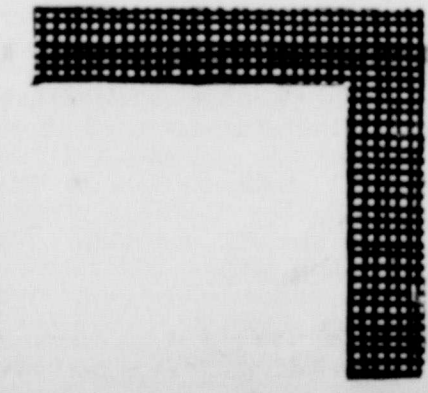

GETS LIFE FOR KILLING NEGRO

COVINGTON, Ga., April 9.—The jury in the Newton county superior court here today found John Williams guilty of murder of a negro farm hand in order to conceal peonage conditions, which existed on his plantation. The jury recommended the mercy of the court.

Verdict of guilty of murder under the Georgia law automatically carries with it life imprisonment. Judge Atcheson had defendant stand up, and after repeating to him the verdict of the jury, he added, "the verdict of the jury is the sentence of the court," and Williams will go to the pen for life, if the higher court sustains the verdict. A motion for a new trial was immediately filed.

Williams was charged with killing a negro on his plantation where it was alleged he treated his hands like slaves, and in order to conceal the practice of peonage he was charged with killing a number of negroes. Several bodies were recovered from a stream where they had been tied in sacks and weighted down and thrown in the water. Five bodies were found at one time, after a negro finally "gave Williams away."

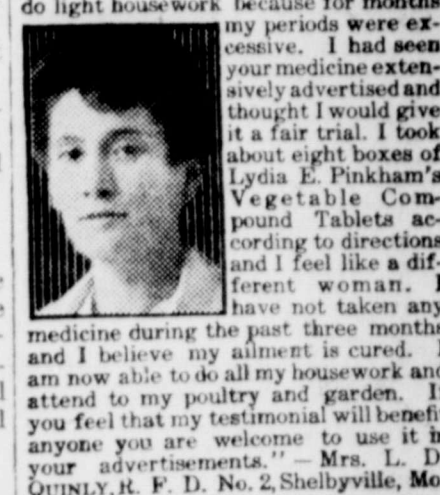

MONEY BY WIRE TO GERMANY NOW

Local Western Union Manager H. P. Pittman has received the following bulletin from the Western Union, which speaks for itself, and which will no doubt be of considerable advantage to those wishing to transfer money to German points.

"Effective as of April 1, we will open our own direct money transfer service with Germany. This service is arranged for the convenience of patrons in the United States who wish to send telegraphic money transfers to German points, and covers east-bound transfers only. The transfers will be paid by the banking institution of Warburg & Company, of Hamburg, and since German transfers will be forwarded direct to this bank for payment, the arrangement is expected to greatly improve and speed up the service, hitherto unavoidably carried on through less direct methods.

"Amounts to be transmitted must be expressed by our offices in U. S. currency. Payments will be made in Germany in the currency of that country, as the rate of exchange established by the telegraph company on the date of the transfer, which will be approximately the prevailing

rate of exchange at New York at the time of the transaction."

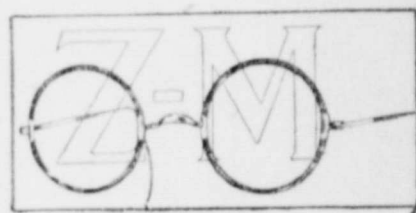

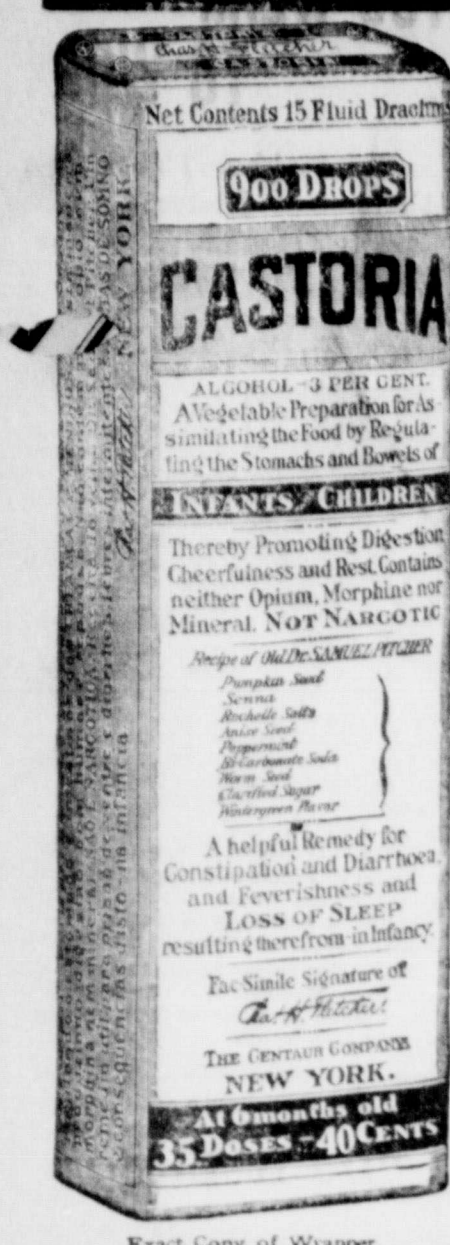
