NO PARDON FOR EUGENE DEBBS

WASHINGTON, April 13.—President Harding told a delegation of Socialists who called on him today to urge the release of Eugene Debbs and other prisoners convicted under the wartime espionage act, that he would not act on a general amnesty such as the release of the prisoners, until a state of peace had been declared.

The president approved a list of twelve new major generals and twenty-six new brigadier generals which was prepared by Secretary of War Weeks and presented to him for his approval. The new list will be presented to Congress soon.

Clarence R. Edwards, commander of the Twenty-sixth New England National Guard Division in France, heads the list of major generals. His name did not appear in the list sent to Congress by President Wilson, and confirmation is being held up.

CITIZENS VOTE 321 TO 11 FOR A MUNICIPAL PLANT

For the issuance of electric light bonds, 321.
Against the issuance of electric light bonds, 11.
For the issuance of water works bonds, 323.
Against the issuance of water works bonds, 10.

The citizens of Ballinger are pulling together, whether right or wrong. That is why the fire company was called out and a little celebration staged and jubilee held following the closing of the polls in Tuesday's bond election.

Now, let's make it unanimous and proceed with the work. It was conceded freely by the opposition that the citizens would vote for the bonds, but the most optimistic and enthusiastic advocate of the bonds did not expect it to be so near unanimous.

The large vote polled in the bond issue election makes the result all the more convincing as to where the citizens stand on the proposition of building a municipal light plant and for improving the water plant.

It must be remembered that only 408 city poll taxes were paid, and that only property tax payers could participate in the bond election, and the voter who merely paid a poll tax could not vote in the bond election.

Thus it will be seen out of a total of 408, 334 votes were counted, and two votes cast were mutilated (scratched wrong) and could not be counted, making a total vote of 335 cast.

It is estimated that about eighty-five per cent of the voters of Ballinger are also property tax payers and would be entitled to participate in a bond issue election, and of this number approximately eighty-five per cent voted.

The citizens—the property owners of Ballinger, have approved the proposition, and passed it up to the city commission to successfully carry out. Much responsibility rests on the shoulders of the commission, and the success or failure of the municipal developments will control largely a similar proposition which might be presented to the voters hereafter.

The tax payers have not only almost unanimously approved the bond issue, but they have expressed a confidence in the men who are at the head of the city government and who will have charge of the expenditure of the funds and who will handle the work of installing the municipal light plant and making the needed improvements in the present water plant.

The city commission is composed of men who have succeeded in their private business, and who will no doubt give the city's important business that careful attention which they devote to their own business and if this is done, we do not believe that the tax payers will ever have cause to regret that action at the polls in Tuesday's election.

"There is of course some red tape to be unreeled," said Mayor Guin, Wednesday, "before we can begin the construction of the new municipal light plant, but we do not anticipate any great delay, and the work will be carried on as fast as it can safely be done and without a waste of the city's money."

"Speaking for the commission, I wish to say that we appreciate the confidence the people have placed in us," said the mayor, "and we are going to do our dead level best to give Ballinger the best light plant in Texas, and give the citizens just what they have voted for."

Too much should not be expected of the commission. A light plant can not be built in a day. Competent engineers must be employed, and all details carefully worked out, and the job done right. With a consolidation of the water system with the new light plant, and with the

improvements made, in the course of a few months the citizens will receive the benefit, and as better service is furnished and new rates worked out, the question which has worried many will be forgotten.

The verdict of the citizens as expressed at the polls in approving the bonds for the building of a municipal light plant is the result of the failure of the present corporation to make good in supplying current and giving satisfactory service from its power house in a neighboring city over its transmission.

For several years the patrons waited patiently for promised improvement and continued to pay a rate which they considered merited better service. If the present company had any doubts that complaints often registered were not well founded and should not have received attention, the vote polled in Tuesday's election should remove that doubt.

RUSSIANS MUST FREE AMERICAN

WASHINGTON, April 13.—President Harding today promised a delegation from Alabama to take up personally with Secretary Hughes the case of Captain Emmett Kilpatrick, of Uniontown, Alabama, who is now held prisoner by the Russian bolsheviks.

The delegation called on Mr. Harding and asked him to intercede in behalf of the prisoner in an effort to obtain his release. Capt. Kilpatrick was captured by the bolsheviks last October while serving as captain of the American Red Cross in South Russia with General Wrangel's anti-soviet army. He has been sentenced to twenty years at hard labor on a charge of taking up arms against the bolsheviks and acting as a secret agent for the United States government. Kilpatrick is one of the number of Americans held prisoner in Russia.

OFFERS BILL TO END WAR

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Senator Knox, of Pennsylvania, today introduced in the Senate his resolution to end the state of war with Germany. The measure is similar to that passed by the last Congress and vetoed by President Wilson.

A resolution which also would end the state of war with the Austrian government was introduced and referred to the foreign relations committee without discussion. The resolution would provide that American rights under the treaty of Versailles be reserved.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—The first move by the present Congress looking towards disarmament came today with the introduction by Senator Borah, Republican from Idaho, a resolution authorizing the president to open negotiations with Great Britain and Japan, looking to the reduction of future naval building by those countries and the United States.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Launching a fight against the twenty-five million dollar Columbian treaty, Senator Kellogg, Republican from Minnesota, told the Senate today that its ratification would "place a stain on the name and fame" of Theodore Roosevelt and would acknowledge that the United States had wronged Columbia while under the Roosevelt administration and was now ready to make reparations therefor.

4 MILLION LABORERS TO STRIKE

LONDON, April 13.—The great triple alliance of labor in Great Britain will call its members from their post of duty at ten o'clock Friday night, it was announced here today. The decision followed the inability of National Miners Federation to reach an agreement with the mine owners and the government for a settlement of the coal miners' strike which began on April first.

The triple alliance is composed of the miners union, the transportation workers union, and the railway men's union. It has been estimated that if the strike is called there will be nearly four million persons idle in England as a result of the strike, and other labor organizations may become involved in the controversy, as many other unions have sent applications to join the strike.

LONDON, April 13.—The British government today issued a statement which said: "In the event of the threatened extension of the strike and stoppage of work the government wishes to make clear that it will use its fullest powers to protect the workers who remain in any services essential to the life of the community. In any settlement which may be reached the government will support the position of the workers remaining at work so as not to be prejudiced compared to its position before work stops."

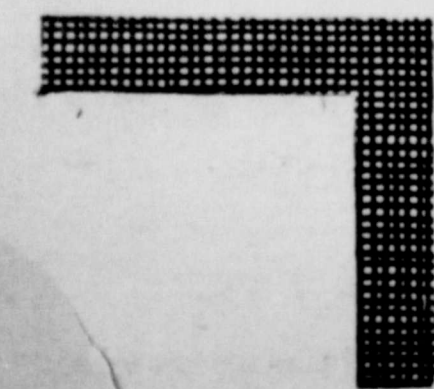

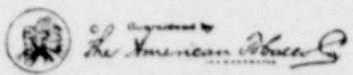

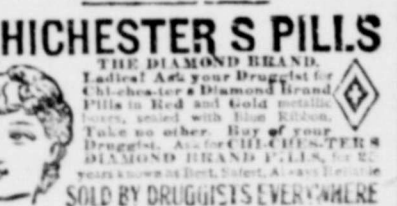


and the funeral was held from the residence of Dr. Sanders at noon Wednesday and interment made in the cemetery at that place.

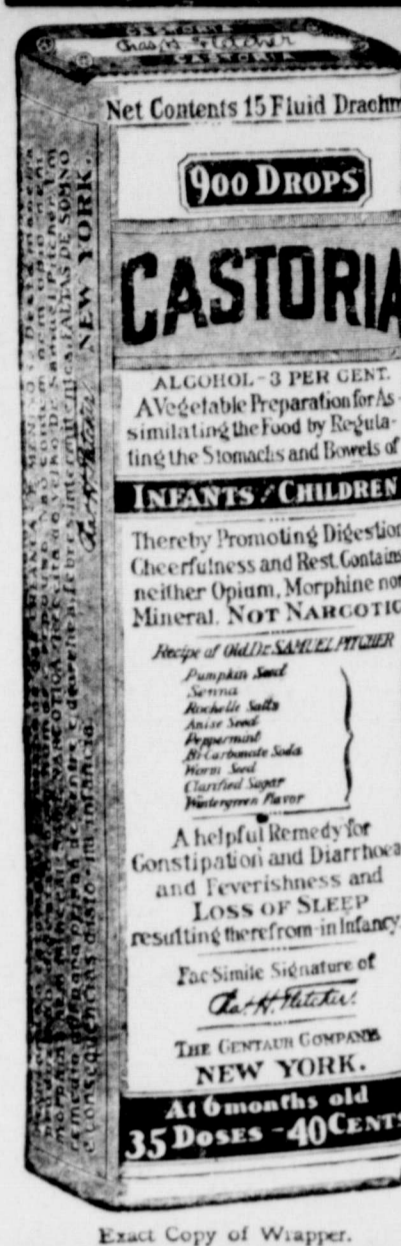
ROBS BANKRUPT STORE WINGATE

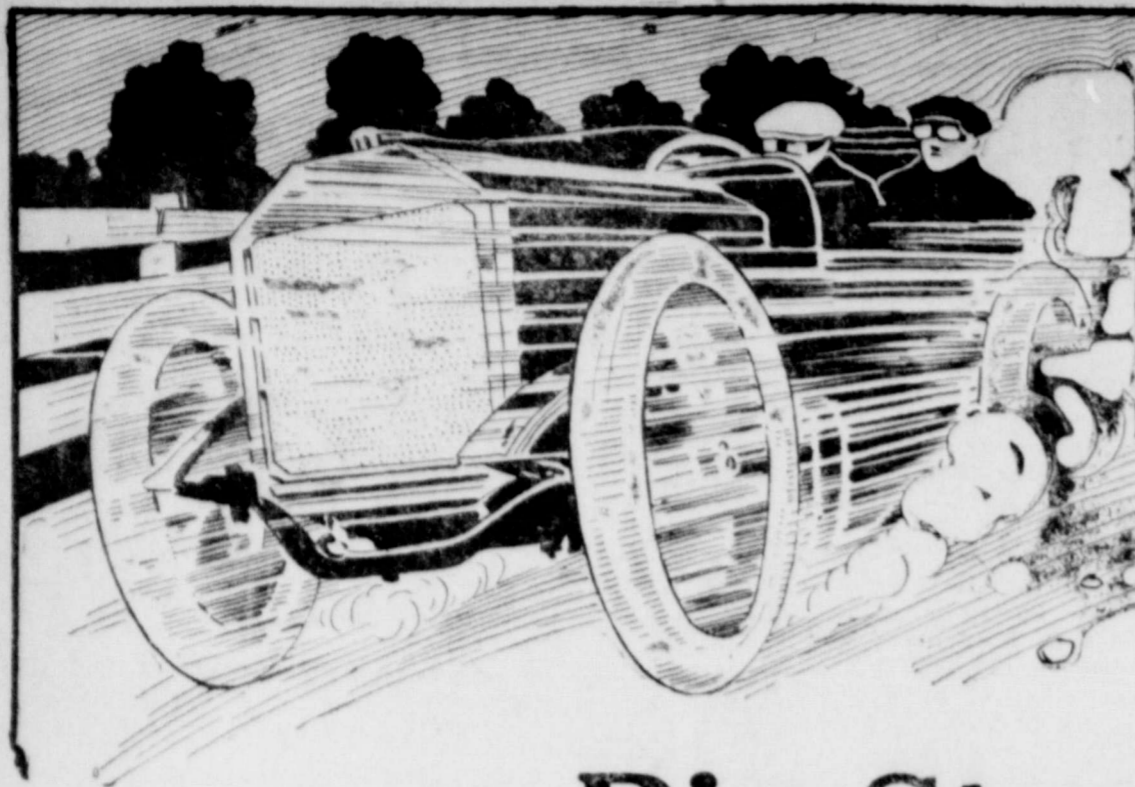
