BRITISH LABOR FORCES BROKEN; STRIKE LOSING

LONDON, April 16.—A conference of delegates from the miners' federation, and representatives from the coal districts in the United Kingdom in which the strike situation is to be considered, has been fixed for next Friday. Work will not be resumed in any of the coal fields during the meantime.

The labor forces of the country today are apparently broken as a result of the refusal of the transport workers and railway men Friday to continue to support the miners' strike. The opinion prevails in some quarters that the action of the transport workers and railway men to support the strike means the death of the "triple alliance."

The party was picked up by a passing car and brought to Winters and another car went out from Ballinger and brought them home. Mr. Nicholson carried insurance on the car with the insurance agency of Miss Maggie Sharp.

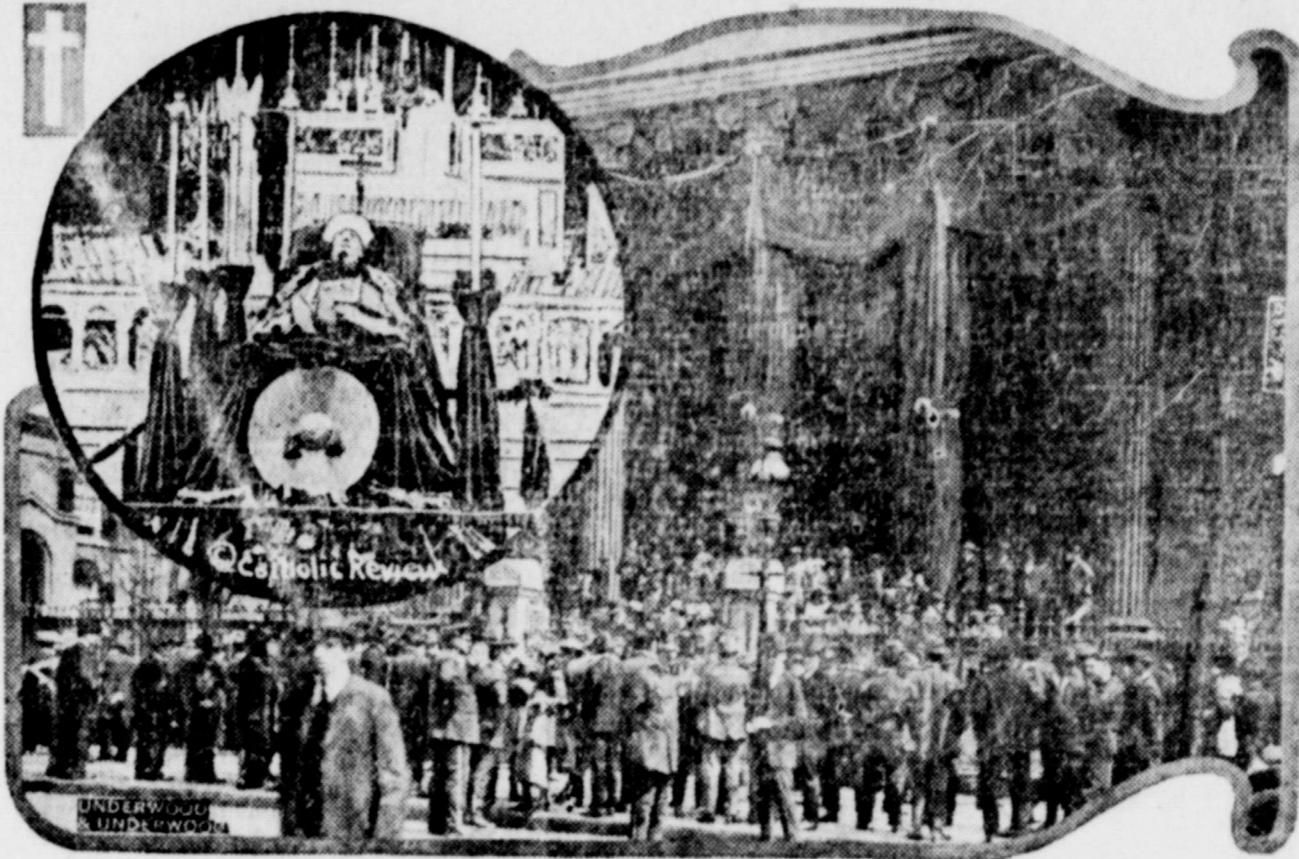

UNIVERSITY COM. HOLDS MEETING

AUSTIN, April 16.—The committee appointed by the governor to carry out the University of Texas expansion program as provided for in the bill passed by the last session of the Legislature, met today with the governor, Will C. Hogg, of Houston, was elected chairman, and J. H. Williams, of Austin, was elected secretary. J. C. Walton, of Waco, is the third member of the committee. Plans will be rapidly carried out for the expansion program.

Following are the nominations: Walter McMenimon, of Massachusetts, deputy president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, representing the labor group; Samuel Higgins, of New York, former general manager of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad, representing the management group; and Ben Hooper, former governor of Tennessee, representing the public group.

TORNADOES HIT 4 STATES; MANY DEAD AND INJURED

DALLAS, April 16.—The latest, yet very meagre reports, from the tornado swept sections of Northeast Texas, indicate that the storm took at least seven lives in that section of the state late yesterday.

Sweeping thru Wood, Gregg, Cass and Bowie counties; passing later into Miller and Hemstead counties, Ark., where more than a score of persons are reported to have been killed.

Scores of persons are reported injured at Texas points, and six were killed at Avinger, Cass county, and one at Atlanta. Reports from Little Rock, Ark., state that the death list in that state is rapidly growing and may exceed fifty in the total area affected by the storm.

Texarkana reports eighteen known dead, and reports are incomplete. Telephone communication is paralyzed in the storm area and reports are slow coming in. Relief parties are scouring the devastated area and other fatalities will no doubt be reported from the rural districts swept by the storm, which have not been heard from.

TENARKANA, April 16.—With eighteen dead having been accounted for up to date, and a score or more injured, ten of whom will die, reports from the terrific storm which girdled Miller county late Friday afternoon are incomplete.

Every available doctor and nurse in Texarkana and many willing citizens have answered emergency calls which began filtering through when at the storm's height S. O. S. calls reached here before the wires failed.

The path of the storm is one of desolation today and the most harrowing tales of devastation are being received here by relief workers.

Skirting Texarkana by a narrow margin, the full brunt of the storm apparently struck Trigena, a community three miles Northeast of this city, and which was practically razed by the twister.

Shilos, another small place seven miles Northeast of Texarkana, is a heap of wreckage. Darkness came on following the storm and greatly hampered relief workers last night. The night was one of horror, many of the injured being located by cries of suffering.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 16.—Fifty are known dead and hundreds are injured from the

tornado which swept sections of Southeast Arkansas late yesterday, according to reports received here today.

BROOKHAVEN, Miss., April 16.—An unidentified woman was killed and twelve persons injured in a tornado which struck Soutage, sixteen miles East of here early today. Ten homes were demolished.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 16.—Reports trickling into Birmingham over badly crippled telephone wires, indicate that the town of Ralph, in Tuscaloosa county, was almost completely destroyed by a tornado at eight o'clock this morning, and that the town of Sulligent, in Lamar county, suffered a like fate.

TRAIN PLUNGES INTO CREEK

LAUREL, Miss., April 16.—A Southern Railway passenger train running South bound, plunged into Rock Creek, nine miles South of here early today. One unidentified passenger was instantly killed and several injured.

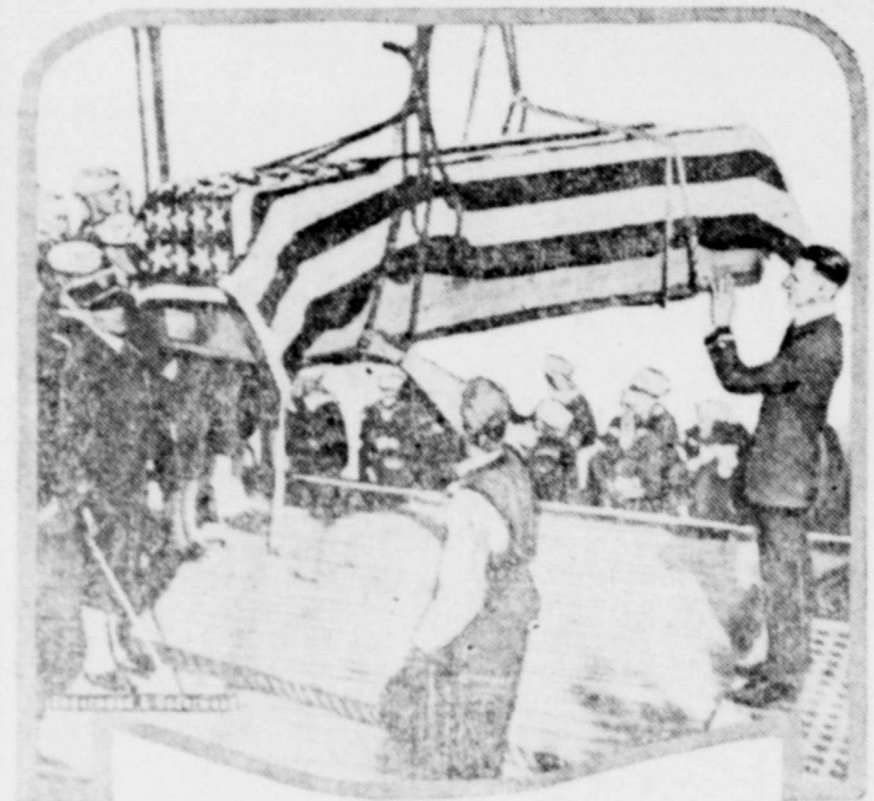

Figures in Stillman Divorce Case



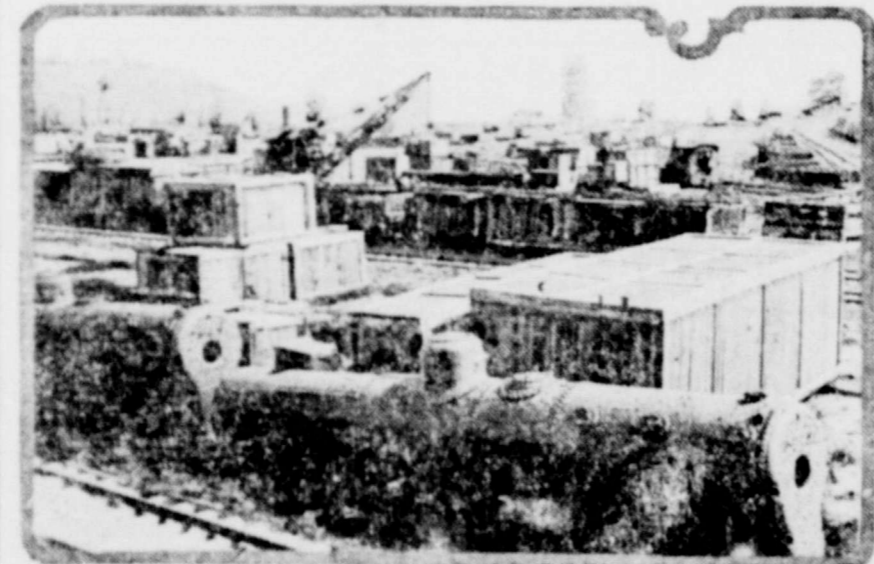

Lieut. Langdon's Body Brought Home



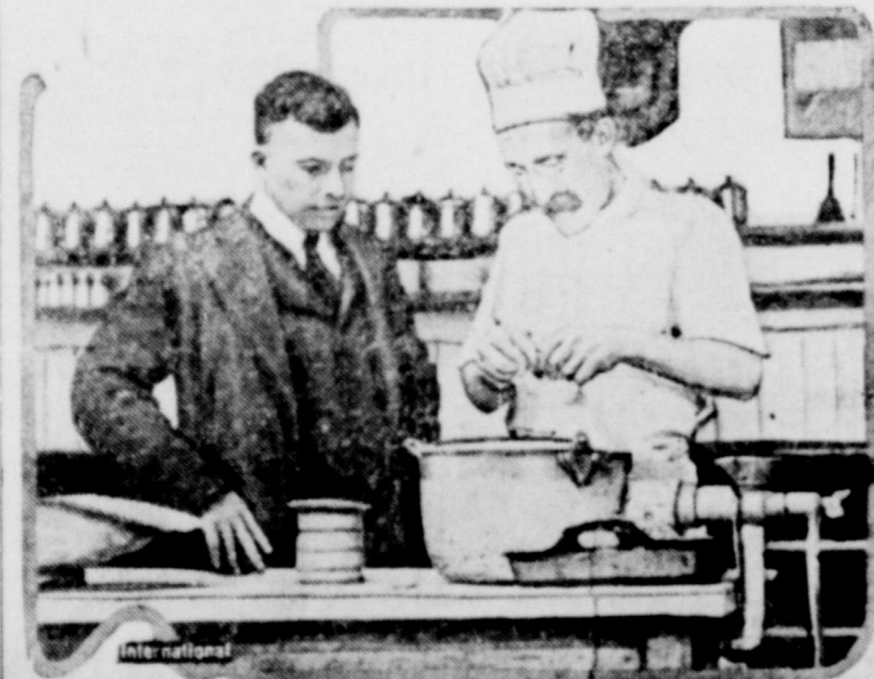

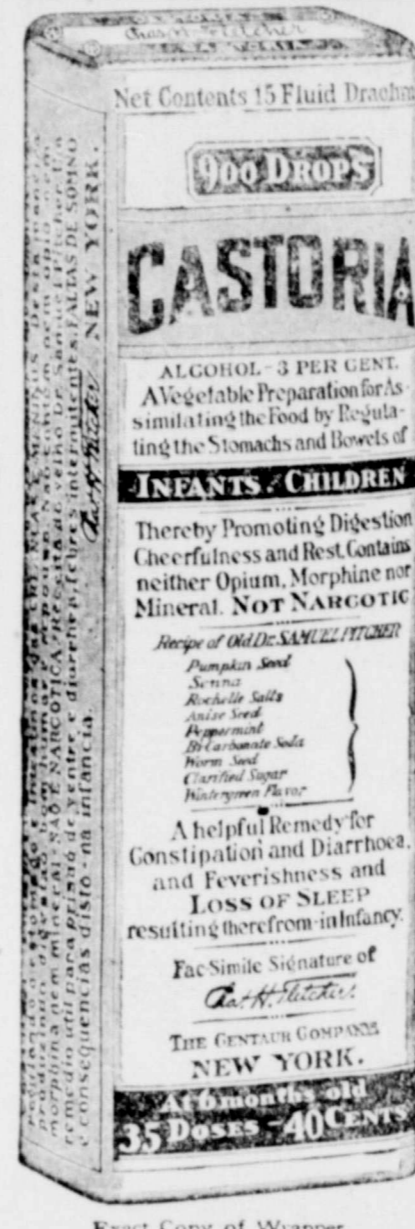

NEWS BRIEFS

GALVESTON—The year 1921 will be "Century Plant Year," according to Charles Schumacher, of 3120 Avenue P, Galveston. In two weeks a century plant in Schumacher's front yard grew in height from five feet to nearly eighteen feet, a growth of about six inches each twenty-four hours. The plant is, according to Mr. Schumacher, about ten years old and was brought to Galveston from Mexico.

EL PASO—Under the auspices of the Associated Charities, another clinic for babies and mothers has been started here. The new clinic is for American mothers and babies. One for Mexicans has been operating successfully for six months. The clinics were established in an effort to reduce mortality among infants. El Paso's record last year showed that 245 of every 1,000 babies died.

BROWNWOOD—Brown county farmers are pooling their cotton. The pool contains about 200 bales, which will be sold soon, the county Farm Bureau announced.

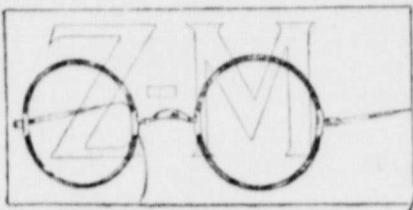
