Farmers Make First Sale Cotton Pooled in Runnels

BEAR CATS TAKE SENATE BACKS OPENING GAME ADMINISTRATION

The baseball season in the amateur class opened good in Ballinger Wednesday afternoon, while the West Texas Leaguers had a most successful opening.

The Abilene Christian College boys, a fine bunch of young fellows, and good ball players, went down in defeat at the claws of the Bear Cats, but fought hard to the last out. Never discouraged, the visitors maintained their pep, and at last took the count in the best of spirit.

Big Boy Wooden was in the box for the Bear Cats. It was the first time Wooden had faced Ballinger fans from that position in several years. He allowed only five hits, using the best of head work, and kept the heavy work of the visitors scattered so that the cost was little.

Hill pitched ball for the visitors, and also held the locals to five hits. The college boys had three errors charged against them, while the Bear Cats permitted five bad plays to blot their record.

The game began with lines drawn tight, and it was three up and three down for the first two rounds for the collegians and three up and three down for the first three rounds for the Bear Cats. The college boys scored in the third fourth and seventh, and were unable to send another man over home plate. The Bear Cats opened the fire works in the fourth with three scores, when Roach made first on a safety, Penn taking first on error, advancing Roach to second, and Big Boy Wooden came up and hit the apple for a round trip of the diamond, bringing in Roach and Penn and planting his number 9 on home plate for a home run. The Bear Cats added three more runs to their score in the fifth, and let the table stand 6 to 3.

The attendance at the game was not what it should have been, and the local club must get better home support if the season goes like it should here. The ladies will be admitted hereafter at half rate—25 cents. It was the purpose of the management of the club to admit ladies free, but where a park is maintained and regular admissions charged at the gate, the club must pay war tax not only on paid admissions, but on all free admissions, and the club cannot afford to admit the ladies free and pay war tax for them also, to say nothing of the difficult problem of keeping a record of the free admissions. With only 25 cents charged for ladies, the lady fans should turn out in large numbers.

The college boys are here for the second game of the season this afternoon. Manager Lusk received a letter Thursday morning from the American Legion team of Meridian, Texas, wanting an engagement here. He also received a letter from the American Legion team of Lometa. These teams have not been looked as they asked for a guarantee which the local club will not put up, but it is probable that the teams will be hooked for games here.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Expressions of gratification were general today in administration circles over what is regarded as a significant test of the Senate in support of the administration's foreign policies in that body's ratification of the long pending Columbian treaty, which was finally ratified by the Senate Wednesday.

The House is prepared to resume debate on the immigration restriction bill, with probable chance of reaching a final vote before adjournment. It is predicted that a safe majority will be given in support of the measure.

The Knox peace resolution will probably be the next measure brought up in the Senate. It will be taken up today by the foreign relations committee.

R. R. RECEIVERS CAN'T CUT WAGES

CHICAGO, April 21.—The Railroad Labor Board in a decision ruled today that Federal Judge S. H. Sibley, of Atlanta, Georgia, acted in violation of the act in authorizing the receivers of the Atlanta, Birmingham & Atlantic Railroad to reduce the wages of the employees. The board declared that it was powerless to act in the case now, and suggested that the employees, most of whom are striking, hold another conference with the owners and if agreement is not reached to return the case to the labor board for further consideration.

The decision of the labor board in passing on the court's ruling, stated that "the duty to obey decisions of this board is not any less obligatory on the receivers of the road than on the owners."

IRENCH AND BRITISH HOLD PRIVATE MEET

PARIS, April 21.—Premiers Briand and Lloyd George plan a strictly private meeting at Hythe, England, next Sunday, it was officially announced today. Only the secretaries of the two prime ministers will be allowed to attend the conference.

Stuart L. Williams and Carl S. Gunn went to Brownwood on business Wednesday afternoon. They refused to divulge the object of their mission, but left town wearing their best clothes and intimated that they were out after big game.

794 bales of cotton pooled here under the Farm Bureau marketing system were sold to highest bidders Wednesday afternoon. The cotton consisted of various grades, and of course brought various prices.

W. C. Williamson, a government cotton classifier, was brought here by the Farm Bureau and classed the cotton, and it was sold on the grades fixed by the government classifier. The cotton was sold at auction from the samples which were concentrated here.

Quite a number of out of town buyers were here to bid, but practically all the cotton went to local buyers. The cotton will be concentrated at the local compress immediately and pressed for shipping.

After paying expenses of concentration, weighing, classing, etc., the members in the cotton pool declare that they received a premium over the market quotations, while the buyers claim that it was about an even break, and the system under which the cotton sold was very satisfactory to them.

This is the plan under which the Federal Farm Bureau is attempting to pool two million bales of the 1921 crop in Texas. Contracts are being signed by farmers for pooling their entire production this year, and the cotton will be sold along the same plan as that sold here this week. In some instances those who pooled probably received a little less than they would have received had the sales been made independently, while in other cases the pooled cotton sold at a premium, or at higher bid than an independent sale would have brought.

The highest price paid was 11.60, and was paid by W. C. Penn & Co. for 40 bales of strict middling.

The lowest price paid was for 194 bales of old cotton (1919 production) and went to C. F. Morris, of Big Spring, at 3.80.

103 bales of strict good ordinary sold to McFadden for 6.55.

225 bales low middling went to W. C. Penn & Co. for 7.55.

126 bales of strict low middling went to Pink Boyd for 9.40.

106 bales middling went to Pete Ewald, of Rowena, for 11.05.

The cotton sold represented the holdings in the pool of more than fifty farmers, and quite a number of these farmers were here to attend the sale, while others had representatives in the city. It was the largest sale of cotton direct from farmer to buyer made here in many years, if not perhaps the largest sale ever made before by the farmers.

If the cotton pool plan proves successful much cotton will be sold here on this basis in the future.

FIELDS CHILD DISINHERITED

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 21.—The Supreme Court today decided that Henry Anthony Marsh reputed to be the son of Henry Field, of Chicago, and the London chorus girl, Peggy Marsh, are not entitled to an inheritance of Marshall Field's millions.

The court ruled that Marshall Field's will specifically exempts any illegitimate offspring from inheritance in his estate.

REVENUE MAN IS RECOMMENDED.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Secretary Mellon announced today that he had recommended that President Harding appoint David H. Blair Winston, of Salem, North Carolina, as Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—President Harding today nominated Claudius H. Huston, of Tennessee, to be Assistant Secretary of Commerce.

Charles F. Marvin was re-nominated to be Chief of the Weather Bureau.

BARBECUE FOR IRRIGATION MEET

Those who motor to the dam site near Bronte for the irrigation meeting next Tuesday will be the guests of the Coke county people at a barbecue which will be spread for the occasion.

The meeting has been called by the Colorado Irrigation Association, and will be held at 10:30 Tuesday morning and the barbecue will follow. Much important business will come before the association, and prominent speakers from other sections of the state will be on the program.

So far about twenty-five have signed up to attend from Ballinger, and there should be at least one hundred. No town will profit more by the success of the big irrigation project than Ballinger, and this city cannot afford to leave anything undone that would in any way hinder the rapid development of the proposition. Bronte plans to accommodate three hundred persons at the big conference, and Ballinger, the largest town in the district proposed, should furnish a majority of the attendance Tuesday.

I. W. W. LEADER MAKES ESCAPE

CHICAGO, April 21.—Federal officials today received confidential information that William D. Haywood, "Big Bill," Secretary of the Industrial Workers of the World, who was scheduled to begin a sentence in Leavenworth penitentiary this week, on conviction of blocking army activities during the war, has fled either to Moscow or Riga. United States District Attorney Clyde announced that a search had been started for Haywood.

MAKES ATTACK ON AMBASSADOR

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Senator Harrison, Democrat of Mississippi, attacked George Harvey, the new American ambassador to Great Britain today in the Senate, declaring that Harvey was vindictive, self-anointed and a political accident. Senator Harrison charged that the appointment of Harvey for the ambassadorship by President Harding was a "reward for his efforts to discredit the Wilson administration."

Senator Harrison said that he feared that Colonel Harvey's arrival in London would cause Great Britain and other nations to believe that he will use whatever power and influence he may possess and the power of his position in an attempt to destroy the League of Nations.

"There is not a renowned statesman in this generation who has not been praised and abused, glorified and maligned, elevated and debased by Harvey," said Senator Harrison.

PERSHING HEADS NEW WAR STAFF

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Secretary Weeks today announced the organization of a war staff headed by General Pershing to take charge of the field operations of armies of the United States in time of war. "Instant preparation in time of peace for active military operations," was given by Secretary Weeks as the reason for forming the new organization.

"The organization will be entirely a separate office from the chief of staff," Sec. Weeks said, which will continue the direct assertion of military estimate in peace time.

General Pershing will have a staff skeletonized to correspond with that at Chaumont, France, during the World War and will concern itself entirely with problems of strategy tactics of war organization.

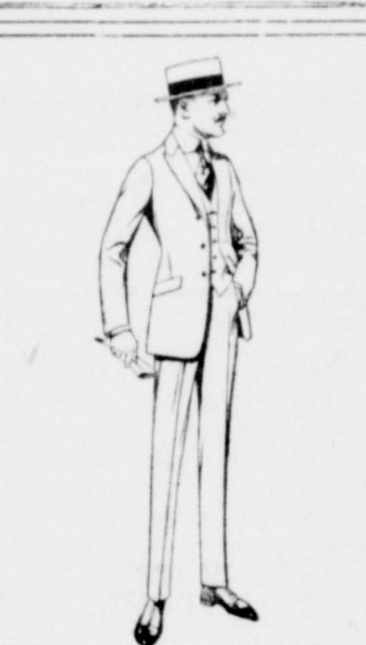

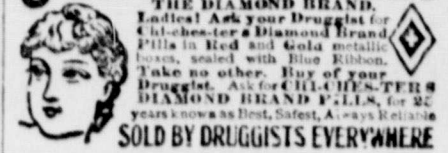
