## Fifth Registration To Be Held On June 30, 1942

Plans are under way to register approximately 220,000 young Texans between the ages of 18 and 20, inclusive, on June 30, General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director, has announced.

All men who were born on or after January 1, 1922, and on or before June 30, 1922, must register. General Page warned, and they must be careful to give their correct addresses where official communications will reach them without delay. He said:

"This fifth registration will complete the inventory of the Nation's potential manpower, although, under current policies, men under twenty are not subject to induction for combat duty."

"Local boards will officially designate places of registration in their particular areas. While anyone who is unavoidably away from his home on June 30 may register at the registration place nearest a convenient on that day, all registrants are urged to make every effort to register at their own local boards to avoid possible confusion in the future. Any person who must register away from home is urged to specify his HOME ADDRESS so that his registration card may be forwarded promptly to his own local board."

"A registrant should choose which of his parents is his place of residence, in making the choice he designates the local board which will always have jurisdiction over him."

The fifth registration will be on Tuesday, June 30, 1942, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. Registration places will

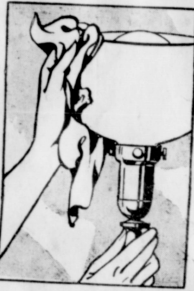

**Homemakers' Exchange**  
of Helpful Household Hints and Recipes

Shopping is simplified if you carry several small slips of paper on which you write names and addresses of the stores you wish to visit. You will save the time and trouble of giving your list to each store, and avoid all chance of mistakes.

The next time you have a stubborn bottle cap to unscrew, don't wrestle with it. Just try using the nutcracker. You will find that it will grip the bottle cap and unscrew it easily.

**PINEAPPLE MARSHMALLOW ICE CREAM**  
Place 1/2 pound marshmallows and 2 tablespoons in a saucepan and heat over a flame folding over and over until the marshmallows are about half melted. Remove from flame and beat until mixture is smooth. Add 1/2 cup of crushed pineapple and blend. Whip 1/2 pint stiff and add 1/2 pint cream. Freeze in a mixture. Place in ice chest.

When children's arms get itchy from the sleeves of their leather jackets, sew a knitted wristlet to the sleeve lining at each cuff. This will keep out the winter winds and eliminate the itchy Ickabod Crane effect.

To eliminate soggy bottoms on custard pies, bake the pastry shell and custard separately, but in the same size tin. Bake the custard in a well-oiled tin. After baking, place the custard in refrigerator, preferably in an air-conditioned ice refrigerator so that the custard will not absorb odors. Then, just before serving, slide the filling out of the pan into the pastry shell and serve at once.

**A CHEESE BISCUIT** mix that you can make yourself!  
Sift together 2 cups of general purpose flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon paprika. Cut in 1/4 cup shortening. Then add 1/2 cup grated cheese. Then store in a modern air conditioned ice refrigerator until such time as you wish to have "hot" biscuits. The moist, clean-washed air of the modern ice refrigerator will protect the mix at rapid drying and against bringing the odors of other foods. A ready-to-bake the biscuits. Ve the mix from the refrigerator. Add 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 cup water. Knead lightly with a rolling pin.
