AVIATOR KILLED MAN ARRESTED AT BEEVILLE ON PRO CHARGE

BEEVILLE, Tex., April 23.—Forest Elton Reese, of this city, was fatally injured, and Henry Hall, also of Beeville, was severely injured when an airplane the two men were flying crashed to the ground Thursday. Reese was piloting the machine and Hall was a passenger, going up for a flight. Reese died three hours after the accident, and Hall may die.

FIXES ALCOHOLIC LIMIT FOR BEER PATIENTS

WASHINGTON, April 23.—An arbitrary limit of four and seven-eighths gallons of beer and three gallons of wine, as a maximum physicians may prescribe at one time, has been set in the new prohibition regulations, which are awaiting approval of David Blair, new commissioner of internal revenue.

Sheriff Bob Miller of Concho county, brought E. Lasker here from Paint Rock Friday evening and placed him in jail on a charge of violating the Deau prohibition law. Mr. Lasker remained in jail only a short time, when friends here learned of his trouble and went to his rescue. He was soon out on bond.

Mr. Lasker is a traveling salesman, and for many years has been making the towns in this part of the state, carrying a line of coffee, and side lines from time to time. He was calling on the merchants at Paint Rock Friday when he was taken in custody by the officer and a Concho county has no jail he was brought here.

According to the gentleman's account of his arrest he was selling a side line of some kind of medicine, formerly sold in this territory by a friend, and the charge was made against him that the medicine was intoxicating, and he was placed under arrest.

Mr. Lasker is a member of one of the pioneer families of Galveston, and is well known throughout the state. He is a former schoolmate of Chas. S. Miller, of this city, and has other friends here, who readily volunteered to help him out of the trouble, and who declare that they do not believe that their friend intentionally violated any law, if the law had been violated at all.

SCRANTON, Pa., April 23.—The police appeared confident today that a further examination of Tito Ligi, imprisoned here under Federal guard, will lead to additional arrests in connection with the Wall Street explosion last September.

Officers plan to question the prisoner further today in an effort to learn whether he knows the radicals who they believe are responsible for the blast. Ligi is being held in default of ten thousand dollars bond after a draft evasion hearing Friday.

GERMAN REPLY RECEIVED TODAY DRAFT EVADER REFUSES TO EAT

BERLIN, April 23.—A crisis in the German cabinet appears imminent here as a result of the discontent aroused by the government's failure to consult the Reichstag before asking President Harding to mediate between Germany and the allies relative to reparations. The position of Dr. Walter Simons, foreign minister, is particularly imperiled.

LONDON, April 23.—Germany sent to Washington today reply to the American note in which the United States rejected to act in the role of arbitrator for the reparations question between Germany and the allies, according to Central News dispatches received here from Berlin.

The note was sent to President Harding, but its terms were not divulged to party leaders up to noon, and the contents will not be made known until late today. Leading politicians in Germany are declared to be angry because the members of the German cabinet did not consult them before the original communication was sent to Washington.

PARIS, April 23.—Instead of either agreeing or refusing to transfer the gold reserve in the Reichsbank to the territory occupied by the allies in Rhineland, as allied reparations commission directed, the Germans offered today to agree not to export or permit the exportation of gold from Germany before next October.

PARIS, April 23.—In a note of reply to the reparations commission, delivered today and signed by Dr. Von Oertzen, for the war burden commission, pointed out that the removal of the Reichsbank gold would act to further depreciate German exchange, and furthermore that the gold reserve was not directly under the control of the ministry of finance, but was private property. The note contended that a transfer of the gold would not serve as reparations payment as the commis-

LAREDO, Tex., April 23.—Linn A. Gale, wanted on charges of being a draft evader and for violation of the espionage act, who was turned over to the military authorities at Ft. McIntosh last night after exportation from Mexico, declared today that President Obregon had not right to turn him over to the United States, and that if he was imprisoned he would go on a hunger strike.

Gale said President Obregon should have permitted him to go to some neutral country. He said if he was imprisoned his hunger strike would last until he was "released by the authorities or by death." Gale had been in Mexico since 1917, when he escaped over the border to dodge the selective draft law. At Ft. McIntosh word is being awaited from Washington in regard to the disposition of the prisoner.

BURLESON OFF TO GERMANY

NEW YORK, April 23.—Albert S. Burleson, former Postmaster General, who now registers as "cotton planter, Austin, Texas," is listed as a passenger aboard the steamer Zealand which is sailing today for Antwerp. Mr. Burleson said that he would visit Germany, France, Italy, Spain, Greece, and Czechoslovakia.

LYMPNE, April 23.—The British prime minister Lloyd George and Premier Briand, of France, are engaged in a discussion of the French proposals for the occupation of the Ruhr basin in the event Germany fails to fulfill her reparations obligation, and also a discussion of the German note on reparations, says an official statement issued this afternoon.

RUSSIAN REVOLT BENEFIT BASE GROWING FAST BALL MONDAY

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, April 23.—An organized rebellion against the Russian soviet government is growing with renewed force in Ukraine, according to telegrams received here from Petrograd.

The reports say that peasants engaged in the revolt are taking many towns between the Dnieper and Dneister rivers, where the revolutionary movement is the most pronounced. They are reported to have been engaged in operations intended to force the bolsheviks Eastward to the left bank of the Dnieper river.

RANGER TAKES LAST GAME AT SAN ANGELO

Quite a number of fans witnessed the defeat of the Angelo Bronchos at the hands of the Nitros from Ranger at San Angelo Friday afternoon. It was a sensational game and the fans who motored over claim they were well pleased with their trip. The Ranger club made 9 runs, while the Bronchos could only pass 5 men over the home plate. Out of the three games played this week Ranger gets two of them from the Angelo team.

Sweetwater lost to Mineral Wells by a score of 12 to 2 yesterday, and Abilene lost to Cisco score 5 to 4. Baseball enthusiasm increases here and the local fans are taking much interest in the progress of the West Texas League.

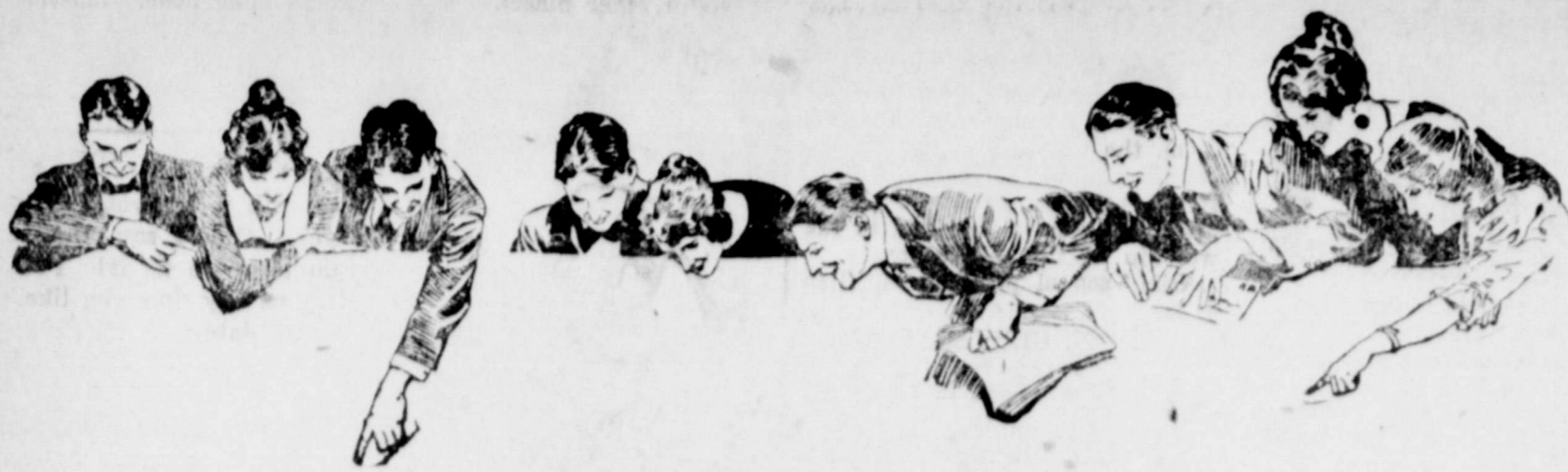

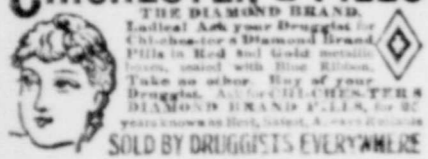
