MANY GOING TO PICNIC TUESDAY

Quite a crowd will motor to Bronte Tuesday (tomorrow) morning to attend the irrigation meeting and attend the big barbecue, according to reports made to Secretary Williams of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association.

The irrigation meeting will be called to order at ten o'clock. W. L. Hayley will make the address of welcome and Senator J. H. Baugh will respond. Assistant Attorney General Wallace Hawkins will be one of the speakers of the day and Porter A. Whaley, of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, is also slated to be heard; and other experts on irrigation and development lines will be given places on the program.

The meeting will be held on the dam site, or by the dam site, or near the dam site, and the engineers who are now making the preliminary survey will be present. It is not known whether the engineers will give out anything or not, but it is probable they will report what progress they are making and what the outlook for completing the work with a favorable report is. However, they have not advanced far enough with the work to state positively whether the project is a feasible one or not.

Reporters and staff correspondents for the more important state papers, will also be present to give the meeting publicity, and for this reason if no other, a representative crowd should be present from Ballinger to lend enthusiasm.

By way of entertainment for the day the Ballinger Bear Cats will meet the Coke County Rabbit Twisters in a well matched baseball game, and after the day's business is over, and the fatted calf has been removed from the program, the contest for the big game will begin.

The crowd will leave Ballinger about eight or nine o'clock Tuesday morning.

ASKS \$50,000 FOR NEW P. O. HERE

Among a number of bills introduced by Congressman Blanton in the House of Representatives on April 11th, is one asking for an appropriation of \$50,000 for a postoffice building at Ballinger. The bill, together with the other bills introduced by Mr. Blanton, were ordered printed and referred to the proper committees. Following is the text of the postoffice bill:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of Treasury be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to acquire for the United States in the city of Ballinger, the county seat of Runnels county, in the State of Texas, in such manner as to him shall seem best, by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, a suitable site, and cause to be erected thereon, according to plans and specifications to be approved by him, a substantial building, including fireproof vaults, heating and ventilating apparatus, and approaches, with good modern conveniences and improvements, for the United States post office, Weather Bureau, agricultural extension service, scientific research service, and other Governmental uses, at a total cost of not more than \$50,000, said site to cost not more than \$7,500."

Other bills introduced by Mr. Blanton include a bill to punish unlawful interference with the right of citizens to labor, and to punish unlawful conspiracies, etc., which applies to strikes.

A bill reducing 20 cents per mile mileage now allowed to congressmen and allowing only actual expenses for traveling to and from Washington.

A bill requiring all pensioners to reside within the territorial limits of the United States and forbid sending money to pensioners in foreign countries.

A bill to prevent picketing in the District of Columbia.

A bill for apportioning representatives in Congress among the several states, reducing in stead of increasing the number.

A bill to return to the South certain of the "cotton tax" collected from 1863 to 1868 by paying each living Confederate soldier and each living widow of a Confederate soldier, as proper representatives of the South, the sum of \$1,000 and a further sum of \$25 per month during the remainder of their lives.

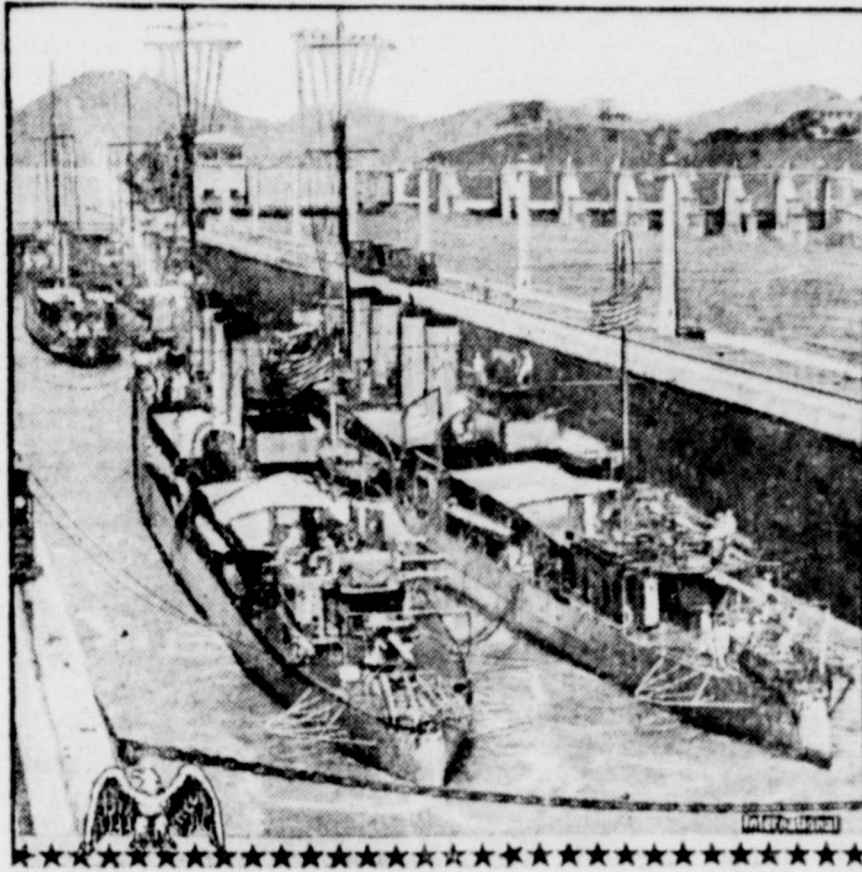
ROWAN CASE SET MAY 2ND

ABELLE, April 25.—District Judge Ely today said that he had set the case of Albert Rowan, sent here from Dallas on a charge of venue, for Monday, May 2nd, and had ordered a special venire of 75 men from which to select the jury. Rowan was convicted in Federal court at Dallas for robbing the Jackson street postal sub-station, and the charge against him now is murder in connection with the killing of a clerk in the post office.

HARDING NAMES TWO DEMOCRATS

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Former Senator Chamberlain, of Portland, Oregon, and Frederick Thompson of Mobile, Alabama, it is understood, have been definitely selected by President Harding as members of the United States Shipping Board. Both are Democrats. Mr. Harding is said to be undecided regarding the third member to be selected in constituting the new board.

Churches Trade Property; Unanimous Vote Approves

A sale of church properties tentatively agreed upon by committees representing the Ballinger Baptist Church and the First Christian Church, of this city, was unanimously approved by the congregations of the two churches Sunday, and the deal closed in which the Christian church gets the Baptist church on Broadway, and the Baptist church gets the lot and building of the Christian church on 10th Street.

This deal was brought about through plans which have been underway for some time by the Baptist church to build a new church. A beautiful building site on Eighth Street was purchased some time ago, and the church has been working out plans for the new building. A few days ago a deal was put on foot by the Christian church to buy the beautiful stone building which the Baptist people had planned to either sell as it stands, or tear down and use the material in the construction of their new home. A committee from each church was appointed to perfect the deal and readily reached agreement, and the terms were submitted to the two congregations Sunday and unanimously approved by both congregations.

As the deal goes through the Christian church gets the Baptist church on Broadway as it stands with the exception of a lot of chairs and the pianos, for a consideration of \$9,000, and the Baptist church gets the Christian church building and lot on Tenth Street, at a consideration of \$4,000. In other words, the Christian church gives its property and \$5,000 for the Baptist church property on Broadway. The Christian church retains its pews, pianos and other furnishings, and also gets the pews, and furnishings of the Baptist church, with the exception of the chairs and pianos. The deal is one of mutual benefit to the two congregations, in that the Christian church needed a new home, larger quarters for carrying on their church and Sunday school work, and they get that to the value of at least \$20,000 in the purchase of the Baptist Broadway church. As the Baptist people are to build a new church to also get more room, their present quarters would be a dead loss further than what they might save in using the material in the building. They will use the material in the old Christian church building and will sell the lot and realize cash to be used in the construction of their new

GERMANY'S LATEST OFFER MORE LIBERAL

SEPARATE PEACE BILL REPORTED

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The Knox peace resolution was reported out of the committee room favorably today, the foreign relations committee (Republican majority) reporting favorably, while the Democratic members of the committee voted against the measure and declared that they would carry the fight to the Senate floor.

MARINES WILL QUIT MAY FIRST

NEW YORK, April 25.—The Marine Engineers and Beneficial Association today issued a strike proclamation to take effect on May first.

The proclamation was issued when negotiations were broken between representatives of the association and the American Steamship Owners Association, which had been holding a conference regarding a contract to supersede that expiring May 1st.

PLEADS GUILTY LIBELING NEFF

WACO, April 25.—M. M. Scholl, editor of the Cooper Courier, pleaded guilty here today to charges of libeling Pat M. Neff, governor of Texas, during the campaign last year. He was fined \$500 in the county court, where the case was called for trial. He paid the fine.

BERLIN, April 25.—The German counter proposals to the allies offer the payment of two hundred billion gold marks as reparations, according to information coming from sources close to the government.

The proposal provides that the payments be spread over a period of from thirty to forty-two years, or less, depending on Germany's economic recovery. Economic pledges in the way of goods and the participation in German industries are offered as guarantees of payment it is stated.

It is indicated that the offer inclines more towards the terms formulated by the allies at the Paris conference last winter than it does to the offer made by Germany at the London conference which the allies summarily rejected.

LONDON, April 25.—Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons today that if the new German reparations proposals, which have not yet been received, proved unsatisfactory, Great Britain would support France at the next conference of the allies to be held next Saturday in her proposals for the occupation of the Westphalian coal fields.

BERLIN, April 25.—Germany's counter proposals on the reparations question refrain from proposing the assumption by Germany of allied debts to the United States. It was learned today that the German government is refraining from announcing today its note to the United States in order to give President Harding an opportunity to consider and make inquiries concerning it, if he desired, before forwarding it to the allies, it is explained.

LATE NEWS FROM OTHER TEXAS CITIES

GALVESTON—A Waco youth, Howard O. Smith, has been elected president of the students' association of the medical department of the University of Texas for the 1921-22 session. F. W. Matlock of Arlington and C. M. Williamson, were chosen vice president and secretary-treasurer, respectively. The remainder of the ticket follows: Editor of the medical department of the Cactus, J. B. Littlefield; business manager, J. R. Barcus; editor of the Medical, V. C. Tucker; business manager, W. H. Heck; J. A. Hampton, Ryan P. Estes and S. T. Hooker, were named as managers of the students co-operative store.

FT. WORTH—Bicycles as mounts for policemen will be revived in Fort Worth, John Alderman, the new police commissioner, announced. The bicycle squad, numbering about a dozen patrolmen, he said, will be similar to a squad that operated several years ago.

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico—J. B. Stewart, American consul here, declared that American shippers have learned how to pack goods for shipment to Mexican merchants. Mr. Stewart made a survey of shipments into his territory and has written letters to merchants and found that goods have been received here recently in good condition.

GALVESTON—Imports thru ports of the Galveston district during February were valued at \$1,373,552, according to figures at the local customs house. Of this amount \$661,888 was classed as dutiable, with \$711,664 on the free list. The figures show a gain of approximately \$100,000 over those of January.

EL PASO—Labor men have organized the El Paso Labor Temple Association for building a three-story labor temple, the initial cost being \$150,000. Labor men, besides contributing money, will be asked to give at least one day's work to building the temple.

LIBRARY BOARD HOLDS MEETING

The Library Board met in call session Saturday afternoon. The meeting was called for the purpose of passing on a proposition to rent the library to the Baptist church for their use in carrying on their work until they can build a new building. After considerable discussion, the board voted to grant the use of the building to the Baptists for a consideration of \$40 per month rental. The program of the church will not conflict with the use of the library auditorium for other public meetings on week nights.

The committee appointed to have the library roof repaired were authorized to proceed with the work, and the cost will be worked out on the best basis possible. The roof is in bad shape and further delay will damage the building when heavy rains come.

A new book committee was appointed composed of Mrs. D. P. Moser, for the Library Board; Librarian, Miss Edith Bell Walker, and a member to be appointed from the Shakespeare Club. The committee will renew subscriptions to magazines and handle the buying of new books from time to time.

There are sufficient funds on hand to maintain the library—keeping it open on the present schedule for another month or possibly two, and in the meantime some plan for continuing the work will be worked out. It is probable the city will get behind the proposition after

two or three months, and those who made it possible to keep the library open may be called on to underwrite another two or three months period of expense.
