ROWAN CASE IS CALLED FOR TRIAL SENATOR FREED ELECTION FRAUD

ABILENE, May 2.—Defense council in the Rowan case devoted much time of the early session of court today in arguing for a continuance of the case. Judge Ely overruled the motion challenging the jurisdiction of the court.

It is indicated that the next move of the defense will be to file a plea of abatement.

ABILENE, May 2.—A score of witnesses, a special venire of 75 men, and a large number of spectators are here today for the opening of the trial of Albert Rowan, charged with murder in connection with the Jackson street post office robbery in Dallas.

The case was sent here on a change of venue. Rowan was convicted and given a twenty-five year sentence for robbery, and the case against him for murder was transferred here and called for trial this morning. Presiding Judge Ely is prepared to hear a large number of motions for the defense council.

MEN HELD IN MEXICO UNDER INVESTIGATION

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The agents of the state department are investigating today the nationality of Jesus and Manuel Trejor, residents of San Antonio, who were arrested at Nuevo Laredo last week, charged with being emissaries of Francisco Murguia, leader of a minor revolt in Mexico.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The conviction of United States Senator Truman H. Newberry by the Federal court in Michigan for conspiracy to violate the corrupt practice act, was set aside today by the Supreme Court. Sixteen other convictions were also set aside.

The court held that Congress was unauthorized to regulate primary elections.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., May 2.—Judge Sessions, who presided in the trial of Senator Newberry here, upon learning today of the action of the United States Supreme Court in setting aside his decision in the case, announced that he would issue an order dismissing the second indictment against Newberry and associates.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The Comptroller of Currency today issued a call for banks to make statements showing condition at the close of business, Thursday, April 28th.

AUSTIN, May 2.—Commissioner Hall today issued a call for State banks of Texas to make a statement showing condition at the close of business on April 28th.

WILL HEAR NOTED MARKETING EXPERT

Farm Agent Eaton and several farmers, including R. W. Bruce, left for Abilene, Monday morning, where the party went to hear Aaron Sapiro, the noted marketing expert, speak. Mr. Sapiro is declared to be the greatest authority on farm organization and co-operative marketing in America. He is the man who put Fresno, California, on the map by perfecting a marketing system which enabled the fruit growers to move their products. He is touring Texas, making eight speeches in the state, and Abilene is the nearest point he will speak, and the local farmers will get a report through those who went to Abilene Monday.

BIRTHS DOUBLE DEATHS IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, May 2.—7,349 children were born in Texas during April, and 3,134 people died, according to the monthly report of the state health department made public today. Thirty-four sets of twins were born, four sets of triplets. Two of the sets of triplets were negroes and one was white.

Will Complete Drilling Oil Well Started By the Safety First Co.

The Safety First Oil & Gas Co., of Douglas, Arizona, is a thing of the past, and hereafter what has been known as the Safety First oil well, on Los Arroyo, three miles West of Ballinger, will be known as the Allen well, and it will be good news to the people throughout the country to know that the well is to be completed as fast as money can do the work.

It was reported several days ago that the well would be completed, but not until Monday was The Ledger authorized to carry a story about the well, and the reporter was forced to do some heavy pumping to get the desired information, and details are not yet as complete as the reading public would like to have.

However, we have been assured that the well will be completed, and it is understood that parties who fell heir to the 2500 foot hole and the acreage formerly owned by the Safety First company are back of the proposition and will drill to a depth of 4,000 feet or get oil.

Contractor Adams of San Angelo, who drilled the Harris well near that city, will have charge of the work of completing the Allen well. Mr. Harris is an experienced driller, having operated extensively in the Ranger field, and has ample tools to put on the job here. Part of the tools have already arrived and are on the ground at the old Safety First stand, and workmen are cleaning out the slush pit, and a car of fuel is due to arrive here within the next day or two, and it is probable that drilling will be resumed by the end of the week.

Just who is the power behind the throne, and what source the cash is coming from, since the Safety First hit bottom, and passed out of existence, is not known. F. W. Hunter, who had charge of the work here for the Safety First, is still connected with the development in the Allen field. Mr. Hunter declines to talk for publication, but carries a very optimistic smile, and begs The Ledger not to quote him on anything for the present.

Mr. Hunter recently returned from Arizona, where he spent several weeks. Soon after returning it was reported that he was negotiating for the completion of the old Safety First well, and in a few days material began to arrive on the ground, and then he was forced to admit that development would be continued, and declared that the promoters were in shape to go down 4,000 feet.

At present the hole stands 2500 feet deep and is in good shape. It is declared to be one of the best wildcat propositions in West Texas. The log of the well so far has promised all the secrets could wish for. It was a bitter pill for the Safety First to have to give up the project, but stringent financial conditions forced them off the job, and creditors crowding in made it necessary that the company throw up their hands and suffer the consequences.

Wild cat promotion schemes are not as easily put over now as in the palmy days of the oil boom in West Texas, and as the Safety

U. S. WILL KEEP HANDS OFF IN REPARATIONS

LONDON, May 2.—Germany must give by May 12th, a categorical answer, "yes or no," to the allied reparations demands, or suffer the infliction of military and naval penalties, according to terms of an ultimatum drawn up by the allied foreign ministers today and submitted to the supreme council for its approval.

LONDON, May 2.—Premier Briand said today that it would take twelve days to complete French military preparations to enforce the penalties for the failure of Germany to meet the demands of the allies in making payment of reparations. "If, at the end of that time, Germany has not fully yielded to the allies demands, the French will march," said Premier Briand, and he added, "I hope we shall not march alone."

LONDON, May 2.—The allied supreme council, after receiving the report of the council of foreign ministers, today agreed to the principal plan of Foreign Minister Jasper, of Belgium, providing that an ultimatum be presented to Germany, and for military measures to be used in case Germany should default in making good the demands of the allies.

LONDON, May 2.—French Ambassador Jusserand, at Washington, today called here an outline of a conversation which he had with Secretary of State Hughes. M. Jusserand reports that the American government desires to take no attitude in the reparations question that would irritate the allies. The message adds that Mr. Hughes said that United States state department had no further communication to make to Germany.

The report received here also indicated that Mr. Hughes said that the United States' preference in the matter is that Germany settle without forcing the allies to occupy the Ruhr valley coal fields, because such an occupation suggested a kind of war, the cable said.

LONDON, May 2.—Great Britain will make a naval demonstration if Germany refuses to yield to the allies' conditions in making reparations, it was stated

today. The demonstration will not take the form of a blockade, but will probably occur in the North Sea.

JEW AND ARABS FIGHT; 20 KILLED

JERUSALEM, May 2.—Twenty persons were killed and 150 wounded in a clash between Jews and Arabs at Jaffa Sunday. Troops succeeded in restoring order without being compelled to fire on the fighting forces.

BARN FIRE THIS MORNING.

Fire originating in the barn at the home of C. B. Laxson on Seventh Street near the Santa Fe passenger station about two-thirty Sunday morning called out the fire company. Members of the family were attracted by the light from the fire in the barn, fortunately having been aroused from their slumber about that time. The fire is supposed to have started from a trash box in the alley, and had not made much headway when discovered. A few buckets of water stopped it before the fire company reached the scene.

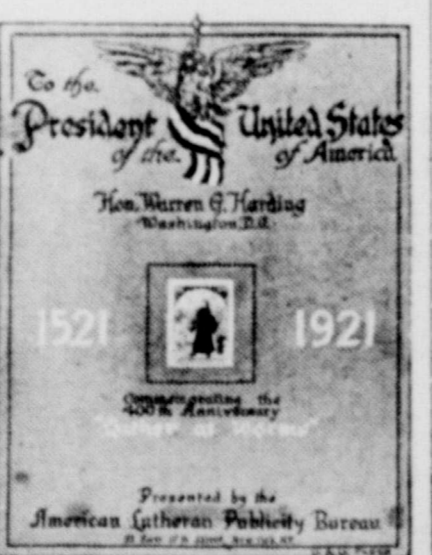

Stockman Killed at Sterling City

STERLING CITY, Tex., May 2.—T. E. Moon, stockman, of Seagrave, Gaines county, was shot and almost instantly killed here at 10 o'clock Saturday morning in the first homicide in Sterling county's 30 years' history. Leslie C. Riordan, cattleman, and a resident of this county for more than a year, surrendered immediately to R. M. Mathis, constable, and later was taken in custody by B. F. Roberts, sheriff, who placed him in jail.

The cause of the killing is thought to have been trouble between the two men growing out of a suit brought by Mr. Riordan against Mr. Moon for several thousand dollars damages resulting from an alleged breach of contract in a cattle deal. Judge Charles E. Dubois, of San Angelo, presiding over the case, had just granted Mr. Moon a continuance when the shooting occurred. The case had first been called at the last term of court but was continued.

Mr. Riordan and Mr. Moon came down stairs from the court room at about the same time, according to eye-witnesses. Moon passed out of the southwest door of the building and had started North, Riordan following. Five shots were fired from a .25 calibre automatic revolver and only one took effect. This bullet, however, struck Moon under the left shoulder blade and pierced his heart. The stricken man staggered almost entirely around the building before falling dead near the southeast entrance. A pocket knife was the only weapon found on the body according to officers.

HEAVY LIFTING MAY BE FATAL

Robert Rains was carried to the Halley & Love sanitarium Sunday and underwent an operation Monday morning with the hope that he might be relieved of paralysis which has had him down since early last February. Physicians held out little hope for him, but offered the operation as the only chance of restoring him to health or saving his life.

Mr. Rains, a big healthy robust fellow, was hurt on the first day of February. He was hauling cotton and in lifting a bale slipped in some way, spraining his back, presumably. He did not notice the hurt much at first. The accident occurred in the forenoon and he returned to work after noon, but was forced to lay off after an hour or two, and was not able to return to work again. He was able to be up and about for a week or more, but gradually became paralyzed from about the middle of his body through his lower limbs, and has been in that condition since.

His friends are uneasy about him, as it is feared that he will never recover. At the time of the accident Mr. Rains was living near the oil mill, but his home is now near the Colorado river bridge.

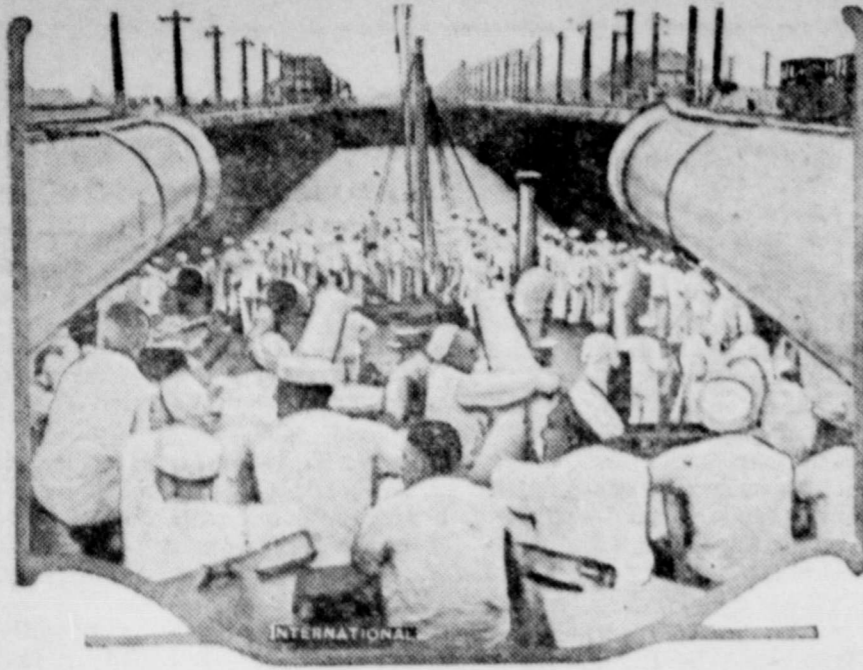
