AUSTIN, May 9.—Every executive board of every state educational institution will have a woman member during the administration of Gov. Neff, according to a statement issued by Mr. Neff today. Gov. Neff said that he was going to appoint a woman as member of the board of regents of the University of Texas, and that he was about ready to announce who that woman would be.

This will be the first time in the history of the university that a woman served as member of the university board. The governor also said that he was going to appoint a woman on the board of directors of A. & M. college. He has already appointed Miss Margie Neal, of Carthage, on the normal board.

TWO KILLED IN AIRPLANE FALL

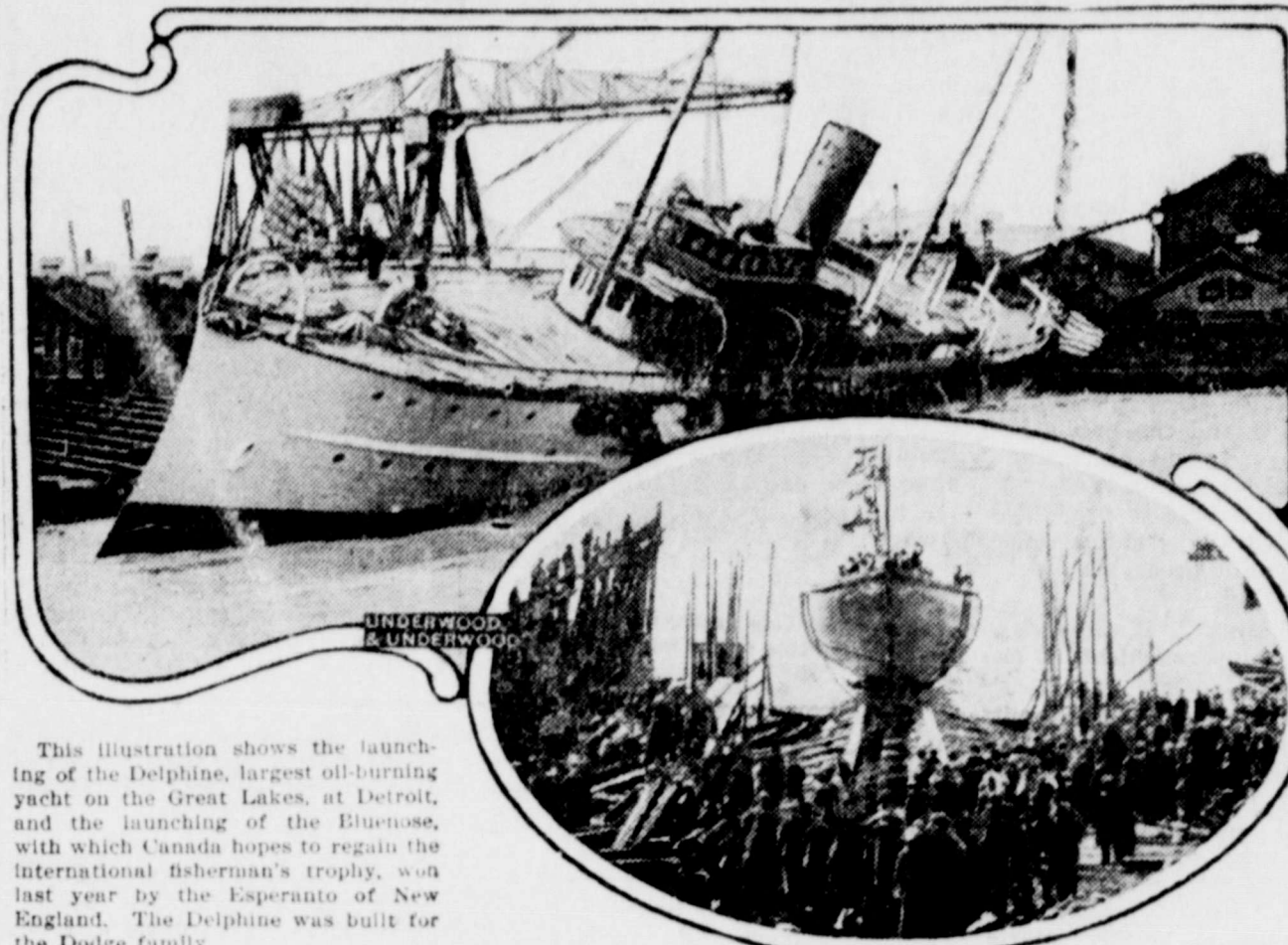
Pres reports Sunday night reported the death of Miss Margaret Pearson and a mechanic by the name of Carson, and the probable death of Lieut. Locking, near Abilene Sunday afternoon, when Locking's machine fell to the ground.

Locking was operating a machine from Abilene for commercial purposes. He made several trips to Ballinger, and was here last Sunday week, and is reported to have carried up local citizens for flights over Ballinger.

The report of the crash to the ground did not give exact causes for the plane falling, but it is believed that the machine went into a tail spin. Another aviator who examined the wrecked plane, declared he believed the control lever jammed and that Carson, who was piloting the machine, lost control. Carson is said to have been a student aviator, and not an expert flyer.

AMERICAN NOW IN ALLIED COUNCIL

PARIS, May 9.—American representation in the allied conference was resumed today when Hugh C. Wallace, American ambassador, took his seat at the session of the council of ambassadors here. He was served with instructions last night from Secretary of State Hughes to represent the United States at the ambassadorial conference. The American ambassador's appearance at the foreign office where the council met today, was the occasion of warm expressions of appreciation on the part of Jules Cambon of France, president of the council, and other members of the body.

Ambassador Wallace was given a seat at M. Cambon's right, and will represent the United States in all matters coming before the council. The problem of Silesia was the subject of the council's deliberations today. Rowlan W. Boyden, who formerly sat with the allied reparations commission, has also been instructed to resume his seat with that body.

PARIS, May 9.—France today replied to the note which Germany last week addressed to the allies in which attention was called to the Polish insurgent movement in Upper Silesia. The reply assures Germany that the allied forces in the district have no need for outside help, pointing out that the troubles are due in part to false rumors that the mining districts of Silesia have been awarded to Germany.

PARIS, May 9.—The allied council of ambassadors, with Ambassador Wallace present as representative of the United States, decided today to ask the inter-allied commission of the Upper Silesian district to inform the population of the exact state of affairs, explaining that no decision had been taken regarding a division of the territory. In an effort to quiet the unrest of the people in Upper Silesia the council also decided to urge Poland to control the Poles in connection with the uprising.

CAUSEWAY ROAD IS CLOSED—USE BRIDGE

The Commissioners' Court has closed the causeway road which has been open during the construction of the new bridge. The temporary bridge has been removed, and the public is notified to not try to travel that road, but go around by the new bridge.

Many People Attend Kirk Memorial Unveiling Sun.

The largest crowd of people to ever gather on the banks of the Colorado river at this place for any occasion, was present Sunday afternoon to witness the unveiling of the Bob Kirk memorial and pay a tribute to the man for whom the bridge was dedicated.

Autos were parked for several blocks up Hutchings Avenue from the bridge and many cars were parked on the South side of the river, while the large crowd stood with marked patience and listened with intense interest to the speakers who took part in the unveiling ceremony.

Mayor Guin acted as master of ceremonies. Dr. Alvin Swindell offered the invocation, and at the close of the services pronounced the benediction. Judge O. L. Parish briefly reviewed "Bob" Kirk's record as a county official. Judge Parish spoke from his personal experience and association with deceased, stating that what he knew of Mr. Kirk's record prior to that time was from hearsay. Judge Parish stated that he knew Mr. Kirk to be intensely interested in the work which made the new bridge possible, and he pointed to the great improvement made in the highways of this precinct as other monuments which stand for his memory today. He said that Bob Kirk not only gave of his time and his money for the upbuilding of his community and county, but he gave of his life, for it was worry over the problems which confronted him from time to time which shortened his days, and no doubt brought the physical breakdown much earlier than it would have come. Judge Parish said that the new bridge was a fitting monument to the memory of R. P. Kirk.

GERMANS FAVOR ACCEPTING TERMS

BERLIN, May 9.—Sentiment in German political circles is showing a drift toward agreement for accepting the allied reparations terms, according to a summary of the situation at noon today. It is now believed that parliamentary coalition, which will accept the allied ultimatum, will be constituted within the next twenty-four hours.

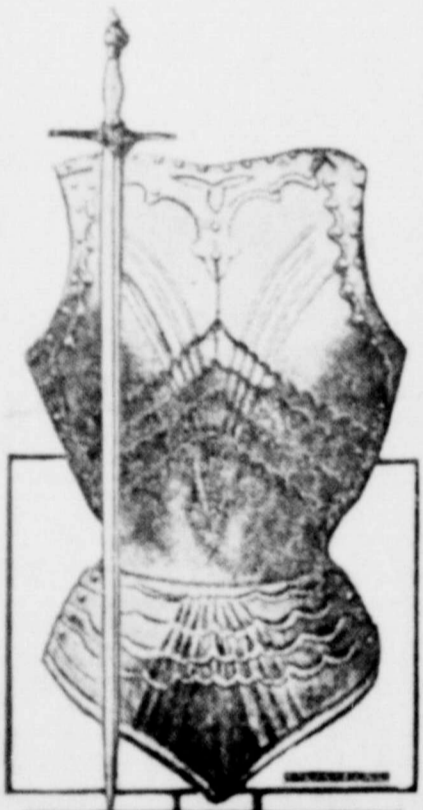

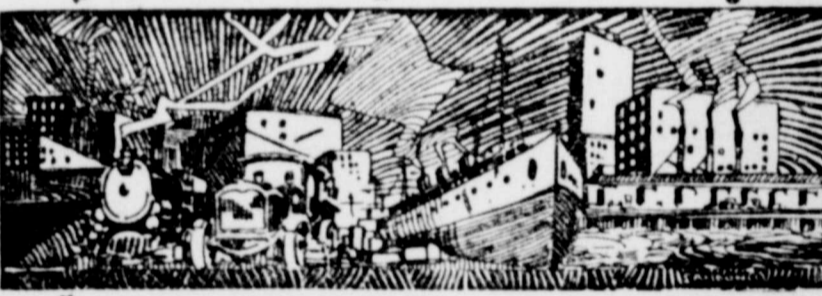

AUSTIN, May 9.—Representatives of a number of cotton associations and chambers of commerce of Texas are conferring with the governor today in regard to the threatened Federal quarantine against Texas, because of alleged failure of Texas to properly combat the spread of the pink boll worm in this state.

CUTS THE COST OF LIVING HERE

A sharp decline in living expenses in Ballinger is reflected in the bulletin issued this week by the Young Men's Business League to the teachers of this section of the state who are planning to attend the Ballinger Normal and Summer School.

Rooms are quoted at \$4.00 to \$10.00 per month. Board can be had from \$20.00 to \$30.00 per month. Room and board together, in private homes, is listed at the low price of \$25.00 to \$30.00 per month. The hotels and boarding houses offer room and board at \$30.00 to \$40.00 a month.

It is expected that these low figures will attract a large number of teachers to Ballinger during the normal term, and will also favorably advertise this city as a place in which the "high cost of living" does not exist.

IN THE CORNER PIGGLY WIGGLY HERE NOT IN SUIT

New Idea for Tombstone.

Austin J. Harman of Custer, Okla., has invented what he calls a "new and improved tombstone." It is designed to represent a life-size human figure standing erect. For instance, it might be a soldier. The material is galvanized iron, made hollow, so that the lower part of it may be filled with cement to make a heavier base. The body is hollow in order that, if desired, it may hold an urn containing the ashes of the deceased. As for the head, it is meant to be screwed on, and may be made a likeness of the person for whom the tombstone is erected.

Eighty-eight stockholders of the Piggly Wiggly Texas Company have filed suit in the district court at San Angelo asking that a receiver for the company be appointed, and S. S. Dowty, a former San Angelo groceryman has been appointed receiver for the company.

The suit filed by 88 of the 300 stockholders of the concern against the trustees charge mismanagement and a breach of trust agreement. In their original petition to the court the stockholders allege that the trustees R. W. Peckham, of Eastland; W. H. Peckham and F. W. Peckham, and R. H. Farley, of Taylor county; and G. W. Peckham, of Wichita county, entered into a trust agreement which specified among other details of management, that the trustees make and file periodical reports of the affairs of the company and that no such report had ever been made. The petition also alleges that the trustees promised a big annual dividend when the company was organized, and so far no dividend has been paid.

When the Piggly Wiggly Texas Company was organized some twenty-five or thirty citizens of Ballinger purchased stock in the concern. Stores were opened in San Angelo, Sweetwater, Abilene, Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman and Ballinger. A few months ago the local stockholders read the handwriting on the wall and got busy and put over a deal in which they withdrew from the company, selling their stock for about seventy cents on the dollar to the larger company, accepting the Ballinger store and a certain amount of goods, and the right to do business under the name of Piggly Wiggly in Ballinger, and organized themselves into a local company. Thus the local Piggly Wiggly company, which was formerly a part of the Texas company is not affected by the bankruptcy proceedings. The local store is solvent and is doing business under its own charter.

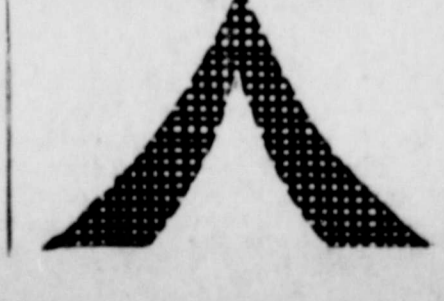
