## GERMANY ACCEPTS UNCONDITIONALLY TERMS OF ALLIES

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The administration officials expressed great satisfaction today over the decision of the German government to accept the allied reparations terms.

Knowing that an invasion of the Ruhr valley by the allied forces would have been regarded by the United States with deep concern, although the allies had been given assurance that the American government would stand with them.

United States government economists appeared to be convinced of Germany's ability to meet her obligations and professed to see in her decision a promise of an economic revival that would cause a happy reaction throughout the world.

With highly controversial question presented by the allies insistence upon Germany's agreement to pay fixed indemnities out of the way, it is indicated that the state department expected to proceed more rapidly with the consideration of numerous problems connected with the development of its foreign policy.

Department officials will not indicate the order of procedure but it is made clear that the policy will be for insistence of equal opportunity, and the recognition of American rights throughout the world.

LONDON, May 11.—Lloyd George announced in the House of Commons today that Germany had made complete acceptance of the allied demands. Prolonged applause and cheering greeted the announcement.

BERLIN, May 11.—Germany's reply to the allied ultimatum accepting the terms of the supreme council, is confined to a repetition of the exact terms in the decision of the allies regarding the guarantees of disarmament, trial of war criminals, and financial conditions. The reply states that Germany adheres unconditionally to these decisions, and accepts the terms in full.

BERLIN, May 11.—Germany's new cabinet began today the preparation of the government's formal note to the entente, accepting the terms of the supreme allied council in London. Dr. Julius Wirth, the new chancellor, received what amounted to a vote of confidence of the Reichstag last night.

LONDON, May 11.—Germany's unconditional acceptance of the allies' reparations terms was delivered to Prime Minister Lloyd George by Dr. Sthamer, German minister to Great Britain, here today.

The British government had been given until tomorrow in

which to comply with the terms, and the allies were rapidly preparing to take possession of important German territory in case the Germans refused.

PARIS, May 11.—Newspapers here today professed to see in Germany's acceptance of the allied reparations demands proof that Germany complies only to the argument of force. At the same time the papers express doubts regarding the fulfillment of Germany's undertaking and promise to comply with the demands.

## COURT AFFIRMS LIQUOR CASES

AUSTIN, May 11.—Of twenty-eight opinions handed down by the Court of Criminal Appeals today, fifteen were from Kaufman county where convictions were returned against John and Clyde Chandler for violation of the Dean prohibition law. The charges against the two Chandlers ranged from the possession of liquor, possession of equipment and of manufacture of liquor to selling liquor.

Two cases were affirmed against each man with a total punishment of two years each in penitentiary. Six cases against Clyde Chandler were reversed and remanded and five cases against John Chandler were reversed.

## POLISH REVOLT IS SUSPENDED

LONDON, May 11.—Negotiations between the inter-allied commission of Upper Silesia and Adalbert Komanty, leader of the Polish insurgents, resulted last evening in the suspension of hostilities, say dispatches to the Central News Bureau from Warsaw, today.

BUENOS AIRES, May 11.—Representations of the United States to the Argentine government as a result of the port workers' boycott, which tied up the steamer Martha Washington by the shipping board, resulted in a solution satisfactory to both governments, it was officially announced today.

## COL. HOUSE LANDS AT CHERBOURG

CHERBOURG, France, May 11.—Col. Edward M. House, upon his arrival from America today, expressed regret that the conditions of the treaty of Versailles had not been more rigorously enforced by the allies. Col. House is en route to Paris to see former premiers, Clemenceau and Andrew Tardieu.

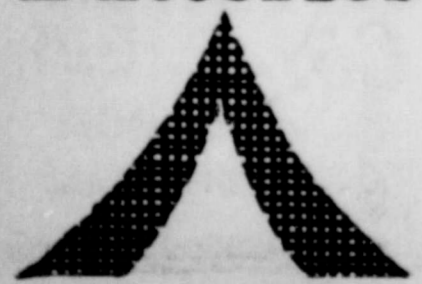

**NO MARKET FOR  
LOW GRADE WOOL**

According to George E. Rutan, an expert wool man, who is connected with the wool division of the Farm Bureau, sheep men should use the very best care in preparing their wool for market.

Mr. Rutan says that where the low grade wool is thrown in the bags with the better grade that buyers will stay off of it, and the entire clip will be hard to sell, while if the good wool is put in an attractive condition the buyers will readily take it when placed on the market.

Mr. Rutan has been working in the interest of the wool pool which the Farm Bureau is trying to put over. He stated that the outlook did not promise the pooling of the allotted amount the Farm Bureau started out to get, and that the success of the proposition depended largely on what the Del Rio country did, and he had not received a report from that section where representatives of the Bureau have been at work.

Mr. Rutan visited the compress while here and inspected about 900 bags of wool stored there. He stated that he wished it could be impressed upon the sheepmen to prepare their wool for sale in an attractive way.

"Wool is going to sell this season, especially the well grown fine staple free clips," said Mr. Rutan. Continuing to discuss the market outlook he said, "prices at present as near as can be ascertained seem to range from 14-16 for short fine wool to 18-21 for good 12 months clip. It will be decidedly to the advantage of the growers to tie the fleeces, skirt fully, keeping all tags separate. Those clips that are poorly handled, containing an excess of heavy locks, bellies, pieces, tags, etc., will be the last to sell and will then go at a sacrifice in price. We all well know the attractive clips sell first and at full prices."

**50,000 FARMERS  
HEAR SAPIOR**

DALLAS, May 11.—More than half a hundred thousand farmers have heard Aaron Sapiro, celebrated California marketing authority discuss the cotton marketing problems of the South in a series of meetings in Texas during the last 10 days. Hundreds of others have read accounts of his speeches. Everywhere that he went he received an enthusiastic welcome verging at times upon an ovation such as only heroes and great statesmen receive.

At Abilene, for example, between twenty-five hundred and three thousand farmers marched thru the streets of the town to three different meeting places before they found a hall large enough to accommodate the crowd. He was given a wonderful reception at Paris and at McKinney. At Waxahachie more than 2500 farmers listened to him describe his remedy for the cotton farmers' troubles.

After speaking at Tyler he went to Waco and at different points. One of the largest strictly farmer audiences that ever came together in the county gave him a hearty welcome and the farmers signified their intentions of getting behind the cotton cooperative movement.

Another big crowd greeted him at Temple and it is said that plans are under foot there to close up all stores in town during the big day set for the final

sign up of all the farmers in that end of the county. At Granger and Taylor he was also greeted by enthusiastic cotton growers. The big planters heard him at Bryan and at Corpus Christi and the climax came at a meeting in San Antonio, May 10, to which the railroads had granted reduced rates as an accommodation to the thousands who wanted to hear him.

## PABST TO STOP BOOZE RUNNING

GALVESTON, May 11.—A campaign to put an end to the smuggling of liquor from foreign-owned and operated vessels has been inaugurated by Fred C. Pabst, collector of customs here.

The practice of bringing in illegal liquors, according to the authorities, has become widespread, sailors on almost every steamer flying a foreign flag adding to their income by acting as buyers for distributors in the various ports of this country. The sailors, it was said, frequently make as high as 1,000 per cent on their contraband liquor sales.

Customs officials here declared that the master of any vessel from which merchandise or liquor is landed illegally, is liable to a fine of \$400 for each offense and that, if the commodities so landed do not appear on the ship's manifest in proper form, the master is liable to fines in addition, equal to the value of the goods landed. In addition to this, it was pointed out, the ship itself is liable to seizure to insure payment of the fines for which the master is liable, and can be held in port until settlement of such fines is made.
