## ROWENA WELL TO BE PLUGGED

Orders are out for the plugging of the Rowena oil well, according to E. S. Kubela, who was here from Rowena Friday. Mr. Kubela stated that the parties responsible for the 2200 foot well had received notice from the commission to plug the well by the 17th of this month.

"It is probable that an effort will be made to revive interest in this project," said Mr. Kubela, "and if the oil fans in Ballinger will assist the well will be drilled deeper."

Mr. Kubela stated that Rowena people were ready to put up money to carry the test hole down further, and at least get the satisfaction of making a better test, and possibly strike pay sand.

As the matter now stands the money invested in the 2200 foot hole is a dead loss and not a test either.

The Rowena well was drilled by the Runnels County Oil & Gas Co. The company played in hard luck, after making a most promising start. To begin with the company obtained leases on about forty thousand acres, well blocked for drilling site, as well as a scattering acreage which

would have given them an advantage in case oil was found anywhere in the county. With the large acreage the company experienced no trouble in placing stock, and considerable cash was raised to carry on development.

The first hard luck came in drilling the first hole, a crooked hole and lost tools resulting. The derrick was skidded a few feet and the second hole drilled to a depth of 2200 feet, after the fifteen foot hole had been abandoned. The funds of the company becoming exhausted at a time when people were slow to place their money in wild cat projects made it hard for the company to continue development.

The log of the Rowena well is declared to be of the best showing, and the field has every characteristic of an oil field. A few hundred feet more drilling might bring in a gusher. Who knows. At least a completion of the well would remove doubt of whether oil existed in that part of the county or not. As it is, the job will be abandoned unfinished and is a dead loss in the effort to develop the field.

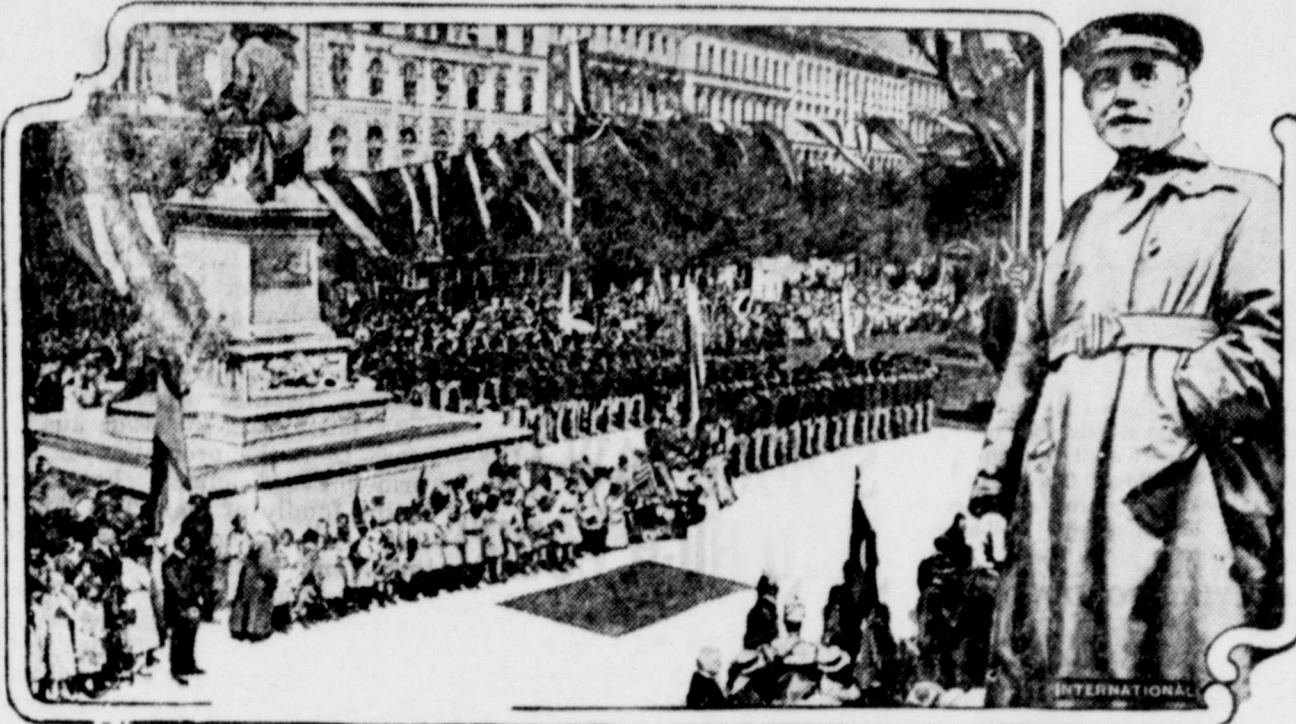

## SURVEYORS ARE PUSHING WORK TROOPS SENT TO SEEKING BETTER MINING DISTRICT SERVICE ON A.&S.

Reports from the scene of action in Coke and Nolan county indicate that the surveying crews are making good time on the work of running preliminary surveys for the Colorado river irrigation project.

C. S. Clark, of the State Board of Water Engineers, was in Coke county this week and was in conference with C. C. Molder, chief engineer of the surveying crew in regard to the work, but nothing was given out, and the state crew is going ahead with the work.

Federal engineer Allen K. Andrews is in charge of the precise level line crew, which is working from the government bench mark at Sweetwater.

The plan of action and the large scale on which the State and Federal authorities are at work indicates that the government has much faith in the feasibility of the project, and will lend every aid possible in developing the greatest irrigation project in the Southwest.

While no definite time has been fixed within which to complete the survey, it is reported that it will require about nine months for the surveyors to make their report. If the project goes through as put on foot by Col. C. M. Stanley, of Kansas City, who worked so faithfully on the job from 1913 to 1916, it will revolutionize the agricultural industry in four counties, which will receive water for irrigation from the big dam.

## TO GET WOMAN FOR DEATH OF 4 HUSBANDS

BOISE, Idaho, May 14.—Lieut. Governor Moore, today signed extradition papers for Mrs. Paul Southard, wanted at Twin Falls, in connection with the death of four former husbands.

The lieutenant-governor was acting in the absence of the governor in granting officers a permit to transport Mrs. Southard to Twin Falls to answer to four murder charges in which she is alleged to have killed her four husbands.

## ATTEMPT TO RESCUE SINN FEIN LEADER

DUBLIN, May 14.—An unsuccessful attempt was made today to rescue Sir Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein organization, from confinement in Mount Joy prison.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Secretary Weeks today instructed Major General Read, commanding the Fifth Corps area, to send Federal troops into Mingo county, West Virginia, if he deemed the use of the troops necessary to quell mine disturbances.

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., May 14.—The battle in the mountains which raged for two days between sympathizers and opponents of the United Mine Workers in the coal district, was resumed today. The fighting is centered in McCarr, Kentucky, and Lynn, West Virginia, being along the Kentucky West Virginia border.

PIKEVILLE, Ky., May 14.—Terrific firing from both the Kentucky and West Virginia sides of the Tag river, is in progress today. Along this section there has been virtually a state of war for the last forty-eight hours. Firing was resumed early today.

## BRITISH PAPER SCORES GEORGE

LONDON, May 14.—Premier Lloyd George's denunciation of the Polish revolt in Silesia, before the House of Commons yesterday, failed to get the unanimous support of the newspapers of London today.

The Daily Express commended the prime minister for his honesty, courage and statesmanship, and insisted that Poland "must be taught that she can not be allowed to become a disturbing element in Europe."

The Morning Post charged the prime minister with "bitter partisanship, intense dislike for Poland, pusillanimous fear of Germany, and ignorance of European politics."

PARIS, May 14.—Premier Briand declared today that France was unalterably opposed to any German military operations in Upper Silesia. The entry of German troops in Upper Silesia would provoke intervention by regular Polish troops, which would mean war and in such a war France could not remain neutral according to expressions in official circles here today.

BOAT AND CREW LOST IN STORM SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., May 14.—Six men of the crew and the barge Miztec are believed to have been lost in a storm which swept Lake Superior last night.

## MUTINY LEADERS CAUGHT

HUNTSVILLE, May 14.—The capture of six men, considered as ring leaders of the Huntsville mutiny, was effected early this morning by three guards from the penitentiary led by R. E. McAdams. The six captured included G. R. Anderson, Lewis Dodd, Harry Lee Watson, Arthur Spragins, C. C. Mims, and J. A. Stewart.

The prisoners were captured about five o'clock by guards 12 miles West of Huntsville. All six of the prisoners captured in this party are known as "bad men." When captured they were armed with two shot guns and four revolvers.

The guards tracked the men down with blood hounds, and when the officers opened fire on the prisoners all six surrendered without making fight.

With the surrender of Ernest Kelly, of Harris county, serving a double life sentence, to Capt. J. A. Herring late Friday, and the capture of the six prisoners this morning, the authorities think the backbone of the mutiny has been broken and the other escaped felons will be captured speedily.

Shortly after nightfall, Friday, DeWitt Conner, G. Ellis, Jack Paulson, William Wilson, were captured by R. E. Coleman and party East of Willis. On the return trip to the penitentiary with four of the mutineers, Chas. Houserman, who escaped from guards last Monday, was picked up. Twenty-six of the forty who escaped, have been captured.

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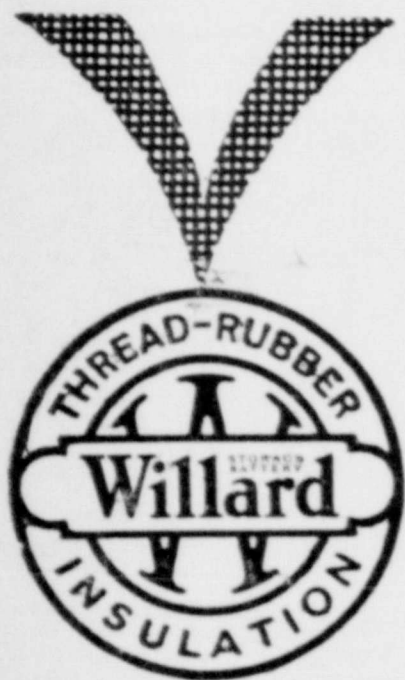

EL PASO—El Paso Post No. 66, American Legion, has obtained \$106,586 in compensation for former service men, according to Nathan Lapowski, chairman of the grievance committee. Men placed on the payroll for disabled soldiers thru the local post, are drawing \$80,000 per month, Mrs. Lapowski announced.

GALVESTON—Seed potatoes, planted in fresh sawdust here by W. C. Homburg, resulted in a yield of tubers averaging twelve ounces and of excellent quality, according to their grower. They were planted February 22 and dug April 30. Another part of Mr. Homburg's garden with soil richly manured was planted to potatoes at the same time, but, compared with the sawdust-planted seed, the results were disappointing, he said.

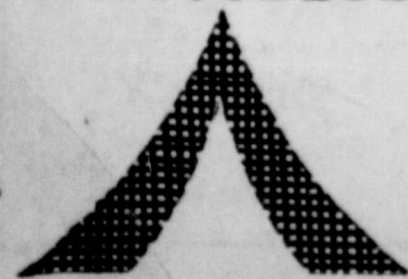

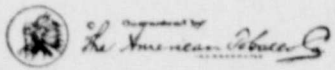

SCHOOL LAW UP TO HIGH COURT

WASHINGTON, May 14—The Supreme Court was asked today to pass on the validity of the San Antonio city ordinance requiring public school pupils to be vaccinated. Counsel for Rosalyn Zuehl, who was expelled from school because she refused to be vaccinated, filed a petition reviewing the dismissal by the Texas courts of her suit for ten thousand dollars damages against the city authorities. The petition alleges that the ordinance is repugnant to the Fourteenth Amendment.

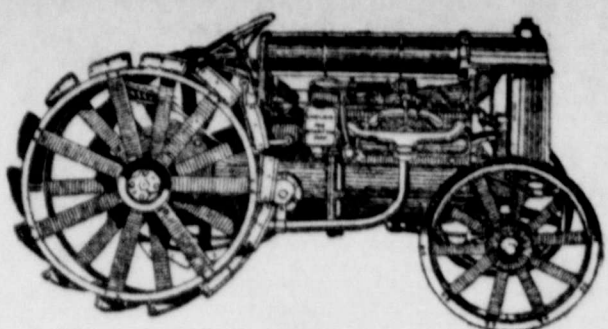

### BALLINGER STILL SEEKING LEAGUE

A phone message to Leroy Nicholson about noon Saturday stated that Stamford had failed to close the deal for the Mineral Wells baseball franchise in the West Texas League, and that the proposition for Ballinger to get in the circuit was still open. Mr. Nicholson was in communication with the owners of the Mineral Wells franchise, and will probably leave this afternoon for that city to negotiate further with the Mineral Wells club.

"I am ready to go after the club," said Mr. Nicholson. "If local fans will get busy and back me up, I can't do the whole thing by myself. If I go to Mineral Wells and close a deal for the club, I am going to expect local fans to stay with me."

Local fans are watching with interest the final disposition to be made of the Mineral Wells baseball franchise. At the league directors meeting held at Abilene Thursday evening Mineral Wells was voted out of the league on the grounds of being too far out of the circuit, and the owner of the franchise was given until May 26th to dispose of his franchise, which if he does not do the president of the league will take up and place at some other town.

Stamford, Breckenridge, and Ballinger are all applicants for the league, with a majority of the directors favoring Ballinger on account of this town being located so as to form a more perfect circuit. However, financial odds are said to be against Ballinger, and while it is probable that Breckenridge will put up the money to get the Mineral Wells club, should all things be equal Ballinger will be favored over either Stamford or Breckenridge.

The Mineral Wells club will be transferred to some other point within the next few days, and Ballinger may have the refusal of the club.
