340 BALES OF COTTON IN POOL

Cotton which would have brought thirty-five or forty cents a little more than a year ago, sold here for 11.75 Friday when about 400 bales of pooled cotton was placed on the block by the Farm Bureau selling committee.

Of the entire lot offered for sale 340 bales were sold at prices ranging from 6.80 to 11.75. One lot of mixed grades failed to sell, the farmers' committee rejecting the bids offered.

41 bales of No. 2 cotton went to B. B. Weborne, of Dallas, for 11.75.

35 bales of No. 3 sold to W. Cochran, of San Angelo, for 11.15.

95 bales of No. 4 sold to W. Lee for Wolf & Co., of Dallas, for 9.20.

148 bales of No. 5 sold to W. Lee for 8.10.

21 bales of No. 6 sold to C. F. Morris, of Big Springs, for 6.80. The lot which the farmers refused to let go was made up of good, bad and indifferent grades, and the prices offered did not meet the approval of the selling committee.

MRS. THOMASON DIES AT EL PASO

EL PASO, May 21.—Mrs. Robert Ewing Thomason, wife of Speaker Thomason of the last legislature, and candidate for governor in 1920, died here shortly before midnight last night following a surgical operation. She is survived by her husband, one son and one daughter. The body will be taken tomorrow to the former home of deceased at Gainesville, for burial.

EX-GOVERNOR UNDER ARREST

ALBANY, Ga., May 21.—Sidney J. Catts, former governor of Florida, was arrested here today on a Federal warrant from Florida, charging perjury. His bond was fixed at \$2500 when he was arraigned before United States Commissioner White. Bond had not been furnished up to a late hour today.

POPE APPEALS FOR IRISH PEACE

DUNDALK, Ireland, May 21.—Pope Benedict has written to Cardinal Logue, Irish primate, appealing to both the English and Irish to abandon violence, and proposing that the Irish question be settled by a body selected by the whole Irish nation. The Pontiff has sent Cardinal Logue two million lire for the Irish White Cross.

RAILWAY HEADS CONSIDER WAGE

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 21.—Approximately six hundred general chairmen of the Big Four brotherhoods and Switchmen's Union of North America, will attend a joint conference at Chicago on July first, to consider the wage award made by the Railroad Labor Board, and which becomes effective on that date.

COL. STRICKLAND DEAD AT DALLAS

DALLAS, May 21.—Col. J. F. Strickland, one of the most prominent citizens of this city, died here of heart trouble today at his home. Col. Strickland was president of several Texas public utility companies.

Col. Strickland was sixty years old. He was born in Alabama and came to Texas in 1878. He had been in poor health for some time, but continued to look after the heavy duties imposed upon him as head of six different business organizations.

NEW SCHEDULES FOR TARIFF BILL

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The House ways and means committee today reported a joint resolution under which a new schedule for the permanent tariff bill will be made effective immediately upon the introduction of that measure, if the committee held that an emergency for such a step required it.

AMERICANS WIN IN GOLF MATCH

HOYLAK, England, May 21.—The American golfing stars decisively defeated their English opponents in the first international golf match here today. The Americans captured five of the eight single matches. The net results of the day's play is nine victories for the Americans and three for the British.

HOYLAK, May 21.—The American golf team, which will contest with the British championship amateurs beginning next Monday, made a clean sweep in the foursome arranged as part of the preliminary series here today.

MANY FAIL TO HEAR PROGRAM

The largest crowd to ever turn out to commencement exercises of the local schools attempted to get in the large auditorium of the Carnegie Library Friday evening, but many were turned away.

The exercises were scheduled to begin at eight o'clock, but for thirty minutes before that hour the auditorium was packed to standing room, and the crowd back to the side walk in front of the building.

Many who could not get in either returned to their homes, went to the picture shows, or spent the time playing forty-two and dominoes in the reading rooms of the library.

The crowd was swelled to the record breaking point by the large number and popularity of the 1921 class. There were twenty young men and twenty-four young ladies in the class, and their kinfolks and friends enthusiastically turned out to see the finishing touch put to their high school days.

The auditorium was decorated for the occasion and the members of the class were linked together with class colors as they filed into the room and took their seats on the stage, while the high school orchestra played the sweet strains of a march.

Despite the jam incident to the overflow and the fact that many were standing uncomfortably, the order and attention was good as the commencement program was carried out just as published.

The prelude by the high school orchestra paved the way for an outburst of applause, and each number on the program was well rendered and received.

Rev. C. E. Simpson offered the invocation, and the class followed with a chorus. A musical duet by Misses Marthyle Bridwell and Allie Mae Radican was an enjoyable feature, as was a piano solo by Miss Ludric Stroble, and a duet by Misses Lola Eubank and Beulah Witt. Miss Naomi Knowles delivered the salutatory and Miss Naomi Golden the valedictory.

The address of the evening was delivered by Judge J. H. Baugh. Judge Baugh's address was along educational lines and things he said will no doubt remain in the memory of the class for life, and prove helpful to them.

Dr. S. B. Raby, president of the school board, delivered diplomas to the thirty-four graduates, and Superintendent J. M. Skinner presented scholarships to those making high grade, for which a number of scholarships were offered.

Dr. Alvin Swindell pronounced the benediction which dismissed the large crowd, many of whom stood throughout the two hours. The exercises marked the closing of one of the most successful terms in the history of the local schools.

GOOD PROGRESS ON RUSSELL WELL

A car load of casing for the well which the Russell Production Company will spud in on the Russell ranch fifteen miles East of Ballinger, at an early date, arrived Friday, and is being unloaded and trucked to the field.

The Russell Production Co. is making good progress in getting in shape to spud in the new well, and actual drilling will be underway just as soon as the rigging can be put in shape to begin plugging away with the big bit.

This is the most promising development in the Ballinger field at this time and will be watched with interest.

NATION TO PAUSE FOR FUNERAL

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The whole nation, as represented by its government, joined today in paying last honors to the late Chief Justice Edward Douglass White.

By order of the president all activities of the executive departments, which were suspended for the funeral this morning, will remain suspended all day. The Senate stood adjourned until Monday and all courts in the city are recessed.

The funeral was private, made so by request of the family, was arranged in no sense as an official occasion, but the position the chief justice held in the affairs of the country made it impossible to eliminate what amounted to official mourning.

Among those attending besides President Harding were Justice White's associates on the supreme bench as honorary pallbearers; Vice President Coolidge, select committees from the House and Senate, and a full delegation of congressmen and jurists from the native state of deceased, Louisiana, as well as cabinet members.

The funeral arrangements provided for high requiem mass at St. Matthew's church, following the ceremonies at the family home. Interment took place in Oakhill Cemetery at Georgetown.

Simultaneous with the hour of the funeral, President Harding ordered the American flag, wherever flown, to be at half mast, and a funeral salute of seventeen guns be fired at the United States military and naval stations throughout the world.

GETS 99 YEARS FOR MURDER

VICTORIA, Tex., May 21.—The jury in the case of Lonnie Lindberg, charged with the murder of Alex Lind, a Victoria jitney driver, who was killed on the Victoria-Goliad road last February, today returned a verdict of guilty. The defendant was sentenced to 99 years in the penitentiary.

COLORADO CITY VISITOR CATCHES PRIZE FISH

Mr. A. L. Whipkey, of the Whipkey Printing Co., of Colorado, Texas, who has been spending the week with his old friend and former partner, D. Reeder, went down on the Concho fishing Thursday afternoon. He was accompanied by another of his old time friends, Walter Page, of our city, who used to fish with Mr. Whipkey in McLennan county. They arrived on the scenic banks of the historic Concho about 3:00 o'clock Thursday and fished faithfully until 11:00 o'clock at night without a catch. Whipkey began to think that the name of the Concho had been in vain ever rated, until Friday morning they began to "bite." After stringing 57 cats and gaspers (from one to three pounds in weight), Whipkey hooked a whale as he thought, and after a fight of about 30 minutes and with Page's help, landed a yellow cat which weighed 12 1/2 pounds. These men fished with rod and reel only and this fish was landed with a small bronze hook, red worm bait, and a 35-pound test silk line. Can any of the local fishermen beat it? Mr. Whipkey left for home Saturday evening, but says he is coming back.

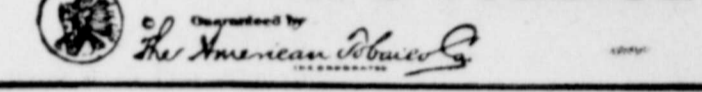

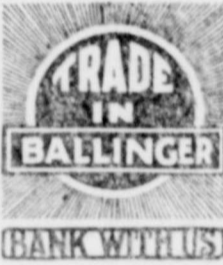
