BRITISH TROOPS GO TO SILESIA

LONDON, May 23.—The British government has decided to send troops into Upper Silesia at an early date, it was announced today.

LONDON, May 23.—The correspondent of the London Times at Oppeln, in reporting German irregular military operations in Upper Silesia, declared today that Germany has been concentrating forces and making preparations in that area for a fortnight. The dispatches said that the activity of the Germans indicate that they were planning to make a determined effort to recover possession of Upper Silesia from the Poles.

PARIS, May 23.—The allied high command in Upper Silesia sent a delegation to intervene with both the Germans and the Poles in an endeavor to obtain a cessation of all military operations in that territory, according to French official dispatches received here today.

FATHER AND SON HELD FOR KILLING AT SONORA

SONORA, Tex., May 23.—Complaints charging assault with intent to murder Nelson McNeill, were filed at this place today against Dick Harris and son H. S. Harris, both of Valley Mills. The two men furnished bond in the sums of one thousand dollars each.

The charges against Harris and son grew out of the killing of Dorothy Harris, daughter and sister of the two men, and the killing of McNeill, who was eloping with the girl when overtaken here by the father and son. Harris had refused to permit his daughter to marry McNeill, and the elopers were chased four hundred miles before the running gun fight in which the boy and girl were killed, took place eleven miles Southeast of this place late Saturday.

SONORA, May 23.—The body of Nelson McNeill, fiance of Elizabeth Dorothy Harris, wounded in battle between himself, Dick Harris and H. S. Harris, father and brother of the girl, was found about twelve miles Southeast of here yesterday.

McNeill died from wounds either self-inflicted, or from wounds received from gunshots in the hands of Harris and his son. The officers have not determined whether the dead man's bride died from gunshot wounds at the hands of her father and brother, or whether the young man killed the girl as claimed by the father and son. Harris and son are being held pending further investigation.

SONORA, May 22.—The chase of an eloping couple ended near the Joe Wyatt pasture 11 miles southeast of here at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon, when Elizabeth Dorothy Harris, 20 years old, was shot and killed in a pistol duel between her father, Dick Harris, her brother, H. S. Harris, with her fiance, Nelson McNeill. All the participants are from Valley Mills, Bosque county, 25 miles Northwest of Waco. The condition of Mr. McNeill is not known. A posse of thirty or more persons, led by B. W. Hutcherson, sheriff of Sutton county, is still searching the neighborhood near the Joe Wyatt pasture, in an effort to locate the young man. Blood stains on the ground too far distant from

where Miss Harris was found, indicate that McNeill was wounded. At 1 o'clock this morning the posse had not returned and it is believed that the search will have to be given up until daylight.

No arrests had been made this morning. Mr. and Mrs. Harris, the parents of the dead girl, and their son, have remained in the McDonald Hotel here, awaiting the return of the searching party. H. B. Balch, Sutton county justice of the peace, conducted a short preliminary investigation last night, but the formal inquest will not be held until Monday morning. Dr. A. G. Blanton, Sonora physician, who attempted to reach the young woman before she died, said that death was almost instantaneous. The body was taken in charge by San Angelo undertakers late today and arrived here after midnight.

Nelson McNeill and Miss Harris had been sweethearts for some time, according to the father's story, and he and Mrs. Harris had objected to the young man's attentions to their daughter. The girl left home last Saturday, according to the story told by her parents, saying that she was going to Waco. When she did not return as expected, the parents set out in search of her, suspecting that she had eloped with McNeill.

The parents of the girl went to Waco but in a search there failed to find her. While in Waco they received word that she was in Dallas and was well. They immediately went to Dallas, but found there that the telegram which they had received was false, McNeill, they allege, having induced a friend to send a false wire to the searching party.

McNeill was known to make frequent trips to the section around Del Rio and suspecting he would make for this section, Mr. and Mrs. Harris and son set out for this part of the state to continue their search for the fleeing couple. They left Waco Friday morning, arriving in Sonora about noon Saturday.

While Mr. Harris was making inquiries about the couple and giving a description of the car which they were driving, the couple drove down the main street of Sonora. McNeill and Harris saw each other almost simultaneously and like two mighty racing cars on a cross country run, the cars sped out of Sonora.

McNeill had ruined one of the casings on his car and was driving on the rim. He had stopped at the town for repairs, but when he recognized Mr. Harris he immediately threw his car in gear and took flight. Mr. Harris, his wife and son jumped into their

HARDING HONORS NEFF RESUMES FIRST WAR DEAD SPEAKING TOUR

NEW YORK, May 23.—President Harding arrived here today from Washington on the Mayflower. He and his party landed at West 96th Street to engage in the day's program, which if carried out as per schedule will leave scarcely a minute's rest.

The Mayflower was saluted by all manner of crafts as the yacht steamed up the Hudson in the center of a great line of destroyers which arrived here last week from the South. The president received another salute of twenty guns as he put off in the yacht's barge for the naval landing station.

Amid a constant boom of guns the swift little craft darted with the president's party toward where thousands of persons were massed along the river side drive to greet the nation's chief executive at the dock where hundreds of blue jackets were stationed. "It must not be again." With these solemn words the president today laid a wreath on the coffin of the first American soldier killed on German soil at the funeral ceremony for five thousand war dead at the army piers in Hoboken.

With his voice husky and his eyes dimmed with tears the president gazed upon rows and rows of coffins and then said: "one thousand sorrows are touching my heart. It must not be again, and God grant that it will not be."

The governor will be accompanied by Adjutant General Barton.

NUTS
"Unless the little nuts turn loose and drop off, the peanut crop this year will be the best in many years," says the Ballinger Daily Ledger. Reports received here state that the trees are 'loaded' with little peans. The next two or three weeks will carry the crop through the danger period."

A good peans crop will help a great big section of country in West central Texas, that is, if they can be marketed profitably. It is a growing industry. It takes a long time for returns to be realized, but they are worth it when they do come in. An acre devoted to the best peans pays better dividends than almost anything to which it could be planted and that without a great amount of labor.

This section had the pean industry thrust upon it. They just naturally raised more than they could do anything with wild, and now have started out to develop the industry along scientific lines. By grafting and budding and planting the best varieties the old trees can be utilized, some of them having great strength, and new ones can be brought up which will make the pean one of the big money crops in time, of the section.—Temple Telegram.

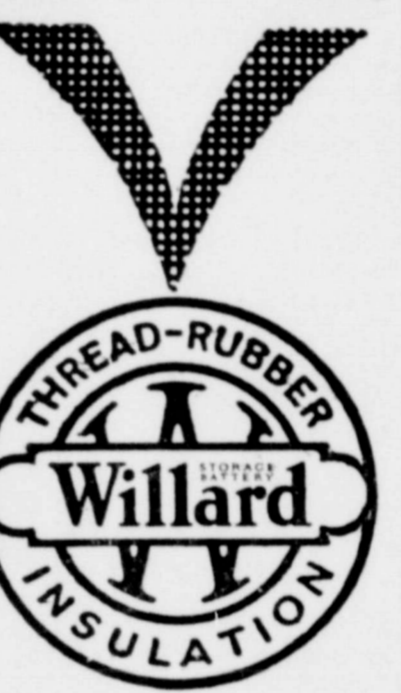

car and followed closely. When about eleven miles out of town, the wheel from which the casing had been removed on McNeill's car, gave way and the fugitives were forced to abandon the auto. Leaving the car, they had run but about a hundred yards from the road, when their pursuers reached the broken down machine.

Mr. Harris says that as he jumped from his car McNeill opened fire with a pistol. The fire was returned from the searching party, altho it was not determined Saturday night just who fired the shots. The father, however, said he fired at McNeill with a shotgun sometime during the fight.

Preliminary investigation had failed to disclose the person who fired the shots which ended the life of Dorothy Harris. H. S. Harris, the brother of the girl, says his sister had started toward her parents when they approached and that McNeill seized her, fired the three shots that killed her, and then turned the weapon upon himself in an attempt to commit suicide. He said that McNeill shot himself in the forehead, inflicting a wound which may prove fatal.

One of the shots entered the girl's abdomen, passing thru her body, another in the right breast and the other in the right side of her neck, the last bullet ranging upward and lodging in her left cheek.
