U. S. SEIZES BERG'S WEALTH

PHILADELPHIA, May 27.—All property in Philadelphia of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, valued at \$850,000.00, was seized today by Colonel Thomas W. Miller, alien property custodian of the United States.

100 LOCAL FANS SEE ANGELO GAME

SAN ANGELO, May 27.—The wildness of Hank Baldrige and errors at critical stages proved costly Thursday to the Ballinger Bear Cats in their initial appearance at Fort Coneho Park, and San Angelo, by copping the opening engagement of the three-game series, 7 to 2, kept pace with Abilene and held fast to the second rung in the West Texas League ladder.

About 100 Ballinger fans motored over to see their newly acquired club in action and the rooting between the rival factions was the most spirited seen here this year, boding well for the sport in the two towns. When Vernon Brown, former Nag center fielder, who was sold last week to Ballinger, stepped to the plate in the first inning he was presented with a huge floral bouquet from his recent teammates and the San Angelo club officials.

Only three men faced Baldrige in the opening stanza, while Liles, who walked, was the only Bearcat to reach first. Baldrige opened the second, however, by passing Cronkrite, whiffing Burleson, then walking Truesdale, Kelly and McKay, forcing in a run. Lefty was derided and Truesdale stole home when Catcher Burch let the ball get away on an attempted squeeze play. Weber got a single off Crockett, who had relayed Baldrige, and Kelly and McKay spiked the rubber. Weber went to third on the relayed throw home and tallied on a passed ball. Higginbotham fanned and Lewis grounded out. Fuller to Nokes, ending the session.

NEGRO HANGS AT PARIS TEXAS

PARIS, Tex., May 27.—Virgil Simpson, age forty, negro, was hanged in the county jail here today for criminal assault on a white girl several months ago. The hanging was private, only the officers and a physician being admitted to the jail.

After being placed on the scaffold and given a chance to make a last statement, the condemned man reiterated his previous confession that he murdered Mrs. Luther Wadford and her six year old daughter. He made no reference to the crime for which he was put to death, only talking about the crime which he confessed to after being convicted for the assault, and which had not been charged to him.

FIRST BALE BRINGS \$1300 ON TRIAL FOR KILLING OFFICER

HOUSTON, May 27.—The first bale of this season's cotton which reached Houston from San Benito late Thursday, fourteen days earlier than for any previous record, sold at auction here today. The bale brought \$1300. It weighed 634 pounds and was classed as strict middling.

BOUNDARY SUIT BACK IN COURT

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Vagaries of the Red River brought the Texas and Oklahoma oil land dispute back to the Supreme Court today, when Attorney General Daugherty sought further legal proceedings to find the South bank boundary by the court.

Attorney General Daugherty recommended today to the Supreme Court that the Federal receiver, Delano, now in charge of the oil lands involved in the original boundary suit, be induced to stop further drilling, and not put down any more wells, except where required to do so in order to hold the leases, until the oil market recovers.

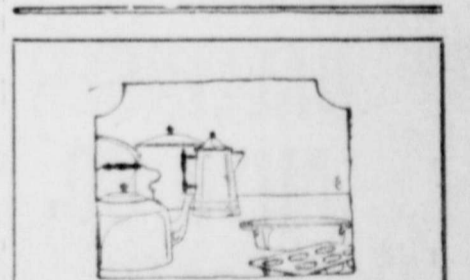
EL PASO, May 27.—The taking of testimony was begun here today in the case of C. P. Shearman and his sons, Neil, John and Allen, and Thomas Mendoza, charged with killing prohibition enforcement officer C. Arch Wood, last March 21st, after four days spent in examining 304 talesmen. The jury was completed late Thursday, and court recessed until this morning when the state began introducing testimony.

Mr. Wood was one of the most popular officers in West Texas, having resided for many years at Abilene, and in Taylor county, and the Shearman family was prominent in this section, which has brought a large crowd of spectators here and the court room is crowded.

Wood was shot and killed while searching for liquor alleged to have been on the Shearman ranch five miles East of El Paso. He was approaching on the ranch house when shots fired from the house killed him.

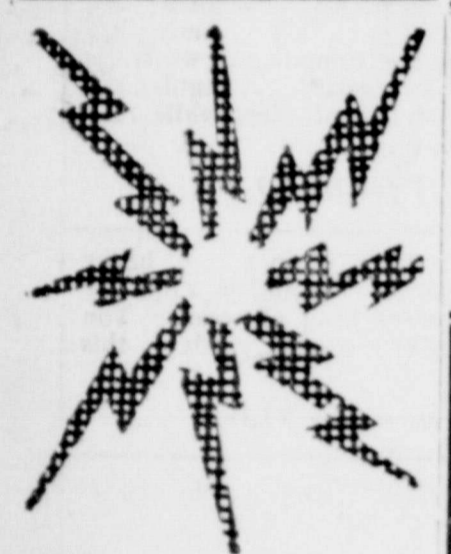

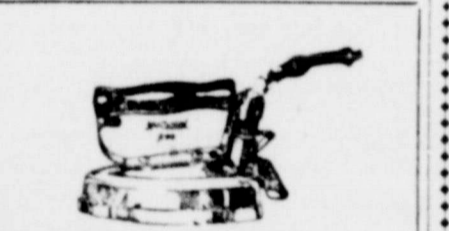

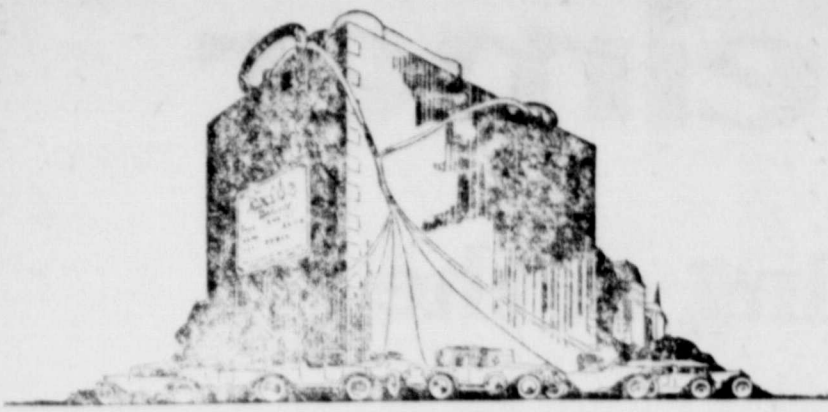
