MEX. NOT READY FOR BOLSHIEVISM TRAINED STOCK MEN ARE READY

MEXICO CITY, May 31.—Bolshivism will not be countenanced in Mexico, declared Antonio Diaz Soto Y. Gama, socialist leader in the Chamber of Deputies. Senor Gama has long been recognized as the irreconcilable radical chief and has been charged by his political opponents as having planned an invasion of the lower House of the Mexican congress by alleged bolsheviks two weeks ago.

In his statement today, Senor Gama said, "Mexico is not prepared for bolshevism. Its proletarian classes, because of their lack of education, experience and general worldly knowledge, are not in a position to supplement the present ruling class."

Local newspapers attach much importance to Senor Gama's utterance, and believe that it puts to rest a rumor that bolshevism would invade Mexico.

The Business League and the County Agent have received information from the Federal Board for Vocational Training that the Board is in a position to furnish trained men to the stock growers, poultry men and truck growers of this section free of charge.

The men in question have completed the two year course in agriculture at Texas A. & M., specializing in Animal Husbandry, Stock Farm Management, Dairy Cattle, Hogs, Poultry and Truck Gardening. They have been educated at the expense of the government, from the fact that they are disable ex-service men. They have had experience along these lines before entering the army or attending A. & M., and have been given this special training to qualify them for work along these particular lines.

They will be paid subsistence allowance by the government after they leave school, and for a reasonable length of time after they are placed on the job, and until they receive sufficient practical training to qualify them for managerial work.

These men are very high class employes, and are intended to thus qualify themselves for work requiring specialized training and experience. Stock farmers and others in this section who are contemplating employing men of this calibre can secure their services free by applying either to Mr. Williams or to Mr. Eaton in the Ledger building.

HOTEL WOMEN HELD ON BOOZE CHARGE

(San Angelo Standard)

Mrs. Little Bird and Mrs. Lula Gamble, both of Brownwood, were brought here Sunday by R. D. Shumate, prohibition officer, and placed in the Tom Green county jail on a charge of possessing and selling intoxicating liquor. Complaint was filed in the Federal court and the women were lodged in jail pending the fixing of bail by the clerk of the court.

Mrs. Bird is the proprietor of the Frisco Hotel at Brownwood, the prohibition officer said, and Mrs. Gamble was in her employ. The liquor, it is alleged, was being served at the hotel at 50 cents a drink. Quite a quantity of the liquor, which was of a poor grade, was confiscated and destroyed by the officers, it is said. Enough of the liquor was retained by the officer to serve as evidence against the accused women.

It is alleged that a quantity of the liquor was found cached in a compartment closed with a trap door. Brownwood officers have been working on the case for several months, suspecting that whiskey was being dispensed at the hotel. The two women arrested in connection with the find, claim that the whiskey, which was confiscated by the prohibition officers, was left in their care by a man who promised to pay them \$150 if they would take care of the goods until called for.

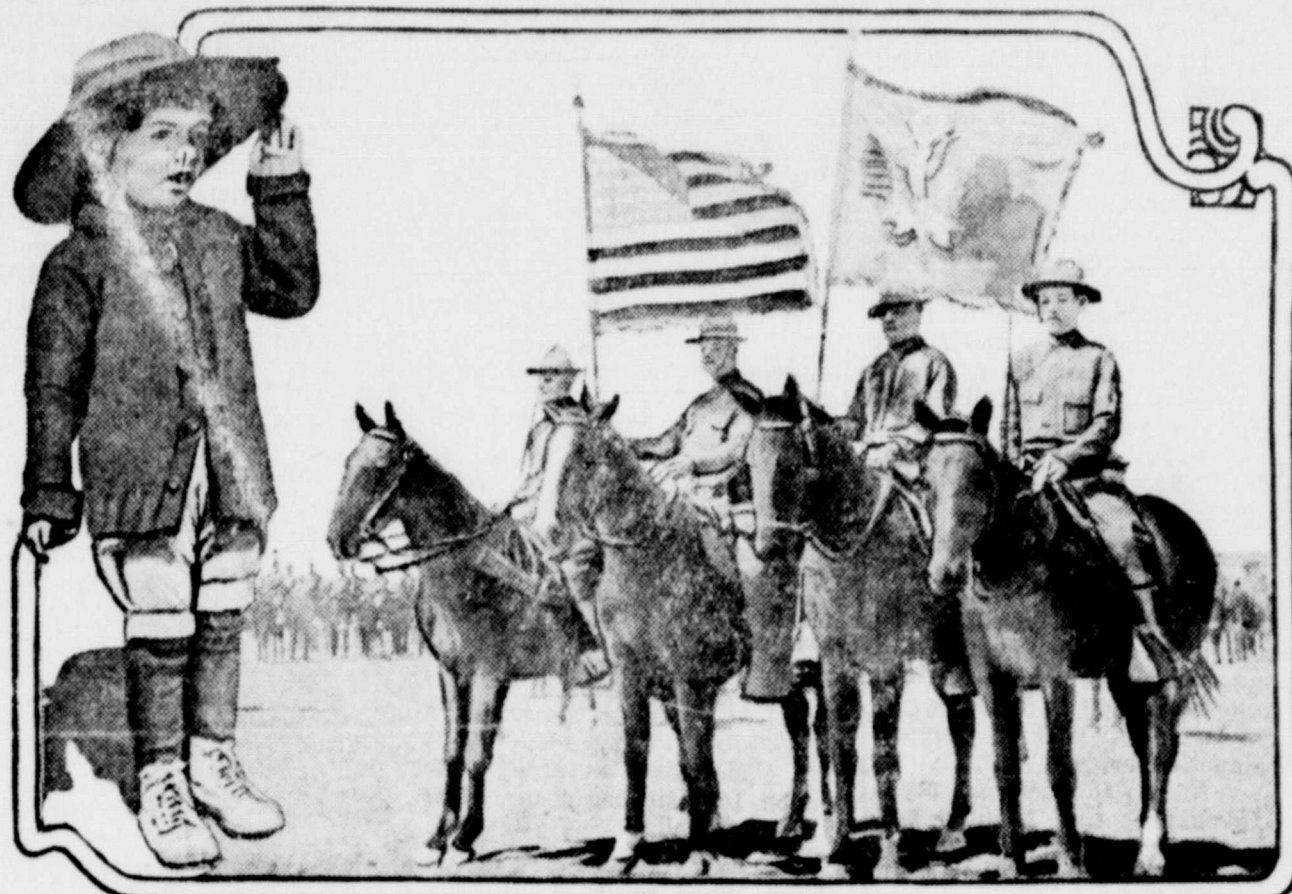

CLAIM FARMERS BUYING ONLY NECESSITIES

SHERMAN, Tex., May 31.—Farmers of Texas, who have not been buying freely since January 1, still are buying only necessities, according to officials of the Texas Retail Merchants' Association.

The restricted buying on the part of the farmers was attributed by S. C. Swain, president of the association, to the scarcity of money in the farmers' possession, the unwillingness of the merchant to open a new account with last year's account unpaid and the farmers' feeling that all merchandise should be reduced to compare with the price of cotton. There has been nothing in Texas to indicate a "buyers' strike" on the part of the farmers, according to Mr. Swain and Adolf Grasso, secretary-treasurer of the merchants' association.

Although the purchases of farmers are smaller, merchants report there are as many customers as before. "It is a fact, however, that the farmers in many sections are hard pressed and that they buy only those things which are absolutely necessary," Mr. Grasso said.

HOUSTON HAS GREATEST CITY INDEBTEDNESS NOW

AUSTIN, May 31.—Houston led the cities of Texas with bonded indebtedness on June 30, 1920, the report of the comptroller of public account showed. The report compiled from city treasurers' reports submitted on June 30, 1920, has just been announced.

Houston was in debt \$15,982,750 with Dallas coming second with \$9,212,500, and San Antonio third with \$8,461,500. The report showed that only 89 cities had bonded indebtedness on that date. Of those, El Campo and Kerrville each had \$3000, while Luling had \$6,000. Austin, Beaumont, Corpus Christi and Paris were the only cities beside Houston, Dallas and San Antonio whose indebtedness ran over a million dollars.

TEXAS BRANDED AS LAND GRABBER

WASHINGTON, May 31.—The State of Texas is attacked as a "would be land grabber" in briefs filed today in the Supreme Court by Frank W. Clancy, counsel for New Mexico, in an original petition filed by that state against Texas to obtain the official delimitation of the interstate boundary along the Rio Grande river.

Declaring that the present claim of Texas would put the Rio Grande on "rocky bluffs or sand hills far above any possible river bed," the brief called attention of the court to what it described as "the predatory and unscrupulous character of the defendant, (Texas), in land matters."

TWELVE HURT IN EXPLOSION

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Three officers and eight enlisted men in the army air service were injured, some seriously, today, when a bomb exploded while being placed aboard a vessel at the army proving grounds at Aberdeen, Maryland.

STATE COMPTROLLER IS SHORT OF FUNDS

AUSTIN, May 31.—State Comptroller Lon D. Smith is issuing deficiency certificates in paying fees of sheriffs, county and district attorneys and county and district clerks because of the lack of funds with which to meet these expenditures. The thirty-sixth legislature appropriated \$354,000 for this purpose and the fund is entirely expended, according to the comptroller.

With each certificate the comptroller is advising the receiver to hold it until the legislature convenes in special session on July 11th, when the amount necessary to meet the certificates will be requested.

The legislature at the special session will be asked to renew a fund of \$60,000 by an appropriation to meet expenses of sheriffs, county and district attorneys and county and district clerks. This fund was appropriated by the last legislature and approximately \$5,000 remains, according to Comptroller Smith. This will have been expended by the time the special session convenes, he said, because of the large number of "bootlegging" cases being tried.

The fund originally was intended to pay the fees of the county and district court officials at examining trials.

PRYOR TELLS NEFF NOTHING DOING

HOUSTON, May 31.—W. G. Pryor, member of the State Prison Commission, said today that he had no intention of resigning and that Governor Neff's latest bill of particulars against him has only strengthened his determination to "stand by his guns."

Mr. Pryor said that he would have written a statement sooner answering every allegation the governor had made against him, and added, "but at this time I have nothing to say, except that the charges are untrue and there is no possibility of my resignation being given to the governor."

CUTTING CREDIT IS HURTING SOUTH

WASHINGTON, May 31.—A formal expression by Secretary Hoover of the belief that extended credit facilities are vitally needed in the Southern cotton states and that Federal reserve credit curtailments having served their purpose, "are now bringing great hardships," is contained in a letter from Mr. Hoover which was made public today by former Senator McLaurin, of South Carolina. Mr. McLaurin conferred with Secretary Hoover last week.

TOO LATE IN OIL POLICY

WASHINGTON, 31.—With the exception of two assertions of the Netherlands government that the United States had entered its protest against duties imposed in the oil policy in the Djambi oil fields, it is too late to affect the operation of that policy is the position taken by the American government.

This information was given out in a new note which the United States government announced today had been dispatched to The Hague.

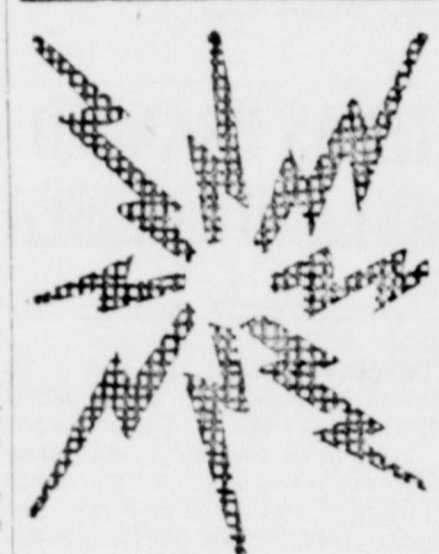

NITROS WALK OFF WITH FIRST GAME

The first game played at home by the Ballinger Bearcats was lost first in the first inning, and within twenty minutes after the ump announced the batteries and said "play ball."

Crockett, pitching for the locals, walked five men, forced in the first run, and later hits in the first inning sent five members of the Ranger Nitros over the rubber, and gave the visitors a lead which could not be overcome by desperate efforts.

However, the jinx was on the job, and right at a time when success for the locals seemed to be in sight, the visitors pulled out of the hole.

While the Bearcats suffered defeat in the first game at home, local fans who witnessed them in action for the first time, were well pleased, and saw in the game the strength of the locals in fielding work and at the bat. It is early in the season and there is plenty of time for the team to get from under.

CHANCE TO HELP STARVING PEOPLE ABILENE SCOUTS ON 10 DAYS CAMP

This city is to have a hand in saving the lives of starving people in the famine districts of China, according to the plans perfected at a meeting held at the Y. M. B. L. Monday morning when a Chinese Relief Committee was appointed, and the week of June 6th to 13th fixed for campaign week in this city.

Mrs. Tabor, of Dallas, representing the Central Relief Committee, was present, and presented the subject, and briefly told what was being done by other cities in making up the Texas quota, which amounts to \$250,000.

Rev. C. E. Simpson acted as temporary chairman of the meeting and the following named parties constitute the campaign committee:

J. W. Powell, chairman; A. W. Sledge, secretary; R. G. Erwin, treasurer; with a publicity committee composed of A. W. Sledge, Stuart Williams, and all of the members of the local pastors' association. The committee on appeal is composed of E. D. Walker, E. Shepperd, R. W. Bruce, Mrs. Scott H. Mack and Mrs. J. H. Baugh.

The committee will be called together at an early date and plans for the drive next week worked out.

This is a matter in which Ballinger cannot afford to fall down. China is a friendly nation to the United States. The Chinese aided the allies during the war, furnishing 750,000 men, and supplies. China is looking to the United States for aid because China is under the influence of the American nation, her government being patterned after the United States government.

1,000 people are dying daily in the famine district of China. No relief in their own land can be had until the present crop begins to come in in July. This appeal is expected to be the last, and \$1 will save a life for one month. Ballinger should do her part, and we believe will do her part in saving the starving of that country.

The quota for Ballinger will be fixed by the committee at its next meeting, and an effort will be made to raise the full quota next week.

About fifty Boy Scouts passed through the city Monday en route from Abilene to Paint Rock, where they will go on the Concho and establish a camp for a ten day's outing. The company was made up of Troops 1, 2 and 3, and are in charge of Scoutmaster Willis P. Gerhart, and Dr. W. C. Neal, who was the guest of the Scouts. Scoutmaster Tom Payne will join the encampment and have charge of the drill work while the boys are on the river.

The Scouts were traveling in autos, accompanied by a large truck conveying the camp equipment to the grounds, and special accommodations will be provided at the camp grounds for ladies who are expected to visit the camp from Abilene.

A cook, who was formerly chef of the Country Club in Memphis, Tenn., has been secured for the camp, and will have charge of

that important part of the outing. The boys are expecting to have the time of their lives.

MEXICANS FIRED INTO BASEBALL CROWD AS DECISION PROTESTED

NOGALES, Ariz., May 31.—Mexican soldiers were called out today to quell a clash between several thousand spectators during a baseball game at Nogales, Sonora, and fired several rounds into the crowd, wounding three Mexicans, one seriously.

Spectators swarmed on the field to protest a decision by the umpire in the ninth inning in a game between the Douglass, Arizona and Nogales, Sonora, teams. Douglas was leading 3 to 0 in the ninth inning when the Sonora team got two men on bases with none out. A throw to second base caught a runner off base and the umpire called him out.

Efforts to disperse the crowd failed and Mexican soldiers were summoned. They fired about 50 shots into the crowd which quickly scattered. The game was not completed. Several hundred Americans were among the spectators.

ALBERTA, meaning nobly bright, has its origin in the Teutonic language. It is one of the names coming from the nobility of which Aethel is the root.

Aethelbryht was its first form, though it was a masculine name and was given to the first Christian king of England. The famous bishop of Prague, who was martyred near Dantzic while preaching to the heathen Prussians in 997, was called Adalbrecht and his fame spread the use of the name throughout a great part of Europe.

Italy received it and straightway changed it to Alberta. It is from this latter that the feminine forms, Alberta and Albertine, were formed. The husband of the late Queen Victoria, who bore the name of Albert, brought both the masculine and feminine into great vogue in England. Indeed, it has since been accepted as a national name.

But, like all names which have a masculine and feminine equivalent, Alberta has no really individual existence. After all, she is merely a masculine name with a feminine termination. But unlike many of her contemporaries, such as Edwina and Roberta, she is almost frivolously feminine and is not regarded as a substitute name for the hoped-for son and heir who was to have been called Albert.

Jade is Alberta's talismanic stone. It has the power to assure its wearer great prosperity, and freedom from danger and disease. But it should never be removed from the finger, arm, or throat on which it is worn. Monday is Alberta's lucky day and 1 her lucky number.
