"Plans for carrying the fight for a tariff on Southern products to the Senate finance committee when the tariff bill comes up before that body for consideration, will be discussed at the meeting of the Southern Tariff Congress here Saturday, according to W. M. Massie, president of the local chamber of commerce and a director of the Southern Tariff Association, which is holding the congress. The failure of the sub-committees of the ways and means committee to specify a sufficient rate of duty on hides, vegetable and mineral oils, is a distinct blow to the industries, according to Mr. Massie, and every effort will be made to get the finance committee of the Senate to raise the rate of duty to a figure that will enable producers to compete with foreign products. Besides President Massie, speakers for the tariff congress are John H. Kirby, of Houston, President of the Southern Tariff Association; R. L. Henry, of Waco; Nathan Adams, of Dallas; Thos. L. Blanton, congressman from Texas; W. W. Turney, of El Paso, president of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association; N. A. Shaw, of Texarkana, president of the Texas Farmers' League; Louis J. Wortham, of Ft. Worth; Will H. Gray, of Tulsa, Oklahoma; Ike T. Pryor, of San Antonio; Geo. M. Thurmond, of Del Rio; Ed Woodall, of Hillsboro; Walter Cline, of Wichita Falls; E. G. Senter of Arlington; and others. Many prominent club women from different parts of Texas are expected to attend the congress here to listen to the tariff discussions.

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## TRADE DAY PLAN; FATHER OF GIRL COLD CHECK TALK GIVEN 99 YEARS

The marking of county roads and the placing of proper signals thereon, was one of the topics discussed at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Business League last night. The committee appointed to confer with the County Commissioners on this point stated that the Commissioners were anxious to have this work done, but could not get the co-operation from the road overseers, the state law governing the marking of roads by overseers makes it a fineable offense to neglect this duty. Letters were read from the Automobile Club of Texas stating that their pathfinder car would pass thru Ballinger this month. If the road conditions thru here are favorable in the above respects, the Auto Club will divert all East and West traffic from the Bankhead Highway to the Brownwood-San Angelo route. The value of this move to the towns affected would be of inestimable value.

The matter of taking a new census of Ballinger was discussed, and it was decided to take action on this matter this fall, the present Federal census figures being considered a libel on the city.

The Board voted prize money and advertising for a monthly "Trades Day" to be held on the first Monday of each month. The prizes will be awarded for goat roping and similar contests. The merchants will be asked to feature special bargains on this day and to co-operate in restoring Ballinger's First Monday to the face of prominence it once occupied.

One of the directors reported that the Committee on Stock Selling, Charity, etc. was doing splendid work in keeping itinerant beggars and peddlers off the streets. A director from the Retail Merchants' Association present stated that they were getting results in the collection of cold checks, and that the attorney for the Association was planning to institute some criminal suits that would make examples of certain cold check artists.

A favorable report was made on the progress of the irrigation survey.

## FARM LOAN BILL PASSES SENATE

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Another farmers' relief measure bill by Senator Curtis, Republican, of Kansas, to loan up to fifty million dollars, was passed by the Senate today.

The bill proposes that the loan be distributed thru the Federal farm loan banks among farmers or not more than five and one-half per cent interest.

The bill passed the Senate with the early assurance that it would receive the approval of the House.

### BEARCAT BRIEFS

Vernon Brown  
Brown was born in Jewett, Leon County, Texas, in 1891. His first baseball experience was with high school and amateur clubs, including Santa Anna. He signed his first professional contract with Wichita Falls of the Texas-Oklahoma League in 1911, where he played for three years, with the exception of the latter part of the 1912 season when he played in several games with the St. Louis Browns. In 1914, he was sold to Ft. Worth, where he spent the entire season. He reported to the spring training camp of the Washington Senators in 1915, which team sent him to Guelph of the Canadian League for the '15 season. He spent the 1916 and 1917 seasons with Portland, Maine, of the Eastern League. During 1918 and part of 1919, he was involved in the misunderstanding with Germany. The latter part of 1919 and 1920, he was in the oil fields, playing with the Magnolia Club of Eastland. Luke Robinson signed him for the 1921 season, and sold him to Ballinger a week ago. It is reported that he was leading the West Texas League in hitting at the time of his sale. Brown has been made manager of the Bearcats, and will devote this summer to bringing a minor league pennant to the "biggest little city in Texas."

## DEATH LIST DWINDLES; PROPERTY LOSS HIGH

NEW YORK, June 2.—The Association for the Advancement of Colored People, today telegraphed Governor Robertson, of Oklahoma, asking him to use his full powers to stop the "reign of terror" in Tulsa. The association offered the Oklahoma governor its cooperation, and announced in the telegram that it expected to send representatives to Tulsa to ascertain the cause of the disorder.

TULSA, Okla., June 2.—As the situation rapidly quieted down here today and peace was restored throughout the city, the estimate of killed and wounded in the race rioting dwindled. It is known that nine white men are dead, and fifteen dead negroes have been accounted for. The situation is rapidly becoming normal, and the customary crowds are on the streets today.

Outside of the horrors of the killing and wounding which resulted from the series of race battles, thousands of homeless negroes today presents the most serious problem for the citizens of this city to deal with.

All that was left today of hundreds of negro homes bunched in the negro settlement of the city fired by white rioters, was a blackened waste of curling column of smoke, and here and there a few shattered walls. The burned area is more than a mile square.

Virtually no buildings escaped. Many were cheap frame houses, but there were more than a score of substantial brick business houses. The negro church, recently completed at a cost of \$85,000.00 was destroyed.

Five thousand negroes are camped in the fair grounds under the protection of one thousand militiamen, and other negroes who fled from the city, came trickling back today. From five-thirty o'clock this morning—just about daylight, the negroes began coming from hiding places, some riding and others walking to their employment, returning to their work as though nothing but of the usual routine had taken place.

Some of the negroes returning to the city were wearing white handkerchiefs on their arms and others were tagged with ribbon badges bearing the wording, "Police Protection." Others went along without any marking of disinterestedness.

The citizens are being called upon to contribute clothing and bedding for the relief of the refugees. Since martial law was declared yesterday there has been no further indication of conflicts, and observers expressed the belief today that the flare of race feeling has died out. Adjutant General Barrett announced today that 250 of the 450 guardsmen here would be sent home later today.

Governor Robertson, who came here yesterday to assume personal charge of the situation in an effort to restore order, said today that he felt assured that the trouble was over. He said that he intended to stop the "reign of terror" in Tulsa. The association offered the Oklahoma governor its cooperation, and announced in the telegram that it expected to send representatives to Tulsa to ascertain the cause of the disorder.

TULSA, Okla., June 2.—At day break today this city was under strict martial law, and the authorities began a systematic stock taking of death and ruin, which, after hours of race rioting spread in its path Tuesday night and yesterday morning.

The military forces headed by Adjutant General Barrett, started a check list of the dead which an unofficial statement placed at somewhere near one hundred. Most of the dead are known to be negroes. The officials express the belief today that the trouble has been quelled, and no further outbreak is expected.

Eight white men were killed as far as check of the death list at the morgues disclosed. Some of the thirty-five injured white men in hospitals are expected to die. When the military forces comb the burned negro quarters a number of negro bodies are expected to be found. Today the bodies of fifteen negroes lay in the morgues unidentified or claimed.

The happy couple left for Abilene, and from there they will go to Amarillo, where they will make their home. This is a transaction in which Ballinger loses another one of her good girls. Miss Anna was born and raised in Ballinger, graduated in the Ballinger high school last year, and has been teaching in this county, her school having recently closed. She has many friends among all ages in Ballinger who bespeak for her the best protection and kindest love possible at the hands of the man she has chosen.

## WILL STRIVE TO KEEP OUT WAR

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 2.—The hope that this nation would never be called to fire another gun in war was again expressed by President Harding today in presenting diplomas to the graduating class of the naval academy here. Mr. Harding added a promise that while he was president the young men who are graduating from the academy today would never have to go to war except in a cause that squared with the American conscience.

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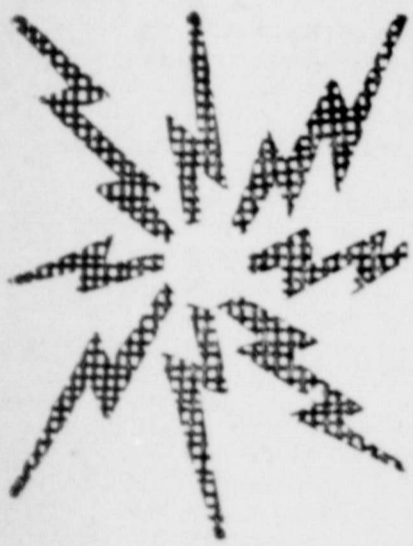

**Mother's Cook Book**

No price is set on the lavish summer. June may be had by the poorest corner.

EVERYDAY LUNCHEONS.

A GOOD all-round substantial dish which will do for a main dish is Potato Soup.

Cook one-half dozen good sized potatoes, one-half dozen onions together in boiling salted water until tender. Then press them through a puree sieve, add butter, milk, salt and pepper, and serve piping hot.

Luncheon Eggs.

Cut in slices three or four hard-cooked eggs. Prepare a rich white sauce, using two tablespoonfuls each of flour and butter, and when well blended add one cupful of rich milk; cook until smooth and thick, season with salt and pepper and stir in the eggs. Prepare small pieces of buttered bread, pour over the sauce and bake until hot in a moderate oven.

Potato Salad.

Cut in cubes three cold cooked potatoes, add three hard-cooked eggs, cut in bits, one-half cupful of walnuts and a dozen olives cut in small pieces. Pour over a French dressing made by using one tablespoonful of vinegar to three of oil, salt, cayenne pepper and a dash of catsup and onion juice.

Custard Pie.

Prepare a pastry-lined pie plate and fill with the following: One pint of milk mixed with four tablespoonfuls of sugar, creamed with a teaspoonful of butter; add three beaten eggs, a half teaspoonful of grated nutmeg and bake in a hot oven at first to brown the crust, then lower the heat until the custard seems firm to the center.

**THE RIGHT THING AT THE RIGHT TIME**

WHEN YOU DINE

"Practice yourself, for heaven's sake in little things and thence proceed to greater."—Epictetus.

NEVER take your seat until the lady of the house is seated. Never lounge on the table with your elbows nor tip backwards in your chair. Never play with your knives, forks or glasses, but cultivate repose at the table. It is an aid to digestion.

Never make diagrams on the tablecloth with your fork or spoon to illustrate what you are talking about. Never leave the table to get something that you want to show some one else at the table—to find a book to verify a quotation you have made or to settle a disputed point. These things can be attended to after the meal.

Never light cigar or cigarette unless you are asked to by your hostess or unless others are doing so. Never, under any circumstances, smoke between courses, but wait until after dessert when coffee is served.

Never tuck your napkin into your vest, yoke or collar. It is unfolded once and laid across the knees with out a flourish. After the meal, at a restaurant or formal dinner, lay it unfolded at your place. If you are a time guest in the household and will remain another meal, you may fold the napkin in its original creases.

Never put the end of a spoon into your mouth, sip everything from the side of the spoon, and do this noiselessly. Never use a spoon when a fork will serve. Forks are now often used for eating ice cream, and salad is folded or cut with the side of a fork, never with the knife. Even small vegetables like peas are eaten with a fork.

Never hold your knife and fork up in the air when your host is serving you afresh. Lay them on one side of the plate when you send it to the host by servant or your neighbor at table.

Never leave your spoon in coffee or tea cup. Lay it on the saucer. Never cool food by blowing upon it. Wait until it becomes cool enough to eat.

Never take a second helping at a large and formal dinner. You will find yourself eating alone.

Never make yourself conspicuous in any way by aiding the host or hostess in serving, unless especially asked to do so, or in passing dishes when servants are provided for that purpose.

Never push back your plate and finger crumbs at the conclusion of the meal. It indicates undue haste.

Telephone Improvement.

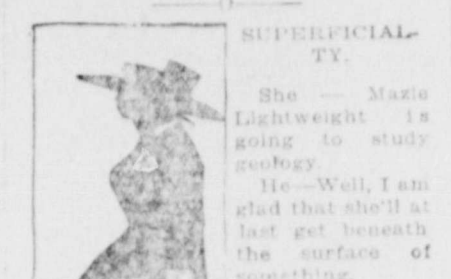

Common Errors in English and How to Avoid Them  
TO EXPECT AND TO THINK.

DO NOT use the word "expect" in the sense of suppose, believe or think. For example, the use of the word "expect" in the following sentence is incorrect: "I expect that your lessons are done." The verb "expect" means "to look forward to as probable or certain; to wait; to feel assured of something before it occurs; to anticipate," as, "I expect to go to church next Sunday. If the weather is fine." Usually we use "expect" when we look forward to an event with interest or desire. "One should not say, 'I expect it is still less, I expect it was.' We cannot expect the present or the past," says one authority. "England expects that every man will do his duty," was the signal hoisted by the famous British naval commander, Lord Nelson, at the mast-head of his flagship, before engaging the French fleet in the battle of Trafalgar.

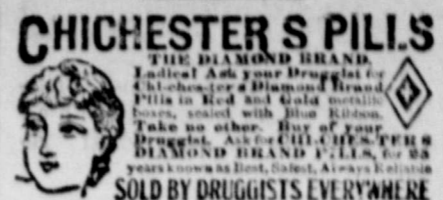
