TULSA, Okla., June 4 .- The last state guardsmen setn here to quell race rioting were withdrawn today leaving the city and county officials in charge. The local officers were reinforced by former service men, who were deputized as deputy sheriffs and police. The final summing up of the cost of the race war is given today as thirty-one lives and a million and a half dollars property damage.



This was the first direct dispatch received from Pueblo since the flood struck the city last night. The dispatches added that most of the lives lost were in the Grove district in the Southeastern part of the city.

DENVER, Colo., June 4 .- A cloudburst at Sawlos, fifteen Lon Poage, 35-year-old farm- miles West of Pueblo yesterday, sent the Arkansas river on a rampage within two hours. Messages received here early today said that five feet of water was standing in the streets of Pueblo, the flood sweeping through the Thele John Wiggins of May and union station. A brief telegram

All lights and telephones were put out of service, and parts of Pueblo were badly railroad equipment which was swept from the railroad yards. was covered with two feet of mud. The city was cut off from rail and wire communication for at 9:00 o'clock last night.

DENVER, Colo., June 4 .--Continued heavy rains early today extended little encouragement to Eastern Central Colorado, which yesterday was swept by the worst floods in the history of the state.

Meager reports indicated that the loss of property is running into millions of dollars with the heaviest loss at Pueblo, where a large part of the business secion of the city and several wealthy residential districts are inundated by waters from the Arkansas river. The known loss of life still remains at four.

PUEBLO, Colo., June 4 .-National guardsmen are today patrolling Pueblo and are permitting no one to enter the sections of the city which were flooded by waters from the Arkansas river. Several fires started by lightning raged unchecked today. All telegraph and felephone communication was lost at nine o'clock last night when the flood filled many business

1,200 INSANE IN TEXAS JAILS

Mr. Turner E. Campe, Vice Commander of the American Legion of Texas, met with a number of members of the local post last night, and told them what the Legion was attempting to do

"The American Legion is the only organization in existence today that is even trying to do anything for wounded, gassed, tubercular or needy soldiers,' Mr. Campe stated. "There are 1200 ex-soldiers of the World War lying in Texas jails today, insane from shell shock. These men could be restored to reason in one to five years if they received attention. 36,000 soldiers are bed-ridden in our army hospitals. Thousands of these have never received a cent of compensation from the government. Thousands of others over the
