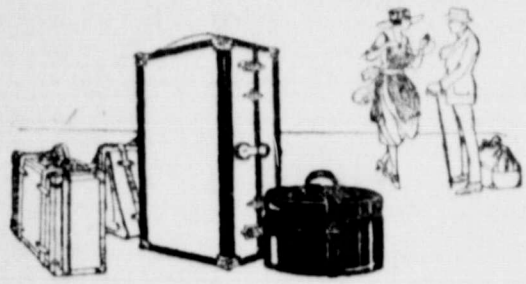

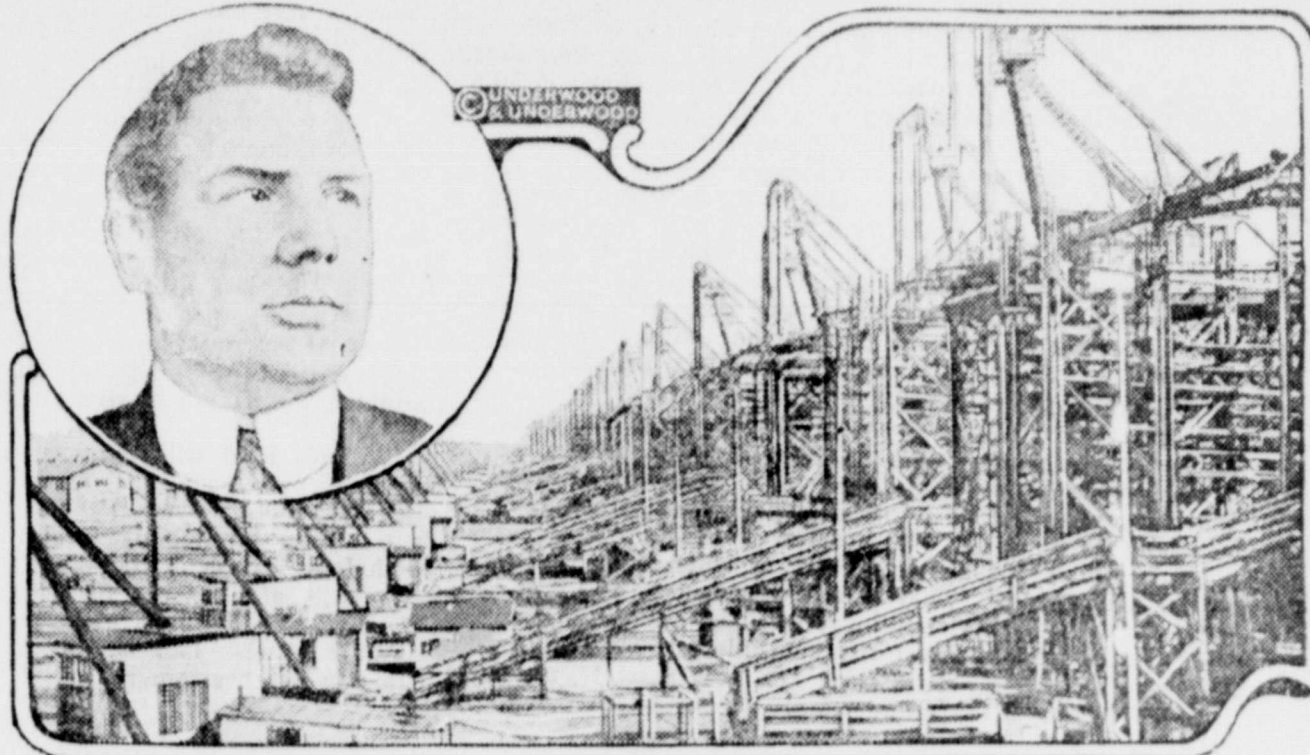
## SON OF JACK NICHOLS RECEIVES BAD INJURY

PUEBLO, Colo., June 6.—An accurate estimate of the loss of life and property is impossible. With morgues crowded, overflow hospitals turning patients to improvised relief stations, and thousands homeless, suffering

from exposure, every effort is being directed to the alleviation of the suffering. Dr. Heller, of the Red Cross, places the number of bodies found at 100. 500 are in temporary hospitals according to J. E. Morehead, secretary to the governor.

PUEBLO, Colo., June 6.—The flood stricken district of central Colorado today survey the havoc of the most disastrous flood in the history of the West. "Tell the world that we are going to rebuild," was the message Pueblo business men gave the Associated Press this afternoon. "Send out the word over your wires that we are going to have another city."

Optimistic signs began to appear in the windows of stores in the downtown district today. "Are we downhearted—No!—Let's go on!" read one sign in a furniture store, which had been several feet under water until today.

Enough tents, bedding, cooking utensils, and medical supplies arrived today from Denver to care for 2,000 of Pueblo's homeless. The work of establishing a refugee camp in Mineral Palace Park is underway.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Pueblo authorities in a telegram today to Representative Hardy, of Colorado, urged that Congress appropriate five million dollars immediately for the relief of the flood stricken area.

PUEBLO, Colo., June 6.—Gov. Shoup today asked the United States government to place twenty-five million dollars at the command of the state for use in the flood relief work.

PUEBLO, Colo., June 6.—Colorado state rangers have gone into the lowlands on the North side of Pueblo to give warning of the approach of floods from swallows. The warnings were issued on the strength of an Associated Press bulletin filed from the South side of Pueblo, which cannot be reached by the military forces from the North side headquarters because of the water over the approaches of all Union Avenue bridges.

DENVER, Colo., June 6.—The Platte river here went out of its banks at midnight and flooded several blocks of the West Side residential districts.

PECOS, Tex., June 6.—All Texas & Pacific railway through traffic is being detoured today via the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railroad between Sweetwater and Alpine, thence to and from El Paso on the Southern Pacific lines, owing to washouts of tracks and high water in the Pecos valley.

## PHONE RATES AT DALLAS CHANGED

DALLAS, June 6.—A compromise in the litigation between the city of Dallas and the telephone company over local telephone rental rates is insight here today, it was announced at the city hall.

Following a number of conferences by both sides, it was decided that a controversy which the city threatened to carry to the Supreme Court, would prove costly to both tax payers and the company. It is understood that the new proposal will include rental rates of three dollars per month on residence phones and \$7.50 per month on business phones, as compared with the present rates of \$4.10 respectively. The latter figures were put into effect through a Federal injunction against the city several months ago and will represent an increase of 100 per cent. The new schedule of rates will be submitted by the city.

## TELEGRAPH COMPANY WINS IN LAW SUIT

WASHINGTON, June 6.—The contents of the Western Union Telegraph Co. that it cannot be held liable for damages caused by errors in transmitting messages while its lines were under government control, was upheld today by the Supreme Court.

The decision in the South Carolina court awarding damages to S. B. Poston, a cotton dealer, was reversed.

HEAVY HITTING SPOILING SPORT

CHICAGO, June 6.—Heavy hitting is spoiling baseball, Manager Johnny Evers of the Chicago Cubs believes.

"The hard hitting is making life miserable for the infielders and is spoiling the game," said Evers, today. "The balls come down to the players so fast that there is a great danger of a man getting hurt and the players can't afford to take the chances they used to take on bad boppers.

"Unconsciously the infielders are getting in the habit of turning and fielding the ball sideways so as to avoid a possible accident, for they know the balls are hit so hard now that a bad hop into the fact would result in a broken jaw.

"Half a dozen players have been hurt already this season by being hit by batted balls and some of them were injured so badly that they were out of the game for many days.

"The clean fielding of a few years ago is impossible. They say the ball isn't any livelier, but it must be or it wouldn't travel so fast.

"Pulling an infield in to cut off a runner at the plate when a man is on third with none or one out is almost suicide now. When that close to the batter, the infielder is just trusting to providence that he doesn't get hurt.

"I suppose the fans like to see hitting, but they don't like to see loose fielding and no other kind is possible under present conditions.

BLONDES AND BRAINS

A LEARNED judge was recently quoted as announcing from his bench that he would not approve of blonde ladies as members of a jury which was about to hear a case under his jurisdiction.

"Blondes are fickle," were the words attributed to the justice, intimating that blondes are a bar to what the law is supposed to assure the person on trial.

A year or so ago a big Western employer in advertising for office help announced that he would not receive the applications of blondes, giving as a reason that he had found them inattentive to work and temperamental in disposition.

There has always been a good deal of discussion regarding the relative attractiveness of blondes and brunettes despite the fact that in the long ago when the caveman was the highest type of civilization, we were all blonde, or at least red hair was the darkest tint.

But the analyzing of society, ancient or modern, according to the color of the hair, would not furnish very substantial basis for judging either woman or men, blondes or brunettes.

WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO AID CLAIMS ON FREIGHT

Arrangements have been completed here to have the traffic department of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce handle on the percentage basis, loss and damage and overcharge claims on freight and express shipments for its members, according to information received today by the Y. M. B. L.

The charge for handling loss and damage claims will be 25 per cent of the amount collected, charge for handling overcharge claims will be on a basis of 50 per cent of the amount collected.

This service is one which has been requested by West Texas members many times, but owing to the great expense and amount of clerical work necessary to handle same a great deal of planning was necessary in order to perfect the bureau before the service could be installed.

May Allison, in her latest Metro production, "Are All Men Alike?" will be the feature attraction at the Maeroy Theatre tonight.

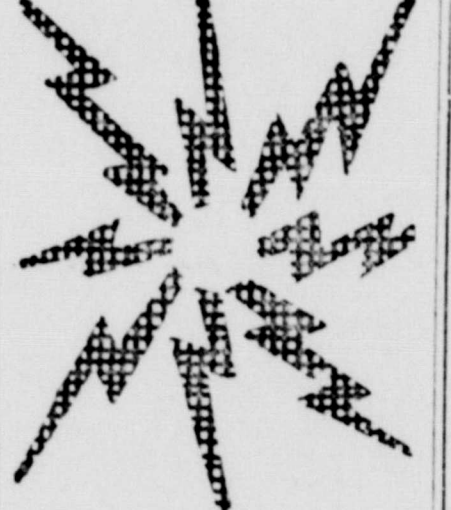

HEAVY HITTING SPOILING SPORT

CHICAGO, June 6.—Heavy hitting is spoiling baseball, Manager Johnny Evers of the Chicago Cubs believes.

"The hard hitting is making life miserable for the infielders and is spoiling the game," said Evers, today. "The balls come down to the players so fast that there is a great danger of a man getting hurt and the players can't afford to take the chances they used to take on bad boppers.

"Unconsciously the infielders are getting in the habit of turning and fielding the ball sideways so as to avoid a possible accident, for they know the balls are hit so hard now that a bad hop into the fact would result in a broken jaw.

"Half a dozen players have been hurt already this season by being hit by batted balls and some of them were injured so badly that they were out of the game for many days.

"The clean fielding of a few years ago, is impossible. They say the ball isn't any livelier, but it must be or it wouldn't travel so fast.

"Pulling an infield in to cut off a runner at the plate when a man is on third with none or one out is almost suicide now. When that close to the batter, the infielder is just trusting to providence that he doesn't get hurt.

"I suppose the fans like to see hitting, but they don't like to see loose fielding and no other kind is possible under present conditions.

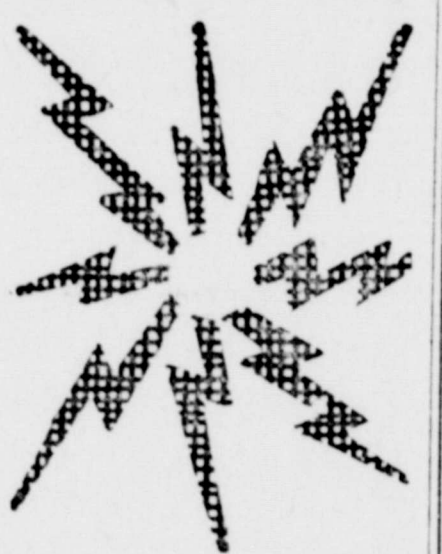

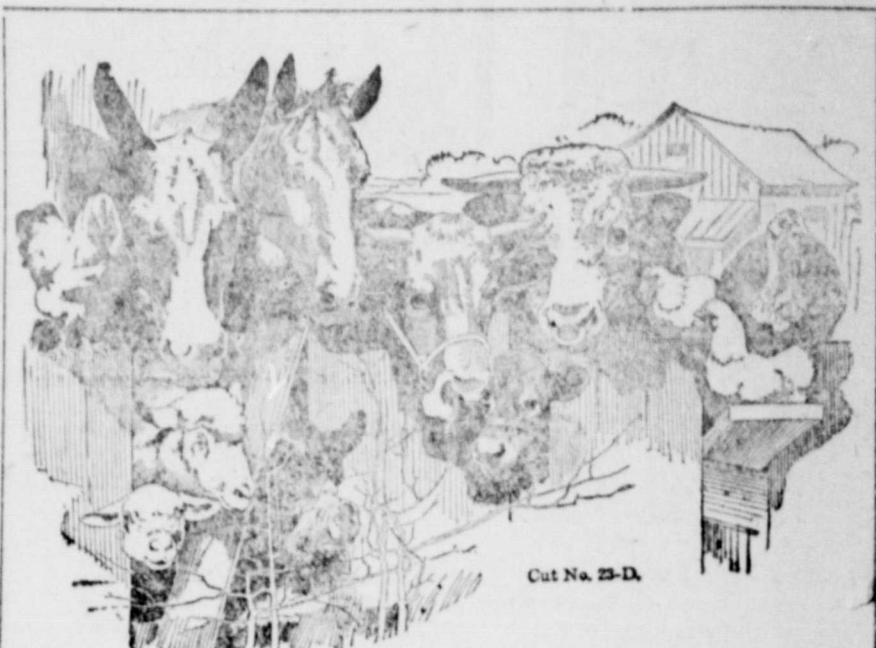
