R. R. WORKING RULES CONTINUE

CHICAGO, June 18.—Rules and working conditions governing the Big Four brotherhoods will continue in effect until changed by negotiations between the brotherhoods and railroads, or by the Railroad Labor Board, according to a ruling of the board today. The board's ruling issued as interpretation of its decision on April 14th, abrogating its decision of July 1920, that the national agreement be continued pending hearings on rules in controversy by the board.

at Stagg Field, at the University of Chicago. Sixty one colleges and universities are represented by 240 athletes, each of whom won championship titles at conference meets this year, or national meets last year. Many are represented in the United States Olympic games.

ERROR MAY DEFEAT NEW LAW

AUSTIN, June 18.—Various department heads today expressed the opinion that an error in naming an article to be amended in joint house resolution No. 30, passed at the regular session of the Legislature, and which is to be voted on by the people on the fourth Saturday in July, may cause the intention of the resolution to be defeated. It is too late to correct the error.

The amendment in question which will be passed on by the people at the polls on July 23rd, is the House resolution proposing the abolishment of the Board of Prison Commissioners, and authorizing the Legislature to enact laws fixing an administration prison system. The resolution was introduced by Representative Satterwhite.

ENGLAND FACES GENERAL STRIKE

LONDON, June 18.—The executive committee of the miners' union which met today to consider the coal strike situation, decided to ask all trade unions affected to meet with the miners' representatives soon with an object of taking national action with the miners. It is said that this action implies a general strike of all trades unions if other unions agree with the miners.

IMMORALITY IS CAUSED BY MODERN DRESS

FT. WORTH, June 18.—Detailed disclosures and reports of several Episcopal priests regarding a number of instances of immorality caused the Dallas Clericus Episcopal Church meeting here to seriously discuss the morals and manners of young people of the present age. The question was discussed at length and recommendations will be made for taking steps to check the downward tendencies of the morals of the present age.

The disclosures of immorality made by the priests are said to be the outcome of immodest dressing, jazz music, modern dancing, night riding in autos of youths without chaperones, and a lack of parental control of the youths of the day.

HALF HOLIDAY NOT GRANTED

WASHINGTON, June 18.—President Harding today declined to meet the request of government employes in the District of Columbia that they be given a half holiday on Saturday throughout the entire year. As an explanation for his refusal it is understood that Mr. Harding stated that the granting of such request when the need of economy is paramount throughout the nation would not be to the best interests of public service.

ALLIES OCCUPY UPPER SILESIA

BERLIN, June 18.—An agreement was reached today between German volunteers in Upper Silesia, Polish insurgents, and the inter-allied commission at Oppeln, under which agreement the Germans and Poles will begin withdrawal of troops tomorrow, according to inter-allied representatives in Upper Silesia, who arrived here today. The evacuated territory will be occupied by joint contingents of British, French and other allied troops.

She is a graduate of Ursuline Academy at Dallas, and received the degree of graduate pharmacist at the University of Texas in 1919. DEATH PENALTY FOR ASSAULT 13 YEAR OLD GIRL

DALLAS, June 18.—J. T. Parks, age forty-three, was convicted and given the death penalty today by the jury before which he was tried for alleged criminal assault on a thirteen year old school girl. Parks is married and has three children.

DEFENDS HARDING'S EUROPEAN POLICIES

NIELS, Ohio, June 18.—President Harding's attitude in pacifying Europe has been far greater in its influence than has been realized, not through entanglements, but by holding to strictly American policy, in well expressed notes to foreign governments, Vice President Coolidge told an audience attending the unveiling of the bust of President Harding here today at McKinley memorial.

AXMAN MURDERS TWO AT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, June 18.—An axeman, believed to have been a negro in a pink shirt, about 2.45 this morning fractured the skulls of B. Wolf and wife, Rebecca Wolf, as they slept in their apartment above a grocery store in Sunset Heights suburb.

It was stated at a late hour today at a local infirmary where Wolf and wife were taken, that both were unconscious and will probably die.

Except for plain finger prints on the window through which the man entered, the assassin left no clues. A three-year old boy, the only child of the couple, was asleep in the same room, but was not harmed by the murderer.

According to an employee of the grocery store, Wolf recently had a difficulty with a negro over the collection of a bill. The officers are searching for the negro.

AMERICANS WIN IN POLO MATCH

Hurlingham Polo Field, London, June 18.—America won the first polo match for the international trophy here today, defeating Great Britain eleven to four. Queen Dowager Alexandra, King Alfonso of Spain, the Prince of Wales, King George and Queen Mary, are among the notables attending the contest.

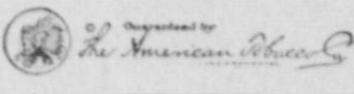

After punishing Gomez Hill, the Abilene Eagles' star pitcher, with five hits and five runs in, the first time up, the Bearcats suffered defeat at hands of the visitors by a 15 to 9 score Friday afternoon. Hill was jerked and Clemons took the mound for the visitor, in the second inning.

Ballinger used four pitchers in an effort to stop the Eagles. Blevins, who started the game for the locals the day before, and who was pulled from the box because he lacked control, started the game again Friday, and suffered four hits and two runs in the first inning. He was relieved in the fifth after the visitors had touched him for a three base clout and a single, and after he had walked two men. Edgar went in, walked the first man and was hit by the second man to face him. He was relieved in the sixth by Page. Page worked up to the middle of the eighth and was relieved by Liles, after he had walked two men and was hit for a two bager and two singles. Liles shut the Eagles out for the remainder of the game. Liles was called out of left field to take the box and Brown went to left garden.

While both teams held the errors down, the game was lacking in pep, and was a slow one. Up to the fourth inning it looked good for the locals, with a six to three score. The visitors piled up five runs in the fifth and five in the eighth, while the locals ran five straight innings without increasing their score.

The third game of the series is on this afternoon, and the fourth has been postponed until later in the month when Abilene returns here for another engagement and the postponed game will be worked in on a double header.

VEGETABLE FREAKS ARE CREATED BY THIS "LUTHER BURBANK"

LAMARQUE, Tex., June 18.—A tomato has been mated with a pineapple and its progeny is named—sunray.

Playing the role of Cupid in this match is P. Dan George, gardener and horticulturist of Lamarque, who has spent 14 years in experimenting with Texas soil and plants.

The "sunrays," as Mr. George has christened them, are of about the same size and shape as their maternal parent, but in color they are a brilliant yellow. Also they contain absolutely no acid. From 90 to 100 days, according to Mr. George, are required for bringing to maturity this new wrinkle in eatables. Pure white tomatoes, as well as blood red ones, containing no acid also are growing in Mr. George's garden plot.

Another successful bit of plant surgery—and wizardry—was the grafting of three varieties of chili pepper plants. The result of this "plant triangle" is a stalk which are yellow, purple, red brown, white and green peppers. The pods are also of different sizes and shapes.

Most interesting of all his present experiments, according to the Lamarque horticulturist, is the crossing of a cantaloupe with a cucumber. At present the product of this "match" is about nine pounds in weight, but, according to Mr. George, when full grown, it is expected to displace in the neighborhood of 18 pounds.

WIFE'S DEVOTION IS DEMONSTRATED

EL PASO, June 18.—A wife's devotion to her husband was demonstrated in the El Paso county jail.

A ragged, bent and forlorn woman in a dress of black, at 3:30 a. m. went to the city employment bureau in the basement of the city hall and took her seat on the last step leading down. She wanted to be sure that she

was among the first to call for the few jobs of washing and housework. She waited until 7:30 o'clock, got a job and did her day's work.

Deputy Sheriff Van Hasslen saw the woman on his way home from the "graveyard" shift at the jail across the street from the employment bureau, at 3:30 a. m. That night, when the deputy sheriff had returned to his duties he met the woman he had seen that morning when he was going home. She was at the prison door, holding a basket of food. Her husband was a county prisoner.

"I wonder," said the deputy sheriff, "how many men would start looking for a job at 3:00 a. m. work all day, take the money and buy delicacies for a woman in the 'lockup.' But such is the way of a woman."

"SALVATION BY GRACE" SERMON SUBJECT GIVEN

Evangelist Kireheville preached on "Salvation by Grace" last night at the Church of Christ revival. Below is a brief summary of the sermon.
"Defining the term 'Grace' in the accepted use of the term as unmerited favor, we give it first place in the great plan of salvation. Not that God was under obligations to mankind because of any worthiness on his part, but that God in his unbounded mercy 'so loved man that He gave His only begotten son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have life eternal.'"
"In order to better understand how we are saved by God's grace, we should understand whether it is conditional or unconditional. If it is unconditional then both saint and sinner will be saved alike or else God would be a respecter of persons. Such scriptures as 'Except ye repent ye shall all likewise perish'—Luke 13:3; 'He that believeth not shall be damned,' Mark 16:16; and he that saith 'I know Him and keepeth not His commandments is a liar and the truth is not in him,' 1 John. 2:4. And many others of equal force prove beyond a doubt that God's grace is conditional."
"Since we now are convinced that God's grace is conditional, the next question of importance is how are the conditions in the acceptance of grace made known unto us, and what are they. We learn in reading Titus 2:11-12 'That the grace of God that bringeth Salvation hath appeared unto all men. Teaching us that denying ungodliness and worldly lusts we should live soberly, righteously and Godly in this present world.'"
"The religious world realizes that God's grace will not convert heathens across the ocean in a direct and unconditional way. They send missionaries over there to present the Gospel and in this way the grace of God reaches to them. Then if it is necessary at an enormous expense to send the Gospel to heathens in order that God's grace may save them, and that God's grace is conditional, and the conditions are revealed through the Gospel, then why ask God to deviate from His divine plan in directly and independent of the Gospel plan, to save our friends and neighbors."

DENTON—Farmers of Denton county met here recently to form a county Farm Bureau unit of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation.

EGGS LEAVING IN CAR LOTS

Carl Jeanes, of the Jeanes Produce Co., reports that the hens in this county are working on full time, judging from the rate eggs are rolling into the local market. The firm is putting out an average of one car of eggs every two weeks, or more than two cars per month.

This output does not include eggs shipped out by other buyers here, or the eggs consumed at home. It is estimated that the output runs about one car per week, which is not bad for a country poultry market, and a country where poultry is made secondary, or considered of little consequence.

The Jeanes Produce Co. put out a car of eggs this week. The car contained 471 cases of thirty dozen eggs to the case, or a total of 169,560 eggs, and they were purchased from the small poultry growers of the county at one cent per egg, this being the market price of the general run of eggs for the past few days, while select or infertile eggs are bringing more money.

At this season of the year it is necessary to cull the eggs closely, and shippers candle every egg—passing them before the candling apparatus one at a time to see that every egg is a clear one, and suitable for market. The small and dirty eggs are culled out. This within itself is a pretty good job, and keeps several hands busy shoveling eggs.

The eggs go in the cooler as soon as candled and are kept there until the car load lot is ready, and then they are loaded in a car cooled with ice the day before, and billed out to Galveston, as a starting point for the larger markets of the world.
