HORRIBLE ACCIDENT ON SANTA FE CUT OFF

SWEETWATER, June 20.—A. W. Hartzog, a farmer 34 years old, who was killed Thursday afternoon by a special train on the Santa Fe near Herndon, was buried here yesterday. The train, an engine and a passenger coach, running extra to Sweetwater to take a load of Chinese colonists en route from the West coast to Cuba under bond, was running between 50 and 60 miles an hour, trainmen say. Mr. Hartzog was returning to his home from Sweetwater in his car after obtaining some medicine for a sick member of his family. The train struck his auto squarely as he drove on the track, hurling it 200 yards from the crossing. The man's body was thrown over 100 feet, it falling face downward on the track.

HUN SUB SUNK BY PLANES

WASHINGTON, June 21.—A former German submarine, the U-117, was sunk off Cape Charles today by the first squadron of naval seaplanes which bombed it, according to reports received at the navy department.

Like a swarm of mosquitos from nearby marshes, bearing "death dealing stings," scores of planes swept out to sea today to seek and destroy the submarine in the first of a series of tests to prove or disprove the claims of the air service experts that the development of the naval aircraft spelled doom for surface warcraft.

SEAPLANE WRECK TEN MEN HURT

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., June 20.—A naval seaplane bomber, outward bound for a bombing test at sea, fell at Hampton Roads today, apparently exploding some bombs the ship carried. The wrecked craft caught fire. A navy tug rushed to the aid of the seaplane and the ten men aboard the plane were saved although some of the number were badly injured.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Naval seaplane NC-7 was wrecked and burned after being forced to land in Hampton Roads today. A telephone report from the navy department said that the plane was not a bomb carrier.

COMPLETE LOG CENTRAL H-WAY

Frank M. Jarrell, business manager, and Ernest W. Willette, organization manager, of the Automobile Club of Texas, passed thru Ballinger Monday en route to Dallas for a tour of the Central Texas Highway to El Paso.

These two gentlemen left Fort Worth last Monday a week ago for the purpose of logging the route of the highway from Shreveport to El Paso, and they report a most successful trip. With few exceptions they received the most hearty encouragement and co-operation from towns along the route. They say that the people along the route from Ft. Stockton to El Paso are anxious for the route and gave them every assistance possible.

Arrangements have been perfected for marking the highway from Shreveport to El Paso, and work will start on both ends of the line next Monday, one crew working out of Fort Worth West and the other crew working East. This will place Ballinger on one of the most important highways in the Southwest, and the camping advantages and all-year weather conditions will make the route an attractive one for tourists, and no time will be lost in advertising the route.

The "pathfinders" report that they found the roads in fairly good shape, which is evidenced by the fact that they made the trip from Ballinger to El Paso, stopped at every town and met with the people and perfected plans for marking the road, and returned to Ballinger in less than a week. With few exceptions the roads are in good shape. It was stated, and the interest in road building throughout this section of the state will bring them up to the highest standard in time.

JITNEY DRIVER GIVEN WHIPPING

HOUSTON, June 21.—W. Stuart, a jitney driver of Goose Creek, was taken to the woods and given a whipping and a coat of tar and feathers and directed to leave town before sunset today. The whipping occurred near Goose Creek.

Stuart told the officers that he could not recognize the men. He said that there were about fourteen in the party. He advanced no reason for the treatment accorded him, and the police failed to apprehend any of his assailants.

LEGION PLEDGES MONEY FOR SOLDIER'S HOSPITAL

SEARCH MADE FOR PIRATES

WASHINGTON, June 21.—A world wide search for the missing crew of the schooner, Carrol A. Deering, of Bath, Maine, which was found piled on a North Carolina beach last January, with its sails set, but not a living soul aboard, was started today by the American state department thru the United States consular service.

The department of commerce is also working on the case and is going on the theory that the oil steamer Hewitt, which disappeared at the same locality about the same time while bound from Texas to Boston, and the Deering were captured by a pirate crew thought to be afloat in the North Atlantic.

PULLMAN CO. LOSES FIGHT

CHICAGO, June 21.—The Pullman Company lost its open shop fight before the United States Railway Labor Board today, when the board upheld the contention of the union leaders that the Pullman Co. did not obey the letter or the spirit of the transportation act when it conferred with employees at mass meetings.

The board threw out the company's petition for a cut in wages of shop employes and instructed the company to go back and meet the "duly elected representatives of the employes."

WESTERN BANKERS TO MEET WITH HARDING

WASHINGTON, June 21.—President Harding has invited a group of twenty Western bankers to confer with him Thursday in the second of a series of conferences recently initiated by the chief executive with leading finance interests of the nation. It was announced at the White House today.

AUSTIN, June 21.—The executive committee of the American Legion, department of Texas, yesterday pledged itself to see that \$17,000 subscribed by Texas people for the Kerrville hospital for ex-service men, be paid to the state. A resolution to that effect was adopted by the executive committee yesterday. This money was used for other purposes by the American Legion, it was said.

Besides acknowledging that the Legion owed Texas that amount, the executive committee requested the resignation of Colonel John W. Young, as committee man from the Tenth district. Young recently resigned as editor of the Legionnaire.

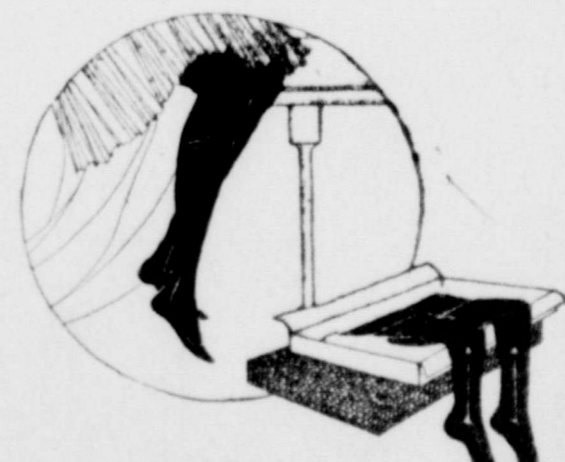
A bill was passed by the last legislature providing that the state take over and maintain the Kerrville hospital and also providing that the Legion return to the state the \$17,000 subscribed for the institution.

CHAMBERLAIN PROBE TO BE MADE AGAIN

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Congressional investigation of the dismissal from the Marine Corps of Capt. Edmund G. Chamberlain, of San Antonio, for his alleged false claims regarding war exploits in the air, was recommended today by the Senate naval committee.

Senator Sheppard told the committee that the British official records prove Capt. Chamberlain's claims. The Texas senator charged that jealousy of British officers, who were not allowed to have their names published in connection with the story of the exploits, was the moving spirit proceeding against Chamberlain.

A cypress tree, estimated from a small asphalt pit in southern California, has lately been identified by the curator of a Los Angeles museum as a relic of the Pleistocene or Glacial age. As such it was contemporary with the mastodon, the saber-tooth tiger and the giant ground sloth. The find is considered the more remarkable, because no living specimens of the cypress are to be found in the vicinity. The tree is in an excellent state of preservation, too, thanks to the action of the enveloping tar. The bark is intact in many spots, and is unchanged except for the discoloration incident to long contact with the bituminous matter of the pit. The tree lacks its roots and smaller branches, but two of the larger are still to be seen.

King robbed the visitors out of several runs with his thrilling bagging of long drive flies, and Bratcher pegged in home from deep center in time to cut off two or three kittens at the plate. That boy has some arm.

Langford sprained his ankle while leaping for a high fly in the second inning. Brown took his place and drove the ball away for a complete trip in the fifth.

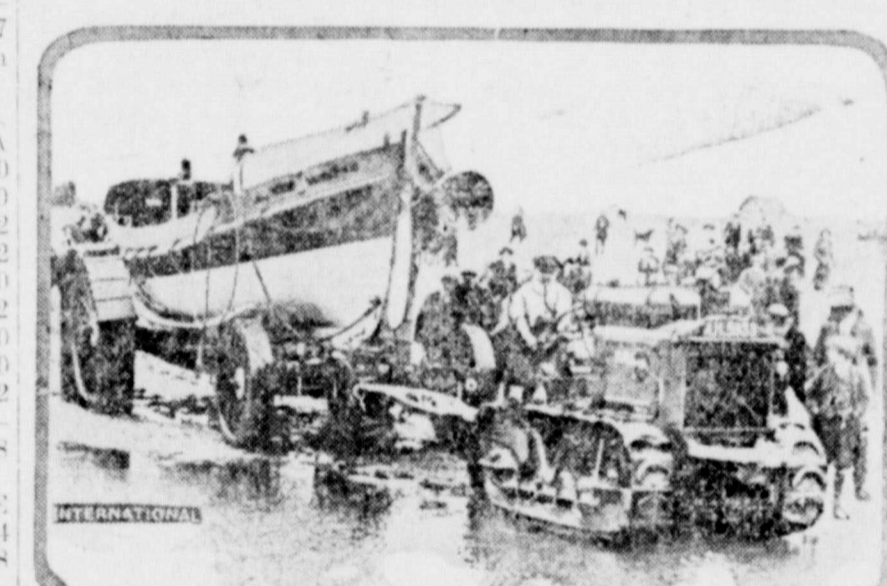
