J. JOHNSON MAY GET FREEDOM

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Attorney General Daugherty indicated today that he might consider a pardon for Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion who is now serving a year's sentence in Leavenworth penitentiary for violation of the Mann Act. Attorney General Daugherty is expected to take up the matter before the day set for the Dempsey-Carpentier fight. He said that Johnson had made a model prisoner and a "liberty bonus" had been suggested for him.

BUSINESS MEN TO FIX BUDGET

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Charles G. Dawes, of Chicago, who was chosen by President Harding yesterday to head the new government budget system, announced today after a conference with the president, that he would call a number of experienced business men to serve on the budget bureau committee without pay because he considered the staff provided by Congress wholly inadequate. Mr. Dawes said that he would ask that two army officers who had distinguished themselves in the American Expeditionary Forces be detailed to serve the bureau, and said that he had asked his business associate in Chicago, William T. Abbott, to serve temporarily, acting as assistant director.

GREEKS SATISFIED WITH CONSTANTINE

EL PASO, June 23.—The people of Greece are satisfied with King Constantine, according to Lewis Nodos, who has just returned from Greece.

"When Venizelos was in power he had soldiers in the streets and when two men were found talking together they were arrested," Mr. Nodos said. "If they could not tell the same story about the subject of their conversation when questioned separately they were thrown in jail on suspicion that they were plotting against Venizelos."

"Greece is pleased with the outcome of the war against the Turks. Because of the war, prices are high in Greece, but money seems to be plentiful."

FLAYS WAR-TIME PROFIT PIRATES

WASHINGTON, June 23.—War-time "profiteering pirates" were flayed today by Senator McCumber, Republican, in an address in the interest of adjusted compensation for former service men.

PUTS UP CASH FOR CEMETERY

In response to a call for cash with which to improve the local cemetery, those owning lots in the cemetery have subscribed liberally, and the Cemetery Association will proceed with the proposed improvements.

The water works system will be extended by installing another windmill and laying new mains to sections of the cemetery where there is no water at present. Driveways will be graded so vehicles can get thru the sand.

It is the plan of the association to maintain this work hereafter by levying a small tax against each lot in the cemetery, and in cases where the owner of the lot fails to pay the tax, the unoccupied part of the lot will revert back to the association and will be sold to others as single burying lots.

The association was recently chartered and the work of maintaining the cemetery hereafter will be conducted on a business basis, a board of directors being elected annually.

SIMS SAYS HE WAS MISQUOTED


WASHINGTON, June 23.—Rear Admiral Sims reported personally to Secretary Mellon today. He informed Mr. Denby that he had been misquoted in the press accounts of his remarks in London touching the Irish question and regarding the Irish sympathizers in the United States. The officer had been recalled on a leave of absence to explain his remarks, and Secretary Denby directed him today to make a written statement giving a correct text of his speech.

BILL TO EXTEND LOANS TO ALLIES

WASHINGTON, June 23.—A bill embodying the plans of Secretary Mellon for the refunding of the war loans made to the allies was introduced in the Senate today by Chairman Penrose of the finance committee. The bill was referred to the finance committee.

The bill would grant blanket authority to the secretary to reconvert or extend loans on interest payments, or to accept foreign securities in payment and settle all claims not now secured.

NO DAMAGE IN PATH OF STORM

DALLAS, June 23.—After curving along the Texas coast for more than two hundred miles from the mouth of the Rio Grande river to Port Arthur, the Gulf hurricane, which has been raging since Tuesday evening, passed inland within fifty miles of Houston, and turned in a Northeast direction, rapidly losing its intensity as it went. The storm is today in Northeast Texas.

Heavy rains accompanied the disturbance over Texas as far North as Dallas, and the rains continued today. The storm left comparatively little damage in its wake. No loss of life has been reported.

The greatest damage so far reported was to small shipping in the vicinity of Port Aransas. Reports from Houston today indicate that considerable crop damage along the coast resulted, the damage to crops beginning to be reported as communities which have been cut off to Matagorda Bay territory are being re-established today.

The latest advices from the oil tanker, William H. Dolley, whose propeller was ripped off in the storm yesterday, was that the vessel which passed through the storm safely, and will probably be picked up today by a relief ship and towed to Galveston.

DEATH CLAIMS GOOD CITIZEN

Dave N. Crockett, age fifty-one years, died at the Halley & Love Sanitarium Thursday morning at eight o'clock, after an illness of several days, and following an operation for gall stones which was performed last Monday. Deceased was in a serious condition when brought to Ballinger from his home South of Ballinger, and all that the surgeons and physicians could do could not save this good man's life.

Dave Crockett had been a citizen of this county for about fifteen years, moving to this county from Lampasas county, where he lived for the greater part of his life. He was born in Smith county, Texas.

Since moving to Ballinger, he has resided in different sections of the county, and at the time of his death he was living on Fuzzy, near the county line on the Ballinger-Paint Rock road. He was numbered among the most successful farmers of this county.

Deceased had a host of friends who will be grieved to learn of his death. He is survived by a wife and nine children, and five brothers and two sisters, all of whom were present at the funeral. The brothers are Bob and John Crockett, of this county; Tom and J. N. Crockett, of Mills county; and Jess Crockett, of Lampasas county. The sisters are Mrs. W. B. Hodges, of Winters; and Miss Maggie Crockett, of Humble.

Following death the remains were removed to the home of L. L. Williams, 501 Ninth Street, and funeral services conducted from that place at five o'clock Thursday afternoon. Dr. Alvin Swindell officiating.

ANOTHER FREAK IN EGG LAYING

Crews Alexander, the grandson of C. R. Crews, thinks he has an egg which will hatch out more drumsticks than Ed O'Kelly's three legged chicken has. Crews feels sure that at least four drumsticks are tied up in the egg which he found in the chicken lot. The egg is perhaps the largest piece of hen fruit ever exhibited here. It comes from the Rhode Island Red breed of chickens and measures six and one half by eight and one half inches.

MEXICANS IN BATTLE; 8 KILLED

LAREDO, Tex., June 23.—Further unofficial details of the battle between Mexican federal troops and about fifty alleged bandits near Huisachito, South of Nuevo Laredo, Tuesday, give the number of soldiers dead at eight, and two wounded. The bandit casualties are still unknown here. No further trace of the band has been found by the pursuing federal troops, the report stated.

UNIONS TO FIGHT PACKING TRUST

DENVER, June 23.—One of the most important questions passed on by the American Federation of Labor in convention here today was the adoption of a resolution calling upon congress to enact legislation for the control of the meat packing industry of the United States.

The officials of the Kansas mine workers' union were commended today by the convention for their stand against the industrial court law. Moral and financial aid was voted for the men for "so courageously opposing the law in the face of injunctions and prison terms, preventing the law from taking effect and thereby fighting the battles of organized labor."

ANTI BEER BILL BEFORE THE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The Willis-Campbell anti-beer bill, with minor amendments, was reported to the House by the judiciary committee today. The rules of the committee are expected to give the bill right of way in the House soon.

Crops were never more promising in South Ballinger at this time of the year. The farmers are needing more sunshine just at this time, however.



Stockmen are making every effort to rid the ranges of the pests, and in some sections are using expert rifle shots to hunt the beasts down. The expense involved in capturing and reducing the horses for the foreign market is not commensurate with the possible profit.

In former years the wild beasts were lassoed at round-up time and shipped by trainloads to St. Paul, Omaha, Kansas City and St. Louis, where they were sold to smaller dealers. The pick of the herd often brought \$100 each after being domesticated. Cow

ponies went to the British army, which found these light, blocky horses well adapted to South African service. Ordinary stock brought \$15 to \$30, while the culs sold at \$2.75 per head, and were sent to the slaughter, yielding an average of 60 pounds of good canned horse meat for shipment to the European markets. The hides and hair were saved and the balance used for fertilizer, glue, etc.



NORMAL VISITED BY SPEAKERS

The normal was visited Wednesday morning by Mr. J. H. Armstrong, superintendent of the Tom Green county schools, who was accompanied by Miss Lucille Spann, Home Demonstration Agent for the same county.

These parties visited several classes while at the normal. At 10:00 o'clock Mr. Armstrong addressed the students taking second grade work.

The subject spoken on by Mr. Armstrong at this hour was, "Better Teachers, Better Schools." He discussed briefly the duty of teachers;

"I uphold the profession. Do not hold a higher position than you are yourself. Teachers influence pupils for good or bad. Be leaders. Develop not only the minds but also the hearts of those intrusted to your care. Put into the child principles of real man-and-woman-hood. Put into teaching your best and the returns will be the best. Make your contracts good. Develop into a 'four square' teacher."

He closed with "Texas is calling for you."

At 10:45 Miss Spann, the Home Demonstration Agent addressed the entire student body in chapel, where she explained the work of the Extension Department of the A & M College in the line of Home Economic teachers.

Miss Spann stated that this department offers work in the line of sewing, canning, cooking, poultry raising, Mothers' Clubs, etc.

These clubs are organized in connection with rural schools, she continued, teachers cooperating with the agent. Pupils work for district contests, then state contests, as in other lines of our educational work.

Miss Spann has about ten clubs organized in Tom Green county, and says the clubs have accomplished some excellent work.

Mr. Armstrong and Miss Spann will meet with the C. C. T. I. board Wednesday afternoon.


