GOMPERS RE-ELECTED PRESIDENT OF A. F. L.

DENVER, Colo., June 25.—Samuel Gompers was re-elected president of the American Federation of Labor today by a heavy majority. The veteran labor leader defeated John Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers' union. Only two of the largest unions cast a solid vote for Lewis. They were the machinists' union and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters.

Gompers has been president of the organization, except for one term, since 1881.

UNION OFFICERS HOLD UP FUNERAL

CHICAGO, June 25.—An Italian funeral was stopped for forty-five minutes here today by men who claimed to be union officials, who objected to a non-union band marching in the funeral procession.

After a protest and after the funeral had been held for nearly an hour the non-union band was substituted by a union band and the procession proceeded to the cemetery, where the union member was laid to rest.

NORTH TEXAS IN FLOOD DANGER

DENISON, Tex., June 25.—Lowlands in this section are today in danger of considerable damage from floods caused by heavy rainfall last night. Creeks in this vicinity are again rising from rainfall during the last sixty hours which exceeded eight inches.

A shower of rain fell at Ballinger Saturday morning about four o'clock. The rain was local, extending only a short distance North and East, and was accompanied by an electric storm. Farmers in the city later in the day reported that the rain was not heavy enough to stop work.

LONDON, June 25.—Both striking coal miners and mine owners have accepted an invitation from Prime Minister Lloyd George to confer with him and the board of trade Monday with a view of endeavoring to reach a settlement of the coal strike which has been in progress almost three months.

PAYS \$3,000 FOR ONE BILLY GOAT

DEL RIO, June 25.—That the report that the goat men of this section are broke is greatly exaggerated was evidenced here yesterday when John Ward of Sonora sold to Bob Davis, president of the American Goat Breeders' Association, of Del Rio, a fine buck for \$3,000. This is the highest price ever paid for a goat at auction in this country.

Six men contended for the animal above the \$2,500 mark. These were James Prentice, of Junction; Adolph Bitters, of Brackettville; N. H. Skaggs, of Junction; Sim Read of Kingston; N. M. Felix Harrison, of Del Rio; and A. L. White of Montell.

The goat had a wonderful fleece, which weighed 25 pounds. Some of it was twenty-six inches long. Mr. Ward bought the fleece back for \$300. He said that fifteen pounds will sell for \$20 a pound to wig makers, who will get as high as \$50 for some of the strands.

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TULSA POLICE CHIEF INDICTED FOR RIOT

SIMS GETS OFF WITH REPRIMAND

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Acting Chairman Poindestex, of the Senate naval committee said today that in view of the reprimand administered to Rear Admiral Sims by Secretary Denby, the Senate naval committee would probably not conduct an independent investigation of the admiral's London speech. An inquiry by the committee was proposed in a resolution offered by Senator Harrison, of Mississippi, and adopted recently.

Secretary Denby reprimanded Admiral Sims late yesterday, and in doing so, said, "This department deprecates the fact that it is necessary to rebuke a flag officer in public, but you have made such action unavoidable. The department expresses its strong and unqualified disapproval of your conduct in having delivered a highly improper speech in a foreign country, and you are hereby publicly reprimanded."

FORMING PLANS TO HELP FARMERS

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Secretary Hoover today told the Senate committee that efforts were being made by the banking interests to mobilize the banking credits for carrying over the country's surplus cotton and sugar. Mr. Hoover stated that the object is to prevent forced liquidation of these commodities, and the plan is identical to that which was carried out by the cattle industry.

Mr. Hoover was called before the committee to give his views on the Norris bill to create one hundred million dollars government farm export corporation. He told the committee he did not favor the measure, and said, "I don't want to appear to depreciate any proposal intended to assist the agricultural industry, because the situation today, which reduced the purchasing power of the American farmer sixty-seven per cent, has put him in the most serious duress agriculture ever had to face. The situation is most acute and the extension of further credit facilities, for supplying food products to Europe would give any adequate remedy."
