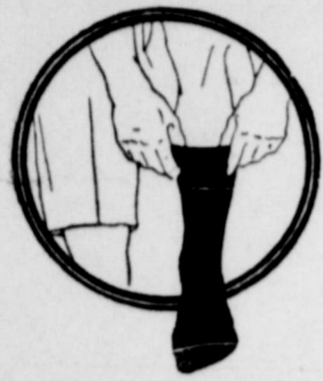

COTTON POOL SEEMS ASSURED

The campaign which has been underway in Texas for the past two or three months to pool one million bales of cotton under the direction of the Texas Farm Bureau, seems to be practically assured, according to information received by Farm Agent Eaton of this county.

The time within which the bureau had set for pooling the cotton closes on July first, and many who had promised to come in if it should be shown that the amount would be contracted, are coming in during this week.

Up to last Saturday night, 600,000 bales had been contracted, and the campaigners went out this week expecting to go over the top by Friday night.

Runnels county ranks among the leading counties in contracting its quota of the crop, and with one million bales pooled the Farm Bureau expects to be able to show the advantage of the new marketing system, and gain the influence of other farmers, and finally adopt a marketing system which will solve the problem.

Emmett Guin left Monday for San Benito, where he goes to buy cotton during the early cotton season. He will return to this county when the cotton crop here begins to come on the market.

STORM IS MOVING NORTH

WASHINGTON, June 28.—A special bulletin today from the weather bureau said that the disturbances from the Caribbean Sea were central today over the Southwestern portion of the Gulf of Mexico, and were moving Northward with an undetermined intensity. Vessels in the waters of the Gulf have been warned to exercise caution.

MARTIAL LAW IN W. VIRGINIA

CHARLESTON, W. Va., June 28.—Governor Morgan, in a proclamation here today reaffirmed the declaration of martial law in Mingo county, where strike trouble was renewed, and commanded the assessor there to enroll all persons liable for military duty, and also ordered the sheriff to draft one hundred and thirty men, or accept volunteers who will be mustered into service for state militia duty for sixty days.

REFORMERS TRY TO STOP FIGHT

JERSEY CITY, June 28.—Robert Watson, an official of the International Reform Bureau, accompanied by five Jersey City clergymen, appeared in Chancery court today in an effort to block the Dempsey-Carpentier fight. The committee was given a respectful hearing and told that the matter would be taken under consideration.

JERSEY CITY, June 28.—Vice Chancellor Stevenson today denied a motion of the International Reform Bureau for an order directing Tex Rickard to show cause why he should not be restrained from staging the championship prize fight.

They made the trip in their cars, leaving Ballinger between showers about two weeks ago. Despite the wet roads and little minor car trouble, they report a pleasant vacation, camping out along the route and spending several days in San Antonio and Corpus Christi. The pleasure seekers were in Sinton during the gulf storm last week, and while the wind struck them at about sixty mile speed they did not become alarmed and suffered no ill effect from the experience. The tourists spent the first night out on the San Saba and camped on the exact spot where Jim Doss and other Ballinger fishermen recently camped, recognizing the camp ground as that of the Ballinger fishermen by certain signs and articles left behind, including a copy of the 'Ferguson Forum.'

MOTIONS OVER RULED IN P.O. MURDER TRIAL

DALLAS, June 28.—Every motion of the defense, including a plea of abatement and change of venue, having been overruled in the state court, counsel for Charles Gaines, charged with the murder of G. W. Street, postal employe killed in the Jackson street sub-station robbery last January, today applied to the federal court for a writ of habeas corpus to remove the defendant from jurisdiction of the Texas state court. Federal Judge Jas. C. Wilson, in whose court Gaines is under indictment for mail robbery, opened the hearing on the habeas corpus plea today, and in the meantime a special venire of three hundred men ap-

peared in the state criminal court of Judge C. A. Pippen, having been ordered for the selection of a jury to try Gaines for murder. In its plea for a writ of habeas corpus counsel for the defense asserts that Gaines was removed from Indianapolis, where he was arrested, and brought to Dallas on a federal warrant charging mail robbery, and Texas courts were without jurisdiction and authority to try him on another charge. The defense counsel contends that a state warrant for murder should have been served on Gaines in Indianapolis before he was brought to Texas on the federal warrant, if the state court also expected to try him.

Light Company Files Suit to Prevent Building Plant

The Interstate Electric Corporation filed a suit in the District Court of Runnels county Tuesday against the city of Ballinger, seeking to prevent this city from building a municipal light plant. The petition was filed about noon Tuesday, but citations had not been served on the city officials up to a late hour Tuesday afternoon, but will be served as soon as placed in the hands of the proper authority.

The petition alleges that the city commission violated the law in selling the bonds recently voted for the building of a light plant and making water works improvements at less than par value and accrued interest, and after setting up other allegations, prays the court to cancel the sale of the bonds.

The Interstate Electric Corporation also files an injunction suit seeking to restrain the city from collecting taxes to pay interest on the bonds and for creating a sinking fund.

While the city has sold the bonds, has the cash in the bank, and engineers on the ground making preliminary plans for building the light plant, and have already started the water works improvements, the suit will probably tie the whole matter up until it is thrashed out in court.

This is the last of a series of efforts on the part of the foreign light and ice company to prevent this city from building a municipal light plant. The first effort was to stop the issuance of city warrants for building the light

BRITISH MINERS STRIKE ENDED

LONDON, June 28.—The British coal miners' strike, which has been in progress since last April, was settled today by an agreement between the miners and mine owners being accepted. It was officially announced that the strike was at an end and that all miners would return to work.

LONDON, June 28.—It was understood that Lloyd George will ask parliament to authorize the granting of a ten million pound subsidy for the mining industry of Great Britain. Mines will resume work generally Monday if the subsidy is granted. The government recently proposed the subsidy, but withdrew it when the mine owners and miners failed to agree.

REPUBLICANS TO SPEED UP

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Representative Asorge, of New York, issued a statement today asserting that the new Republican members of the House were dissatisfied with the promise made Congress at special session, and that he and ten others had joined in a call for a conference tomorrow night when approximately one hundred new Republican members will discuss the situation. Mr. Asorge stated the meeting was not called in any spirit of revolt, but that the new members wanted to cut out some of the red tape and substitute action for delaying of important legislation.

IRISH TO MEET IN CONFERENCE

BELFAST, Ireland, June 28.—Sir James Craig, Ulster premier, announced today that the Ulster cabinet had accepted an invitation of Lloyd George for a proposed conference of representatives from Northern and Southern Ireland with the British premier. Premier Craig will be accompanied to the conference by all ministers of the Ulster cabinet, except Sir Dawson Bates, whose duties necessitates his remaining at Belfast.

Fire originating from the Pierce Oil Corporation's wholesale station at San Angelo shortly before two o'clock today caused a loss estimated at \$250,000, according to information received in Ballinger.

In conversation with John Brewer, of the San Angelo Standard, about three-thirty The Ledger learned that the fire destroyed five large oil tanks, the wholesale office of the Pierce Oil Corporation, the Santa Fe freight station, the Martin Glover Co., a large wholesale house, several freight cars and other property.

The fire spread from an explosion of one of the oil tanks, and the large amount of oil on hand in the other tanks threw fire for several blocks. It is believed that all the oil tanks except one were open, or the other tanks would have exploded.

Just how the fire originated is not known. A workman was near the tanks unloading oil from tanker cars, and in giving his version of the origin of the fire he stated that the first he saw was something like an electric spark, and then suddenly great flames shot up, and the fire soon enveloped the whole works and the explosion followed, throwing the fire to the Martin Glover wholesale house and adjoining property.

The Pierce Oil Corporation and scene of the fire is located on West Fourth Street West of the Santa Fe passenger station. Other property in this neighborhood was saved by the heroic work of the firemen. All the city's fire fighting reserve was called out, and the entire power strength of the electric light and power plant was put behind the water power, the city being cut off from electricity during the fire, and all business depending on current suspended.

The Martin Glover Co. suffered the heaviest loss, their loss being estimated at \$100,000.

There is too much difference between the unrolled and rolled out markets.

One man has been given life sentence, another death sentence, for the same murder in Comanche county, and the man who actually did the killing has not been tried. Wonder what his punishment will be?

The farmer who operates a cream separator, a family canning outfit, an incubator, has some time left to feed the hogs, but he has no time to worry about low priced cotton and cotton pools. He is what is known as an independent farmer.

The towns which have been cutting up about the federal census report, claiming that they did not get a just count, might take a lesson from the scholastic enumeration of Corpus Christi. The school enumerator accounted for 6,045 children, while the state called for a recount and only found 2,096. The state enumerator could not even find the streets where some of the school enumerators reported children residing. It doesn't pay to pad anything.

The re-election of Sam Gompers president of the American Federation of Labor, shows that the labor unions have been taught a lesson in conservatism, and the radicals must go. Lewis, the opposing candidate for president of the A. F. L., is the recognized leader of the radical element, and carried a solid vote of the radicals in the convention, but the conservatives controlled. "DOCTORS BY MAIL"

In 45 states we have laws known as an Optometry Law. In these states an optometrist before he can practice his profession has to be a graduate of some reputable school that teaches optometry, and pass a satisfactory examination. There are a number of universities and colleges that have a chair of optometry. Among them is the Columbia University. The time required to complete a course in optometry is from 2 to 4 years, and not 6 weeks.

Unfortunately this big state of Texas has no optometry law, and it is a distinction that the optometrist does not desire. One reason for not having an optometry law is the "political medical man," who for selfish motives fights it as they did in other states; as they did with dentistry. Right now we are working hard to get an optometry law in this state, just like they have in every other state, and do away with conditions as the eminent doctor spoke of in his ad yesterday. I want to admit that there is a bunch of incompetents run out of other states, who are calling themselves optometrists, and opticians. Why this fight from the medical man? We are only trying to clean our own house, have made no mention of the incom-

petency of the physician in fitting glasses. With his 5 to 10 years in medicine he only has a few hours in fitting glasses. If conditions are so bad in Texas, let's have an Optometry Law. If it is good in all other states, it will be good in Texas.

About the prices of optical work, a reputable physician in Ballinger informs me that he charges \$25.00 for Kryptok glasses, and not \$10 to \$15.

CONTRACTS FOR CEMETERY WORK

The contracts for laying the streets, and digging a new well in Evergreen Cemetery was awarded to Frank Wood at a meeting of the cemetery board of directors Monday afternoon. The work is already underway and will be rapidly pushed until the improvement program is carried out.

The new well will be located in the center of the main street running North and South on a line with the old well, and will be North of the driveway leading in from the gate. This places the well in about the center of the North or East side of the cemetery. Pipes will be laid and windmill and tank equipment will give the cemetery the much needed addition water supply.

The new streets will be cayed, making it possible for vehicles to pass up and down the streets without getting stuck in the sand, and a driveway will circle the live oak hedge in the Southern part of the cemetery.

A surveyor is at work straightening the streets in the unplotted part of the cemetery and laying out new lots, and the weed cutter is operating on full time.

The money contributed recently by those owning lots in the cemetery, and by other individuals, will be used in paying for the improvements. The asso-

ciation will need more money, and those who have not had a hand in the work should hand in their subscription at once.
